The setting up of the com-missions is in accordance with the decisions of the extraordinary session held in Philadelphia last month

The commissions are: rights of lews in foreign lands, laws, eco-nomic research, finance and edu-

The heads of the commissions are experts in the fields of work in

which they will engage.

Prof. Jerome Michael heads the commission on the rights of Jews in foreign lands. He is a member of the faculty of the Law School of Columbia University and formerly a director of the war trans-action section of the United States Department of Justice.

The commission on law is headed by George Z. Medalie, former United States Attorney, an authority on the law, who has served at various times as assistant district attorney and special assistant to the attorney general.

Prof. Salo Baron has accepted Prof. Salo Baron has accepted the chairmanship of the commis-sion on economic research. Prof. Baron is a member of the Faculty of Columbia University, occupying the chair of Jewish history, literature and institutions.

The commission on education is headed by Prof. Horace M. Kallen, professor of philosophy and psychology at the New School for Social Research.

No eulogies were delivered at the funeral and no flowers were laid on his grave in accordance with the rabbi's last will. Instead. gifts were made to Jewish schools of Milan

Representatives of the munici-pality and of numerous Jewish communities in Italy were among the large crowd attending the funeral.

Mrs. Schonberg, who has served as executive secretary of the council for three years and was re-named for another three-year term at the triennial convention of the council last month, died Monday evening at the Park West Hospital. A native New Yorker, she was forty-five years old.

Funeral services will be conducted by Leo W. Schwartz, a former rabbi who was a personal friend of Mrs. Schonberg.

## Seders Tonight Open Passover, 8-Day Holiday Marking Exodus

(Continued from Page One) described in Exodus, the Second Book of Moses In popular mind, Passover, is

observed primarily by the eating of unleavened bread, matzoh. of unleavened bread, matzon. Called the "bread of affliction," the matzoh recalls the haste with which the exodus of the Jews from Egypt was carried through, the dough of the travelers not having the time to leaven.

Jewish homes observe Seder this evening while some, the more orthodox, also have a Seder the second evening. In the course of the feast, the story of the exodus is told. The service is con-ducted by the father of the house who is asked four "kashes" or questions by his youngest son as to why this evening differs from all others. The eating of the bitter herbs, the cup of wine that is set aside for the coming of Elijah, the hiding of the matzoh (Afikomen), and the lamb bone that is symbolic of the Lord "passing over" the

homes of Israelites and sparing their first-born are all familiar to anyone who has ever attended a

Though various groups of Jews celebrate Passover in different ways, the service is universally observed throughout the world and in a manner essentially the same.
