## Austria Jews Boycotted by State Project

#### Vienna Restaurant Chain Openly Upholds Move; **Buys Only Gentile**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, Jan. 23.—A wholesale
boycott of Jewish merchants by
the state-maintained municipal
chain of low-priced restaurants is chain or low-priced restaurants is in progress here, officials of the chain making it a point of refus-ing to buy from Jews even if they offer lower prices than their Gentile competitors, Neue Welt, Jew-ish newspaper, reported today.

Charging that officials of the "WOEK" not only conduct the movement, but actually permit widespread agitation for an antiwidespread agration for an anti-Jewish boycott with full knowl-edge of the government, Neue Welt publishes letters from a num-ber of Jewish merchants attesting

to the open anti-Jewish boycott.

"WOEK" is a semi-state institution which daily feeds tens of
thousands of officials and employees of the municipality and
the government.

Jewish circles point out the inconsistency of the government and the municipality, which tolerate an outright anti-Jewish boycott, but at the same time continue to issue denials that there is any of-

issue demais that there is any or-ficial anti-Semitism in Austria. Recently Viennese anti-Semites distributed lists of merchants on every street, marking the names of Jewish tradesmen and urging or Jewish tradesmen and urging the population to refrain from buy-ing in Jewish shops. ## Pelley, Guilty, Faces 5-Year Prison Term

#### He and Aide Out on Bail of \$2,500 Each Pending Sentence Feb. 18

(Special to the J.D.B.) ASHEVILLE, N. C., Jan. 23.— Found guilty late last night of two Found guilty late last night of two counts in an indictment charging them with violation of the North Carolina "blue sky" laws, William Dudley Pelley, anti-Semitic Siver-shirt leader, and Robert C. Sur-merville, one of his aides, today enjoyed temporary liberty under bonds of \$2,500 each. Sentence will not be passed until February 18, Judge Wilson War-lick announced today. The pair face imprisonment for as long as five years on each count, or fines

five years on each count, or fines of \$1,000, or both.

A third co-defendant, Don D. Kellogg, was free of all counts, while Summerville and Pelley were acquitted of the seventh count in the indictment.

### Chief Rabbi Places Hope in Rome Agreement

Two declarations, one expressing anxiety over the existence of Jew-ish institutions in the Saar, and the other expressing hope that the "Aryan paragraph" will not be applied to Saar Jews, were issued to-day by the Jewish Community. Simultaneously, Dr. Lothar Roth-schild, new Chief Rabbi of Saarbruecken, gave an interview em-phasizing the fact that the situation of Saar Jewry is "dark and uncertain" and that the community places its hopes entirely on the guarantees secured by the Franco-German agreement in

The first manifesto of the Federation of Jewish Communities in the Saar, issued today, states:

"We hope that the quieted at-mosphere and the state of appeasement into which Europe is now ment into which Europe is how entering will also favor more peaceful and more just judgement of the entire Jewish problem. We are now fused with German Jewry. We desire to work together with the German Jews for the honor of Judaism.

Anxious Over Institutions

## Austria Likely To Enact New Curb on Jews

#### Tyrol Proposal Would Further Restrict Law Practice

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) (Jewish Tolegraphic Agency)
VIENNA.—A new project
which, if it becomes law, would
impose further restrictions upon
the activity of Jews has been
brought forward by the Advocates Chamber of Tyrol and submitted to the Government, which now has it under consideration.

Under the proposal, law practice for advocates would be fixed from one to two years. Only those would be admitted to the second court year who had been declared trustworthy in and out of service by the President of the Supreme Court.

In practice, every lawyer would be eligible to admission to the first year, but for the second year he would be at the mercy of the President of the Supreme Court.

In this connection it should be pointed out that since 1920, when the Christian Socialists formed a government, no Jew has been ap pointed a judge in Austria.

The attitude of the government appears favorable. Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, the Chancellor, is himself from the Tyrol.

JERUSALEM.—The Legislative Council is required to improve the state of the country, the former mayor of this city, Ragheb Bey Nastashibi, stated in an interview which appears in Al Jamia Al Islamia, Arabic daily.

In answer to a question as to why he promised in 1922 to accept the council, which the government proposed contrary to the feelings of a large section of the inhabitants of Palestine, Ragheb Bey said: "I thought that the loss of this

"Is there a posibility that the government will set up the Legis-lative Council?" asked the interviewer.

"The High Commissioner has stated many times, both in Geneva and here, that it is his intention to set up a Legislative Council and I think that the High Commis-sioner feels that it is a real necessity.

"The members of the National Defense Party, with which I am working, also feel the necessity of this institution, and it is one of their many aims, in their attempts to improve the state of the country."
