Needless to say, this is not
the German view; and confirmation of the conception of a Germanic type, embodying all the virtues of a superman, is found in the evidence of archaeology and racial history.

Cites Hitler's

"Mein Kampf"
Herr Hitler himself affirms in
"Mein Kamp" that the Aryans alone among the peoples of the world have been "founders of culture," and another prominent official of the Reich, Dr. Frank, is reported to have declared that from the substance of the Ger-manic race have issued the highest achievements of man-kind, so that it might be con-sidered the duty of the entire human race to safeguard this basic element.

This may come as a surprise to those who are not familiar with certain lines of argument in the racial question. It is a view which derives from the middle of the last century and the theories of the Comte de Gobineau, in which the Aryans, the white races par excellence, were regarded in their mission to mankind at large as only a litte lower than the angels.

Modern Models

Of 'Aryan' Race
Briefly, the German doctrine
of the "Aryan" race is that the
tall, long-headed, fair-complexioned Nordic peoples of northern Europe are the modern representatives of the original "Aryans." To this race is due the high standard of culture found throughout the civilized world. Not only is this true in antiquity, in the civilizations of Mesopotamia, Egypt, the Medi-terranean and so forth, but even the contribution to culture of Romance countries in modern times is to be attributed to descendants of the Nordic race. descendants of the Nordic race. They were endowed with cer-tain bodily characters, which represent the highest evolution of the human form; and in addition they possessed, as a racial inheritance, certain outstanding

mental qualities.

It was in virtue of these physical and mental characters that they became the ruling classes in most ancient and

Earliest 'Aryans'
Proto-Nordics?
It would be beyond the present purpose to enter into a detailed examination of these in-terpretations of ethnological, archaeological and historical archaeological and mistorical fact, or to weigh the probabili-ties that the earliest "Aryan"-speaking people were Proto-Nordics, who carried their tongue to the other races of

That the Nordics were a far wandering people who irrupted into many lands is unquestioned; but as nomads their early cul-ture was crude, and the people they conquered must almost in-variably have been of a higher cuture than themselves. But whatever their cultural status, a whatever their cultures status, we strict anthopometric measure applied to the modern population of Germany would find true Nordics in all their racial purity in an embarrassingly small in an embarrassingly minority.

Dogma Could Not

Stand Test
That Germany has adopted a highly colored interpretation of history, which in the greater part of its detail would not stand the test of a moment's impartial examination, is a matimpartial examination, is a mat-ter of lesser import beside the fact that, by the forcible im-position of certain views on race and racial history, assumption has been taken as proof; and research and its results, unless 'orthodox,' have been banned on a rumber of questions such as racial heredity, racial admix-ture, the relation of race, mentality and culture, and the like, upon which science would hesitate to pronounce finally in the light of the evidence available.

Such dogmatic assumptions, unfortunately, have their at-traction for the political doctrinaire and the agitator; and it is pernaps to be regretted, there-fore, that the International Con-gress of Anthropological and Ethnological Sciences did not see its way to promote investigation into such racial problems on broad lines. The machinery may seem overweighty; but at least the truth would have been made available in authoritative

Kishinovsky, Noted Author Journalist, Founded Paper; Author, Came From Russia

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) RIO DE JANEIRO, Feb. 6. Adolf Kishinovsky, Jewish short story writer and journalist of note, died here today. He was forty-five years old.

He was born in Russia and educated there. In 1909 he emigrated to the Argentine and began his literary career two years later. 1918 Kishinovsky settled in Rio de Janeiro, where he helped found and edito the first Jewish weekly in Brazil, which appeared in 1923. Since then he had been editor of a number of Jewish newspapers in Brazil.

Kishinovsky's short stories and feuilletons were widely published in the general press of Argentina and Brazil. He also edited the first book of Jewish stories of life in Brazil to be published there. The anthology was called "New anthology Homes."

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British Uphold Palestine Act On Revisionists

Secretary Says Colonial Regimes Have Powers of Revocation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
LONDON, Feb. 6—Colonial governments in the British Empire have the power to revoke citizen-ship rights of individuals they consider as undesirable, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister declared today in the House of Commons when the question of revocation of the citizenship rights of Aha Achimeier the Palestine government was raised.

Questioned by Colonel Josiah Wedgwood, Sir Philip answered that he had never approved of the action and that he had no power to approve, since such a preroga-tive belonged to the various colonial governments.

Achimeier, acquitted of the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, Laborite leader, was sent to jail for twenty-one months for mem-bership in the Brith Habiryonim, alleged secret terrorist organization. The sentence was reduced by the Court of Appeals to eighteen months.

The Palestine government re-cently notified Achimeler that unless he could show cause to the contrary his citizenship would be

cancelled.

Protests from Revisionist groups all over the world followed on the heels of the notice of revocation. Dr. Yevin and Joshua Lichter, convicted with Achimeier in the Brith Habiryonim case, were also notified that their citizenship rights had been withdrawn.

His first action after receiving his appointment from the High Commissioner was to refuse to share municipal work with Daniel Auster, Jewish vicewith Daniel Auster, Jewish vice-mayor. He even refused to as-sign Auster an office in the mu-nicipal building. Later he con-sented to share the work with Auster if the Palestine government would give its consent.

Proposed Barter Pact Killed By Roosevelt, Called 'Illegal'

(Continued from Page One) ment in cash and the remainder in goods. It involved approximately \$30,000,000. Aside from Jewish opposition to

the pact, the agreement repre-sented a difference of opinion between the Southern cotton growtween the Southern cotton grow-ers and industrialists elsewhere, who saw in the barter aspect of the deal a danger to American manufactured products.

In return for the American cotton, the United States would have received registered marks with which goods could be purchased in Germany. What worried govern-ment officials, and in the last analysis caused the President to turn down the proposition, was the fact the registered marks, on a gold basis, are cheaper and would make it possible for buyers to bring into the United States extremely cheap goods that might work injury to domestic business.

At one time it was suggested that the Export-Import Bank, headed by Peek, might be used as a depositary for the funds involved and underwrite the risk and handle the exchange policy.

Hull Began Opposition

The first opposition to the deal was born in the office of Secretary of State Cordell Hull. Hull, a be-liever in reciprocity treaties, urged this form of agreement rather than the barter suggestion of

Peek contended that if this country could not increase exports through the sale of goods, it should increase them through exchange or barter of goods,

The proposed deal involved be-tween 500,000 to 800,000 bales of cotton. At first this appeared to the liking of the Southern growers that it seemed that they would exert enough pressure on the Administration to force acceptance of the German offer.

Factors tending to weaken the Southerners' advocacy of the deal had been the upward trend of cotton since August and the realization that the cotton involved would only be a drop in the bucket, that it involved the normal sales to Germany, and no more.

Importance Exaggerated The Texas Weekly, one of the outstanding farm publications in this country's leading cotton producing State, pointed out that the deal, though welcome, was having its importance exaggerated.

Also involved was the question of Germany's moral integrity. A number of countries had experienced difficulty in collecting their due from Germany. The Netherlands, in particular, had voiced dissatisfaction with the manner in which Germany had lived up to a trade agreement negotiated last September.

This phase of the situation was pointed out by Samuel Untermyer, president of the non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, in a long letter to Secretary Hull denouncing any proposed agreement between the United States and Germany.
