Act to Curb **Student Riots** In Rumania

Courts-Martial Awaiting Those Blamed for Recent Outbreaks

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BUCHAREST, April 19.— The
Minister of Interior today issued
a statement to the press declaring that the government has taken necessary steps to prevent a repe-tition of the recent anti-Semitic student outbreaks.

"The majority of the student organizations denounce the activi-ties of the few misled anti-Jewish students," the Minister asserted.

statement declares tha those guilty of the anti-Jewish outbreaks last week will be court martialed. Disciplinary measures will also be taken against them by the university authorities.

25 Out on Ball Twenty-five of the students ar-rested in the recent anti-Jewish

disorders were released today on bail pending further investigation. The Jewish population in Ru-nia feels relieved by the strong attitude taken by the government against the anti-Semitic students. The Bucharest University, where The Bucharest University, where the anti-Jewish riots started, is still closed. It will, however, re-open after the Baster holidays. The Jewish students there have been assured that they will no longer be molested in the classrooms and in the laboratories by anti-Jewish elements.

Capital Flight Laws Revised **By Nazi Edict**

Permit Funds Transfer to Reich Bank in Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, April 19.—A new order was issued today by the German government permitting Ger-man Jews now residing in Palestine to transfer part of their ac-counts from German banks to Temple Society, a German bank in Palestine, provided they can prove that they left Germany with small sums and have no means of economic existence in

The order, to be known as "Order No. 207," provides that be-fore the transfer of an account from the bank in Germany is permitted, the applicant must a certificate from the German emigration authorities that he left Germany without any funds other than permitted under the existing exchange regulations. He must also submit a certificate from the German Consulate in Palestine stating that he has no income in Palestne.

The government will not permit transfer of any amount exceeding 60,000 marks, unless the transfer is first approved by the Reich Currency Office.

The new order also states that the German government has no objection if the applicant transfers a part of his denosit from German banks to 1 as gifts to near relatives. In such

cases, the depositor will have to submit proof that the gift is not used as a pretext to evade the paying of the tax on capital tak-en out of Germany, which is known as the Capital Flight Tax.

Soviet Eases Crop Laws Crimea

Permits Jewish Settlers to Keep Products for Own Use

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
MOSCOW, April 19.—Jewish
colonists in Crimea will henceforth be exempt from delivering their wheat and milk to the gov-ernment, according to a govern-

ment order issued today.

The order aims to consolidate the position of Jewish collective farms in Crimea and to attract new Jewish colonists there. It makes a distinction between old and new settlers by providing that while the old settlers are not obliged in the future to deliver their milk to government cooper atives, the new settlers are at the same time exempt from delivering their wheat crops.

May Sell to Anyone

The new order will not only enable the Jewish settlers in Crimea to consume more milk and wheat themselves, but also to sell these products to whomever they wish.

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, April 19.—Miss Ja-nina Gallot, a student at the Warsaw University, was sentenced today to two months' imprisonment for distributing leaflets last Summer asserting that a Jew assassinated the Polish Minister of Interior Pieracki.

Representatives of the German Nazi press arrived today at Kat-towice to report the trial of Edward Chavansky, editor of a Polish Nazi newspaper, who has appealed a sentence of nine months' imprisonment for slanderous anti-Jewish attacks in connection with the Talmud.

Chavansky's appeal was sch duled to be heard by the Court of Appeals today. The hearing, however, was postponed to April 25. Meanwhile the Nazi paper has been suppressed by the Polish authorities.

Agudah to Conduct Own Negotiations With Authorities

JERUSALEM, April 19.—A
new Jewish Agency which will new Jewish Agency which will function in competition with the present Jewish Agency was offi-cially proclaimed here today by the World Orthodox Agudath Organization.

The proclamation states that the Agudah has decided to establish its own agency to work along the same lines as the Jewish Agency in which Zionists and non-Zionists are represented and which is recognized by the League of Nations under the Palestine Mandate.

Agudah makes it clear that it Agudah makes it clear that it will conduct independent political negotiations with the Palestine government, the British govern-ment and the League of Nations. It will also conduct independent immigration colonization and work, the proclamation announces, indicating that the new Agency will demand from the Pales by win demand from the Pales-tine government certificates to bring Jews into Palestine inde-pendently of the Zionist Organi-zation.

The decision of the Agudah to establish its own agency came as a surprise to the Jewish popu-lation Palestine. The opposi-__e Agudah to the Zionist executive was well known, but it was not believed that it had reached a point where the Agu-dah would establish a competitive agency. It is believed that this step was taken by the Agudah leaders after announcing their intention to the High Commissioner of Palestine.

The German market has been practically closed to American goods in spite of the fact that the Hitler govern-ment is in desperate need of products pro-duced in the United States. What little trading there is, is being done either on a bar-

The United States Department of Commerce reports that American business interests which have been making sales against un-transferable German paper marks, no longer care to continue this type of transaction. They are in the main not willing to build up mark balances in Germany. Since there is practically no possibility at present of an American firm selling goods to Germany to be selling goods to Germany to be paid in dollars, trade with that country may be expected to reach a vanishing point if present Ger-man governmental policies con-

Indeed, much that passes today for hard-boiled ma-terialism, in the final analysis fol-lows the self-same pattern. 40 Plants Produce Milk for Passover

Smidowitch was helpful to the Jews in Soviet Russia also along the lines of preserving the Jewish religion. As the head of the anti-religious department of the Soviet government, he saved many syn gogues from being converted into clubs and advocated free-dom of religion for Jewish colonies. He was also helpful to the Hechalutz in Soviet Russia and helped young Chalutzim go to Palestine at a time when no Soviet citizen was permitted to

leave the country.

The Jews of Russia considered Smidowitch their protector from the Jewish Communists. Smido-witch was always ready to ham-per the Jewish Communists in their activities against the average Jew in the country. He made no secret of his opposition to the Yevsekzia, the Jewish section of the Communist party, and it was due partly to him that the Yevsekzia was finally liquidated. Litvinoff Outspoken

In Hitler Attack

Mourning the death of Smidowitch, the Jews in Russia had occasion to feel pride this week in Maxim Littinoff, the Soviet Commissar for Foreign Affairs, who despite his important role in world affairs, is proud of his

Jewishness.
It was the lashing address against Hitler delivered by Litvinoff this week at the session of the Council of the League of Nations, that made Soviet Jewry proud of him. Litvinoff was the only diplomat in Geneva who outspokenly demanded that the League openly condemn Nazi Germany and check Hitler's am-bitions. The decision which the League of Nations adopted following Litvinoff's speech was greeted in Berlin with surprised anger, and it may have a far-reaching effect on world politics. Passover Desolate

For Reich Jews
The Jews in Germany celebrated Passover this week in a more desolate spirit than ever before. The propaganda to boycott Jews in commerce was renewed this week in connection with the approaching Easter holidays, and more than 6,000 young Jews who were gradu-ated from the German school system this week faced a situa-tion where they will have no possibility of continuing their education.

The first Jewish school, for

Jewish children only, was opened this week in Germany as the result of the difficulties which result of the difficulties which Jewish children are facing in the general schools. It seems that the Nazi government will encourage the opening of separate Jewish schools, in order to make the Jews feel that they are not equal citizens of the country. These schools will of course have to be supported by the Jewish communities and will receive no subsidies from the government

Nazis Exert Pressure On Jews in Trade

On Jews in Trade

Left temporarily unmolested in
the field of commerce, the Jews

commercial enterprises. Jewish
firms are actually forced to
liquidate. Others are compelled
to sell out to "Aryans." The restrictions against Jews in commerce are growing and affect
merce are growing and affect merce are growing and affect not only the Jewish merchants but also Jewish employes. The army of German Jews who are compelled to find salvation by emigration is therefore growing larger and larger.

Under such circumstances it is no wonder that the news about the possible admission of German Jews into South American countries was this week received by many Jews in Ger-many with great joy. This news came from James G. McDonald, came from James G. McDonald, the High Commissioner for Ref-ugees, who is now in South America hegotiating with gov-ernments there for the admis-sion of Jews from Germany. After Palestine, South America is the only hope for German Jewish immigration.

Palestine Festive

As Passover Opens
In Palestine the Passover started very gaily. Jerusalem was flooded with tourists from abroad and guests from all over the country who came to this ancient city to celebrate the Passover holiday.

The announcement made by the Palestine government about the forthcoming labor schedule for Jewish immigration did not provoke any satisfaction in Jew-ish circles. This announcement ment grants the Jewish Agency 7,600 immigration certificates for the next six months, which only 100 certificates more than only 100 certificates more than were granted for the six months just expired. At a time when the shortage of Jewish labor continues to grow in the coun-try, such an insignificant in-crease in the labor schedule is highly disappointing. It seems that the Palestine

It seems that the Palestine government, anxious to weaken the Jewish Agency, has agreed to acknowledge the existence of another Jewish Agency, established by the Orthodox Agudath Israel organization, which aims to perform the same function as the Jewish Agency in which Zionists and non-Zionists are equally represented.

New Agency Surprise to Jewry An announcement of the es-

An amountement of the second Jew-ish Agency was made by the Agudah on the eve of Passover, and came as a surprise to the Yishub. In this announcement, the Agudah explains that it will conduct its own politics with regard to submitting claims to the Palestine government and the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations; that it will

League of Nations; that it will maintain its own colonization department; that it will conduct its own immigration policy.

This announcement simply means that the Agudath Israel has entered into an open fight with the Zionist Organization and will attempt to obtain from the Palestine government immi-gration certificates independently of the Jewish Agency. It means that the Zionist Executive will be faced with competition, the result of which no one can foretell, since the Colonial Office in London is far from opposed to the Agudah.
