The Huleh Plain and Malaria

When the High Commissioner of Palestine recently announced that the concession of the Huleh district—one of the worst districts in Palestine for malaria-had been made to a Tewish group, he referred to a number of cases in which the Jews had freed land from malaria by drainage and cul-e malaria and that adequate drainthat these successes would be relage is installed. peated.

Palestine, like Italy, has a long range of limestone mountains down National Fund bought much of its center, and the water, pouring off the bare mountains, cannot collect into regular rivers, but soaks into the ground of the alluvial plain and there forms dangerous marshes the home of the malaria-carrying mosquito.

The damp plains are much more fertile than the mountains, and it is not surprising that the first Jew-ish settlers, who came to Palestine in the eighties of last century, settled on the western coastal plain. The result was a terrible outbreak of malaria and blackwater fever.

The colonies of Chedera Petach The colonies of Cheuera, Fetach Tikyak, and others had repeated-ly to be abandoned, but a return was always made. In Chedera always made. In Chedera a million eucalyptus trees the ground, led to the complete earance of malaria as early made its appearance in this dis-trict last year; it is thought that the early rains were responsible.

Jerusalem itself used to be one sive worst centers of malaria. This was due not to the geogra-phical conditions but to the badly built and inadequately covered cisterns which held the water sup-

A society of Jewish doctors was concerned with the struggle against malaria even before the war, but a systematic campaign began only with the coming of the mandatory power. The Jew-ish organizations worked hand in hand with the health department of the government. Local conditions were investigated, marshes were drained, stagmant waters were drained, stagnant waters cleared, and the water supply reorganized

Doctors practising in Tel Aviv ave had practically no cases of malaria from the town and district for years, and malaria today is practically unknown in Jerusa lem. If the High Commissioner's hopes are fulfilled, the history of other districts will be repeated. The Arabs will gain in health and wealth from the capital and work of their Jewish neighbors. Not only has the prevalence of malaris among the Arabs been reduced; the Jewish health institutions, in cooperation with the health department, have fought successfully against the Egyptian eye disease (trachoma), to which the ly against the mgyptian eye un-ease (trachoma), to which the Arab children in particular were victims, and the amount of in-fant mortality among the Arabs has also been strikingly reduced.

The time is not far distant when malaria will become as un known in Palestine as it is at the present day in England. Short-ly before the war a writer declared that the complete elimination of malaria from Palestine was imaginable. Exactly in the same way many travelers across the sandy deserts of Western Pales-tine and the barren mountains before the war used to say that the Biblical phrase, a land "flowing with milk and honey," was merely so much Oriental rhetoric. Today the whole plain along the coast is covered with flourishing orange plantations, from which this year plantations, from which this year 5,500,000 cases of oranges, to the value of £2,500,000, were export-ed. The desolate sand contains valuable chemicals, and water can be obtained even from the most parched land by boring.

Masaryk at 85 To world Jewry, President eighty-fifth Masarvk. whose birthday is being celebrated today, is a great figure. Not only did he lead his own people out of the darkness of age-long political non-existence to the political non-existence to the heights of a new national life. has always exhibited great interest in the Jewish aims for a national restoration.

The Jews will never forget the which President Masaryk played some thirty-five years ago, when Leonold Hilsner, a Jew, was condemned for murder on totally insufficient evidence, founded on the old libel of "rit-ual murder." Once more the charge was levelled against the as a nation and a wild Jews popular agitation was started against entire Jewry.

#### A Champion for Jewry

Professor Masaryk was one of the first publicly to protest against the judicial murder of Hilsner which was about to be committed, and against the libel which was agitated against the Jewish people.

Then the violent campaign

turned against Masaryk. He wa accused of being in the pay of the Jews. Students of the Praha university, incited by anti-Semites, prevented him from deliv-ering his lectures. He became the object of severe attacks in the press. He found himself almost entirely isolated

For a time he forfeited a good deal of his popularity. But this did not make the least difference to him. He never regretted the part he had taken. He declared that "it was for purely ethnical motives that I took my stand against the superstition of a blood ritual." This was in the year 1900.

Condemns Beilis Trial In 1913, when the Beilis "rit-

ual murder" trial was started in Russia, Professor Masaryk again vehemently condemned the ac-cusations. He also protested strongly against the anti-Jewish pogroms in Czarist Russia. was he who brought out that the anti-Jewish pogroms in Rus-sia had since 1905 caused the loss of 37,000 human lives

All his life President Masaryk has stood for truth and has known no compromise. unmistakably condemned anti-Semitism and has been a great supporter of the idea that Palestine should be restored as a

Jewish national home. When Professor Masaryk, after the outbreak of the war. fied to London, where he became lecturer at King's College and started his Czech liberation campaign, he received a great deal of assistance from Jews, especially in America. He has acknowledged this assistance on

many occasions.

Proises American Jew In his work, "The World Revo-lution," Professor Masark speaks in particular of Justice Louis D indeis as one of the group of intimate friends to whom he showed the draft of the Declaration of Independence of the Czechoslovakian people, before he submitted it to the United States Secretary of State.

"As everywhere," he writes in this book, "the Jews helped me also in America. In the United States, indeed, I found that the Hilsneriade repaid me, if I may

In 1907, when Masaryk was in the United States, he was given a big reception in New York by Jewish leaders. It was then that he made good friends of Justice

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## New Ship Links Palestine and EWS Rumania Ports

#### Mount Zion, Manned by Jews, to Ply Between Constanza, Haifa

JERUSALEM.—The S. S. Mount Zion was formally inaugurated in-to the Constanza-Haifa service, at a ceremony held in Haifa in the presence of a large gathering.

The ship belongs to the Palestine Maritime Lloyd. Mr. Tubim, on behalf of the company, said that the liners of the service would fly the Palestine flag and have Jewish crews. Other speak-ers were G. Leviathan

## Bialik Group Will Promote IN BRIEF Culture Fund

World Union Seeks to Stir Interest in Hebrew

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM.—A call has been issued here to the Jews of the world by the Bialik Fund which has been established by the He-brew World Union to promote the Hebrew movement in the Diaspora countries and to develop the growth of Hebrew culture in Palestine.

"Bialik," the issue says, "was the elect of his generation, whose word was listened to by all. Withevery Jewish heart there is the desire to erect a perpetual move-ment for the great poet, a monu-ment in keeping with his spirit. The hest monument for Bislib be a fund for Hebrew culture bear ing his name. He dreamt all his life of such a fund, to inspire He-brew culture, encourage its literature, revive the language, consolidate Hebrew education, promote science and art. Bialik saw such a fund as the means of strength-ening cultural activity in the Diaspora countries, where Hebrew culture is in a very low state.

"While the existing national funds, the Jewish National Fund and the Keren Hayesod work to build the Jewish home in Palestine, the third fund, the Culture Fund, will promote Jewish spiritual culture. Bialik always grieved when he observed what litt our culture occupies in the upbuilding work in Palestine. He fought to correct this historic injustice but his call failed to obtain response during his lifetime But today we must, in accordance with his wish, create the fund for Hebrew culture."

#### Butcher Workers Seek **Exemption From Law**

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## Trip to Algiers To Probe Riots

#### Fear for Life Believed Behind Postponement of Personal Quiz

PARIS, March 6.—Henri Regnier, French Minister of Interior, has postponed his visit to Algeria, where he was to investigate per-sonally the anti-Jewish events which took place in Setif.

In parliamentary circles it was indicated today that the trip of the French Minister was postponed be-cause of fears for his life. It was explained that anti-French agitation in Algeria is reaching high proportions.

"Rifles go off easily," Deputy Diouf, Moslem deputy for Senegal, declared today. "The population declared today. "The population in Algeria is driven to despair by the complete lack of concern for their critical position by the French authorities. Political rights are authorities. Political rights are accorded to French colonists and to Jews only. The French admin-istration is not at all interested in the natives.

#### Demands Concessions

"If Algeria became completely independent from France it would soon be swallowed up by Musso-lini or Hitler," the Arab deputy lini or Hitler," the Arab deputy admitted. "But the longer France delays her promise of granting full citizenship rights to the Arabs the more dangerous things will be-It is high time for France to make concessions.'

The French cabinet decided on the French cabinet decided on the creation of a special committee to deal with all problems of the Moslem world in the French Empire of North Africa and Asia Minor. A special department for Moslem affairs will be created at the Prime Minister's office.

TEL AVIV.—A total of 1,425 capitalist immigrants and investors as well as tourists investigating investment possibilities in Pa-lestine were assisted by the American Economic Committee for Palestine in 1934, it is announced in the annual report of the Commit-

During the year the American Economic Committee Investiga-tors continued their work of enlarging and revising the Central Bureau's files of the economic phases of the more important branches of Palestine industry, agriculture and commerce. The files are now the most complete of their kind extant in relation to the Palestine development and are constantly being expanded and brought up to date in the interest

of prospective middle-class set-tlers and investors. The files are available to public and private in-stitutions and are constantly be-ing used by them. The work of gathering and preparing economic data and the work of registering and assisting prospective entre-preneurs and of eliminating unjustified undertakings constitute preliminary steps taken by the American Economic Committee toward planned economic

#### Official Sources

Under an agreement executed in August, 1934, with the Palestina-Amt in Berlin, the American Economic Committee became official source of economic information for German middle-class immigrants. Prior to the formal agreement, the American Econo-mic Committee had been furnishing the Palestina-Amt with all the available data required for fulthe available data required for ful-filling the need of prospective mid-dle-class immigrants from Ger-many for specific information about industry, agriculture and service performed by the American Economic Committee for the rean Economic Committee for the Palestina-Amt and gave that group one of the most complete files of specific Palestine econo-mic data outside of Palestine.

In addition to its work with personal inquiries by or in behalf of capitalist immigrants, the American Economic Committee furnished specialized information to 273 miscellaneous economic inquirers and sent detailed replies, frequently elaborate reports to 915 mail inquiries received from prospective capitalist immigrants and investors from all parts of the

#### Visitors Increase

During 1934 the American Economic Committee experienced a marked increase in the number of visits paid to its Central Bureau by the individual inquirers who sought additional information and continuous guidance. Hundreds of inquirers returned to the Central Bureau to request more data on the subjects already investigated or data on new subjects or to report on the progress of their plans or to confer with American Economic Committee officials about their problems or about new developments.

The year also saw the settle-ment of many inquirers who had come to Palestine during 1932 and to take up wood-carving. 1933 on investigation trips. These

persons had returned with their families and their goods and had themselves with such inquirers who are now abroad and who expect to return for set-tlement in 1935.

The American Economic Com The American Economic Com-mittee paid special attention to export opportunities. Every op-portunity to encourage exports was utilized. The inquiries which it received from many parts of the world were assiduously an-swered and referred to the proper

tional and religious rights on the lines which he laid down at a meeting arranged by Jewish students in Paris in June, 1919, soon after the Versailles peace conference.

Decries Anti-Semitism

Speaking on anti-Semitism, Pr fessor Masaryk recently said "it is a sore upon the body of humanity. It harms and demoralizes people and makes them raw. Ma-terially it does not harm the Jews. At most it may harm them morally in the negative sense only, insofar as it makes them sharpen their wits to overcome anti-Semitism socially and religiously."

President Masaryk has on many occasions declared his support of the Zionist movement and the Jewish national home in Palestine emphasizing in particular its moral value as a Jewish regeneration

During the war, when he was in the United States, Professor Masaryk gave his support publicly to the idea of the Jewish restoration in Palestine. In 1927 he demonstrated his interest by paying an official visit to Palestine, the first head of any European state to do so. He toured the Jewish colonies and discussed conditions with the

leaders of the Zionist movement. During the Hitler regime he con-demned the anti-Jewish legislation in Germany and was the first statesman to demand that the statesman to demand that the League of Nations act to protect

Berlin alone about thirty Jews, including women, have been arrested, according to Reuters.

They are being kept in the police headquarters as prisoners and will be sent to a concentration camp for "undergoing a special course of spiritual training."

Former J.T.A. Man Was 7 Years With American Legation in Latvia

United States Legation in Latvia,
died here today at the age of 49.

Mr. Aronsberg was a member of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency staff in the United States and later stat in the United States and later in London before he joined the American diplomatic service. Since he was of Russian birth, he was appointed Councillor for Russian Affairs at the American Legation here, which post he held for the past seven years.

Last year, when the United
States recognized Soviet Russia,
Mr. Aronsberg was slated for a
diplomatic post in the American
service in Russia. After a visit
to Washington he was assigned
temporarily to the Riga legation
pending his scheduled assumption of office in Soviet Russia.

Mr. Aronsberg was master of more than a dozen languages and was the translator of many im-portant works into English. At one time he was a member of the Foreign Language Information Bureau maintained by the American Red Cross.
