DeniesAnti-Semitic Policy in London Interview

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, Feb. 27. - Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, Austrian Chancellor, prior to his departure for Vienna last night, issued a lengthy statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency dealing with the Jewish tradition in Austria and with the charges that the present Austrian government has adopted an anti-Semitic policy.

In his statement Dr. Schuschnigg declared that the Austrian government has no intention whatsoever of expelling East European Jews from the country, as has been reported.

Socialists Ousted

"The administration of the City of Vienna was quite justified in ousting certain elements from its system, but this was not done for anti-Semitic reasons. It was done chiefly because of the need to eliminate Socialists," Dr. Schuschnigg

The Chancellor denied that the measures which are now being taken by the Austrian government and which affect the Jewish population are aimed chiefly against the Jews.

"All measures taken have no reference at all to religion," he explained. "They were necessitated by political and economic reasons

Referring to the drastic anti-Jewish attacks now conducted in the press in Austria, Chancellor Schuschnigg said that "the Jews have their own press and are able to reply to these attacks."

"The government cannot be partial," Dr. Schuschnigg explained. "It acts regularly by confiscating the anti-Semitic newspapers when they overstep the limits in attacking the Jews. But the Jews have a right to hold public meetings and can reply publicly to the charges made against them by the anti-Jewish press."

With regard to the mass dismissals of Jewish doctors and other municipal and state employes, Dr. Schuschnigg denied their rights to work and earn a

Rumanian Law On Jobs Target Of Protest Here

Society Tells Legation It Is Determined to See Justice Done

The United Rumanian Jews of America yesterday made representations to the Rumanian Legation in this country protesting the discrimination against Jews implicit in the new National Labor Law recently enacted in Rumania.

The organization addressed a communication to the Legation for transmission to Minister of Foreign Affairs Nicholas Titulescu. The letter, signed by Leo Wolfson, president, and Herman Speier, secretary, follows:

"The manner in which the law is being applied is deliberately seeking to take away the means of a livelihood from the Jews. It affects those who are Rumanian citizens in like manner as those whose status is that of Rumanian subjects. Although under the constitution and civil law of Rumania,

2 Arab Papers Are Suspended

Penalized by Palestine for Charging Jews Store Weapons

The government is taking measures to investigate the threats and to establish their source.



Johnston Will Confer With Agents of Germany

Oscar Johnston of Scott, Miss., sailed yesterday on the S.S. Manhattan for Europe as an official representative of the United States government to survey the possibilities of increasing American export trade. His activities will be concentrated on improving the export situation for agricultural products, principally cotton.

Mr. Johnston will first stop in London where he will confer with governmental and business representatives. Then he is scheduled to visit countries on the continent. It is expected that among the countries he is to visit will be Germany where he will survey the possibilities of increasing the sales of American cotton. In the event he does not visit Germany, it is definitely understood that Mr. Johnston will confer with representatives of German textile in-

MayAnnounceThat Jewish Problem Is Solved

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Feb. 27.—An official announcement that the Jewish problem has been solved by existing governmental measures eliminating or curbing Jews in various walks of life is being considered in government circles, it was learned here today.

Such an announcement would bring to an end the incessant anti-Jewish agitation which is still being conducted against the Jews despite the various drastic measures which have been adopted against them.

It is pointed out that such an announcement is the maximum the Jews may expect. A reversal of Nazi policy cannot be looked for, Anti-Semitism is such a fundamental part of Nazi doctrine that any reversal would seriously embarrass and shake Nazi authority.

Woud Pacify Jews Abroad

It is believed that such an announcement from the heart of the government would go a long way toward pacifying Jewish sentiment abroad. The Jewish population of Germany would be given opportunity to adjust themselves to the new conditions created by the Nazi regime and the cessation of anti-Semitic propaganda would allay the fears of Jewish communities abroad about the spread of anti-Semitism outside German borders. Such an announcement, it is hoped, would take the wind out of the anti-Nazi movement.

For some time past, certain official circles have disavowed the extreme anti-Semitic propaganda as indulged in by Julius Streicher, the Nazi chief of Nuremberg. It has been pointed out that the German government should not be held responsible for purely local activities such as those carried on by Streicher in Franconia. The various decrees and declarations issued by cabinet ministers against Jews in the field of business are more representative of the government policy than Der Stuermer, Streicher's violently anti-Semitic organ. The government is mainly concerned with curbing the political and cultural influence of the Jewish element, it is declared, and it

Economic Crisis in Palestine Is Predicted by London Times

LONDON, Feb. 27. -- That an economic crisis in Palestine is imminent is predicted today in the London Times in a lengthy review of the Palestine situation.

The Jewish immigrants are arriving in Palestine faster now than they can be economically disposed of, the Times states. They are congesting the cities. At the same time land speculation in Palestine continues on the craziest scale, causing grave anxiety even among responsible Zionists.

The Times warns against the "inflated prices" which prevail in Palestine and declares that they are a serious handicap to the future development of the country. I Jewish relations.

"The Palestine government does not yet expect an economic setback in the country on account of the flow of capital, but it is nevertheless prepared with a program for public works in every eventuality," the article discloses.

The Times points out that it is noticeable that complaints against restriction of Jewish immigration into Palestine have been less vehement recently. The German Jews who arrive in Palestine have a stabilizing influence there, it observes.

Status Quo in Germany

The Jewish situation in Germany is again beginning to attract attention, this time because of the utterances of certain Nazi leaders that it is high time to consider the Jewish problem in Germany solved.

When the Nazi theoreticians included in their program the socalled "Aryan' paragraph, they wanted to oust the Jews from the government machinery and from the cultural and political life of the country. This, they claim, has now been achieved. Germany no longer feels any Jewish influence.

The only field in Germany in which the Jews are still active is the field of commerce. Here the Jews cannot be touched. The application of the "Aryan" paragraph to commerce would definitely lead to collapse of the entire German commercial system. It would increase the army of unemployed Germans. It would cause dissatisfaction among the middle class, which buys its goods cheaper in Jewish stores than in "Aryan" stores. It would hamper the development of German trade.

The Industrialist Pressure

Thus the leading industrialists in Germany, who practically control Hitler's actions, now consider it opportune to impress upon the Nazi leaders the necessity once and forever to declare that the Jews will no longer be molested in Germany. Once such a declaration is made, German industry will benefit not only within the country but also abroad. The boycott of German goods abroad will cease, German exports will increase. Jews will again represent German firms in foreign countries. The lost market will be recovered. Factories in Germany will again begin operating. Employment will increase. The world will learn to realize that the Germans are not as brutal as it had been assumed. More sympathy for Germany will be gained in international politics. Confidence will be restored to German credit. There will be more opportunity to obtain loans abroad. There will be no necessity to burden the German taxpayers with new

The pressure of the industrialists in regard to the Jewish question seems still to find opposition in the ranks of the Nazi party. This opposition is, however, daily growing weaker. It has especially diminished during the last two weeks when a German delegation returned from the United States with the disappointing report that no loans can be obtained from this country under the present state of affairs in Germany.

Milder winds are therefore to expected in Germany as rai as the treatment of the Jews is concerned. The notorious Julius Streicher will still continue his Jew-baiting publication with its libelous anti-Jewish accusations, but this will not be the policy of the government. The government press will restrict itself to a more dignified tone than that of Streicher's "Stuermer."

Armistice But Not Peace

The status quo situation with regard to the Jews in Germany is, however, far from being a solution to the Jewish problem there, and will hardly satisfy Jewish leaders abroad. It may be true that Jews in commerce will remain undisturbed, but that does not settle the question of those who have been ousted from their positions as doctors, lawyers, journalists, professors and scientists. What about the re-

World Press Digest

'More General Zionists, Less Zionist Generals'

The American Jewish Outlook of Pittsburgh, in an editorial entitled, "More General Zionists and Less Zionist Generals," states:

To get into Palestine today, it is not enough to be a Jew. One must be a Revisionist, a believer in capitalism; or one must be a Socialist, depending on which group happens to control the admission at the moment. Avoid Mistakes Of Reich Jews, Einstein Warns

Speaks at Reception by AJC Women; 2,000 Attend

A warning that the Jews must learn a lesson from the Jewish situation in Germany was sounded at the Hotel Commodore yesterday by Professor Albert Einstein at a reception in his honor by the women's division of the American Jewish Congress, at which 2,000 persons were present. Mrs. Nathan D. Perlman, presided.

"At this time," Professor Einstein said, "the unity of Jews the vorld over and their mutual assistance is an unyielding law. Would that all Jews would learn from the mistakes of the German Jews during the last twenty years! For most of the German Jews there existed no international Jewish community. In their own eyes they were Germans and nothing but Germans. The Eastern Jew, the so-called 'Ostjude' was to them but a foreigner. When aid was given it was administered to him with condescension. And the recipient of such charity was not too happy. Copied Modes Slavishly

"Slavishly these German Jews copied the still foreign-to-them modes of life of the German people with the sole purpose of making themselves forgetful of their Jewish origin. How greatly did I suffer under this lack of pride and dignity on the part of these German Jews who were so lacking in self-respect that they were insensible to its loss.

"A single political upheaval was sufficient to destroy all their illusions," Professor Einstein continued. "In a single moment they lost all those insecured possessions whose acquisition was bought at the sacrifice of their inner dignity and their traditional historical individuality. Materially and spiritually broken, the help of those Jews abroad, who did not admit of such a ruinous course of assimilation became their sole protection.
Urges Institution

"Learn from the destiny which has befallen the German Jews and preserve your independence by the creation of an appropriate institution which you will need in the hour of oppression. Do not trust that this hour will never come, but keep the international community of all Jews sacred and holy! In this way, you will serve best the interests of international relations, for integrity and honesty is sorely needed everywhere.

With this consideration in mind, I greet with especial delight and satisfaction the unselfish work of the women's division of the American Jewish Congress in their establishment of a home for exiled Jews. All respect for the tireless work of Mrs. Stephen S. Wise who prepared the home with such love and sympathetic understanding. Everyone who is received there, will never forget what brotherly solidarity means for those Jews who remained steadfast right," Professor Einstein conduded.

Other speakers at the reception included Mayor Fiorello H. La-Guardia, Sholom Asch, distinguished writer, and Dr. Stephen S. Wise, honorary president of the American Jewish Congress.

Palestine Group Plans Drive for Polish Jews

This will be the first time that Palestine Jewry is carrying on an organized relief campaign for the Jews of Poland. There are about 80,000 Polish Jews in Palestine, or one-fourth of the entire Jewish population.

On the other hand, anti-Semitic activities in various parts of the country have again been on the increase lately. It is true that Jewish business men in certain branches have fared better than a year ago. This is true particularly of the textile branch, because of the scarcity of available raw material and of those industries which work for the German army. It is also partly due to the hidden inflation which characterize the monetary situation in Germany which induces many to make purchases in preference to holding on to their marks.

The various decrees which are cited in government circles do not necessarily represent a change of heart. The economic position of Germany is such that further measures against the Jewish business element would lead to new complications. Nevertheless Jewish circles here would welcome an official announcement that the Jewish problem is solved, bringing about a cessation of further anti-Semitic agitation. Such an announcement would be on a par with the government's proclamation that the revolution is ended. It would usher in a period of more calm and peace than the Jewish population has so far enjoyed.

AJC Refutes Lippert On 'Jewish Boycott'

The allegation made Tuesday by Dr. Julius Lippert, State Commissar for Berlin, at a meeting of the American Chamber of Commerce in Berlin, that the boycott against German goods in the United States is a "Jewish boycott" was denied yesterday in a cablegram sent to the Chamber by the American Jewish Congress and made public by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, honorary president.

"The United States boycott is a spontaneous reaction of the American people of all faiths and races to Hitler terrorism against all groups in Germany," the cable says. "Four million American associated with the American Federation of Labor have twice in the past two years reaffirmed adherence to the boycott. Members of Catholic and Protestant churches practice boycott as rightful exercises of their abhorrence of a government which has returned to medieval barbarism. The office of the High Commission for German Refugees created by the League of Nations is an incontestable evidence of the ruination visited by Nazism upon many of its citizens. Jews from only small percentage of many millions refusing to do business with Nazi

Germany." U. S. Industry Gained

Referring to Mr. Lippert's statement concerning the loss to America, the cable points out that the leading department stores as well as the United States Chambers of Commerce affirm that American industry has shown a rise of from thirty to sixty per cent in new industries making products for-

merly bought from Germany. "The statements by Dr. Lippert concerning conditions affecting Jews in Germany are brazenly Nazi," the cable continues. "The economic, cultural and political life of Jews is completely ruined in Germany by government acts. Even if the economic life of German Jews were not in danger, civilized nations would still rise up against an infamous injury perpetrated against the many Jews in the German Reich."

The cable concludes by stating that Dr. Lippert's and Dr. Schacht's statements are "typical of the Nazi policy of issuing molli- foundations of life itself."

Speaks at Einstein Fete

Dr. Wise, speaking at a reception afternoon to Professor Albert Einstein, amplified on the statement in the A. J. C. cable as fol-

"Nothing could be falser than to allege that there is a 'Jewish boycott' in the United States against Nazi goods and services, and this Dr. Lippert knows right well. If three per cent of the population of the United States, which is the percentage of the Jewish population, were alone in boycott-ing Nazi goods and services, Nazi Germany would not find it worthwhile appealing for the cessation of the so-called 'Jewish boycott.'

"As for being a 'Jewish boycott,' organized labor in America, speaking through the American Federation of Labor and its leaders, William Green, has renewed its pledge to abstain from relations of every kind with the government of a people, which has ruthlessly and savagely destroyed its own labor front. Millions of libertyloving Catholics and Protestants join with the American Federation of Labor in refusing to or use Nazi wares and services as long as the Hitler-Rosenberg pagan war against religion continues, with the sanction and blessing of the Reichsfuehrer and his Streich-

"One thing more remains to be said. We Jews do not wish to be Hitler's 'favorites.' We would rather be numbered among the victims of the Hitler war against freedom and justice than be singled out for economic favor at the hands of those who now seek to hurt us as we have never been hurt before. . . . They do not know the Jews. They do not know America. They do not know and understand the heart of free men. America cannot be Nazified into compromise with these hell-born forces which would save themselves and ere they go down to death, seek to destroy the moral and spiritual

Urge Executive Not to Change Shekel's Text

General Zionists Adopt Resolution at Meeting in Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, Feb. 27.—An extraordinary session of the Central Committee of General Zionists in Palestine adopted a resolution today against the contemplated change of the text of the Shekel, which entitles Zionist members to vote for delegates to the forthcoming World Zionist Congress.

"The Zionist Executive must retain the old text if it wishes to keep integrity within the Zionist movement," the resolution says.

The resolution emphasizes at the same time that the General Zionists are in a measure opposing the attitude of the Revisionists in not submitting to the internal dis-cipline of the Zionist Organization.

The proposed change in the text of the Shekel was decided upon by the Zionist Executive in London without inquiring of the different Zionist groups as to whether such changes should be introduced. It is pointed out that the change in the text, if made, will make it impossible for the Zionist Revisionists to participate in the next Con-
