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Danzig Jews Relieved at Vote Result

But Threat to Future Is Still Serious, Leaders Hold

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

DANZIG, April 8.—The Jewish population of Danzig today welcomed the results of yesterday's parliamentary elections as removing for the first time the threat that the Jews of Danzig would be placed in the same position as the Jews of Germany.

It was pointed out in Jewish circles that although the Nazis failed to win the two-third majority necessary to modify the constitution, the Jewish situation remains serious in view of the fact that the administration will still be dominated by the Nazis, since they form a majority of sixty per cent in the Parliament.

Newsstands Wrecked

A number of Jewish newspaper stands were wrecked by the Nazis during the elections on Sunday. The windows of a Jewish restaurant on Pfeffer street were smashed by hooligans.

Inciting anti-Jewish placards were posted by the Nazis on the walls of the Danzig synagogue.

Joel Cang, the Warsaw correspondent of the Manchester Guardian, British daily newspaper, and of the London Jewish Chronicle, was arrested here yesterday when he arrived to report the outcome of the parliamentary elections.

Court to Get Case

Despite the intervention of the British consulate, and of the Polish Commissar for Danzig, the Jewish correspondent was not released today. The administration of the Danzig Senate declared that the case will be turned over to the court.

No mention was made in the reply of the Danzig Senate to the British and Polish diplomatic representatives, whether the case of the correspondent will be taken up in a regular court or is to be handled by a special court.

A number of foreign journalists in Danzig decided today to leave the city in protest against the arrest of Mr. Cang.

The Nazis gained six seats in Parliament by yesterday's elections. Complete official election returns are as follows:

Jewish Sailors Form Union in Palestine

HAIFA, April 8.—A union of Jewish sailors, the first in the world, was formed here today by a group of 100 Palestine seafarers.

This is the first group of young Jews engaged in navigation who have been specially trained for this vocation. A number of them received their training in Italian ports prior to settling in Palestine.

Rent Strike Closes Shops In Jerusalem

Merchants in Six-Hour Protest Against Increases

JERUSALEM, April 8.—A six-hour strike of tradesmen and merchants was carried out here today in protest against proposed increases in rents.

Promptly at noon, all stores were closed and factories stopped their work, responding to a call of the Jerusalem Merchants Association, the Jerusalem Artisans Association, the Barbers Union and the Laundry and Dry Cleaners Association. The strike passed quietly and work was resumed in some stores at six o'clock.

Government Warned

Prior to proclaiming the strike, meetings were held by shopkeepers who are tenants and a warning was given to the government and to the municipality urging the enactment of a law restricting rentals. The municipal council decided not to sponsor enactment of such restrictions.

A resolution adopted by the merchants' association and the other groups who called the strike today, says that "the municipality is serving a small group of landlords who

42 Betarim Get Visas, Zionist Court Decides

JERUSALEM, April 8.—The Zionist Congress Court today ruled that immigration certificates must be granted to forty-two members of the Revisionist Betar organization in Poland.

The ruling was issued in connection with a claim which the Revisionists submitted to the court against the Zionist Immigration Department.

Actions Body Ends Parley In Disunity

Stormy Debate Climaxed by Withdrawal of Revisionists

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, April 8.—Failing to bring unity into the Zionist Organization, the Zionist Actions Committee, which opened its conference March 27, brought its final session to a close at 4 o'clock this morning after a stormy debate which was climaxed with the announcement by the Revisionists that they will not participate in the nineteenth World Zionist Congress.

After making this announcement, the Revisionist members of the Actions Committee left the hall and did not take part in the closing ceremony.

Hopes for Reconsideration

The session of the Actions Committee was closed by Dr. Nahum Goldmann, who expressed the hope that the announcement of the Revisionists is not their final word, since all parties have tried to meet the Revisionist demands, and will continue trying in the desire to see the elections to the Zionist Congress pass peacefully.

Prior to walking out of the Actions Committee session, the Revisionists read a declaration explaining their reasons for not participating in the next Congress. The declaration says that the majority of the Actions Committee has not shown any inclination to reach an understanding with the Revisionists, although the Revisionists came to the present session of the Actions Committee with a desire to unify all forces in Zionism on the basis of a common program for common activity emanating from deep Zionist patriotism.

Supported by 5 Groups

"Our desire was confronted with mechanical dictatorship of the governing party, which refused a round-table conference for reaching a peaceful understanding, despite the support of five Zionist parties," the declaration says.

After the Revisionists concluded their announcement, statements were also read by Ben-Zion Mosensohn in behalf of the General Zionists, by Rabbi Meier Berlin in behalf of the Mizrahi, and by Berl Katznelson in behalf of the Laborites.

The crisis at the Actions Committee which led to the walking out of the Revisionists, came after the General Zionists had failed in their attempt to establish a coalition of all parties on the basis of party discipline. This was refused by the Revisionists. The Mizrahi leaders then made a motion that the question of discipline be adjourned until an understanding is reached with regard to a common Zionist program for extending the Zionist work and for building a

Adolph S. Ochs Dies Suddenly At the Age of 77

Paralytic Stroke Fatal to Famed Publisher in Chattanooga

(Special to the J.D.B.)

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 8.—Adolph S. Ochs, publisher of the New York Times and one of the most famous figures in the newspaper business of the past three decades, died here today at the age of 77. Death came suddenly and unexpectedly as a result of a paralytic stroke, complicated by a hemorrhage.

Mr. Ochs, who had left New York Saturday in the best of health, arrived here yesterday and sent messages to New York saying that he was feeling quite well. His trip here was in connection with business.

While funeral arrangements have not yet been decided upon, it is believed that burial will be in this city.

Born in Cincinnati on March 12, 1858, the son of Julius and Bertha (Levy) Ochs, the boy who was later to become one of the world's outstanding publishers received his education in the public schools of the city. At his death he held degrees from some of the leading universities of the country, including

Soldiers Told Hitler Holds Draft Verdict

Veterans' Query on Inclusion Answered by War Office

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, April 8.—The German War Office today informed the Jewish War Veterans Association in Germany that the ultimate decision on whether or not Jews are to be included in the forthcoming conscription, lies with Hitler himself.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that the War Ministry is inclined to favor Jewish equality in the army but that Hitler and Goebbels are strongly opposed to it.

Dr. H. Kaufman, a district leader of the Jewish War Veterans Association in Frankfurt-am-Main, was arrested today for telegraphing to General Goering that the Jewish war veterans will continue to display the German flag until an official order to the contrary is published.

Acknowledges Letter

The office of Chancellor Hitler acknowledged in very polite form the receipt of a strongly worded letter addressed to him by the Jewish War Veterans Association, in which the association claimed the rights of Jews to defend the country. The reply states that the letter is now under Hitler's consideration.

The principle of Jewish equality in economics, proclaimed by the former Nazi Minister of Economics Dr. Schmidt, and advocated by his successor, Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, is gradually being removed. It was learned today that a secret order has been circulated by the authorities to the effect that Jewish managers of business firms may no longer be authorized to nominate candidates to represent the workers of their enterprises, and that this privilege is to be confined to "Aryan" business managers only.

British Statesmen Given Reception in Tel Aviv

TEL AVIV, April 8.—An official reception was given by this city to a number of British members of parliament now on a visit to Palestine.

Artisans' Parley in Biro-Bidjan Reports Big Sale of Products

MOSCOW, April 8.—The first conference of Jewish artisan cooperatives in Biro-Bidjan opened today in the city of Biro-Bidjan and reported a production of goods worth 111,860,000 roubles during the first five years of their existence.

It was reported at the opening of the conference that the artisan cooperatives in the Bureya have a current membership of 1,190. Delegates reported that there are very good prospects for artisan

ship in Biro-Bidjan since numerous products are now being manufactured in this territory from native timber. Many of these products are being shipped to different parts of the Soviet Union for sale.

The convention was greeted by a representative of the local government. Messages of greeting were also received from Moscow from the government committee to settle Jews on land. The conference, conducted entirely in Yiddish, is taking place in the building of the local Jewish theatre.

Interview With Dr. Lwowitch

MOSCOW.

Dr. David Lwowitch, member of the praesidium of the World Ort Union, who has left after a short visit here during which he conducted negotiations with the government for settling foreign Jews in Biro-Bidjan, has found the Jewish situation in the Soviet Union much better than it was five years ago when he last visited this country.

This was stated by Dr. Lwowitch in an interview which he gave me prior to his departure from the Soviet Union for Paris, whence he will sail for the United States to report on his Soviet visit and to seek funds for the work of the Ort in Soviet Russia.

"Very profound changes have occurred in the economic position of the Jewish population in pace with the vast constructive work of the Soviet Union," he said. "The problem of the declassed Jews, which was so acute a few years back, is now very much moderated. The number of Jews in agriculture is about the same, roughly a quarter of a million souls, but the number of Jewish workers in industry and the number of Jewish artisans in the co-operatives have increased many times over since my last visit. The number of Jewish employes in the State institutions and in the cooperative system has also considerably increased.

"There are still, however, a considerable number of Jews who demand attention on the part of the Soviet government and the social organizations. Those are the Jewish population of those townships which lie far away from the industrial centers. The question has been partly solved by sending a part of the population on the land in Crimea, in the Ukraine and Biro-Bidjan, and retraining the declassed in settling them in artisan co-operatives and industry.

"But much further work is necessary in this direction. The Moscow representatives of the ORT Union are, with the aid of the government, conducting reconstructive work in a number of centers in various directions. The ORT Union has organized in many towns in the Ukraine and in White Russia and in several centers in Russia a number of new artisan co-operatives, and is providing for the existing co-operatives equipment, raw materials, credit aids and technical instructors.

"The work of the ORT extends now to sixty various enterprises, wood working, tricotage, weaving, metal work, toy manufacturing, etc., in which about 7,000 workers are employed, the majority of them Jewish declassed. The work in these enterprises is being carried on under the instruction of highly qualified specialists of

The Danzig Results

The unexpected rebuff which the Nazis received in the Sunday elections in Danzig is one of the pleasant surprises that come so seldom nowadays to world Jewry.

This rebuff astounded not only the press but most of the European political observers. It certainly astonished Berlin.

Failing to obtain the desired two-thirds of the general vote, the Nazis in Danzig succeeded, however, in obtaining sixty per cent of the vote, which is much larger than the number of pro-Nazi votes received during the preceding election. This fact is something which deserves the attention of our leading Jewish organizations interested in protecting the rights of the Jews in Danzig.

Jews Still in Danger

I have on several occasions pointed out in this column that something must be done for the 8,000 Jews of Danzig, to defend them from the Nazi attacks on their rights, before it is too late. Now is the time to do it.

With sixty per cent representation in the Danzig Parliament, the Nazis still form a majority there. It is true that they do not possess the two-thirds necessary to make constitutional changes. They do, however, possess a sufficient majority to pass all kinds of ordinances which may affect Jewish rights.

To hamper the Nazis in their efforts to introduce the "Aryan paragraph" in Danzig is now the duty of our central Jewish organizations. Now more than ever, a careful survey of the anti-Jewish activities of the Nazis in Danzig must be made and submitted to the League of Nations, either through its Danzig High Commissioner or through other possible channels.

There is no doubt that if the League of Nations has thus far refrained from paying attention to the anti-Jewish discriminations in Danzig, it will now be only too interested in obtaining full data on all the Jewish employes ousted from state-controlled institutions in Danzig; on all the Jewish doctors ousted from the municipal hospitals; on the discrimination practiced by the Danzig administration against Jewish artisans and on all the anti-Jewish legislation passed.

Polish Support

A memorandum on the anti-Jewish policy of the Danzig Senate has already been submitted to the League of Nations by Sean Lester, its Danzig High Commissioner. This memorandum should now be followed up by complete data compiled by such Jewish organizations as the American Jewish Committee, the American Jewish Congress, the Joint Foreign Committee, or the Committee of Jewish Delegations.

The Polish government, interested in preventing the Nazis from eventually controlling Danzig, would be only too glad to cooperate with the Jews if such a memorandum were submitted to the League of Nations. The fact that Dr. Casimir Papee, Polish High Commissioner for Danzig, has made representations to the Danzig Senate on behalf of Jews abused during the election campaign and against the violent anti-Jewish boycott propaganda being conducted in the Free City only substantiates the belief that Poland would be ready to support Jewish claims against the Nazi administration in Danzig, if such claims were submitted to the League of Nations.

Dr. Lwowitch stressed the assistance given by the Soviet government to the ORT through government institutions, particularly the Comzet. This was greatly perceptible during the past year, when the difficult situation of the Jewish population of Germany, Poland, Rumania and other countries diverted a large part of the funds of the ORT Union, and at the same time the general crisis in Europe and America made the collection of funds more difficult, he said. The Soviet government did everything possible, to promote the activity of the ORT Union in the Soviet countries.

Dr. Lwowitch together with Mr. Zegalnitzsky has visited M. Peter Smidovitch, vice-president of the Soviet Union and president of the Comzet.

Some Personal Data On Neville Laski

The London Sunday Dispatch, in an article on Neville Laski, president of the Board of Jewish Deputies, gives the following information:

Son of a wealthy Manchester merchant, who has done more for Lancashire than most men, Neville Laski has few rivals at Manchester Grammar School and Clifton College. At Cambridge he won a B. A. degree.

In Manchester it is said that he was earning £10,000 a year at the age of 30. This Mr. Laski has always denied.

Just before the war he married a beautiful girl, daughter of a high Jewish dignitary.

After leaving the army he returned to the bar in the North. His success continued, and men pointed to him as a coming man.

Then in 1930 he took silk. This was the greatest gamble of his life. It meant that he would have to come to London and build up a new career . . . years of hard work before he could reach the heights he had achieved in the North.

Now his risk has been justified and he has risen to an even greater eminence.

Streicher Keeps 2 Sets of Books on Jews

The double bookkeeping kept by Julius Streicher with regard to Jews, is emphasized in an editorial in the Glasgow Herald, which reads:

It is all to the good to find Herr Julius Streicher, the National Socialist leader for Franconia and editor of the anti-Semitic sheet, Der Stuermer, announcing that there must be no pogroms of Jews in his district. It appears that "irresponsible elements" in Nuremberg have spread a rumor that a Jew has attempted to assassinate Herr Hitler and are inciting the public to retaliate by pogrom. Herr Streicher takes a firm stand. "No one but myself issues orders," he says. And his orders are that the peace must be kept.

The "Gauleiter" for Franconia does not seem to have been in very close touch with the editor of Der Stuermer when he issued this edict. Officially Herr Streicher keeps the peace: unofficially—that is, editorially

—he still does everything possible to stir up ill feeling against the Jews and the smaller they are the more does he harry them. The latest issue of his journal to reach this country contains an article reiterating his theory that the Jews commit ritual murders, and giving what he holds to be two specific instances. The evidence he produces would not hang a dog, but since his propaganda is obviously directed at simple people some of his slanders are bound to stick.

Race Ideology Brands Germany 'Nuisance'

Commenting editorially on the Nazi kidnaping of Berthold Jacob, the German Jewish refugee, the New York Herald Tribune says:

The German Jew is a member of the German racial state's subject people. He is state property, just as "the King's Jews" were, in medieval England, the property of the crown. Once the Nazi has established in his own mind his moral right to govern the affairs of the elect under any flag, the assumption of a similar right over the racial state's subjects under other jurisdictions is an easy step. It need scarcely be pointed out that just as the application of this racial ideology to the affairs of German-speaking Austrians, Czechoslovakians and so forth makes Germany a European menace, so the application of it to individuals abroad will make Germany an international nuisance.

Alien Students Threaten To Quit France

The Associated Press, reporting on the movement against foreign students in French universities, says:

Foreign medical students in Paris, including Americans, issued a protest against recent anti-foreign demonstrations on the part of French medical students. The protest contained an intimation that the students would leave Paris unless the movement against them was brought to a close.

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Toronto Opens Appeal Drive For Palestine

Ontario Premier Pledges 'Unlimited Equality' for Jews

TORONTO, April 8.—The United Palestine Appeal drive was opened here in the presence of the Premier of Ontario, Mitchell F. Hepburn. Before 500 guests at a banquet in the King Edward Hotel last night, the Premier assured "unlimited equality" to the Jews of the province.

Also seated on the dais at the banquet which opened the drive for \$30,000 were Dr. A. L. Sachar of the University of Illinois, national director of B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations; David Croll, Minister of Public Welfare; Paul Leduc, Minister of Mines, and A. J. Freeman, president of the Zionist Organization of Canada.

Over \$12,000 was collected at the banquet after an address by Mr. Freeman which he concluded with the announcement of a personal contribution of \$1,000.

Rabbi J. B. Wise to Speak At Raleigh Parley Today

Rabbi Jonah B. Wise will be the principal speaker at the North Carolina State Conference of the United Jewish Appeal today at the Sir Walter Raleigh Hotel in Raleigh, it was announced at Appeal headquarters here yesterday. The conference has been called to organize North Carolina for participation in the national campaign of the United Jewish Appeal for the relief and rehabilitation of the Jews of Germany and other lands and the settlement of Jews in Palestine.

State chairmanship of North Carolina's campaign has been accepted by Julius W. Cone of Greensboro, with Rabbi Frederick I. Rypins, also of Greensboro, as secretary.

Raleigh is the first community in the State to be organized and is led by Albert Zand, chairman.

Bentwich Arrives to Aid Appeal Campaign Here

Norman Bentwich, professor of international relations at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, former attorney-general of Palestine, and now associated with James G. McDonald on the League of Nations Commission for Refugees from Germany, arrived here yesterday on the Statendam.

He came with Mrs. Bentwich for a tour of the United States in the interests of the United Jewish Appeal.

"We plan to take the story of Palestine throughout America, not only to the Jew but to the Christian as well," he said on his arrival.

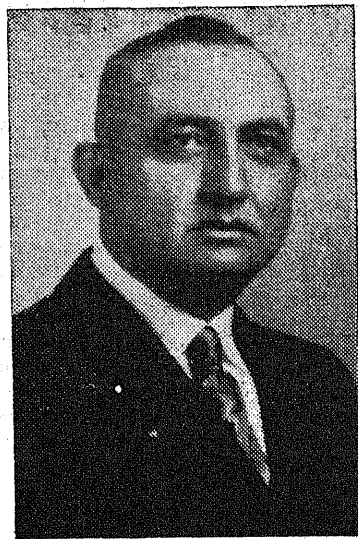
Shortly after debarking, Prof. Bentwich attended a luncheon given by the United Jewish Appeal at the Henry Street Settlement.

Fromberg Is Named To Justice Dep't

Charleston City Judge Is in Washington as Special Cummings Aide

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Judge Joseph Fromberg of Charleston, S. C., has been appointed special assistant to United States Attorney General Homer S. Cummings, and has assumed his duties in the Department of Justice here.

Mr. Fromberg resigned as judge of the City Court of Charleston, to which position he was recently re-elected, in order to accept his new appointment.

Revisionists Assail Palestine Nazi Trade Deal

Called 'Slur on Israel'; William B. Ziff Named President

The second national conference of the Zionist Revisionist Organization of America closed last evening with the election of new officers following a day largely taken up with debate on a dozen resolutions. The session was held at the Blue and White Center, 122 Second avenue.

Of prime interest among the resolutions was one, adopted unanimously, pledging the Revisionist movement on this side of the Atlantic "to stand unflinchingly by its world leadership" in the present differences with the World Zionist Organization and its Actions Committee.

Another resolution lashed "certain Jews" for failure to adhere to the anti-German boycott and condemned ratification by the Actions Committee of a transfer agreement with the Reich as "a betrayal of the interests of Jewry and a slur upon the name of Israel."

Other declarations which were approved by the delegates called upon: American Jewry to support the National Jewish Organization of Palestine; demanded that provisions of Great Britain's mandate must be applied to Transjordan as part and parcel of Palestine; urged the world leadership of Revisionism to launch the second stage of the petition movement aimed at bringing about reforms in the Palestine regime; proclaimed a campaign to raise \$25,000 for the Tel Hal Fund; expressed thanks for the visit of Vladimir Jabotinsky; protested revocation of the Palestine government of the citizenship of Aba Achmeier.

Dr. Yevin and L. Lichter recommended establishment of regional districts to further Revisionist growth.

Welcomes Unity

The resolution concerning relations with the Zionist Organization asserted the Revisionists are ready to subordinate freedom of political action to a united front pledged to work in a true spirit of state Zionism, but added:

"We reject any other limitation of Revisionism's independence."

The boycott statement, describing Hitlerite legislation and discrimination against German Jewry as tantamount to an attack on world Jewry, placed the conference on record as deploring "lack of spirit" in those Jews who do not firmly support the boycott.

Outstanding portions in a declaration of general principles which was unanimously adopted voiced these demands:

All Jewish labor for all Jewish enterprises in Palestine; establishment of such agrarian, tariff and fiscal reforms "as are indispensable for repatriation"; legalization of Jewish self-defense; Jewish contingents in the British garrison; settlement of social conflicts by arbitration; unfettered repatriation on both sides of the Jordan for all Jews who desire it; abolition of discrimination between classes or Zionist parties as to rights of immigration; opportunity of employment or assistance by national funds; fair distribution of immigration certificates.

A farewell banquet was given Sunday night in honor of Jabotinsky, who is scheduled to sail for France tomorrow, and William B. Ziff, due to leave on a trip to the Holy Land next week. Sees Too Much Stress Placed On Philanthropy, Fund Drives

Glucksman Urges Center Development at Parley of Welfare Board

The inadequacy of Jewish community organizations to deal with Jewish problems because of over-emphasis on such negative aspects of Jewish life as philanthropy and fund-raising was decried by Harry L. Glucksman, executive director of the Jewish Welfare Board at an education conference of the board and the National Association of Jewish Center Executives at the Ninety-second street Y. M. H. A. yesterday.

Pleading for development of the center to provide Jewish youth with a sense of balance and a goal, Dr. Glucksman pointed out that a great deal of the fear and hysteria which sprang up in this country with the rise of Hitlerism in Germany was due to a lack of knowledge of basic causes and the failure of many Jews to understand their position as Jews.

Information Is Needed

"The adult," he said, "needs information regarding Jewish problems. He needs also greater opportunity for association with fellow Jews. The reawakening of Jewish interests must be given opportunity for expression in meaningful activity."

Praise of the center movement for its aid in "effecting a harmonious blending in their (Jewish youths') lives of the American and the Jewish elements" was contained in an address by Dr. Mordecai Soltes, director of education for the Jewish Welfare Board.

Dwelling on the problem of anti-Semitism, Dr. Soltes declared that it is a "method used by demagogues who are interested in using the Jews as convenient scapegoats." He quoted Dr. Everett Clinchy as saying, "As wages rise, the market value of hatred depreciates."

Why Youth Is Stirred

"What agitates Jewish youth most," he said, "is to be told repeatedly not to overcrowd this or that profession without being directed to other sources for vocational outlets."

Dr. F. Ernest Johnson of Teachers College, Columbia University, observed in an address that "the real motive power in salutary social change, even in revolution, is found in tested ideals such as Judaism and Christianity have always proclaimed."

Other speakers were Dr. Delos S. Otis, TERA educational advisor; Lillian Strauss, Council House headworker; Judith Horowitz of Bronx House; Dr. Frank Astor, Bureau of Child Guidance; E. J. London, field secretary of the Metropolitan League of Jewish Community Associations; Herman Jacobs of the Bronx "Y"; Harry Friedgut of Newark, and Harry Liebau of Elizabeth, N. J.

New Paper Stirs Race Hatred in Polish Capital

Endek Weekly Demands Immediate Ouster of Jews

WARSAW, April 8.—A new Polish weekly, devoted almost exclusively to anti-Jewish propaganda, made its appearance here today as a supplement to the Gazeta Warszawska, the organ of the anti-Semitic National Democratic party (Endeks).

The publication, called Tygodnik Polityczny, in its featured articles blames the Jews for all the troubles Poland is now facing. It warns the government that it must get rid of the Jews without delay in order to solve the economic crisis and "because we have to prepare ourselves for the next big fight of historic reckoning with Germany."

It is expected that the authorities will take measures against the dangerous anti-Jewish propaganda initiated by this new organ.

Negotiations Long

The intergroup negotiations carried on by the Mizrahi and the General Zionists, with the Revisionists and the Laborites, lasted for many hours. Both the General Zionists and the Mizrahi consider the present break in the Zionist Organization as very serious.

The change in the text of the Shekel, obligating every voter to the next Congress to maintain party discipline, was adopted by the Actions Committee by a vote of thirty-six against thirteen. The Revisionists, the Mizrahi and some of the General Zionists from Eastern Galicia voted in the negative. Other General Zionists from Galicia abstained from voting. Mr. Ben-Gurion and Mr. Ussishkin advocated acceptance of the change.

Try to Check Split

At three o'clock in the morning, prior to the declaration of the Revisionists, the Mizrahi delegates made a last effort to prevent a split in the Zionist Organization by urging that the question of the change in the Shekel be left to the decision of the next Congress. This proposal was rejected by forty-four votes against nine.

All political resolutions recommended by the political committee were accepted at the closing session of the Actions Committee by all parties, the Revisionists being the only ones voting against them. The resolutions regarding labor and immigration questions were adopted unanimously.

The organization committee approved the granting of the status of Sonderverband (separate union) to the Hashomer Hazair, the left wing of the Histadruth. The same committee rejected the granting of the same privilege to the Judenstaats party, led by Meer Grossman.

The session of the Actions Committee closed in the early morning hours to the tune of Hatikvah, the Zionist hymn.
