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Riots Result In Closing of Bucharest U.

Order 6-Day Shutdown
After Jewish Students
Are Attacked

BUCHAREST, April 7.—Anti-Semitic students continued their disorders today in street processions, insulting Jewish passersby. In a memorandum to the government, they protested the closing down of the medical faculty and blamed the Jewish students for the disturbances.

BUCHAREST, April 7.—The Bucharest University was closed down yesterday for six days after severe clashes between anti-Semitic and Jewish students.

Many of the Jewish students were attacked in the laboratories of the university and in the class rooms. Several of them are now in the Bucharest Hospital being treated for injuries.

The clashes started as a result of the increased anti-Jewish propaganda throughout the country. The leader of this propaganda is ex-premier Dr. Valda-Voevod who has started a campaign to have Jews eliminated from the educational system and from all professions.

Protest to King Carol

At the same time the anti-Semitic students arranged a demonstration yesterday in front of King Carol's palace in protest against the ban on their projected congress. The order prohibiting the congress was issued under the explanation that such congresses are devoted chiefly to anti-Semitic propaganda rather than to matters concerning the academic interests of the students.

A meeting of Jewish students today decided to abstain from visiting the university until the administration arranges full protection for their lives. It was pointed out at this meeting that the tense atmosphere prevailing within the university walls makes it dangerous for Jewish students to visit the classes.

A torchlight procession at the stadium was one of the features of the ceremony. It is estimated that about 200,000 persons visited the Maccabiad games which opened April 2.

Centers Seen In Improved Financial State

Rising Budgets Noted at Welfare Board Conference

That contraction of expenditures by Jewish centers has been checked and has been replaced by a tendency to begin enlarging budgets was noted yesterday at the annual meeting of the National Council of the Jewish Welfare Board at the Ninety-second Street Y. M. H. A. About 500 persons attended morning and afternoon sessions.

Observing in his annual president's report that "the basic financial structure of Jewish centers is in a much improved condition as compared with five years ago," Judge Irving Lehman urged "a vigorous, inspired and dynamic Jewish Center movement to reach into every town and city in which Jews dwell and which will prove a secure mooring mast for the Jewish spirit, anxious and distressed by the trials of our people."

Youth Interest Rises

In addition, Judge Lehman reported increased interest on the part of Jewish youth in Jewish centers. "The young people," he said, "are prompted by a sense of responsibility to the community."

During the morning session Dr. Cyrus Adler, chairman of the army and navy committee, reported that many of the 4,000 Jewish boys in the Civilian Conservation Corps are "displaying interest in things Jewish." He described the work of the Board in providing

Revisionists To Stay Out Of Congress

Paris Office Lays Action
to Result of Peace
Plebiscite

JERUSALEM, April 7.—The Zionist Actions Committee adjourned its morning session today to permit the Mizrahi and the General Zionists to consider the declaration by the Revisionists that they will not participate in the next Zionist Congress unless its program is agreed upon in advance with regard to questions concerning major Zionist policies. If this point is granted, the Revisionists declared, they will be ready to submit to discipline and cooperate with the other factions in the Zionist Organization.

PARIS, April 7.—The World Executive of the Zionist Revisionist Party, which has its headquarters here, today issued an official announcement that the Revisionists will not participate in the next Zionist Congress in August.

Simultaneously, the Revisionist Executive ordered its representatives at the Zionist Actions Committee, which is now in session in Palestine, to leave the committee's sessions.

These steps were taken because "the proposals for peace agreed upon between Vladimir Jabotinsky, the leader of the Revisionists, and David Ben-Gurion, the leader of the Palestine Laborites, were rejected by the Laborite plebiscite in Palestine," the announcement says.

Issue Now Clear, Jabotinsky Declares

Asked to comment on the decision of the Revisionist Executive, Vladimir Jabotinsky, the leader of the Revisionists, made the following statement to the Jewish Daily Bulletin, outlining conditions under which peace may still be reached in the Zionist Organization:

"The issue before Zionism is now perfectly clear," Mr. Jabotinsky declared. "The political regime of Palestine must immediately be adapted to the needs of Jewish mass immigration, and that means agrarian reforms, opening of Transjordan, intensest protection of local production, and efficient security. Without these reforms the present unprecedented effort of the Jewish people will be frustrated and prosperity will end in failure."

Ready to Cooperate

"We therefore hold that a worldwide decisive political offensive must be made now. If the other parties agree to it, we are ready to cooperate, and the question of unity of discipline will settle itself, and Zionism will be reunited."

"If they do not agree, we will carry out the petition movement alone; and in that case we have no business with the Zionist Congress. This will mean that the Congress no longer represents the

Nazi Paper Likens Herr Hitler to Haman

BERLIN, April 7.—Adolph Hitler was compared today with Haman, the Persian minister of ancient times who plotted to massacre the Jews, in an article appearing in the Nazi paper Judenkenner.

"Both Hitler and Haman are leaders with a profound knowledge of the Jews," the Nazi paper says, adding that the Jews had better be careful about "the red flame of hatred against Hitler" because this flame may destroy them utterly.

Ask Palestine To Rescind New Rules on Visas

Actions Body Resolution Verifies View Monop- oly Is Broken

JERUSALEM, April 7.—A sharp discrepancy was seen here between a resolution on immigration adopted today at the session of the Zionist Actions Committee, and an assurance given the committee last week by M. Shertok, member of the Zionist Executive, that the new immigration regulations published by the government do not affect the monopoly which the Jewish Agency hitherto enjoyed with regard to obtaining immigration certificates from the Palestine government.

Today's resolution of the Actions Committee requests that the Palestine government "should not complicate the work of the Zionist Executive by assigning special categories and sub-categories of immigrants." (The new regulations of the Palestine government provide that in addition to the Zionist Executive, every employer in the country may apply to the government for immigration certifi-

Writers Are Jailed; City Flaunts Anti- Semitic Banners

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
DANZIG, April 7.—Fifteen hundred Danzig Jews entitled to participate in today's parliamentary elections were removed from the voting lists, a special correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency established.

The only Jewish newspaper in Danzig, the Danziger Echo, was today confiscated by the authorities, who refused to give any reason for the confiscation.

Several Jewish journalists who arrived here from Warsaw to witness the elections were arrested and held until Dr. Goebbels left Danzig.

Warned Not to Vote

The entire city was flooded with Nazi banners and with signs announcing that "The Jews Are Our Misfortune." The Jewish population of Danzig was warned in a house-to-house canvass by the Nazis that they had better abstain from participating in the voting.

A number of Jews were attacked yesterday in the streets here by Nazis when they refused to raise their arms in the Hitler salute during the Nazi parades in connection with the elections. Anti-Semitic leaflets were distributed in hundreds of thousands of copies throughout the city. The leaflets appealed to the population "to free Danzig of Jews and return the city back to the Fatherland."

Cite Terror Methods

A delegation of Danzig Jews who are Polish citizens appeared before the Polish Commissioner in Danzig and drew his attention to the terroristic methods used by the Nazis in Danzig even against Jews who are citizens of Poland. The Polish Commissioner assured the delegation that every incident in which Polish Jews in Danzig have been maltreated will be taken up by him with the Danzig Senate. He emphasized that the Polish government intends to go the limit in protecting its Jewish citizens in Danzig.

The Jewish population here is especially worried about the aftermaths of the election. It is

Force Jewish Paper in Reich To Drop 'German' From Title

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, April 6.—Following the policy of isolating the German Jews to a ghetto life, the Ministry of Press and Propaganda of which Dr. Goebbels is the head ordered today a change in the title of the German Jewish newspaper Central Verein Zeitung, the official organ of the Federation of German Citizens of Jewish faith.

The order instructs the newspaper to eliminate the word "German" from the subtitle of the paper. The subtitle must read "A General Newspaper for Jewry," instead of "A Journal for German-Jews and Jewry," the order says.

Reports that the entire German press in Pomerania has decided not to accept Jewish advertisements were denied today in the Pommersche Zeitung which appears in Stettin. These reports, the paper says, were nothing but April Fool stories. The non-party newspapers are continuing to accept Jewish advertisements as usual.

In connection with this it was also pointed out today that Goering's newspaper Essener National Zeitung published an article warmly greeting the Pomeranian newspapers for their alleged ban on Jewish advertisements in their papers.

'Aryan' Lawyers in Austria Urged to Fire Jewish Aides

VIENNA, April 7.—"Aryan" lawyers in the major concerns of Vienna were advised today to dismiss their Jewish assistants and to avoid entering into any arrangements with Jewish experts.

This step was taken as a result of the campaign going on throughout Austria silently to introduce the "Aryan Paragraph" restrictions against Jews along the same lines as in Nazi Germany.

A survey discloses a heavy decrease in the number of Jewish lawyers employed by Austrian industrial firms. The same survey

shows a corresponding increase in the number of "Aryan" lawyers employed by these firms.

It was explained here today that the dismissals of Jewish lawyers in the Austrian industrial firms is due chiefly to the pressure exercised by the Credit Anstalt, the government credit bank on which these firms are dependent for their credits. The bank is actively working for the elimination of Jews from all fields of life. This policy has been openly adopted by the bank since the recent reorganization instituted there by the government.

Report on Refugee Scholars

GENEVA.

The High Commissioner for Refugees (Jewish and others) from Germany has published a pamphlet describing the work done during the past two years to assist the university teachers displaced in Germany by the political revolution in 1933. It is an impressive record. Of about 650 scholars who have left Germany 248 have already been re-established in permanent positions, and it is interesting to see that forty are in the University of Istanbul and eighteen in the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, while others are distributed throughout the world. Facilities for continuing their studies or research in universities or other appropriate institutions have been given to 336 of the remainder. In short, almost all the displaced scholars in exile have been retained within the university sphere, a magnificent demonstration of support for the principle of the preservation of learning.

This means that a group of university teachers nearly as large as the whole staff of Cambridge University has been either permanently or temporarily accommodated in the institutions of higher learning outside Germany. Since the German foreign exchange restrictions ensured that few of the scholars had financial resources outside their country, maintenance has been provided from non-German sources.

Universities, in all but a few instances, could not use their normal funds for this purpose; the most that they were justified in doing in this crisis was to incur the expenses involved in offering hospitality in laboratories and libraries. Almost the full financial burden has been met from funds especially raised for the purpose by emergency academic committees in Europe and the United States. These special committees have collected nearly \$10,000,000 during the past two years, and used this sum in grants-in-aid, loans for traveling expenses, etc.

In a foreword to the pamphlet the High Commissioner, James G. McDonald, points out that, in contrast to the financial support for other work on behalf of the German refugees, funds for the academic work "have been contributed without distinction of creed or race." It is one of the most gratifying aspects of the work of the Academic Assistance Council in this country that substantial support should have been received from both Jewish and non-Jewish sources. The Jewish community, in spite of its heavy responsibilities for general relief work, has contributed \$25,000 to the council funds through the Central British Fund for German Jewry. In addition

tion the council received \$29,000 from certain Jewish trusts and family contributions. A large proportion of the remainder of the \$140,000, contributed for the most part in small donations and subscriptions, has come from non-Jewish sources. In particular, university teachers and university graduates have given generously.

Apart from substantial individual donations, many small donations of a few shillings have come from persons of limited means who wished to be associated with the work.

There remains the second half of the task to be accomplished; the academic committees' plans for the future are described in outline in the pamphlet. In many ways the future work will be harder than the past. Although great experience has been gained, although the work of assistance has been coordinated on an international basis, and although the nature of the problem is now known, there are new difficulties which almost outweigh these advantages.

The international task is to transfer the 366 temporarily placed scholars into more permanent positions and to maintain them during this process in positions where they may continue their studies. Several of the committees on the Continent doubt if they can continue to support their guests.

Many of the scholars requiring further assistance are engaged in subjects such as philosophy and classics, where the field of absorption is more limited than in the natural sciences, in which there has so far been most success in permanent placement. A majority of the temporarily placed persons are younger men and women without the international reputation which made it easier to assist their senior colleagues to re-establish themselves; yet it is this younger age group, because of its potential importance in future research, which deserves and needs extraordinary assistance in re-establishment.

The time has come for final plans, and the committees outline their proposals in this pamphlet. The Academic Assistance Council has the following program for the future. It wishes to continue its international information service and investigations for openings; to continue a system of grants-in-aid to about seventy of the displaced scholars for not more than two years; to subsidize occasional short lecture courses in Great Britain for those of the displaced scholars who are able to support themselves in Germany but have otherwise no opportunity of announcing the results of their research or of maintaining contact with their colleagues; and to create twenty special research fellowships, awarded in the first place for three years, which will enable us to retain for this country the services of some of the most distinguished or promising of our guests. This is a manageable task, and if enabled to complete it the council will have made the most substantial contribution to the solution of the total problem.

Between the Lines

If any proof were needed of the existence of a secret Nazi ring in Europe whose purpose is to spy on refugees from Germany, the mysterious death of two German-Jewish women in London has furnished this proof.

As early as a month ago, the Swiss police, in their investigations of the kidnaping of Barthold Jacob, established that the headquarters of the Nazi kidnapers are in London and that it is from London that the Nazis are operating an espionage system among the refugees from Germany all over Europe.

This theory of the Swiss police has now been substantiated by what is believed to be the murder of the two women in London.

Spying in Peace Time

The system of espionage which Nazi Germany is now conducting in different countries, reveals itself more and more clearly. It is reminiscent of the days of the World War, when Germany flooded America and Europe with spies to whom the life of any enemy meant nothing. It actually amounts to keeping the opponents of the Nazis under terror, not only in Germany but even on foreign soil.

It is therefore no wonder that the Swiss government is now determined to put an end to this system of Nazi war spying in times of peace. The efforts of the Swiss government against Nazi espionage will no doubt be supported not only by France but by all civilized countries. After the suspected poisoning of two innocent women in London, the British government will be as interested in checking the Nazi activities outside Germany as the Swiss government.

Breaking Diplomatic Traditions

There is an unwritten tradition existing among nations and observed by all civilized governments. This tradition provides for non-interference in the life and activities of other countries and their inhabitants. It is to this tradition that Nazi Germany always refers when it complains against intervention in the internal affairs of the Reich.

This tradition has now been violated by Germany, not only in Switzerland, where it has been established that Herr Jacob was captured by Nazi agents on Swiss soil, but also in England, where German agents are believed to have poisoned the two German-Jewish women. The breaking of this tradition is now exposing the lives of thousands of refugees to danger.

U. S. and the Gestapo

There is no doubt that something will be undertaken by European nations to check the Nazi terroristic activities in foreign countries. This will have to be done not only by the countries where the work of the Nazi agents has already been exposed, but also by those countries where this work has, unfortunately, not yet been discovered.

In the general chorus of protest, the voice of the American government must also be heard, since no one knows how far the terrorism of Nazi agents may go, and whether the long arm of the Gestapo has not already reached America.

Paris, London Slate Anti-Nazi Boycott Rallies

World Council to Hold Meetings in 14 Countries

The first of a series of mass meetings in fourteen countries to push the economic boycott against Hitler's sword-brandishing Germany will be staged in Paris tomorrow, it was announced yesterday by the World Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi Council, which has arranged the gatherings in conjunction with dominant labor organizations in the various lands and international unions.

A London meeting, which will also be held this week, will be addressed by Sir Robert Mond and Walter Citrine, president of the British Central Trades and Labor Council.

The New York Hippodrome is expected to be crowded to capacity Wednesday evening for the local meeting, under the joint auspices of the American Federation of Labor and the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League. Samuel Untermyer, world boycott chieftain, and high officials of the A. F. of L. will speak.

Similar rallies are scheduled for Philadelphia, Chicago, Cleveland, New Orleans, Montreal, San Francisco, Brussels, Amsterdam, Warsaw, Cairo and Johannesburg, with plans for meetings in Rumania, Palestine, Czechoslovakia, Latvia.

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The purpose of the assemblies is to bring pressure on the League of Nations at its forthcoming session for adoption of an official international boycott, as sanctioned by the League covenant, to curb German militarism and treaty-breaking.

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Appeal Drives All Over Texas To Start Soon

Campaign in Galveston Already Under Way; Chiefs Prepare

Organization of a state-wide campaign in Texas on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal is nearing completion, according to word received at national headquarters here. Co-chairmen for the state are J. K. Hexter of Dallas, Tobias Sakowitz of Houston and Jake Karotkin of San Antonio, with George A. Levy as executive director.

Several leading Jewish communities of Texas are already participating in the drive. Among them are Galveston, which is being led by I. H. Kempner, and El Paso, of which the chairman is Maurice Schwartz.

Dallas will begin a campaign April 21 under the leadership of Louis Tobian and I. D. Geetch, co-chairmen. Fred F. Florence is treasurer. Waco will begin its drive on the same day with A. M. Goldstein as chairman. In San Antonio the campaign, which is headed by Gilbert Lang, Sid Katz, Morris Stern and J. D. Oppenheimer, will be launched April 29. Houston is also preparing a campaign.

In Tyler a drive is now in progress, of which B. Wadel and Mrs. A. Golenternek are co-chairmen. I. Rudman vice-chairman and Max Krumholz treasurer. Rabbis Aron Moskowitz and David B. Alpert are on the advisory committee.

Many adjacent smaller communities are participating in the campaigns of the cities mentioned.

Rabbis Meet Tonight To Map Appeal Aid

Rabbis of more than 100 conservative, orthodox and reform congregations of greater New York will attend a conference at Hotel Commodore tonight, to discuss the present plight of Jews in Germany and Eastern Europe, and to consider plans for assisting them, it was announced yesterday by I. Edwin Goldwasser, co-chairman, with Michael Schaap and Nathan Straus, of the Greater New York Campaign of the United Jewish Appeal.

The United Jewish Appeal is endeavoring to raise \$1,250,000 as this city's share of a national quota of \$3,250,000, for assistance to German Jewry and other lands, and for settlement of Jews in Palestine. Judge Otto A. Rosalsky will be the principal speaker at the conference.

Jewish leaders of the Bronx proceeded with the organization of a committee of one hundred to direct that borough's participation in the drive, Mr. Goldwasser also announced. These plans were made at a luncheon held at the Hotel Commodore Friday at which Abraham Krasne, food merchant, was elected Bronx chairman.

Deutsch to Be Honored At AJC Dinner May 7

Aldermanic President Bernard S. Deutsch will be the guest of honor at a testimonial dinner tendered by the American Jewish Congress on May 7, at the Hotel Commodore, it was announced yesterday.

The dinner is being tendered to Mr. Deutsch in recognition of six years of service to the American Jewish Congress as president. Mr. Deutsch refused to stand for reelection last month, owing to the pressure of his official duties as President of the Board of Aldermen. He was succeeded in the Presidency by Dr. Stephen S. Wise.

Stella Adler, Group Theatre actress, will participate in the program of the conference.

The call to the conference was issued by a special committee, of which Judge Anna Moscovitz Kross is chairman, Mrs. Rebekah

Kohut is honorary chairman, and Mrs. Mark Harris is vice-chairman. The Conference, according to the list of sponsors made public by the committee, will be a representative assembly of Jewish women.

Zionists Place Rothenberg In JNF Golden Book

The Downtown Zionist District, the oldest Zionist unit in the United States last night presented Morris Rothenberg, President of the Zionist Organization of America, with a certificate of the inscription of his name in the Golden Book of the Jewish National Fund, at Jerusalem, in recognition of his contribution to the Zionist cause during more than two decades. Upwards of 500 New York Zionists attended the celebration at the Central Plaza marking the opening of the new headquarters of that organization.

Beginning yesterday, hundreds of volunteers canvassed the Jewish public with boxes for contributions toward the upkeep of institutions maintained by Histadruth Ivrit. Last evening a Maimonides celebration by Histadruth Ivrit was held at the Hotel Pennsylvania.

the Jews in the CCC as well as in the army and navy an opportunity to come closer to their religion.

Spirited discussion was aroused by the plan of M. Maldwin Fertig, president of the Metropolitan League of Jewish Community Associations to reorganize regional federations and to resolve the League into a new organization to be called the Metropolitan Division of the Jewish Welfare Board and which would integrate Jewish social work in the New York area.

In opening a discussion about the Jewish community center, Professor Mordecai M. Kaplan said, "The tragedy of the modern Jew is not so much that he is persecuted for being a Jew as that he himself sees no reason for remaining one. . . Only the establishment of the type of communal organization which will reckon with all Jewish needs and problems, interests and aspirations will bring about these conditions which will redeem American Jewish life from its present sterility and aimlessness."

Budgets Increase

A report prepared by Harry L. Glucksman, executive director, showed that the membership of

Jewish centers last year totalled 325,000, including about 100,000, mostly unemployed, who could not pay fees. Budgets of centers range from \$3,000,000 to \$3,500,000, a fact which Judge Lehman cited in showing the encouraging financial condition of the center movement.

Speaking after Judge Lehman, Dr. Adler announced that he regards it as encouraging that the army last year expanded the Jewish personnel of the chaplains' service. Ten "contract chaplains," he said, were appointed last year on a limited basis at a salary of thirty dollars per month plus traveling expenses.

Other speakers during the day were: Rabbi Alexander Basel, Frank L. Weil, president of the Y. M. H. A.; Benjamin J. Buttenweiser, treasurer; Harry Budalsky, David Landau, Nathan A. Heller, J. Meyer Schine, and seven young men and women who participated in the discussion opened by Professor Kaplan.

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Fraternal Units Establish Body To Aid Charity

500 Societies at Parley Move to Cooperate With Federation

A permanent council to coordinate Jewish fraternal and benevolent organizations with the communal activities of the ninety-one charitable agencies of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies was established yesterday after an all-day convention held at the Hotel McAlpin. More than 500 delegates participated, representing as many Jewish fraternal and benevolent societies in New York, with a membership of 250,000, and voted their affiliation with the council.

The council, to be known as the Council of Fraternal and Benevolent Organizations for Federation, has as its object the building of closer relations through Federation, between the Jewish fraternal life of New York City, and the organized philanthropic work of the community. It will be made up of representatives of local, fraternal and benevolent societies, each affiliated organization being entitled to one member on the Council.

The council, it was said by speakers at the convention, is expected to play an important role in the new Federation plan, announced at the Hotel Commodore dinner last Thursday which calls for an "all-year-round" educational and organizational program intended eventually to supplant the "hectic, intensive high-pressure fund-raising campaigns by a broader, more stable and continuous financing of Federation's ninety-one institutions by individuals and organized groups."

Paul Felix Warburg, honorary chairman of the committee of civic and welfare leaders in response to whose call the convention met, said that the convention marked "a new stage in the broader understanding of communal problems by the average citizen of the community," and was "a symbol of the unity of Jewish life in the acceptance of the traditional obligation to take care of the needy and the unfortunate of the community."

"The magnificent, representative outpouring at this convention demonstrates, if any demonstration is necessary," he said, "that Jews, however they may differ in political belief, shade of religious creed, or fraternal and social affiliation, are united in one essential conviction—that the needy and unfortunate among their fellow man must be helped."

The following were elected as officers of the council: I. Edwin Goldwasser, president; M. E. Fried, first vice-president; Abraham Levine, second vice-president; Max Resnick, third vice-president; Philip Gingold, 4th vice-president, and Jerome Edwards, secretary.

The creation of the Council was hailed as an important progressive step in the philanthropic life of the community by Samuel D. Leidesdorf, president of Federation. "The Council holds the greatest promise," he said, "of becoming the great instrument which will serve large masses of Jews by keeping them and their interests in close touch with the ninety-one institutions maintained by Federation, so vital in the lives of us all in New York."

Other speakers at the morning session included: Solomon Lowenstein, executive vice-president of Federation; Waldemar Kops, chairman of its business men's council, and Mr. Goldwasser and Sol M. Stroock, chairman and associate chairman, respectively, of Federation group activities.

Parley Here Acclaims Paris Decision

The second day's sessions of the national conference of the Zionist Revisionist Organization of America, which is being held at the Hotel Edison with more than 200 delegates and alternates participating, received with enthusiastic acclaim yesterday an announcement concerning instructions by the World Executive that its representatives walk out on the deliberations of the Zionist Actions Committee at Jerusalem.

The announcement was made by Vladimir Jabotinsky, president of the World Union of Zionist Revision. He said the order issued in Paris told the Revisionist delegates to leave the meeting of the Actions Committee if the proposals of the Revisionists for a round-table conference were rejected and, in that eventuality, to declare that the Revisionists will not have anything to do with the next Zionist Congress, scheduled for August.

Canadians Attend

The opening session of the conference, which attracted delegates from as far west as Omaha, Neb., and from Toronto, Ont., and Montreal, Que., was held Saturday evening and ran into the early hours of yesterday morning.

Addresses were delivered by Jabotinsky, whose remarks took almost three hours, Rabbi Louis Isaac Newman, Rabbi Wolf Gold, Jacob de Haas and Elias Ginsburg, chairman of the central committee of the organization.

Jabotinsky excoriated the World Zionist Organization and the Actions Committee in his speech, saying:

"Those at the helm of the World Zionist Organization do not want peace in Zionism."

(Continued from Page One) quite clear that the election will yield an overwhelming majority of votes to the Nazis and that the worst chapter for Danzig Jewry will start when the elections are over.

Lester Helpless

The High Commissioner of the League of Nations for Danzig, Sean Lester, is absolutely helpless in protecting the Jewish population. He maintains close contact with the Secretariat of the League but is not in a position to do anything at present to ensure Jewish safety in the city.

Fifteen thousand Germans who formerly resided in Danzig and are therefore entitled to participate in the elections were brought from Germany on Nazi trains in order to increase the number of votes for the Nazis.

The Polish population in Danzig is seriously concerned over the situation. The Nazi spirit prevalent in the city in connection with the elections gives ground for the belief that Polish influence in Danzig will soon be substantially diminished if the League of Nations does not undertake energetic steps to hamper the Danzig Nazis in their ambitions.

JDC Council Picks Officers This Week

Warburg and Rabbi Jonah B. Wise to Address Meeting Set for Emanu-El on Saturday

Officers and directors will be elected at the annual meeting of the national council of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee on Saturday evening, April 13, at Temple Emanu-El.

The meeting, at which additional members of the national council, selected from outstanding leaders of Jewish communities throughout the United States who have rendered service on behalf of the overseas philanthropic work of the organization, will be elected, will be addressed by Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, who recently returned from a visit to Germany and countries where thousands of refugees from the Reich are presently located, and by Felix M. Warburg, who visited Palestine a few weeks ago, it was announced Friday by Joseph C. Hyman, secretary of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

Butcher Stripped Of His Kosher Sign

Pleading guilty to a code inspector's charge of having non-kosher meat on his premises, Louis Langsaman, a butcher at 174 Amsterdam avenue, was required to remove the "kosher meat" sign from his show-window by the retail kosher meat trade code authority, David S. Andron, general counsel, announced yesterday.

Langsaman was one of 112 kosher butchers who were summoned to appear before the complaints committee at 1501 Broadway on various charges, including employing minors, paying employees below the code minimum, sanitary violations, maintaining fire and health hazards and sale of non-kosher meat as kosher.

Twenty-five of the cases were disposed of this week. All except Langsaman received warnings and signed affidavits pledging to abide by code regulations in the future. The rest of the cases are pending.

The resolution further demands an increase in the number of immigration certificates to be issued by the government under the new labor schedule. It proposes that the government grant immigration visas also to Jewish artisans possessing \$1,250. Likewise, it asks that visas be granted to persons possessing \$2,500.

A demand that the Palestine government permit all tourists who have found occupations to remain in the country was also voiced today at the Actions Committee meeting in a special resolution.

It is expected that the session of the Actions Committee will come to a close tomorrow.

Propose 3 Banks

At last night's session, the Actions Committee adopted a resolution to establish banks for the granting of credits to industry, agriculture, and for rural development. The resolution provides that the Zionist Executive must secure a substantial interest in these banks.

A sum of \$470,000 was assigned by the Actions Committee to develop new colonization projects in Palestine and \$300,000 was earmarked for final stabilization of the already existing colonies.

The committee resolved that \$50,000 of the annual budget is to be set aside for political work and for security. Seventy five thousand dollars was assigned for the Baron Rothschild Foundation; \$32,000 for maintaining an information service and for pensions; \$25,000 was voted for a Bialik Foundation and \$4,000 for an Arlosoroff Foundation.

The sum of \$125,000 was approved by the committee for the administrative expenses of the Keren Hayesod. One hundred and ten thousand dollars was also assigned to pay off debts of the Zionist Organization; a sum of \$100,000 was set aside for the support of Jewish education in the country.

Seek to Oust Jews In Bialystok Jobs

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, April 7.—A proposal to eliminate all Jewish employees from municipal institutions has been made in the city of Bialystok by the anti-Semitic faction of the National Democratic Party (Endeks) in the Municipal Council.

The proposal provoked protest on the part of the Jewish councillors and caused a heated discussion. The Mayor of the city declared that the question of municipal employees cannot be discussed by the Municipal Council because the only authority to deal with it is the Federal administrator of the city.

Medical Center Fund Gets \$20,000 in 5 Days

The first five days of the building fund campaign for the Rothschild-Hadassah-University Medical Center in Palestine yielded contributions of \$20,000, it was announced yesterday by Mrs. Moses P. Epstein, national vice-president of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, and chairman of the campaign. The campaign is under the auspices of Hadassah and the American Jewish Physicians' Committee.

50,000 Slated For Passover Aid in Warsaw

Other Thousands on the Rolls of Private Agencies

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, April 7.—Not less than 11,000 Jewish families in Warsaw alone, totaling 50,000 persons, will receive aid from the Jewish Community for Passover, it was announced today by the community.

In addition thousands of families will receive Passover food from private relief organizations. The number of Jews who depend upon charity for their Passover food is estimated at over a million throughout the whole of Poland.

The miserable situation of Polish Jewry is pictured in the tens of thousands of applications filed with the Jewish communities asking for matzoh in connection with the approaching Passover. Most of the applicants are asking for nothing more than matzoh and potatoes. All of them will celebrate the Passover with hardly anything but these bare necessities.

In view of the withdrawals of government subsidies from the Jewish communities, Jewish leaders are totally at a loss as to how to accommodate the tens of thousands of applicants. The poverty in the provincial cities is even greater than in Warsaw.

Fear was expressed today that many Jewish communities will actually be stormed this week, the last before Passover, by those applicants who will be informed that their applications cannot be accommodated. Appeals were made Saturday in all synagogues throughout the country asking the more affluent Jews to share their Passover meals with the needy by contributing voluntarily to the special funds created for the purpose of providing the needy Jews with food throughout the Passover.
