Puts Burden Of Exile Cost **Upon League**

McDonald Tells Refugee **Body it Must Finance** Work of Settling

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, Feb. 12.—A demand that the League of Nations directly finance the settling of Jewish and other refugees from Germany and the Saar was sounded today at a meeting of the committee which the League of Nations has established to cooperate with James G. McDonald, the High Commissioner, in his work.

At today's session the committee approved of Mr. McDonald's plans to investigate the possibilities of the settling of refugees in South American countries. Mr. Mc-Donald will reach South America early next month for the purpose of studying the immigration question there.

Addressing today's meeting, Mr. McDonald, as well as representative of the French government, emphasized that efforts to settle the refugees in various countries must be concentrated under the direct supervision of the League of Nations. This attitude was also supported by Lord Robert Cecil. "It is clear that the responsibility for the care and the settlement of the refugees must rest on the League," Mr. McDonald said in his address. "It is only through the League that the work can be effectively done. Hasn't the time come for the reaffirmation in the most unequivocal manner that the League is inescapably responsible in this whole matter of refugees?" McDonald asked.

Open Anti-Semitism of Nazi Paper Rouses Apprehension

VIENNA, Feb. 12. — Apprehen sion was felt in Jewish circles here today because of severe anti-Jewish attacks which have appeared in a number of Nazi newspapers, publication of which is now permitted in Austria.

Fears arise from the fact that the Austrian government is now quite indifferent to the anti-Semitic propaganda which the Nazi press continues to feature. their attacks today the Nazi newspapers demand a complete boycott against Jewish lawyers.

Today's anti-Jewish articles are published in papers subsidized by Dr. Walter Riehl, leader of the Nazi party in Austria. Dr. Riehl, in a signed article. writes that "anti-Semitism is naturally permitted in Austria and is not considered a movement against the government."

Arabs Seek To Cut Power Of Auster

Ask Third Vice-Mayor as Ruse to Control Jerusalem Council

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM, Feb. 12.—Further complications in the municipal council arose today when it became known that Daniel Auster, the Jewish vice-mayor, may not automatically replace Mayor Khalidi during his absence. At the same time Arab leaders submitted a demand that a third Christian Arab be nominated as additional vice-mayor in order to create a non-Jewish majority.

The demand for a third vicemayor was submitted to District Commissioner of Jerusalem Campbell today, despite the fact that the Palestine government has officially promised that there would be two vice-mayors, one a Jew and one an Arab. It is predicted here that the government will reject the Arab demand.

A tacit agreement between the Jews and the Arabs that Auster was automatically to replace Mayor Khalidi during his absence has been ignored in the new by-laws referring to the mayoralty. These by-laws reserve to the High Commissioner the right to nominate a deputy during the absence of the Mayor.

The question as to whether Auster should occupy a special office in the municipal building has also not been settled and has created serious dissatisfaction among the Jews, in view of the fact that the vice-mayor's status has not yet been completely clarified.

Meat Control Plan Hits Polish Jews

Poland Obliged ToGuardRights Of Minorities

Simon Tells Commons Pact Repudiation Is Invalid

Jabotinsky Sees Zionist **Pact Violated**

Holds Executive Blocks Entry; Scores Tel Hai Warning

Charging the World Zionist Executive with "deliberate infringement both in spirit and in letter" of the peace pact signed between himself and David Ben Gurion in London, Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the Zionist Revisionist party yesterday announced that "any further peace negotiations with the present Zionist Executive alone would be futile." Mr. Jabotinsky demands in his statement that a round table conference of all Zionist parties be called. Otherwise, he warns, "peace within Zionism is in eater danger than ever before."

The charges of the Executive's breach of faith are founded on Jabotinsky's contention that obstacles are still being placed in the path of Revisionists who seek immigration certificates to Palestine. Mr. Jabotinsky also con-tends that the warning recently issued by the Executive against supporting the Tel Hai fund which the Revisionists have established is a violation of the London agreement. Another charge which Mr. Jabotinsky makes is that the Zionist Executive intends to change the printed text of the "shekolim." The reason for this projected change, Jabotinsky asserts, is to convert the shekel into a narrow partisan membership and thus make Revisionist participation in the next Zionist Congress impos-

Text of Statement The text of Mr. Jabotinsky's statement follows:

"One of the three agreements concluded in London, at Mr. Rutenberg's initiative, between Mr. Ben Gurion on behalf of the Zionist Executive and myself on behalf of the Revisionist Union, stipulated that both sides should suspend certain reprisals against each other, namely:
"1.—The Zionist Executive

should suspend the ban on Betar certificates, restoring all the rights of the Betar with regard to Hachshara and Aliya;

"2.—The Revisionist Union and the Betar should suspend the boycott of the Zionist Funds. "It now appears that the Zionist Executive has failed to carry out to complete the final arrange- its obligations: unsurmountable

HaltStreicherMedicalPublicity,/ Reich Health Leaders Ask Hitler

The complaint is signed by the Health Commissar of the Reich and by health commissars of five German states. The health officials point out in their protest that while Streicher may be correct in field only.

The Troubles of Rumania

By Our Bucharest Correspondent

BUCHAREST.

Since the Autumn of 1928, when the National Peasant Party, led by Dr. Maniu, ousted the Liberals, after the first free elections the country had experienced since the war, Rumania has lived through three further elections, twelve Governments, the return of the King, and a severe economic and financial crisis.

Today, although the income of her 17,500,000 odd inhabitants is less than half that of 1928, and although public finances, owing to chronic budgetary deficits, are in a parlous state, Rumania has hardly any unemployed. The number of persons without work is only about 20,000. Four-fifths of her inhabitants are practically self-supporting peasants, and many of the remainder could probably go back to the land.

The late Government's policy of maintaining the price of grain contents of all classes continue to return to the producers has given reasonably good results, and since the peasants have also had their debts reduced by half and made payable over a period of seventeen years by law they are now much better off than they were a year ago. The End of an Armistice

Jews interested in Palestine, whether Zionists or non-Zionists, wili study carefully the statement made yesterday by Vladimir Jabotinsky, breaking off further negotiations for peace with the present Zionist Executive and demanding a round table conference of representatives of all groups.

Whether one agrees or disagrees with Mr. Jabotinsky's theories, the charges which he voices against the Executive are grave. Mr. Jabotinsky accuses the Executive of violating the peace pacts signed recently in London and thus throws upon the Executive the blame for destroying the possibilities for Zionist unity.

Waiting for a Reply

We still have to hear what the Executive has to reply to Mr. Jabotinsky's charges. From a distance it is difficult to establish whether there is any justification for the complaint that the Revisionists are still not receiving immigration certificates for Palestine, to which they are entitled under the London agreement.

Similarly, very little is known in this country as to the intentions of the Executive with regard to changing the printed text of the Zionist shekel, which Mr. Jabotinsky asserts "will be converted into a partisan membership card."

Party Funds and J. N. F.

Somewhat clearer is the complaint about the warning issued by the Executive against the Revisionist Tel Hai fund. This warning coincided with Mr. Jabotinsky's arrival to America to stimulate a campaign for this particular fund. The Executive is, therefore, open to the suspicion of having to spoil Jabotinsky's mission to the United States.

It was perhaps unfortunate that the Executive issued its Tel Hai statement at a time when all groups in the Zionist movement were on the road to unity. After all, the Jewish National Fund and the Keren Hayesod are little affected if the Revisionists, in addition to supporting these two funds, also indulge in their own partisan collections. Such collections have been made for years by the Mizrachi and by the Laborites and have not harmed the Zionist Funds in the slightest.

War Again?

With the sessions of the Actions Committee scheduled to take place next April, it would be wise for leaders of the various Zionist factions to acquaint themselves fully with Jabotinsky's charges against the Executive, in order once and forever to bring definite recommendations to the Actions Committee. There is a good deal to be said in favor of the suggestion that the negotiations which the Executive is carrying on with various Zionist groups be turned into round table discussions. The Actions Committee can decide whether this should be done. It would be a grave mistake for the committee to permit the internal party strife to flare up again in a much stronger form than ever, particularly with the next Zionist Congress only a few months off.

Arrest Students Medical Diplomas Who Besieged Wilno Offices

Used Spectacular Means in Asking Community Pay College Fees

WILNO, Feb. 12.—Several Jewish students were arrested today on charges of leading a demonstration before the offices of the Jewish Community, demanding that the Community pay tuition for Jewish students in Wilno University, from which numerous Jewish students had been ousted for non-payment of fees.

The demonstrators besieged the Jewish Community offices and stationed guards at every entrance to the building. A delegation of ousted students then appeared before the Community officers and informed them that they would not be permitted by the demonstrators to leave the building until the matter of reinstating the ousted Jewish students in the university was settled satisfactorily.

The police, who arrived at the place of the demonstration, dispersed the demonstrators and arrested all of those who were found in the building. A special police guard was then placed before the offices of the Jewish Community in order to prevent any possible

Urges Posts Here For Exiled Scholars

The establishment of endowed chairs at American universities for Jewish scholars custed from Germany is urged in ar article published in The New Republic, entitled 'Jews Out of Germany":

Mr. McDonald estimates that some 4,500 professional men and women, teachers, technicians and students, have left Germany, but that of this number less than 2,000 have found permanent posts, a number of them, oddly enough, in Turkey, where the government is seeking to establish a modern educational sys-Although many of these

professional people are distinguished scholars and eminent experts in their fields, it is difficult to fit them into academic and professional circles in other countries. University and research budgets are strictly limited in these days and to give a post to a German scholar usually means that the native scholars have to make up his salary by reductions in their

As Professor Norbert Wiener cogently points out in an article in The Jewish Advocate, this is not a method of helping German refugees but of spreading anti-foreignism and anti-Semitism. The remedy is enlarged endowments (though Dr. Alvin Johnson has done a notable piece of work with limited funds at the New School for Social Research, New York City), and those who would like at one stroke to aid the refugees and advance learning could do no better than back The Jewish Advocate's campaign to establish endowed chairs at American universities for these emigre scholars.

Would Encourage Migration to Syria

Should Jews be encouraged to settle in Syria?

The Philadelphia Jewish Exponent, in an editorial, answers this question in the affirmative. The paper writes:

The report from Beirut to the effect that German refugees and possibly Jews from other parts

of Europe, will be permitted to settle in Syria, though not alto-gether unexpected, is, nevertheless, welcome. Investigations conducted in recent years in neglected parts of Europe, in South America, in other parts of the world, have shown that with few exceptions the Near East affords the best opportunity for Jewish settlement. Palestine is doubtless the ideal place. Official reports from that ancient country reveal the extraordinary fact that the absorptive capacity of the land appears to become greater as its Jewish population increases.

It is natural that the adjoining countries, Syria, Iraq, Transjordania, should desire to join in the progress and the development of their neighbor. Jews unable to go to Palestine are willing to settle in these coun-They should be given every opportunity to do so.


Donates Funds for First Tel Aviv Trade School

TEL AVIV, Feb. 12.—The first municipal trade school in Tel Aviv will be established with special funds donated by a Russian Jew named Pernikoff, according to a decision adopted by the munipality today.

Reich Art Body Absent at Rites ForLiebermann

Academy Not Represented at Great Artist's Berlin Funeral

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, Feb. 12.—Not a single representative of the German Academy of Art was present at the funeral yesterday of Max Liebermann, famed Jewish artist and former president of the Prussian Academy of Art, who died last Saturday at the age of 87. Professor Liebermann was buried at the Old Jewish Cemetery in the Schoenhause-Allee.

The funeral was attended by about 100 persons. Among them were Professor Saurbruch and his wife and the former vice-president von Kardorff. No representative of the German authorities participated in the last rites.

The Jewish Community of Berlin was represented at the funeral by Dr. Stahl, president, and Dr. Klee, vice president of the Community. A wreath was laid on Liebermann's grave by the union of Jewish War Veterans.

Karl Scheffler, outstanding German art critic, delivered a short eulogy at the grave. "Professor Liebermann," he said, "was the distinguished beacon which directed the course of German art. With Liebermann's death now, a distinct period of cultural life is disappearing. The deceased will be remembered by all art lovers in Germany and by German artists."

Rabbi Dr. Warschauer delivered a eulogistic sermon. Among those attending the funeral services were also Dr. Max Friedlaender, Jewish director of the State Museum, and Max Osborn, well known German-Jewish critic.

Reich Press Pays Tribute to Artist

BERLIN, Feb. 12.-While the Voelkischer Beobachter, Hitler's organ today termed Professor Max Liebermann "as a Marxist artist," other newspapers in Germany paid high tribute to Liebermann's mem-

The Frankfurter Zeitung carries an article by the famous art critic Hrnst Benkard, that Professor Liebermann's works will last and his name will never be forgotten as one of the greatest exponents of German art."

The Voelkischer Beobachter describes Professor Liebermann's works as "remote from racial conception" and as "over estimated." The Nazi paper aserts that in recent years Professor Liebermann's

(Continued from Page One) obstacles are still being placed, almost in every country, in the way of the Betar Halutzim applying for certificates.

"On the other hand, the Jewish Agency has issued a statement calculated to obstruct the success of the Tel Hai Fund—an obviously unloyal act since we have, under the agreement, stopped all attacks of the Funds of the Zionist Organization.

"At the same time, the Zionist Executive has announced its intention to change the text to be printed on the Shekalim, thus attempting to transform the Shekel, created by Herzl as a symbol of adherence to the Basle program, into a narrow partisan membership card. There are, moreover, soon to be expected further steps in the same direction, deliberately calculated to render participation in the Zionist Congress inconsistent with the political conscience of Revisionists, and so to ensure forever the domination of the Socialist wing. And all this is being done in a hurry, before the resumption of the peace negotiations so solemnly promised, with the obvious intention to make such negotiations useless and impossible.

Further Talks 'Futile'

"These deliberate infringements by the Zionist Executive of both the letter and the spirit of the London agreements are conclusive proof that any further peace negotiations with that Executive alone would be futile; and that the only hope of reaching some kind of stable accord between the various Zionist bodies is to convene a round table conference of all Zionist parties, especially as the present Zionist Executive does not represent such important groups as the Mizrachi and the section 'B' of General Zionists.

"I warn all those who are sincerely anxious for a united Zionist front that, unless they all join in protest against these tactics of

More Certificates

Supplemental List Expected at End of Week, Agency Announces

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
JERUSALEM, Feb. 12.—Additional immigration certificates will be issued by the Palestine Government to the Executive of the Jewish Agency at the end of this week, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency has been informed. It is hoped in Zionist circles here that the number of additional certificates will exceed the supplementary number granted last year.

The Executive of the Jewish Agency has already started negotiations with the Palestine Government for certificates required for the next six months beginning April. The Executive has submitted figures to the government upon which it bases its demand for the labor certificates, at the same time expressing the hope that the government will agree that the present shortage of labor justifies an increase in immigrants to Palestine.

unloyal sabotage and in the demand for a round table conference, peace with Zionism is in greater danger than ever before.

"As to the Tel Hai Fund, whose reorganization was only completed in the middle of last year's Spring, its first annual report will be published after Passover; and it is more than unfair on the part of the Jewish Agency to insinuate, before such a report could be presented, doubts as to the Fund's activity in assisting the upbuilding of Palestine.

Upholds Palestine

"The Fund, despite all the handicaps inherent in any period of beginning, has already spent not inconsiderable sums in equipping the Kapat Cholim of the National Labor Union, in constructing dwelling - barracks for National workers in several colonies, and in several other directions; and a reserve gradually and steadily increasing, has been set aside for building the Union's headquarters at Tel Aviv as soon as a plot for this construction will, as we hope, be granted by the municipality. This has been done apart from the Fund's original function—the support of courses and camps training the Betar youth in the Diaspora to protect their people against pogroms; courses and camps from which, up to date, some four thousand sport instructors have graduated.

"The Tel Hai Fund enjoys great sympathies among the neutral Jewish masses in Eastern Europe. A striking example is the decision. of the Vilna Jewish community to include into its budget a subsidy to the Keren Tel Hail—an example which will find followers.

Scope of Tel Hai Drive

"The next Tel Hai drive will be carried out, in Palestine, Europe and South Africa, in commemoration of Trumpeldor's death on Adar 11th. The drive will last from March 15th to March 18th. The following appeal to all members of the Revisionist Union, the Brith Trumpeldor, and the Brith Hachayal (Veterans' Union) has been issued in this connection:

'Prepare for exceptional 'Giyus' (mobilization) with regard to the 11th of Adar. The bulk of the collected sums will be used to strengthen the National Labor Union in Palestine which we intend to develop into the decisive factor securing the principles of arbitration and class partnership within the Yishuv.

"'To the Jewish Agency's attack on the Tel Hai Fund you will answer by establishing a record of collections never reached by any other fund.'"
