

Map Company Will Revise East Side Guide

Offensive References to Jews to Be Dropped, Rand Tells AJC

The Rand-McNally Company, publishers of maps and guide books has promised the American Jewish Congress to revise its "Guide to Places of Interest in the City and Environs" in order to eliminate obnoxious references to the Jews, it was announced by the AJC yesterday.

The action of the company is in response to a request submitted March 22 by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president, in behalf of the American Jewish Congress, calling attention to offensive references to the Jews in descriptions of points of interest on New York's East Side.

Steps for the creation of organized responsibility in Jewish life in the United States, and preparations for the nation-wide direct elections scheduled to be held in 1937 were taken by the American Jewish Congress, following the meeting of the new administrative committee on Tuesday.

In accordance with the decisions of the extraordinary session which called for the organization of local Congress branches throughout the country, preliminary to the holding of direct elections, instructions were issued by the American Jewish Congress for the establishment of such local branches.

In a communication sent to the 652 elected delegates to the extraordinary session of the American Jewish Congress held in Philadelphia, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president, outlined the immediate program to be followed by the national organization and calls upon the delegates to initiate organizational work in their local communities. The functions of the organization in the United States and in relation to Jews abroad are clearly defined.

200 Zionists to Meet In New Britain Sunday

Between the Lines

Transjordan for Jews

A private report which reached New York yesterday discloses the important fact that the British Colonial Office is now seriously considering the opening of Transjordan to Jews.

The insistence of the Arab leaders in Transjordan that Jews be permitted to enter their territory is no doubt one of the reasons why the British government is now inclined to somewhat modify the ban which it imposed upon Jewish immigration into Transjordan. But the major reason for doing so probably is the present war talk in Europe.

War and Near-East

No one can tell how a new European war will affect the Near East. It is quite certain that Germany in time of war will not be idle insofar as stimulating the Arabs in Palestine against Britain is concerned, as she is not idle now in stimulating Ethiopia against Italy.

Such a situation is foreseen by the Colonial Office in London, where the officials know that in case of war they can depend more upon the Jews than upon the Arabs. Such a situation is also foreseen by some British officials in Palestine interested in the military and strategic position which Palestine has for the entire Near East.

Important Perspectives

It is for this reason that a revision is now definitely contemplated in the Colonial Office in London with regard to the order forbidding Jews to enter Transjordan. This order may not be revoked at once. Gradual modifications of the order are, however, to be expected in the near future.

Interested in increasing the Jewish population in the Near East, the Colonial Office may now adopt a more liberal policy also with regard to immigration of Jews into Palestine. The year 1935 may witness a more flexible interpretation of the immigration regulations not only for Transjordan but Palestine as well.

Arab Sentiments

There is no doubt that the Arabs in Transjordan will welcome the permission of the British government for the settlement of Jews in Transjordan. While the Arabs prosper in Palestine, the Arabs in Transjordan still suffer starvation and depend largely upon aid from the government. They are envious of the millions of dollars which the Arabs in Palestine receive from the Jews for their land, and are irate because Jews are not permitted to obtain land also in Transjordan. They also fear that if the Jews are permitted to enter Transjordan, Jewish money will then flow into Syria instead of being diverted to Transjordan.

The Arab pressure for permitting Jews to settle in Transjordan is therefore growing quite serious. Coupled with the present intentions of the Colonial Office, it spells the opening of Transjordan to Jews in the very near future.

Urge Support for Alien Law Reforms

Women's Council Asks Its Members to Work for Kerr Bill

Active support of the administration bill to guard against separation of families and to provide for legalizing residence in the United States by certain classes of aliens was urged yesterday by Miss Cecilia Rasovsky of the National Council of Jewish Women. In a message to the 40,000 members of the council throughout the country, The Kerr Bill, H. R. 6795, creates more stringent regulations for the deportation of criminal aliens, but guards against the separation from their families of aliens of the non-criminal class. It also gives the Secretary of Labor greater discretion in handling cases of the latter type.

A resolution favoring such legislation was recently passed by the National Council at its triennial convention in New Orleans. The Kerr Bill is an administration measure and is based on research

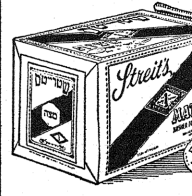

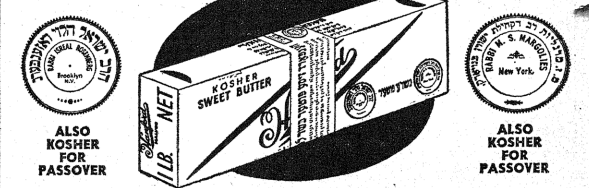

Officiating at the services were Rabbi Samuel Elias Elkin, N. Rappaport, Kalman A. Goldberg, secretary to Chief Rabbi Gabriel Zev Margolis, who was ill, and the Rev. Samuel Kaganoff. The services were held at Adath Israel Synagogue, 205 East Broadway, which he founded as a burial society in 1901.

The long procession stopped for prayer on its way to the services at the Hebrew Free Loan Society's headquarters, 108 Second avenue, which Mr. Alter founded in 1891.

All indications point to the fact that the American team will win world championships in the Maccabiad.

Miss Lillian Copeland of Los Angeles, who won the women's shot-put championship yesterday, today set the Maccabi record for the discus throw with a heave of 37.38 meters.

Miss Sybil Koff of New York, who yesterday won the 60-meter dash, today repeated her victory in the 100-meter race.

The Struggle Between Church and Nazis

The London Times, commenting on the continued arrests of Catholic priests in Germany, says:

Striking evidence has recently been afforded that the Confessional Movement has some justification for its complaint that in the "new religion" racialism and nationalism are put before Christianity. In some high quarters in the regime, at any rate, the whole Church conflict is regarded in a purely political light; the resistance of the pastors is characterized as an attempt to put race, "blood and soil," and similar National-Socialist ideas in a secondary position, which is passionately resented. If those quarters had their way the whole power of the State would be used to sweep away the movement which is defending basic Christian principles. There seems to be no particular reason why the counsels of those particular quarters should be followed in matters of no direct concern to them, but now that the Minister of Education has taken to decreeing Church taxes there is no knowing what department may next take a hand.
