

Scores Efforts To Turn Jews From Civic Duty

Straus, Rosenwald Open Appeal Campaign At Passaic

PASSAIC, N. J., March 20.—Scoring the "invidious whispering" that Jews should not be so active and conspicuous in the American public life as a means of avoiding anti-Semitism, Nathan Straus, former New York State Director of the National Emergency Council, and former New York State Senator, declared here tonight his belief "that any Jew who counsels abstinence from the highest privileges of American citizenship is betraying his country."

Mr. Straus spoke at a dinner under the auspices of the Passaic Jewish Community Council for the purpose of launching the local drive on behalf of the national campaign of the United Jewish Appeal to maintain \$100,000 for the relief and rehabilitation of Jews in Germany and other lands and for the settlement of Jews in Palestine. The drive is national in scope and is being conducted by the national treasurer of the United Jewish Appeal.

Speaking at the dinner with Mr. Straus was William Rosenwald, younger son of the late Julius Rosenwald, who was recently named a national co-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal. Harry K. Flecht was chairman of the dinner.

Emphasizing that no Jew can hold himself aloof from the fate of other Jews, Mr. Rosenwald declared that "however good you or I may be as Americans, the fact is inescapable that we are also judged as Jews. This judgment is passed upon you and I as well as on the Jews of the world, in other lands—Jews all over the world, in America and abroad. The same philosophy does not stop at the Rhine. In helping our brethren overseas, we are, at the same time, protecting our own interests."

250 Delegates Attend General Meeting at Temple Emanu-El

The Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations held a general assembly at yesterday at the Community House of Temple Emanu-El, 1 East Sixty-fifth street, with Mrs. David E. Goldfarb, president, presiding. About 250 delegates attended, representing 243 constituent organizations of the Federation.

Speakers at the meeting included Morris E. Siegel, a director of the American Arbitration Association, and Mrs. Florence Dolowitz, president of the American Women's ORT.

Editors to Vote Youth's Place On Award of In Community Gottheil Medal Is Parley Topic

Zeta Beta Tau Sends Out Ballots; Undermeyer Favored to Win

A questionnaire seeking to establish the best candidate for the "Gottheil Medal" for 1934 to be awarded by the Zeta Beta Tau fraternity to the American who did most for Jewry during the year was sent out yesterday by the fraternity to a number of editors of Jewish and Anglo-Jewish publications throughout the country. The editors are requested to cast their ballots for their candidate not later than April 1.

It was predicted yesterday that the medal would go to Samuel Untermyer, leader in the economic boycott of Germany. The Zeta Beta Tau fraternity is the oldest and largest Jewish national college fraternity in America.

The presentation of the medal will take place on May 11 in New York City, at a dinner at the St. Moritz Hotel, attended by the 1400 members which the fraternity numbers in New York City.

The Gottheil Medal was established by Zeta Beta Tau in 1925, in honor of Dr. Richard J. H. Gottheil of Columbia University, an outstanding leader of the Jewish, American and international culture. For many years he was a national president of the fraternity.

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Jewish Welfare Board to Hold its Annual Meeting April 7

The places of youth in the Jewish community will be discussed at the annual meeting of the Jewish Welfare Board, parent organization of the Jewish Community Council, which will open April 7 at the Y. M. H. A. building at Ninety-second street and Lexington avenue.

Judge Irving Lehman, president of the Board, will preside, and Harry L. Gluckman, executive director, will lead the discussion.

At the opening session of the annual meeting, delegates representing fifteen Jewish national organizations, and 300 constituent societies of the Board located in various parts of the country, will hear reports on the activities of the Board of the preceding year.

Judge Irving Lehman will deliver the presidential address, and will be followed by Dr. Cyrus Adler, chairman of the Army and Navy Committee of the Board, who will report on welfare activities in the Civilian Conservation Corps and for soldiers and sailors and disabled veterans.

Benjamin J. Buttewisser, treasurer, will report on the finances of the organization, and Mr. Gluckman will review the activities of the Jewish Welfare Board during the past year, with special reference to new trends in the national program.

A new proposal for regional organizations will be presented by M. Malvin Fertig, president of the Metropolitan League of Jewish National Associations, and will be discussed by the heads of the other regional federations.

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
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
