Vladeck, business manager of the publication, and reports by J. Weinberg, president, and J. Baskin, general sec-retary of the Workmen's Circle on the year's activities of the or-ganization. Thereafter, daily meetings of the convention will be held at the St. Nicholas Arena, 53 West Sixty-sixth street.

Circle was

founded thirty-five years ago, by zounced thirty-nve years ago, by a group of Jewish industrial work-ers who desired to provide educa-tional and welfare activities for themselves and their associates, through funds contributed out of ther own earnings. Through three and a half decades, the organiza-tion, established to create a means of help for workingmen, as a sub-stitute for dependence on public or private philanthropy, in times of need and emergency, has grown to hundreds of thousands of memrs in branches throughout this country and Canada. Its original educational and social welfare pro-gram has been expanded to include a tuberculosis sanitarium at Lib-erty, N. Y., where 3,000 persons have been treated for tuberculosis; éducational activities, children's camps, schools, forums, sick and death benefits, and unemployment

During 1934, it expended ap-proximately \$1,000,000 for its varied activities, including \$320,000 for sick benefits, \$200,000 for deaths, deaths, \$150,000 for the sanitar-ium: \$100,000 for aid to unemployed members, It also appropri-ated \$150,000 for the upkeep of children's and adults' summer camps near New York City, and \$70,000 for educational work
