Accept Bid to Attend Parley Seeking Ways to Oust Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) VIENNA, Feb. 22.—While Chan-cellor Schuschnigg is visiting Paris, assuring the French government that he has the good-will of the that he has the good-will of the entire population in Austria, his troops, known as the "Ostmar-kische Sturmscharen," accepted an invitation today from the anti-Semitic Association to participate in a conference which it is calling to discuss ways and means to oust the Jews from Austria.

The Anti-Semitic Association, which consists of representatives which consists of representatives of different parties approving of anti-Semitism, has been active in Austria under the present regime and has been supported by gov-ernment circles. Plans are now be-ing put into effect by this organiing put into enect by this organization for the purpose of intro-ducing a campaign against Jews, not only in the fields of employ-ment and free professions but also in commercial fields.

Demand Food, Coal

15-30% of General Income Tax

WARSAW, Feb. 22.—The Minister of Finance issued an order today providing that taxes paid by Jews in Poland to the Jewish comnunity for the maintenance of Jewish institutions should be in-creased to equal from fifteen to thirty per cent of their general income tax.

The exact percentage of the in-crease will be established in each city in accordance with the needs of the local Jewish community. In Warsaw, the Jews will have to pay the maximum which is set at thirty per cent of the income tax-

The Minister announced that the strike has ended. The fourteen who may be released are still detained because no suitable bail was furnished.

The prisoners, who were arrested for illegally entering the country, will be placed in two classifications those who had already completed jail sentence and those who still have to serve the terms which they were sentenced as illegal immigrants. The first will be released after posting individual \$500 bail bonds.

"The mass of German Jews ac-tive in economic life have just as great an interest in the develop-ment of Germany's foreign trade and export as all other merchants working in exporting branches," the statement says.

This declaration, published in the Central Verein Zeitung, the official organ of German Citizens Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, the econom-Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, the economic dictator of Germany, has in the last two years repeatedly stressed the importance of export to the economic development of

Germany.

"The German Jews, who are inseparably bound up with German
economic life, are well aware of
the importance of these questions,
Jewish exporters have during the past two years devoted all'efforts to the development of Germany's export trading," the article in the C-V-Zeitung declares. "The fact that the Jews outside

A good many American intellectuals are getting an emotional kick out of accepting "orders" and yielding themselves swooningly to a "rigid discipline."

Their art will no longer be a self-willed hoyden. It will be utilitarian, propagandist, or-ganized. Temperament, they say, is an indulg-ence of petty bourgeois minds. As for themselves, the only inspiration they need is a commandment from the Mt. Sinai of proletarian art. In a world of chaos and uncertainty they can at last stop worrying and thinking-inspired

can at ast stop worrying and timizing—inspired dialectic leaders will tell them exactly what to write or paint and what to do with the stuff.

I do not doubt their earnestness. But neither do I doubt that their self-abnegation is at bottom an emotional

amusement. In taking orders in the new church of dialectic art, amusement. In taking orders in the new control of diacette air, they are aware in their nerves if not consciously in their minds that the bond is not so binding, after all.

Their yielding to dictation has the dignity of being voluntary. It is a slap in the bloated face of smug, self-centered bourgeois art. It puts them among the revolutionary elite, a narrow and highminded brotherhood pledged to live and die for a cause. In fact, it's a little like joining a prole-tarian Freemasonry, with a ritual of beliefs, a ceremonial of ac-tion, passwords for themselves, cusswords for those in the outer

I happen to know these intellectuals fairly intimately, not individually but as a type. It seems to me that the chief element in their new dedication, in their ac their new dedication, in their ac-ceptance of dictatorship, is not discipline but rebellion—rebellion against the present American scene. But rebellion is the one element that is most dangerous and least tolerated under a functioning dictatorship.

How many of them will remain in the fold when the ritual and the "social orders" are no longer voluntary but are enforced by an American G.P.U., an omnipotent censorship with police powers? When the dialectic arguments to keep them in line will no longer consist of sophistries but of con-centration camps and exiles and the loss of food cards and total ostracism? When petty writers with a gift for toe-licking, ward politics and sycophancy will be the taskmasters of the sacred discipline?

This does not mean that I am ignorant of the restraints upon any artists implicit in any social order. The freedom of an artist often does come down to a freedom to He or a freedom to die. The fact that some chains do exist, however, seems to me a very inadequate reason for enthusiastically pulling them tighter and locking them with locks of police decrees and excommunications. On the contrary, the existing restraints and economic bludgeons which destroy sensitive artists should serve as a warning against restraints that are time more rigorous and against in-tellectual systems that are infi-

nitely more rigid and limiting.

Whatever influence American
intellectuals can exert would be much better invested in loosening discipline and encouraging honesty and independence of mind. There is still time to fortify notions of freedom-even relative freedomsas insurance against the day when as insurance against the day when there will be no choice, when the discipline will be enforced by a real iron dictatorship.

The Executive announces that the Revisionists in Palestine intend to organize mass meetings and protests against the notices served by the governments there to Revisionist leaders, informing them that their citizenship may be cancelled. A special petition may also be sent to the High Com-missioner of Palestine, the statement says.

There is one thing which the League of Nations ha s neglected to do before handing the Saar over to the Reich, and that is to revise the sentences of those imprisoned in the Spar inite There are many prisoners in the Saar today who would have been released immediately if a group of international officials looked into the charges against A large number of Jews and Social Democrats were re-cently arrested in the Saar for no other purpose than to be kept until the Nazis take control of the region. One can easily imagine what these prisoners will have to face now, after March 1, under the Nazi regime

The 4,000 Jews of the Saar who will on March 1 automatically he subjected to Nazi mile any be subjected to Nazi rule, have remained in the territory chiefly because they would not have been admitted into any other country. special credits to expedite the settlement of refugees wherever this may be possible. It is becoming clear that this problem cannot be solved unless interested governments actually contribute to the financial upkeep of the apparatus established un-der the League of Nations for dealing with the refugees.

James McDonald, the High Commissioner, who heads this apparatus, has long been apaling to different governments direct assistance. He has pointed out on numerous occa-sions that the work conducted hy his office for the refugees is financed almost exclusiv Jewish organizations. T This, he emphasized, is rather abnormal. The problem of the refugees would long ago have been solved if countries affiliated with the League of Nations had exhibited more readiness to solve it, he indicated.

Britain May Help

In Financing Work From certain remarks made week by Sir John Simon, the foreign minister of Britain. it may be assumed that the British government, and perhaps other governments of central Europe as well, may finally take a hand in financing the work of Mr. McDonald's office. Should this be the case, the problem of the Jewish refugees from Ger-many will be solved in a very short time. There is, after all, no new influx of refugees from Germany. Those of the German Jews who have remained in the Reich are now hoping for a change in the Nazi policy and are in no hurry to leave Germany.

This hope has been aroused in German Jewry by the repeated demand of Dr. Schacht, the minister of economics, that the Nazi government revise its Jew-bait. ing policy. Anxious to increase German exports abroad and, especially, to obtain large foreign loans, Dr. Schacht is trying his hest to influence Hitler and the others to let the Jews alone and to order the discontinuance of anti-Jewish propaganda in the Nazi press

Spurred by Failure To Get Loan

The interest which Dr. Schacht has suddenly taken in the Jew-ish problem is due not only to the theory that the boycott of German goods abroad is crippling German industry, but also to the fact that Germany's ne-gotiations for a \$200,000,000 loan in the United Staaes have completely failed.

Very few know that a delegation sent by the German government to America to obtain a loan here left last week for Berlin without successful results The delegation included such personalities as Dr. Hugo Stinnos and other industrialists and bankers. It conducted its negotiations in the United States tiations in the United States quietly. It was almost on the verge of getting the desired loan. At the last moment, how-ever, the banks that agreed to sponsor this loan were prevent-ed from doing so. The delega-tion had to leave, disappointed, and to carry to Hitler the me sage that the sentiment against e Nazi government is rather rong in the United States, the United strong in partly also because of the anti-Jewish discriminations.

It is for this reason that Dr. It is for this reason that Dr. Schacht, the head of the entire economic system of Germany, has been arguing that the time has come to let the Jews in Germany alone. In his argu-ments Dr. Schacht is supported not only by leading industrialists of the country, but also by the more liberal elements in the Nazi party. He is, however, severely opposed by the chauv-inistic Nazis of the Streicher type.

The question, to ease or not anti-Semitism in Germany, came up this week at a conference of Nazi officials in Berlin. The results of this conference have been, of course, kept secret. The course of the kept secret. The course of the will, however, disclose whether Dr. Schacht's recommendations with regard to the Jews were adopted or rejected at this conforonce

In connection Schacht's proposal it is per-haps interesting to know that the sentiments of the Jews in Germany are definitely against the boycott of Germans goods ahroad. This sentiment was expressed publicly this week by German Jewish leaders. The attitude which these leaders have taken is that the Jews abroad are actually playing a very small role in the boycott of German goods and that the entire boycott movement is being conduct-ed for reasons other than fighting for Jewish rights in Ger-

many.

To substantiate this theory out in their public statements that Palestine, the Jewish country, is not at all boycotting Ger-man goods. On the contrary, German export to Palestine is constantly growing. It has sub-stantially increased since the Nazi regime.

Hold Boycott Hurts

nota Boycoll Huris Reich Jews Also Whether this statement is made by the German Jewish leaders of their own will or un-der pressure it is difficult to establish. There were many occa-sions when Jewish leaders in time, however, it stands to rea-son that the Jews in Germany do not wish any anti-German boycott to be conducted by Jews abroad, since such a boycott also affects Jewish commerce in Ger-

while there is hope that anti-Jewish discriminations in Germany may come to a standstill, certain uneasy winds are begin-ning to blow from Rumania, where all was comparatively quiet on the Jewish front till now. A new decree issued by the Rumanian government on labor threatens the ousting of thouands of Jewish employes from their positions. At the same time, meetings are being organ-ized by anti-Semitic groups demanding limitations for Jews in # the field of the free professions and educa ٠nn.

Trouble Looms On Rumanian Front A report that reached New

York this week from a respon-sible Jewish leader in Rumania warns that the Jewish situation there will definitely grow in the near future. Though King Carol himself is definitely deter-mined to suppress the activities of all anti-Semitic organizations. the members of the present Cab-inet are determined to violate the King's policy and to press legislation that will undermine Jewish existence.

Jewish organizations in Ru-mania are therefore mobilizing their forces to fight for their their forces to fight for their rights on legal grounds. In this fight American Jewry will prob-ably have to take a hand if the anti-Semitic plans in Rumania are to be carried out, as indicated by a number of recent acts.

The Federation of Rumanian

Jews in America held its annual convention in New York last week, but little was reported at this convention on the Jewish situation in Rumania. Instead of dealing directly with matters concerning the welfare of Ru-manian Jews, the conference devoted the major part of its ses-sion to issues which have nothing to do with Rumanian Jewry.

The principles of Jefferson are the definitions and axioms of free the definitions and axioms of free society. And yet they are denied and evaded, win no small show of success. One dashingly calls them "glittering generalities." Another bluntly calls them "self-evi-dent lies." And others insidously argue that they apply to "superior

These expressions, differing in form, are identical in object frect—supplanting the principles of free government and restoring those of classification, caste, and legitimacy. They would delight a convocation of crowned heads slotting against the people. They are the vanguard, the miners and sappers of returning despotism. we must repulse them, or they will subjugate us. This is a world of compensation; and he who would be no slave must consent t. have no slave. Those who deny freedom to others deserve it no for themselves, and under a just God, cannot long retain it."

McDonald to Confer With Governments of 8 Nations

James G. McDonald, League of Nations High Commissioner for German refugees, was to sail Saturday from New York for Rio de Janeiro to begin a series of conferences with the governments of eight South American countries to admit to those lands a number of Jewish and other refugees over a fixed period of time

In a statement explaining his mission to South America, Com-missioner McDonald emphasized missioner McDonald emphasized that more than one-third of the total of the refugees from Ger-many are still unsettled.

"Increasingly, it is recognized that wherever the German refugees are given opportunities to work, they quickly become valuable assets to their new homelands," the statement reads. "I am honeful therefore that in cartain hopeful, therefore, that in certain of the countries of South America it will be possible to work out with the governments there a basis for the admission, over a fixed period of time, of limited numbers of the refugees. Many of these are par-ticularly suited for emigration to countries like those in the South which still possess vast undeveloped resources."

If the boycott of German goods in North America were only a Jewish manoeuvre, we could expect that it would be strongest where the Jews comport of the country—in Palestine. "It should also be pointed out that our exports to Great Britain, which for West European condi-

tions has a comparatively high quota of Jewish population, have developed on somewhat more favorable lines.'

Iraq Revising List of Banned Publications

LONDON, Feb. 22.—The government of Iraq is revising the lists of foreign newspapers recently banned from Iraq, Sir Simon stated in the House Commons yesterday.

Representations were made by the British government with the Iraq authorities in behalf of the newspapers published in Britain and Palestine. As a result of these representations the Iraq government informed the foreign office that the entry of Jewish publications from these two countries would be permitted provided they did not carry any provocative articles against Iraq.
