BERLIN, May 19 - Anti-Jewish disturbances were reported here from Glogau, Silesia, where a new railway terminal was opened yesterday.

Crowds attending the formal opening of the station noticed an advertisement of a Jewish firm among other advertisements displayed at the terminal. This was sufficient to cause the outbreak of a spontaneous anti-Jewish demonstration necessitating intervention of the police.

Order was established when the advertisement of the Jewish firm was replaced by a poster of a Ger-man concern.

### Syria Enters **Trade Compact** With Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM, May 19—Sir Ar-thur Wauchope, the High Commissioner of Palestine, returned today from a two weeks' visit to Syria where he discussed questions concerning a change in the Palestine-Syrian boundary.

An official communique giving the results of the High Commissioner's visit, is anticipated. Dur-ing his stay, the High Commissioner negotiated a commercial pact between Palestine and Syria which may have a far-reaching effect on Palestine industry.

LONDON, May 19—The next
World Zionist Congress will take
place in Lucerne, Switzerland, and will open on August 27, it was announced here by the Executive of the World Zionist Congress.

The Congress will be the nine teenth held by the Zionist Organiza tion. A manifesto issued by the Executive says that "the masses must participate in the nineteenth Zionist Congress to an extent surpassing all previous records be-cause Zionism today is the cause of the whole Jewish people."

## The Daily News Letter

A Crisis in German Jewry

By MORRIS WOOD

It was not so long ago that we all pointed with pride to the unity achieved by German Jewry in the face of great adversity. And it was true that German Jews, despite divergencies of opinion, had achieved the measure of solidarity dictated by the Greenstances. The great value of this new orientation of Jewish communal life was quickly at its recently concluded conference adopted a remarkable resolution of difficult problems which a Nazi re-

gime presented for the Jews Germany. It resulted in many soundly constructive developments and many acomplishments not otherwise possible.

But now a cleavage is appearing in German-Jewish unity and a crisis is approaching rapidly. It is due to a fundamental philosophical difference which, true enough, has en present all along but now is being forced to the fore.

Two Opposite Views The issue between those German Jews who wish to direct German-Jewish life on the fundamental the sis that the majority of the Jews in Germany and their children will have to work out their destiny in the Reich and the Zionists who see the only solution in the German-Jewish question in Palestine and insist that all German-Jewish life be directed to that end.

The former who are in the ma-jority in the administrations of the national Jewish organizations and in the community organizations, have been handicapped in the preaching of their doctrines by the very real government objection to any propaganda seeking to induce the Jews to remain in Germany and rebuild their lives to conform with altered circumstances. Such German-Jewish leaders, for in-stance, as Dr. Martin Buber, Dr. Bruno Woyda and others have been forbidden to address public meetings to urge this point of view.

#### Would Spread Migration

On the other hand, the authori-ties listen with interest to any plans or measures designed to facilitate, the emigration of Jews from the Reich. They welcome every activity tending to lead the Jews out of Germany and have cooperated in such measures as the transfer agreement permitting emigrants to Palestine to take capital in the form of German goods.

Now the issue has been precipi tated by the Zionist forces who have demanded that control of the Berlin Jewish community be handed over to them and that the personnel of its various departments be changed.

which cannot but bring matters to a head. This resolution proclaims the right of the Zionist movement to influence decisively the whole of Jewish life in Germany. The leadership belongs to Zionism in all branches of life in which Zionist initiative has shown the German Jews new roads for constructive upbuilding and systematic aid; in the question of the Jewish schools, of vocational and economic policy, the promotion of Palestine upbuilding and emigration. "Zionism cannot in the present situation of the Jews in Germany restrict itself to certain spheres of work, but must demand that the Zionist recognition should serve as the foundation of a new shaping of the whole of Jewish

Demand Full Control On this fundamental the resolu-tion proceeds: "The Conference of the German Zionist Federation decides: The German Zionists demand a personal and organization1 transformation of the central and local bodies of German Jewry which will guarantee them the influence due them in the shaping of Jewish work in Germany. The executive com-mittee is instructed to take the neessary action to realize these demands and to see that they are carried into effect."

This resolution, virtually an ulti-matum, if it is to be followed upas indeed the Zionists have every intention of doing-can only bring widely-heralded German Jewish unity tumbling down into ruins. For the non-Zionist elements cannot accede; they canot surrender without abandoning beliefs as deeply rooted in themselves as Zionist ideology in the Zionists.

### Flight Held Cowardly

Many of them believe that the issue at stake in Germany is not that of just the 500,000 Jews remaining there today-but that in Germany issues are being decided and must be decided that must profoundly affect the Jews of the entire world and must materially Jewish destiny for generations to come. To these people flight to a Palestine refuge, the abandonment of the field of battle without a struggle, is a cowardly course. Rightly or wrongly, they believe their fate and the fate of Jewry in general is to be decided in Germany. They cannot and will not adopt a course which to their thinking is nothing but surrender.

Many others are opposed to Zi-mist domination of German-Jewish life because they feel that Palestine cannot be the refuge for all of them -that at best it can only shelter a part of German Jewry. They favor a program that will expedite the emigration to Palestine of those who are temperamentally suited to Palestine life and can be accom-modated there but will also consider the requirements of the great majority who will have to remain in Germany and build new lives here. The Zionist program, to their way of thinking, is unsatisfactory because it does not recognize this second factor and does not provide for it.

The Rutgers Inquiry The hearings which start

morrow at Rutgers University into charges that members of the German department of the school's Women's College are spreading anti-Semitic and pro-Nazi literature among the students, will be watched by all those interested in checking Nazi propaganda in

It is a fact that the Nazis are making an effort to reach the American youth through the dissemination of anti-Jewish propa ganda in the universities. This fact was emphasized openly by Dr. Sachar, director of the Hillel Foundation, at the recent convention of the B'nai B'rith in Washington. Its truth is substantiated by Prof. Leinard Bergel's charge that he has been dismissed for his attempt to fight the pro-Nazi spi in the Women's College of Rutgers.

#### Suspicion and Citizenship

Many will be puzzled by the fact that the faculty of the German department is composed entirely of German citizens. Any one residing in America and still retaining his German citizenship at a time when Germany is condemned by liberal people the world over, may naturally be suspected of being sympathetic to-wards the Nazi regime. The teachers in the German de

partment of the Women's College at Rutgers are now under this suspicion, both by public opinion and by the students of the University. More than 400 students of the College have openly declared themselves in sympathy with Prof. Bergel and did not hesitate to come out in the press with the accusation that the Nazi spirit is stimulated among the students by the members of the German faculty of the college. Violation of State Law

The outcome of the inquiry fore of importance not only to Rutgers University but to all universities in the country where the Nazis are trying to spread their poisonous anti-Jewish propaganda. It is quite clear that now that such an inquiry has been instituted for the first time in America, the Nazi agents in other uniwill have to restrict their activities for a time in or-der not to be discovered.

The outcome of the inquiry is also of importance to the State of New Jersey. Only a few weeks ago the State passed a law prohibiting subversive propaganda. Should the inquiry prove that such propaganda was con-ducted by the teachers of the German department in the col-lege, it will be tantamount to proving that the law of the State had been violated, and may lead to the proper consequences.

### Eyes on New Brunswick

Only a short time ago the State of New Jersey was considering granting a large subsidy to the Women's College. Now such a subsidy is out of the question until the issue is settled. The eyes of legislators, educators and all interested in seeing the laws of the United States ob-served, will therefore be turned to New Brunswick where the inquiry will begin tomorrow.

What Germany's New Citizenship Law Means The London Jewish Chronicle, speaking of the law in Germany de-

ship, says:

At a moment when the Chief Rabbi of British Jewry is invited as an honored guest of the King to the Jubilee State Banquet, the Nazis are busy forging decrees to rob the German Jews of their na-tionality. There is no mistaking the sinister significance of the Minister of the Interior's announcement on that point. Under the new Reich Citizenship Law now in preparation, says Herr Frick, Germans will have to qualify for citizenship instead of acquiring it by accident of birth. It will be an honor which those of German stock must earn. For these it will open the way to public office and "only those who bear it" will have the honor of serving under arms "for people and Reich." The grant of citizenship will be made subject to definite conditions one of which. in conformity with Nazi principles, will be racial membership of the German people. This, then, guestion whether Jews would b allowed to enter the new Conscript Army, They will not.

#### Germany Loses Its Best Journalists

The World's Press News of London writes.

The recent decree of Dr. Goebbels, the German Minister of Propaganda, expelling nearly 1,000 Jews from German newspaper offices, completely eliminates Jews from German journalism. It also eliminates much of the variety and intelligence left in the German Press after the Nazi revolution, for Jews and Socialists were admittedly among the best newspaper men. More important, however, is the

significance of this move. For it shows the German Fascist iden-tification with the Russian Communist plan of ejection of political opponents from journalism. is the first deviation from the Nazi Press plan of organization of the German Press on Italian lines.

Recognizing the talent of his opponents and anxious to secure it for Fascism, Mussolini converted the majority of journalists by promises, bribes and other in-ducements. This explains the high standard of the Italian Press comparison with the German, which has suffered so much from intolerance as to cause a rumor of the revocation of this anti-Jewish and anti-Socialist edict

#### Spain Is Praised For Rambam Tribute

The New York Herald Tribune, an editorial, praises the Spanish priving the Jews of their citizengovernment for setting up a monu-ment in memory of Moses Maimonides. The paper says:

No Jewish son of Old Spainand there were many brilliant ones-could have been better chosen for an honor that is meant sen for an nonor that is meant to proclaim Spain's reconcilia-tion with the Jewish world, for no Jew of the Middle Ages was so whole-heartedly devoted to the reconciliation of Occidental rationalism with Semitic dogmatism. After fifteen years of wand-ering he became in Cairo the household physician to the great Saladin; and, being saturated with both Aristotelian philosophy and rabbinical lore, he devoted his ample leisure for the rest of his life to focusing the searching light of logic on the Scriptures and on the traditional law of his The results were of intense interest to European philosophers for five hundred years after his death and are still pro-vocative reading to both Jewish and Christian theologians.

#### Day Stoppage as Wage Protest Will Affect 60,000 Children

The central committee of He-brew Teachers' Organizations has declared a one-day stoppage in all the Hebrew schools of Greater New York. The stoppage will take place on Thursday, May 23, and will in volve 1.500 Jewish teachers and more than 60,000 Jewish children. it was announced yesterday by the

The committee issued the following statement: "During the past few years of the depression the situation of the

Jewish teacher grew continually worse. Teachers with fifteen to twenty years of experience have been forced to teach at a salary of \$25 or \$20 per week. Many of these schools have enforced a salary of \$15 per week, and still others have hired non-licensed teachers to do the service of regular teachers. Because of a continual increase in the cost of living, their condition is becoming worse. Despite a recog nition throughout industry that salaries ought to be increased, salaries of the teachers have been de creased. Besides direct cuts, various indirect methods have been inous indirect methods have been in-stituted such as forced vacations without pay, withholding salaries for several months.

"The continuation of this miser "The continuation of this mice; able condition must cease. Teachers cannot perform their educational duties under such conditions. Although individuals active in Jewish communal affairs and re sponsible directors were fully aware of the situation, hardly anything was done to improve it.

"The Central Committee was, therefore, compelled to resort to this move of calling a stoppage, in order to arouse the Jewish citizens of New York to this horrible condition, and to take definite steps to improve the situation.'

In his report, Mr. Cohen pointed out that "the great reservoirs, the well-springs of Jewish life are dry-ing up, here by persecution and pogroms and there by official anti-religious policy.

"All too many so-called Jews are satisfied to sit back in smug selfcomplacency, relying for security upon the democratic principles propounded by the constitution of their country. Permit me to point out that a similar attitude on the part of our German brethren as a whole probably contributed materially to their downfall."

## The Daily News Letter

A Crisis in German Jewry

By MORRIS WOOD

It was not so long ago that we all pointed with pride to the unity achieved by German Jewry in the face of great adversity. And it was true that German Jews, despite divergencies of opinion, had achieved the measure of solidarity dictated by the Greenstances. The great value of this new orientation of Jewish communal life was quickly at its recently concluded conference adopted a remarkable resolution of difficult problems which a Nazi re-

gime presented for the Jews Germany. It resulted in many soundly constructive developments and many acomplishments not otherwise possible.

But now a cleavage is appearing in German-Jewish unity and a crisis is approaching rapidly. It is due to a fundamental philosophical difference which, true enough, has en present all along but now is being forced to the fore.

Two Opposite Views The issue between those German Jews who wish to direct German-Jewish life on the fundamental the sis that the majority of the Jews in Germany and their children will have to work out their destiny in the Reich and the Zionists who see the only solution in the German-Jewish question in Palestine and insist that all German-Jewish life be directed to that end.

The former who are in the ma-jority in the administrations of the national Jewish organizations and in the community organizations, have been handicapped in the preaching of their doctrines by the very real government objection to any propaganda seeking to induce the Jews to remain in Germany and rebuild their lives to conform with altered circumstances. Such German-Jewish leaders, for in-stance, as Dr. Martin Buber, Dr. Bruno Woyda and others have been forbidden to address public meetings to urge this point of view.

#### Would Spread Migration

On the other hand, the authori-ties listen with interest to any plans or measures designed to facilitate, the emigration of Jews from the Reich. They welcome every activity tending to lead the Jews out of Germany and have cooperated in such measures as the transfer agreement permitting emigrants to Palestine to take capital in the form of German goods.

Now the issue has been precipi tated by the Zionist forces who have demanded that control of the Berlin Jewish community be handed over to them and that the personnel of its various departments be changed.

which cannot but bring matters to a head. This resolution proclaims the right of the Zionist movement to influence decisively the whole of Jewish life in Germany. The leadership belongs to Zionism in all branches of life in which Zionist initiative has shown the German Jews new roads for constructive upbuilding and systematic aid; in the question of the Jewish schools, of vocational and economic policy, the promotion of Palestine upbuilding and emigration. "Zionism cannot in the present situation of the Jews in Germany restrict itself to certain spheres of work, but must demand that the Zionist recognition should serve as the foundation of a new shaping of the whole of Jewish

Demand Full Control On this fundamental the resolu-tion proceeds: "The Conference of the German Zionist Federation decides: The German Zionists demand a personal and organization1 transformation of the central and local bodies of German Jewry which will guarantee them the influence due them in the shaping of Jewish work in Germany. The executive com-mittee is instructed to take the neessary action to realize these demands and to see that they are carried into effect."

This resolution, virtually an ulti-matum, if it is to be followed upas indeed the Zionists have every intention of doing-can only bring widely-heralded German Jewish unity tumbling down into ruins. For the non-Zionist elements cannot accede; they canot surrender without abandoning beliefs as deeply rooted in themselves as Zionist ideology in the Zionists.

### Flight Held Cowardly

Many of them believe that the issue at stake in Germany is not that of just the 500,000 Jews remaining there today-but that in Germany issues are being decided and must be decided that must profoundly affect the Jews of the entire world and must materially Jewish destiny for generations to come. To these people flight to a Palestine refuge, the abandonment of the field of battle without a struggle, is a cowardly course. Rightly or wrongly, they believe their fate and the fate of Jewry in general is to be decided in Germany. They cannot and will not adopt a course which to their thinking is nothing but surrender.

Many others are opposed to Zi-onist domination of German-Jewish life because they feel that Palestine cannot be the refuge for all of them -that at best it can only shelter a part of German Jewry. They favor a program that will expedite the emigration to Palestine of those who are temperamentally suited to Palestine life and can be accom-modated there but will also consider the requirements of the great majority who will have to remain in Germany and build new lives here. The Zionist program, to their way of thinking, is unsatisfactory because it does not recognize this second factor and does not provide for it.

morrow at Rutgers University into charges that members of the German department of the school's Women's College are spreading anti-Semitic and pro-Nazi literature among the students, will be watched by all those interested in checking Nazi propaganda in

It is a fact that the Nazis are making an effort to reach the American youth through the dissemination of anti-Jewish propa ganda in the universities. This fact was emphasized openly by Dr. Sachar, director of the Hillel Foundation, at the recent convention of the B'nai B'rith in Washington. Its truth is substantiated by Prof. Leinard Bergel's charge that he has been dismissed for his attempt to fight the pro-Nazi spi in the Women's College of Rutgers.

#### Suspicion and Citizenship

Many will be puzzled by the fact that the faculty of the German department is composed entirely of German citizens. Any one residing in America and still retaining his German citizenship at a time when Germany is condemned by liberal people the world over, may naturally be suspected of being sympathetic to-wards the Nazi regime. The teachers in the German de

partment of the Women's College at Rutgers are now under this suspicion, both by public opinion and by the students of the University. More than 400 students of the College have openly declared themselves in sympathy with Prof. Bergel and did not hesitate to come out in the press with the accusation that the Nazi spirit is stimulated among the students by the members of the German faculty of the college. Violation of State Law

The outcome of the inquiry fore of importance not only to Rutgers University but to all universities in the country where the Nazis are trying to spread their poisonous anti-Jewish propaganda. It is quite clear that now that such an inquiry has been instituted for the first time in America, the Nazi agents in other uniwill have to restrict their activities for a time in or-der not to be discovered.

The outcome of the inquiry is also of importance to the State of New Jersey. Only a few weeks ago the State passed a law prohibiting subversive propaganda. Should the inquiry prove that such propaganda was con-ducted by the teachers of the German department in the col-lege, it will be tantamount to proving that the law of the State had been violated, and may lead to the proper consequences.

### Eyes on New Brunswick

Only a short time ago the State of New Jersey was considering granting a large subsidy to the Women's College. Now such a subsidy is out of the question until the issue is settled. The eyes of legislators, educators and all interested in seeing the laws of the United States ob-served, will therefore be turned to New Brunswick where the inquiry will begin tomorrow.

What Germany's New Citizenship Law Means The London Jewish Chronicle, speaking of the law in Germany de-

ship, says:

At a moment when the Chief Rabbi of British Jewry is invited as an honored guest of the King to the Jubilee State Banquet, the Nazis are busy forging decrees to rob the German Jews of their na-tionality. There is no mistaking the sinister significance of the Minister of the Interior's announcement on that point. Under the new Reich Citizenship Law now in preparation, says Herr Frick, Germans will have to qualify for citizenship instead of acquiring it by accident of birth. It will be an honor which those of German stock must earn. For these it will open the way to public office and "only those who bear it" will have the honor of serving under arms "for people and Reich." The grant of citizenship will be made subject to definite conditions one of which. in conformity with Nazi principles, will be racial membership of the German people. This, then, guestion whether Jews would b allowed to enter the new Conscript Army, They will not.

#### Germany Loses Its Best Journalists

The World's Press News of London writes.

The recent decree of Dr. Goebbels, the German Minister of Propaganda, expelling nearly 1,000 Jews from German newspaper offices, completely eliminates Jews from German journalism. It also eliminates much of the variety and intelligence left in the German Press after the Nazi revolution, for Jews and Socialists were admittedly among the best newspaper men. More important, however, is the

significance of this move. For it shows the German Fascist iden-tification with the Russian Communist plan of ejection of political opponents from journalism. is the first deviation from the Nazi Press plan of organization of the German Press on Italian lines.

Recognizing the talent of his opponents and anxious to secure it for Fascism, Mussolini converted the majority of journalists by promises, bribes and other in-ducements. This explains the high standard of the Italian Press comparison with the German, which has suffered so much from intolerance as to cause a rumor of the revocation of this anti-Jewish and anti-Socialist edict

#### Spain Is Praised For Rambam Tribute

The New York Herald Tribune, an editorial, praises the Spanish priving the Jews of their citizengovernment for setting up a monu-ment in memory of Moses Maimonides. The paper says:

No Jewish son of Old Spainand there were many brilliant ones-could have been better chosen for an honor that is meant sen for an nonor that is meant to proclaim Spain's reconcilia-tion with the Jewish world, for no Jew of the Middle Ages was so whole-heartedly devoted to the reconciliation of Occidental rationalism with Semitic dogmatism. After fifteen years of wand-ering he became in Cairo the household physician to the great Saladin; and, being saturated with both Aristotelian philosophy and rabbinical lore, he devoted his ample leisure for the rest of his life to focusing the searching light of logic on the Scriptures and on the traditional law of his The results were of intense interest to European philosophers for five hundred years after his death and are still pro-vocative reading to both Jewish and Christian theologians.

Many of these schools have enforced a salary of \$15 per week, and still others have hired non-licensed teachers to do the service of regular teachers. Because of a continual increase in the cost of living, their condition is becoming worse. Despite a recog nition throughout industry that salaries ought to be increased, salaries of the teachers have been de creased. Besides direct cuts, various indirect methods have been inous indirect methods have been in-stituted such as forced vacations without pay, withholding salaries for several months.

"The continuation of this miser "The continuation of this mice; able condition must cease. Teachers cannot perform their educational duties under such conditions. Although individuals active in Jewish communal affairs and re sponsible directors were fully aware of the situation, hardly anything was done to improve it.

"The Central Committee was, therefore, compelled to resort to this move of calling a stoppage, in order to arouse the Jewish citizens of New York to this horrible condition, and to take definite steps to improve the situation.'

In his report, Mr. Cohen pointed out that "the great reservoirs, the well-springs of Jewish life are dry-ing up, here by persecution and pogroms and there by official anti-religious policy.

"All too many so-called Jews are satisfied to sit back in smug selfcomplacency, relying for security upon the democratic principles propounded by the constitution of their country. Permit me to point out that a similar attitude on the part of our German brethren as a whole probably contributed materially to their downfall."

A Crisis in German Jewry

By MORRIS WOOD

It was not so long ago that we all pointed with pride to the unity achieved by German Jewry in the face of great adversity. And it was true that German Jews, despite divergencies of opinion, had achieved the measure of solidarity dictated by the Greenstances. The great value of this new orientation of Jewish communal life was quickly at its recently concluded conference adopted a remarkable resolution of difficult problems which a Nazi re-

gime presented for the Jews Germany. It resulted in many soundly constructive developments and many acomplishments not otherwise possible.

But now a cleavage is appearing in German-Jewish unity and a crisis is approaching rapidly. It is due to a fundamental philosophical difference which, true enough, has en present all along but now is being forced to the fore.

Two Opposite Views The issue between those German Jews who wish to direct German-Jewish life on the fundamental the sis that the majority of the Jews in Germany and their children will have to work out their destiny in the Reich and the Zionists who see the only solution in the German-Jewish question in Palestine and insist that all German-Jewish life be directed to that end.

The former who are in the ma-jority in the administrations of the national Jewish organizations and in the community organizations, have been handicapped in the preaching of their doctrines by the very real government objection to any propaganda seeking to induce the Jews to remain in Germany and rebuild their lives to conform with altered circumstances. Such German-Jewish leaders, for in-stance, as Dr. Martin Buber, Dr. Bruno Woyda and others have been forbidden to address public meetings to urge this point of view.

#### Would Spread Migration

On the other hand, the authori-ties listen with interest to any plans or measures designed to facilitate, the emigration of Jews from the Reich. They welcome every activity tending to lead the Jews out of Germany and have cooperated in such measures as the transfer agreement permitting emigrants to Palestine to take capital in the form of German goods.

Now the issue has been precipi tated by the Zionist forces who have demanded that control of the Berlin Jewish community be handed over to them and that the personnel of its various departments be changed.

which cannot but bring matters to a head. This resolution proclaims the right of the Zionist movement to influence decisively the whole of Jewish life in Germany. The leadership belongs to Zionism in all branches of life in which Zionist initiative has shown the German Jews new roads for constructive upbuilding and systematic aid; in the question of the Jewish schools, of vocational and economic policy, the promotion of Palestine upbuilding and emigration. "Zionism cannot in the present situation of the Jews in Germany restrict itself to certain spheres of work, but must demand that the Zionist recognition should serve as the foundation of a new shaping of the whole of Jewish

Demand Full Control On this fundamental the resolu-tion proceeds: "The Conference of the German Zionist Federation decides: The German Zionists demand a personal and organization1 transformation of the central and local bodies of German Jewry which will guarantee them the influence due them in the shaping of Jewish work in Germany. The executive com-mittee is instructed to take the neessary action to realize these demands and to see that they are carried into effect."

This resolution, virtually an ulti-matum, if it is to be followed upas indeed the Zionists have every intention of doing-can only bring widely-heralded German Jewish unity tumbling down into ruins. For the non-Zionist elements cannot accede; they canot surrender without abandoning beliefs as deeply rooted in themselves as Zionist ideology in the Zionists.

### Flight Held Cowardly

Many of them believe that the issue at stake in Germany is not that of just the 500,000 Jews remaining there today-but that in Germany issues are being decided and must be decided that must profoundly affect the Jews of the entire world and must materially Jewish destiny for generations to come. To these people flight to a Palestine refuge, the abandonment of the field of battle without a struggle, is a cowardly course. Rightly or wrongly, they believe their fate and the fate of Jewry in general is to be decided in Germany. They cannot and will not adopt a course which to their thinking is nothing but surrender.

Many others are opposed to Zi-onist domination of German-Jewish life because they feel that Palestine cannot be the refuge for all of them -that at best it can only shelter a part of German Jewry. They favor a program that will expedite the emigration to Palestine of those who are temperamentally suited to Palestine life and can be accom-modated there but will also consider the requirements of the great majority who will have to remain in Germany and build new lives here. The Zionist program, to their way of thinking, is unsatisfactory because it does not recognize this second factor and does not provide for it.

morrow at Rutgers University into charges that members of the German department of the school's Women's College are spreading anti-Semitic and pro-Nazi literature among the students, will be watched by all those interested in checking Nazi propaganda in

It is a fact that the Nazis are making an effort to reach the American youth through the dissemination of anti-Jewish propa ganda in the universities. This fact was emphasized openly by Dr. Sachar, director of the Hillel Foundation, at the recent convention of the B'nai B'rith in Washington. Its truth is substantiated by Prof. Leinard Bergel's charge that he has been dismissed for his attempt to fight the pro-Nazi spi in the Women's College of Rutgers.

#### Suspicion and Citizenship

Many will be puzzled by the fact that the faculty of the German department is composed entirely of German citizens. Any one residing in America and still retaining his German citizenship at a time when Germany is condemned by liberal people the world over, may naturally be suspected of being sympathetic to-wards the Nazi regime. The teachers in the German de

partment of the Women's College at Rutgers are now under this suspicion, both by public opinion and by the students of the University. More than 400 students of the College have openly declared themselves in sympathy with Prof. Bergel and did not hesitate to come out in the press with the accusation that the Nazi spirit is stimulated among the students by the members of the German faculty of the college. Violation of State Law

The outcome of the inquiry fore of importance not only to Rutgers University but to all universities in the country where the Nazis are trying to spread their poisonous anti-Jewish propaganda. It is quite clear that now that such an inquiry has been instituted for the first time in America, the Nazi agents in other uniwill have to restrict their activities for a time in or-der not to be discovered.

The outcome of the inquiry is also of importance to the State of New Jersey. Only a few weeks ago the State passed a law prohibiting subversive propaganda. Should the inquiry prove that such propaganda was con-ducted by the teachers of the German department in the col-lege, it will be tantamount to proving that the law of the State had been violated, and may lead to the proper consequences.

### Eyes on New Brunswick

Only a short time ago the State of New Jersey was considering granting a large subsidy to the Women's College. Now such a subsidy is out of the question until the issue is settled. The eyes of legislators, educators and all interested in seeing the laws of the United States ob-served, will therefore be turned to New Brunswick where the inquiry will begin tomorrow.

What Germany's New Citizenship Law Means The London Jewish Chronicle, speaking of the law in Germany de-

ship, says:

At a moment when the Chief Rabbi of British Jewry is invited as an honored guest of the King to the Jubilee State Banquet, the Nazis are busy forging decrees to rob the German Jews of their na-tionality. There is no mistaking the sinister significance of the Minister of the Interior's announcement on that point. Under the new Reich Citizenship Law now in preparation, says Herr Frick, Germans will have to qualify for citizenship instead of acquiring it by accident of birth. It will be an honor which those of German stock must earn. For these it will open the way to public office and "only those who bear it" will have the honor of serving under arms "for people and Reich." The grant of citizenship will be made subject to definite conditions one of which. in conformity with Nazi principles, will be racial membership of the German people. This, then, guestion whether Jews would b allowed to enter the new Conscript Army, They will not.

#### Germany Loses Its Best Journalists

The World's Press News of London writes.

The recent decree of Dr. Goebbels, the German Minister of Propaganda, expelling nearly 1,000 Jews from German newspaper offices, completely eliminates Jews from German journalism. It also eliminates much of the variety and intelligence left in the German Press after the Nazi revolution, for Jews and Socialists were admittedly among the best newspaper men. More important, however, is the

significance of this move. For it shows the German Fascist iden-tification with the Russian Communist plan of ejection of political opponents from journalism. is the first deviation from the Nazi Press plan of organization of the German Press on Italian lines.

Recognizing the talent of his opponents and anxious to secure it for Fascism, Mussolini converted the majority of journalists by promises, bribes and other in-ducements. This explains the high standard of the Italian Press comparison with the German, which has suffered so much from intolerance as to cause a rumor of the revocation of this anti-Jewish and anti-Socialist edict

#### Spain Is Praised For Rambam Tribute

The New York Herald Tribune, an editorial, praises the Spanish priving the Jews of their citizengovernment for setting up a monu-ment in memory of Moses Maimonides. The paper says:

No Jewish son of Old Spainand there were many brilliant ones-could have been better chosen for an honor that is meant sen for an nonor that is meant to proclaim Spain's reconcilia-tion with the Jewish world, for no Jew of the Middle Ages was so whole-heartedly devoted to the reconciliation of Occidental rationalism with Semitic dogmatism. After fifteen years of wand-ering he became in Cairo the household physician to the great Saladin; and, being saturated with both Aristotelian philosophy and rabbinical lore, he devoted his ample leisure for the rest of his life to focusing the searching light of logic on the Scriptures and on the traditional law of his The results were of intense interest to European philosophers for five hundred years after his death and are still pro-vocative reading to both Jewish and Christian theologians.

#### Day Stoppage as Wage Protest Will Affect 60,000 Children

The central committee of He-brew Teachers' Organizations has declared a one-day stoppage in all the Hebrew schools of Greater New York. The stoppage will take place on Thursday, May 23, and will in volve 1.500 Jewish teachers and more than 60,000 Jewish children. it was announced yesterday by the

The committee issued the following statement: "During the past few years of the depression the situation of the

Jewish teacher grew continually worse. Teachers with fifteen to twenty years of experience have been forced to teach at a salary of \$25 or \$20 per week. Many of these schools have enforced a salary of \$15 per week, and still others have hired non-licensed teachers to do the service of regular teachers. Because of a continual increase in the cost of living, their condition is becoming worse. Despite a recog nition throughout industry that salaries ought to be increased, salaries of the teachers have been de creased. Besides direct cuts, various indirect methods have been inous indirect methods have been in-stituted such as forced vacations without pay, withholding salaries for several months.

"The continuation of this miser "The continuation of this mice; able condition must cease. Teachers cannot perform their educational duties under such conditions. Although individuals active in Jewish communal affairs and re sponsible directors were fully aware of the situation, hardly anything was done to improve it.

"The Central Committee was, therefore, compelled to resort to this move of calling a stoppage, in order to arouse the Jewish citizens of New York to this horrible condition, and to take definite steps to improve the situation.'

Attorney General John J. Ben-Attorney General John J. Ben-nett, Judge Ferdinand Pecora and Richard E. Gutstadt of the Anti-Defamation League were the chief speakers at a banquet at the hotel convention which will end today.

Officers, elected yesterday were Officers, elected yesterday were: Charles Horowitz, president; Wil-fred Feiga, Worcester, Mass., Emil Rubinstein, Buffalo and Isidore Marcus, Toronto, vice-presidents; Lawrence White, New Haven, Conn. cretary and William Tasher, New Fork City, treasurer.

In his report, Mr. Cohen pointed out that "the great reservoirs, the well-springs of Jewish life are dry-ing up, here by persecution and pogroms and there by official anti-religious policy.

"All too many so-called Jews are satisfied to sit back in smug selfcomplacency, relying for security upon the democratic principles propounded by the constitution of their country. Permit me to point out that a similar attitude on the part of our German brethren as a whole probably contributed materially to their downfall."

friendly forces are being felt in and around Palestine." The next world war, he said, may affect the Arab countries and the Jews ought to be prepared for such a possibil-

Sneaking in a hall crowded with 3,000 Zionist Laborites and sympa Show 2 Months and sympa-thizers, Ben-Gurion asserted that the Jewish pepole must be made over from a people of peddlers, doctors and lawyers to a people predominantly laborers and farm-ers before there can be any mass immigration to Palestine,

### Uphold Class Struggle

He reaffirmed the necessity for class struggle in Palestine, explaining that he meant by class struggle the fight for humane working con-ditions and for civil and political rights for the Jewish laborer. "Those who fight Jewish laobr, human rights and decent living standards for the Jewish worker," said, "are fighting Zionism."

### Over 100 Delegations at Historic Bier; Stores Closed for Day

CRACOW, May 19-More than 100 Jewish delegations participated in the funeral services for Marshal Josef Pilsudski here, including a great number of rabbis and leaders the country.

The Jewish delegations carried wreaths with inscriptions in Polish and Hebrew forming the greatest group among the National Minori ties in the funeral procession.

All along the hundreds of miles between Warsaw and Cracow Jew ish delegations of the different townships along the route paid trib ute together with the local non-Jewish population when the train with the body of Pilsudski passed. All Jewish stores were closed and the windows of every Jewish home was decorated with black and with pictures of Pilsudski.

Special Sabbath services held yesterday in all synagogues of the country. The Sabbath sermons were dedicated to the Marshal. Special solemn services were held in the ancient historic syna gogue of Cracow.

Pilsudski's body was placed in the royal catacomb of the Wawel Castle near Poland's great leaders, including the emancipator of the Jews, Casimir the Great,

### Hear Deutsch Urge U. S. Intervention to Aid Jews Abroad

Intervention by the United States in behalf of Jews in other countries suffering from persecution was advocated by Aldermanic President Bernard S. Deutsch in an address yesterday before 2,500 persons who gathered at Temple Emanu-El under the auspices of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States for its fortieth national memorial sev

The services were preceded by parade of 2,000 members of ver-erans' and other military orders from the Ninety-second Street Y.M. H.A. down Park Avenue and to the temple at Sixty-fifth Street and Fifth Avenue. American and Jew-ish flags waved in the brisk breeze and numerous bands played patriotic airs.

### Warns of Persecution

At the temple, Mr. Deutsch warned that if "racial persecution is permitted to go unchecked it will find its roots even in free America." He declared that "too long have people in high places in America closed their eyes to persecution."

Suggesting that the United States

should take a hand in stamping out racial persecution in any country in which it may exist, he said that civilized people throughout the world no longer think that persecutions. tion in one country is merely the problem of that country. "The viof Jewish communities throughout the one in which it originates," he said.

Congressman Emanuel Celler described the services of Jews of the United States in behalf of their country during the various wars and pointed out that the number of Jews in military service was greater than the proportion of Jews in the population. This idea was re-iterated by New York Deputy Controller Milton Solomon.

#### Says Expulsion or Pogroms Face Jews in Germany

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
GENEVA, May 19—The Jews in Germany will face either complete expulsion from the Reich or pogroms if the present increased anti-Jewish propaganda continues.

This is the opinion expressed to-day in the Neue Zuericher Zeitung, influential Swiss newspaper, in an article from its Berlin correspon-

Describing the new wave of anti-Semitic fervor in Germany the co-respondent comes to the conclusion that the future for German Jews is much darker than even its gloomy present.

"If the type of enlightenment and propaganda which is now being conducted against the Jews in Ger-many continues then the Reich will head directly either for Jewish po-groms or for the expulsion of the Jews along the same lines as in Spain during the fifteenth century," the correspondent warned.
