Actions Body Set to Open Deliberations

Problem of Revisionists to Occupy Center of Interest

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, March 27.—Much was going on behind the scenes in Jerusalem today on the eve of the opening of the sessions of the Zionist Actions Committee which is to decide many momentous problems affecting the future of the Zionist Movement. The most pressing of these problems is whether the Revisionists are to be ousted from the Zionist organization or a round-table conference is to be called of representatives of all Zionist groups, before the election campaign to the World Zionist Congress begins, in order to make a last attempt to attain unity in the Zionist organization.

Laborites Busy

The Laborite leaders are especially busy today, holding conferences to decide what their attitude should be at the Actions Committee sessions now that the Histadruth referendum has resulted in rejection of the peace agreements with the Revisionists.

Negotiations were carried on all day long today between General Zionists and the Mizrahi leaders in an effort to reach an understanding for united action at the Actions Committee meeting. Both the General Zionists and the Mizrahis are aggravated over the fact that the Histadruth has voted not to rectify any peace agreement with the Revisionists.

Shekel Change Opposed

The majority of the General Zionists in Palestine are definitely opposed to the change the Zionist Executive has made in the text of the Shekel, it was indicated here today. It is understood that the Mizrahi and the General Zionists will vote at the Actions Committee for the convocation of a round-table conference, if a suggestion is made to this effect.

While the leaders of the different groups in the Zionist movement were preparing themselves for the expected fight at the Actions Committee sessions, the rank and file of the Jewish population in Palestine did not display any interest at all in the fact that the Actions Committee is to open the sessions in Jerusalem.

Plea to Prince of Wales Wins Palestine Visas

VIENNA, March 27.—A plea to the Prince of Wales submitted by a number of Viennese Jews during the Prince's stay here resulted today in the British Consulate's issuing a number of Palestine visas to Jewish artisans.

In their plea, the Viennese Jews had asked the Prince to help them get to Palestine. Wales submitted their appeal to the British Embassy in Vienna with the request that it be transmitted to the Palestine government. In reply the Palestine government notified the British Consulate in Vienna to issue special immigration certificates to the Jews for whom the Prince of Wales had intervened.

Poland Averts Attempt to Curb Rights in Lodz

Federal Official Bars City Plan to Drop Aid for Jewish Groups

LODZ, March 27.—The government commissioner for the Lodz municipality today acted promptly to avert another attack on Jewish rights made by the anti-Semitic majority of the local municipal council.

The majority, consisting of members of the anti-Semitic National Democratic party (Endek), submitted a proposal to the municipal council to eliminate from the municipal budget any subventions for Jewish organizations on the ground that "Jews are only guests of Poland and are, therefore, not entitled to any assistance."

The proposal would have passed if not for the government commissioner who vetoed it.

"The Jewish relief organizations are doing great and good work and are, therefore, entitled to benefit from the municipal budget," the commissioner declared.

This is the second time within one week that the government commissioner has prevented the anti-Semitic majority of the Lodz municipality from accepting anti-Jewish projects.

The first occasion occurred a week ago when the majority of the Lodz municipality was about to vote for the dismissal of Jews from employment in municipal institutions. The government commissioner declared such a proposal violated the existing constitution.

Spain Hits at Reich in Fete For Rambam

'No World Peace Without Peace With Israel,' Official States

CORDOBA, Spain, March 27.—The dedication of a commemorative marble slab in the old Cordoba synagogue marked today's celebration of the octocentennial anniversary of the birth of Moses Maimonides, the famous Jewish philosopher and physician.

"This stone will bear witness of the peace concluded between Spain and the brothers of Maimonides," the Mayor of Cordoba said, opening the ceremony. "Without peace with Israel there is no world peace."

The civil governor of the Cordoba district, greeting the assembly in the name of the Spanish government, alluded to the anti-Jewish persecutions in Germany. "Certain countries," he said, "illuminate monuments of soldiers with a flame symbolizing peace. This stone, like a flame, will recall for future generations the peace existing between the Jews and Spain."

Senor Antonio Jean Morente, former Ambassador, who was one of the speakers at today's ceremony, pointed out that children must often bear the consequences of the errors made by their parents.

"We Spaniards," he said, "are glad that the Jews do not bear any resentment against us for the errors of our forefathers."

Prof. Donemilo Gacia Gomez, director of the Institute of Art, addressed an assembly of scholars today on the value of Rambam's teachings.

The delegates and guests from many countries who are participating in the Maimonides celebrations were today conducted by the municipality on an excursion to visit Moorish ruins.

The evening passed in entertainment and concerts arranged by the municipality in the palace of the county council for the foreign guests and diplomats who came to Cordoba to witness the festivities.

Harvard Exhibits Maimonides' Books

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 27.—An elaborate display of valuable early books containing the writings of Maimonides is on exhibit now in the Treasure Room of Widener Library, Harvard University, in commemoration of the 800th anniversary of the birth of the great Jewish philosopher. The books are from the regular Harvard Library collection.

Among the items is a handwritten copy of a Harvard College commencement oration of about 1675. A quote from Maimonides is used in this oration in connection with John Harvard, who in 1638 gave his books and half his fortune to the college founded in 1636 by the General Court of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay. The commencement orator says, in ef-

Schools in Bulgaria Must Close Sundays

SOFIA, March 27.—Breaking a 57-year-old precedent, the Bulgarian government today ordered Jewish schools throughout the country to remain closed on Sundays.

A Jewish delegation was told by the Minister of Interior that it would be impossible to make an exception for the Jews, but he would present their case to the session of the Cabinet. The Jewish delegations argued that since Jewish schools are closed on Saturdays, it is logical that they be permitted to stay open on Sundays.

Arab Chieftains Demand Right To Sell to Jews

Ask Britain to Repeal Act Curbing Sale of Land in Transjordan

AMMAN, Transjordan, March 27.—A movement to repeal the edict prohibiting sale of land to Jews in Transjordan was started here today by a number of Arab sheikhs.

Anxious to attract Jews to Transjordan and to develop the country along the same lines as Palestine, the leading sheikhs of Transjordan have called upon Arab landowners of the country to organize and to submit a petition to the British government asking that the ban be withdrawn.

As a result of the call a meeting was held today in which many heads of Arab tribes participated. The meeting adopted a resolution asking the cancellation of the anti-Jewish laws, "because Jewish money which is destined to develop Transjordan is being diverted to Syria."

Explains Significance Of Country to Britain

What the opening of Transjordan for Jewish settlement would mean to the British policy in the Near East is outlined in an article in the Pro-Palestine Herald.

Owen Stratford, the writer of the article, a London journalist, says that Winston Churchill, who was instrumental in separating Transjordan from Palestine, is now being criticized for severing this territory and hampering its development by blocking its economic development.

Reveal Exiles Assisted by Rockefeller

\$340,000 Was Given by Foundation to Aid Displaced Scholars

LONDON, March 27.—A sum of \$340,000 has been appropriated by the Rockefeller Foundation to help non-"Aryan" professors and scientists who were compelled to leave Germany since the Nazis came into power, it was reported today by the office of James G. MacDonald, High Commissioner for Jewish and other refugees from Germany.

The report discloses that 236 non-"Aryan" scholars and scientists from Germany have been placed in various educational institutions in America. The total of Jewish professors and scientists dismissed in Germany under the "Aryan Paragraph" is given in the report as 1,202.

\$1,000,000 Raised

The report states that approximately \$1,000,000 has been raised during the past two years by the academic committees which were organized in many countries to help the scholars exiled from Nazi Germany. The \$340,000 given by the Rockefeller Institution was used as grants to institutions in Europe and in America, contributing toward the salaries of the displaced scholars appointed to the staffs of these institutions.

"The university world of Germany offered little opposition to the new government policy of dismissing non-"Aryans" from their posts," the official report of the High Commissioner's office emphasizes. "Many of the dismissed were without pension rights. Most of them were unable to obtain alternative employment. Some were denied access to libraries and laboratories. Those of them who were Jews saw their race become an object of contempt and their children faced with a future of either open or indirect persecution."

Review Plight of Exiles

Describing the plight of the German Jewish scientists in exile, the report states:

"Noble prize winners, scientists of international reputation, men and women who have devoted years of loyal service to their universities became wandering scholars, together with their young assistants. Many were at first able

Nazi Theory on Race Ridiculed In Address by Schuschnigg

VIENNA, March 27.—The Nazi race theory was sharply repudiated today by Chancellor Schuschnigg, addressing a women's detachment of the Ostmaerkische Sturm-scharen, the storm troops of Austria.

The Austrian Chancellor described the theory advocated by the Nazis in Germany as a "terrible way of thinking."

"This theory fails completely to see the real values," the Chancellor said.

Chancellor Schuschnigg called upon the women of Austria not to be misled by the "blood myth," promulgated by the Nazis. He ridiculed the propaganda carried on in Germany on race purification, and said that "this propaganda is based on the belief in the mystery of spirit."

Praha to Prosecute Nazi Doctor Who Drove His Aide to Suicide

PRAHA, March 27.—The police authorities today handed over to the attorney general the information on the suicide of Dr. Gach, a member of the staff in the clinic of the German University here, who left a note saying that he was driven to suicide by the anti-Semitic actions of Prof. Schloffer whose assistant he was.

Action will now be taken by the attorney general against Prof.

Schloffer and his German assistant, Herr Wenzel. At the same time civic action was started today against the two by the mother of Dr. Gach, who accuses them of driving her son to his death.

The funeral of Dr. Gach took place today and was attended by more than 1,000 persons. The surgical clinic of the German University was pointedly not represented at the funeral. The nurses, however, sent a wreath.

Analysis of the Peace Pacts

JERUSALEM. The negotiations initiated by the World Zionist Executive with the Revisionists last September have led to three sectional agreements, the text of which were made known to the public at that time.

These agreements will now be widely discussed here in Palestine, at the sessions of the Actions Committee which will open in Jerusalem at the end of March, especially since it can be definitely predicted that they will not be ratified by the Histadruth, despite the fact that Ben-Gurion, leader of the Histadruth, signed them. (The results of Sunday's plebiscite, bear out this prediction, made some time before it took place.—Editor)

It will, therefore, be interesting to know exactly what the World Zionist Executive expected when it signed the agreement with Jabotinsky. The Executive from the very beginning left no doubt that it regarded these agreements from a twofold point of view. First, from the point of view of the intrinsic value of the agreements, which they possess—independently if further consequences. Secondly, as a possible prelude to a more comprehensive understanding regarding the relations of the Revisionists with the Zionist Organization through which the first partial agreement would receive fuller importance and certainty.

What the Executive understood by "Zionist peace" was very clearly stated to the Revisionists from the first moment: incorporation of the Revisionists in the World Zionist Organization, with the exercise of the same rights and the discharge of the same duties as pertain to all other existing groups in the Zionist Organization.

Zionist peace would by no means amount to the cessation of the ideological struggle and the political and tactical differences of opinion within the Zionist movement. The freedom of propaganda of ideas, of criticism of the political course of the Zionist Organization determined by the majority spheres of Zionist life and Zionist work, so far as it is not in conflict with the unity of the Organization and its ability to act, would be assured to the Revisionists in the same degree as it has now been assured to other tendencies in the movement and been utilized by them. Nobody demanded from the Revisionists any sort of ideological sacrifices, just as the other parties were not prepared for any sacrifices.

It is true, the Revisionists would finally have to surrender all other special rights hitherto claimed by them, subordinate themselves to

the discipline of the Zionist Organization, and especially abandon any separatist activity in the field of external politics.

This further object of the negotiations begun in September now seems unattainable, or at least to have receded into the remote distance. The resolutions of the World Conference of the Revisionists at Kracof and the later statements of Jabotinsky and his lieutenants have made it clear that the Revisionists will not under any circumstances accept the discipline of the Zionist Organization and give up separatist political actions.

The result is that any further negotiation about "Zionist peace" between the Zionist Organization and the Revisionists is devoid of any real foundation.

It should be made absolutely clear: the Executive first invited the individual Parties to negotiations, and the first was the Revisionist Party. The intention of this procedure was in the first place to determine whether there could be found the minimum of concurrence which could provide the ground for further negotiations.

But this minimum means a uniform Zionist Organization, discipline and preservation of the unity of our external politics. As long as the Revisionists insist on the refusal of this minimum then a round-table conference would only lead to the opportunity being afforded them of proclaiming this negative statement once again. It would surely be a pity to squander any time and energy upon this, the Zionist Executive holds.

We are now on the eve of a meeting of the Zionist General Council, which will certainly occupy itself primarily also with the question of the relations within the Zionist Organization. The Revisionist members of the General Council will also come to this meeting, for so far they still stand with one leg in the Zionist organization. They will have the opportunity there of stating with the utmost clarity whether they are remaining in the Zionist Organization or prefer to leave it. They are thus given the opportunity of repentance and of revising their destructive policy. A round-table conference cannot offer them anything more, is the official opinion of the present Zionist Executive.

Women Will Meet To Plan JNF Aid

A call for a conference of representatives of Jewish women's organizations to consider ways and means of redeeming land in Palestine was issued here yesterday by a special committee of which Judge Anna Moscovitz Kross is the Chairman and Mrs. Rebecca Kohut, Honorary Chairman.

The conference, which will take place on April 9 in the assembly hall of Temple Emanu-El is expected to lay concrete plans for the cooperation of women's organizations with the Jewish National Fund, with a view to making available new areas to accommodate the needs of the ever growing influx of immigrants and refugees entering Palestine.

Between the Lines

Maimonides and Einstein
The Maimonides celebrations now taking place in Spain afford a lesson for the numerous countries where the Jews are now being oppressed. They show that in the long run of history, nations must regret their mistreatment of the Jews.

Eight hundred years from today a Germany, different than the present, will celebrate the octocentennial of Prof. Einstein and will, no doubt, regret the fact that the Germany of today sent one of its greatest sons into exile and confiscated his entire property just because he was a Jew.

Power and Spirit

Governments come and go. Powers change with every generation. But the contributions which great men like Maimonides, Einstein and their like, are making to humanity remain forever. They cannot be evaluated by any biased attitude of this or another regime.

It has long been preached by Jewish spiritual leaders of ancient times that the strength of the Jewish people lies not in developing an army, nor in exercising force, but in spiritual contributions of high value to the world.

The eternity of the Jewish spiritual contributions is best illustrated not only by the Bible but also by the present festivities in honor of Maimonides. The theories which Maimonides advocated in the twelfth century—both philosophical and medical—are still valid today, in the advanced twentieth century.

In dedicating yesterday a commemorative marble slab for Maimonides at the old synagogue in Cordoba—the birthplace of the Jewish philosopher—the mayor of Cordoba said something which should well be remembered by all those who now fear a new world war. "Without peace with Israel, there can be no world peace," he warned.

This pronouncement is especially timely now when the eyes of the entire world are turned towards Wilhelmstrasse in Berlin, where Sir John Simon, the British Foreign Minister, was recently trying to persuade Hitler to preserve the peace of Europe.

The great diplomats of the world may not have realized two years ago the fact that Hitler's declaration of war against world Jewry was actually a forerunner to a declaration of war against all civilized nations. They are realizing it now.

Spain and Germany

Without peace with Israel a Germany will never be safe for the peace of the world. A government which practiced no mercy with regard to its own citizens has certainly no mercy for the welfare of the inhabitants of other countries.

The Maimonides celebrations in Spain, therefore, are now casting a direct reflection upon the Germany of today, and its menacing role toward the world's peace. The shadow of war will always be hanging over Europe as long as Jews in Germany are treated as they were treated in Spain during the Inquisition.

World Press Digest

Explains Why Jews Became Nazi Scapegoat

Milton S. Mayer, in an article in *Today*, weekly edited by Prof. Raymond Moley, explaining why the Nazis chose the Jews as a scapegoat, says:

The sentiment of anti-Semitism goes back for the moment—to the psychological inability of the German people to see that their loss of the World War was a defeat at arms. Wilhelm told them they couldn't be beaten. Ebert told them they hadn't been beaten. They had been betrayed. I heard this every place I went in Germany: There had to be a traitor. The Social Democrats offered the people Wilhelm. That was impossible; by 1925 the old flag of the Monarchy had replaced the colors of the Republic. In 1929 the world crash came. Times grew desperate in Germany. The old enemies—even Poincaré—were sympathetic. But sympathy did not lift the spiritual shackles of Versailles. The need for a traitor was more acute than ever.

National Socialism offered the German people the Jew. Had the Jew been in Doorn, or in Moscow, the hunt for the traitor would not have been over. But the Jew was right there in Germany—within a stone's throw.

The Jew was the perfect choice for the role of a scapegoat in the Third Reich. He was an unorganized minority, numerically as unimportant to Germany as the Mormons to the United States. His disproportionate position in German life made him vulnerable *ipso facto*. He was militarily defenseless. And, what is most essential, he was already unpopular; Germany dates back to the massacres of the First Crusade as the spiritual home of anti-Semitism. Dr. Goebbels' revival of "Aryanism" was the master stroke.

Explain Opposition To Histadruth

The *Commentator*, official newspaper of the Yeshiva College students, carries the following editorial:

Our opposition to the Histadruth does not spring from our failure to appreciate the valuable work of that organization in the material development of Eretz Israel. It is occasioned, rather, by their callous indifference to and disrespect for the spiritual values of traditional Judaism, an indifference that has recently festered into a general, militant opposition to the introduction of any semblance of traditional Jewish observance in the Holy Land. When their policy becomes one of discrimination against religious Jews, such as is being practised in the distribution of immigration certificates, it becomes a menace to the future of Judaism. Hundreds and thousands of poverty-stricken, religious Jews in Eastern Europe, fully qualified as *Chalutzim*, await eagerly an opportunity to

emigrate to Palestine. Nevertheless, the Palestine Bureau turns a deaf ear to their heart-rending appeals, issuing certificates, instead, on the basis of narrow, party divisions.

Would Form League To Protect Religion

Charles Edward Russell, writing in the *Pro-Palestine Herald*, on "What Should Be Done to Help the Oppressed Jews in Europe," says:

The first step toward the rescue of the German Jew is to induce the British government to relax its absurd and disingenuous quota limits, and that is a reform to be achieved only by Gentile efforts and influence.

There is one other thing that ought to be done and the doing of it started at once. In all the countries still immune from the reactionary wave that has inundated Germany and Austria, exist men and women whose sympathies are unlimited toward the oppressed. It would be feasible and most advantageous to unite these into a league for the preservation of religious liberty, and then to make such an organization effective in protest and protection. Once established, it should investigate and verify all cases of religious persecution, publish the facts to the world, protest against the offending State and bring it as a culprit to the pillory of the League of Nations.

Ivan Stanislavovich Bloch published in 1893 a book on war in the future in which he maintained that modern developments made war a calamity even for the most successful nation.

The Polish Jew Isidor Borowski served as a soldier under Bolivar and in Persia as a general in the 1830's.

Welfare Body In Syracuse Is Reorganized

All Jewish Groups Have Representatives on Board of 27

SYRACUSE, March 27.—Twenty-seven directors to serve terms of from one to three years, and three honorary directors were elected at the annual meeting of the reorganized Syracuse Jewish Welfare Federation, at which all Jewish organizations of the city were represented.

The new board of directors represents a cross section of the community such as organized Jewish societies, fraternal groups, synagogues and also the contributors at large, as well as the local Jewish beneficiary agencies.

Collaborates With Chest

The Syracuse Jewish Welfare Federation was reorganized Tuesday night on a democratic and efficient basis permitting closer cooperation with the Community Chest, which makes allotments to a number of local welfare agencies, and also providing for support from the Jewish Community for national and overseas causes. In addition to distribution of funds, the new Federation will also deal with local and national Jewish problems and public relations.

David Sarnoff Gets French Decoration

Radio Corporation President Given Honor Legion Cross for His Pioneering

The Cross of the Legion of Honor has been conferred upon David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America and pioneer in the science of radio, it was announced yesterday. The presentation took place in the Consulate General in La Maison Francaise, Rockefeller Center.

In presenting the Cross and the Diploma of the Legion of Honor, Consul General Fontnouvelle said: "It is my great pleasure to inform you that the President of the French Republic has bestowed upon you the Cross of Knight of the Legion of Honor, in recognition of your pioneering and great accomplishments in the science of radio."

Synagogue, Church Urged to Cooperate

Need for Unity to Stem Forces of Paganism Stressed by Roger W. Straus

An appeal for closer cooperation between church and synagogue was sounded in an address last night over radio station WEVD by Roger W. Straus, co-chairman of the National Conference of Jews and Christians.

Speaking under the auspices of the Bronx division of the Young People's League of the United Synagogue of America, Mr. Straus declared that these two spiritual forces "must be more closely allied than ever before to fight the anti-religious pagan forces that are the main supporters of intolerance and inter-group hatreds."

Warning that both Communism and Fascism attack "the fundamentals of religion as well as the basis of true democracy," Mr. Straus said the "fate of democracy . . . is inextricably bound up with the cause of religion."

Mr. Straus called attention to the Institute of Human Relations being sponsored by the National Conference of Jews and Christians and urged that as many as possible attend its sessions, which are scheduled for August at Williams College.

Mussolini to Receive Louis Untermeyer, Poet

Among the passengers on the Saturnia, which left yesterday on a Mediterranean cruise, were Louis Untermeyer, poet, and Mrs. Untermeyer. Mr. Untermeyer, who was recently awarded a prize of 10,000 lire by the Italian government for his "The Donkey of God," an Italian legend, will be received by Premier Mussolini in Rome.

'Black Hitler' Will Be Grilled On Harlem Riot

Abdul Hamid Agitated Against Jewish Merchants

The anti-Semitic activities of Abdul Sufi Hamid, known as "the Black Hitler of Harlem" will be investigated by the Mayor's committee, it became known yesterday, as a result of last week's riots in Harlem during which many Jewish stores were wrecked.

Abdul and his associates are held to be responsible for the agitation stirred in the past year in Harlem against local Jewish merchants who did not employ Negro sales clerks, floor walkers or office help.

A member of the Mayor's committee, of which Dr. Charles J. Roberts, Negro physician, is chairman, intimated yesterday that Abdul had flirted with various Nazi organizations in this city and had obtained some encouragement and casual promises of financial aid—if not actually material assistance—in carrying on his anti-Semitic work among the residents of Harlem.

While, it was explained, the committee intends to give careful and serious consideration to the sociological problems involved in any specific policy among Harlem merchants discriminating against the employment of Negroes, it intends also to ferret out such wholly illegitimate movements designed to stir up racial animosities.

The traditional portrait of Maimonides is shown in Ugolino's "Thesaurus Antiquitatum," Venice, 1744.

Philadelphia Opens Celebrations Saturday

WARSAW, March 27.—A number of orphans from the Jewish orphanage in Warsaw maintained by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee will be sent to Palestine where they will be trained as workers, it was announced today.

Mr. Goldin and Mr. Neustadt, two directors of the orphanage, left for Palestine today to make arrangements for transporting the children from Poland.

Will Decipher Biblical Finds In 3 Months

Dr. Mayer, of Hebrew U., Says Potsherds Are Authentic

Recent letters in ancient Hebrew script unearthed at what is believed to be the site of the ancient city of Lachish in Palestine are expected to throw important light on the background of the Biblical Book of Kings when their deciphering is completed about three months from now, Dr. Leo A. Mayer, professor of art and archaeology at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, said in an interview yesterday.

Also on the same ship was Prof. Harold Joseph Lashi of London University. The noted economist is here to lecture at the University of Illinois.

Dr. Mayer, who arrived in New York on the Berengaria yesterday, is the first archaeologist to arrive here from Palestine since the discovery of the Hebrew script near Hebron was announced two weeks ago. The find climaxed three years of intensive explorations by the Sir Henry Wellcome Expedition of London headed by J. L. Starkey.

15 Pottery Fragments

Dr. Mayer explained that the discovery consists of fifteen fragments of pottery in a remarkable state of preservation bearing a letter in ancient Hebrew script. Dr. Mayer, who said he had seen the potsherds, asserted that they contained a number of names mentioned in the Book of Kings.

At present, the archaeologist said, the letters are in the hands of Prof. N. H. Torczyner, professor of philology at the Hebrew University, who is preparing a translation. A complicated photographic process is being employed which sometimes results in bringing out details which the naked eye misses.

Tall and black-haired, Dr. Mayer presents an imposing appearance. He flatly refused to answer questions about the significance of the discovery, even question prepared by the publicity man representing the American Friends of the Hebrew University, as suggestions to reporters.

"I am intentionally vague," he said, when reporters pressed him for a definite statement about the discoveries. He explained that he was not a member of the expedition and had only cursorily glanced at the potsherds.

Asked about the authenticity of the discovery, Dr. Mayer declared that they are authentic "beyond all doubt."

Dr. Mayer, who is visiting the United States for the first time, is staying at the Hotel Shelton. He will speak next Tuesday night at the dinner celebrating the tenth anniversary of the Hebrew University at the Hotel Plaza. Dr. Mayer is chairman of the Hebrew University School of Oriental Studies, and honorary government curator of coins.

Ask Britain to Repeal Act Curbing Sale of Land in Transjordan

nomic and political progress.

"The problem of Transjordan looms up in the British horizon more and more as grievously affecting the safety of the Empire's communications with Iraq and far-away India," the writer asserts.

Policy Cripples Land

"Due to its forced separation from Western Palestine, Transjordan remained an economically crippled and politically uncertain province, dependent for its continued existence upon the financial support of the British government which, in turn, passes on the burden to the treasury of the Palestine administration."

"While Western Palestine, due to the influx of Jewish settlers and capital, made gigantic strides forward to the point of increasing the surplus available in the treasury of the Palestine government to the staggering amount of over \$20,000,000, Transjordan remained in the primitive state of a desert-reservation being a cumbersome liability to the British Exchequer."

Poverty Cause of Unrest

"Moreover, the poverty of Transjordan and the backwardness of its sparsely settled population are direct causes for the spirit of restlessness which pervades its population and threatens the stability of the regime of Emir Abdullah which is being artificially propped up, from time to time, by gifts of money distributed among the Arab chieftains of the different tribes inhabiting the country."

"Only recently, the Palestine government had to grant a large sum of money to the Emir for this purpose, which sum was distributed, ostensibly to relieve the prevailing distress of the peasants, but actually to appease the discontent of the Arab chieftains with prevailing conditions."

Would Stem Agitation

"The opening of Transjordan to Jewish settlers would effectively block the agitation of super-patriotic Arab zealots who now claim that the Jews are crowding out the Arabs from their positions in Palestine. It would also remove the just grievances of the Zionists against the arbitrary and harmful policy of the Palestine authorities, a policy which does not permit Jewish capital and labor to fertilize the now barren territory east of the Jordan River."

"The placing of Transjordan within the sphere of Jewish resettlement activities in the land of Israel, at this time, would also offer the only rational and practical solution of the problem of immigration, now faced by the persecuted Jews of Germany, Poland, Rumania and Austria. From an international political viewpoint again, the inclusion of Transjordan within the Jewish colonization scheme, would place Great Britain in the forefront as the nation who has done most for the salvation and protection of the weak and disinherited ones."

Federation Youth Group Meets in B'klyn Tonight

The young men's committee of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities will hold a dinner meeting tonight, at the Unity Club, Bedford avenue and Dean street, Brooklyn. This group has entered the Federation's Spring campaign with a quota fixed in terms of new members rather than in money. It will enroll 100 new members as its special campaign contribution.

Palestine Coast Guard Will Not Be Withdrawn

tire Jewish press of Poland, including the Haint and the Moment, the leading Jewish dailies of Warsaw, today expressed dissatisfaction with the results of the Histadruth plebiscite in Palestine on the peace agreements concluded between Ben-Gurion and Jabotinsky.

Hope is expressed in these articles that the Actions Committee will at its present session in Jerusalem do everything possible to avoid the unfavorable consequences of this plebiscite and not to permit new confusion in the Zionist ranks.

Sees Round-Table Parley Last Hope of Zionism

"A round-table conference is the last chance to save Zionism and the Yishub from utter disruption." This was the comment of Vladimir Jabotinsky, Revisionist leader, in a statement issued from Chicago, where he is lecturing, on the report of the failure of the Histadruth to ratify the peace agreement signed by David Ben-Gurion and himself.

Mr. Jabotinsky regards two of the pacts, one prohibiting violence and libel, and the other suspending the ban on Betar certificates in exchange for the suspension of the boycott of the Keren Hayesod and the Jewish National Fund are still formally valid, but "believes their efficacy is now seriously jeopardized."

"The defeat of practically the whole old-time leadership of the Histadruth and the Mapai," said Mr. Jabotinsky, "indicates that Socialist labor is definitely dominated by a wing that rejects Social conciliation and is determined on class war. This is the attitude of the group now desperately striving for totalitarian dictatorship over the Zionist Organization, the Jewish Agency, the distribution of certificates, and also over the entire organization of the Yishub from colony councils to the municipal council of Tel Aviv and the Vaad Leumi."
