Nazis 70 Seats in Czech Vote

Will Have Largest Bloc In House; 2 Jews Are Victors

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) PRAHA, May 20-The Nazis will comprise the largest faction in the new Czechoslovakian Parliament, but the inclusion of their representatives in a coalition government is entirely out of the question, it was authoritatively stated today to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

PRAHA, May 20-Two Jews were elected to the Czechoslovakian Parliament in the general election yes terday, according to the complete returns today.

Those elected are: Dr. Angelo Goldstein of Phaha, former ber of the Parliament, and Chaim Kugel of Munkacevo, a director of the Hebrew High School there.

While the returns show that the
Czech parties have obtained in this election practically the same re-sults as in the previous election, the German Democratic parties have suffered heavy losses.

Nazis Gain Votes

Nearly one-half of the votes which the Democratic tickets of the German population in Czechoslovakia received in the last election, this time went to the anti-Semitic Nazi party led by Konrad Henlein. It is estimated that Henlein's party may now have 70 seats in the new Parliament.

The sweeping victory which Herr Henlein achieved came as a sur-prise even to the most competent political observers. In some dis-tricts of Czechoslovakia, especially those located near Silesia, Hen-lein's party took about eighty per cent of the entire German vote. Henlein is known in Czechoslovakia as the "Czechoslovak Hitler," and his party is called the Sudeten German party.

The Czechoslovakian Parliament

consists of 300 ceats in the lower house and 150 in the senate. It was predicted here today that no Germans will be represented in the government despite the large vote obtained by the Henlein party.

Lawrence View On Arab Riots Is Disclosed

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, May 20—"With 400 de-cent British policemen in Palestine the Jews need not fear any Arab riots," was the opinion once voiced by Col. T. E. Lawrence, the "Law-rence of Arabia," whose funeral services will be held tomorrow at Moreton, near the cottage where he

This opinion of Lawrence's is dis-closed today in the Manchester Guardian in an article by L. B. Namier, former political secretary of the Jewish Agency. Mr. Namier states that Lawrence

arr. Namer states that Lawrence supported Zionist aims and was a friend of the Jews. He was ready to testify in favor of the Zionists before the British Cabinet in 1930, following the anti-Jewish riots of 1020 in Palestine but was not called.

Charities Get Record Bequest

2 British Groups Given \$1,250,000 by Will Of Henry David

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, May 20—The largest bequest ever made to Jewish chari-ties was announced today when the will of Henry Eskell David was made public.

The David will bequeathes \$1,-250,000 to various Jewish institu-tions. The bulk of this sum is to be shared equally by the Anglo-Jewish Association and the Jewish Board of Guardians.

The will stipulates that Anglo-Jewish Association spend the money to send promising students from Iraq to study in European countries. The Jewish Board of Guardians is to use its share for general charitable work.

Reich Imposes 'Aryan' Clause On Veterans

Dentists Must Prove Non-Jewish Origin To Retain Posts

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, May 20—The restrictions for Jewish dentists in Germany, from which the war veterans were exempt, will now be applied even to Jews who fought in the world war, it is announced today in the official Reichsgazette.

The announcement states that every dentist who wishes to work in the panel system will henceforth have to prove his "Aryan" origin and also that his wife is an "Aryan". No exceptions will be "Aryan". No exceptions will be made even of war veterans.

The announcement adds that Jewish war veterans who were permitted to practice dentistry in the panel system prior to February, will still be able to continue their practice there.

56 More Lose Vote The feelings of German Jewry The feelings of German Jewry after two-and-a-half years of Nazi rule are desribed in an article in the Central-Verein Zeitung, the organ of the non-Zionists in Ger-

many.

"We see flowers and processions "We see nowers and processions and the banners which we are not allowed to fiy, and we have to stand aside," the article written by the editor of the paper says. "We cannot join in the rejoicing of the German people. We who have borne the grief of this people as our own grief. But we feel all the closer together in that room that is allowed to us. This is our world now, this small German Jewry, these few people oppressed by a load of anxieties; and yet we shall not let this load crush us to the ground, or doubts rob us of our courage."

Visa Pact Sought With Revisionists

Agency Executive Aims To Forestall Separte Action by Rebels

JERUSALEM, May 20—Negotiations were started today between the Executive of the Jewish Agen-cy and the Revisionist Executive in the hope of reaching an understanding with regard to immigration certificates for members of the Zionist Revisionist Party, in order to prevent the rebel party from undertaking direct negotiations with the Palestine government.

The Executive is represented at the negotiations by Isaac Gruenthe negotiations by Isaac Gruen-baum, head of the immigration de-partment. The Revisionists are represented by Dr. Hoffman, mem-ber of the World Revisionist Ex-

Pact to Bind All Units

It was understood at the very beginning of the negotiations that whatever agreement reached will go into immediate effect and will be valid for all groups affiliated with the Revisionist movement, including the Brith Trumpeldor, the Brith Hachail and the Revisionist Artisans Organization.

The Executive came to the negotiations with a concrete proposal. The Revisionists, after hearing the proposals as presented by Mr. Gru-enbaum today, are now preparing counter proposals.

In the meantime, the Executive conceded the allocation of immigration certificates from the curthe Revisionist Organization and to members of the Brith Trumpeldor, in accordance with the proportion of Revisionists in the Hachshara, training farms of agricultural workers for Palestine. Danzia Before the League

The question of the Jews in Danzig will come up this week

for discussion before the Council of the League of Nations, which opened its session in Geneva y terday. The petition by the Danzig Jews which the Council will take

up is one of seven submitted by various groups of the Free city to the League of Nations, demand ing a curb on Nazi activities there. The Jewish petition, how ever, will no doubt attract more attention than the others since the anti-Jewish propaganda now being conducted by the Nazi ministration in Danzig is a direct violation of the provisions set by the League for the administra tion of the Free City.

Jewish Sufferings Grown The 8,000 Jews of Danzig have long been suffering from the Nazi propaganda in the Free City and from the anti-Jewish regulations. Their suffering has, however, he come more intense during the last

few weeks, following the devalua-tion of the Danzig currency.

Although the devaluation was carried out by the Danzig Senate. which is controlled entirely by the Nazis, Nazi agitators and the Nazi press started a campaign that the Jews are the ones to be blamed. The campaign, encou-raged by the Nazi administration of the Free City, is leading many to believe that the Jews are in deed responsible for the deflation from which they are suffering Since most of those affected are of the middle class, whose total deposits in the Danzig banks are estimated at 70,000,000 gulden, the incitement against the Jews is finding fertile ground even among those who are not Nazis.

Truth About Inflation

The truth of the matter is that the Danzig Senate before devaluating the currency of the Free City, tipped off the Nazi institu tions in time to permit them to exchange their capital. It is also a fact that the move of the Dan zig Senate to devaluate the cur rency was aimed to pauperize that part of the population which voted against the Nazis in the parliamentary elections of April 7. Notwithstanding this fact the leaders of the Nazis in Danzig have seen in the devaluation of the currency a good excuse for strengthening their anti-Jewish Propaganda by blaming the Jews The anti-Jewish propa ganda in Danzig has thus, after the inflation, assumed an unpre cedented, dangerous character,

The Jewish Petition

The petition which the Jews of Danzig has submitted to the Council of the League of Nations is a result of this situation. A similar natition was submitted to the League by the Catholic population of Danzig, which is also persecuted by the Nazis though

to a lesser degree than the Jews. Among the petitions which the League Council will take up at its present session, is also one submitted by Sean Lester, the League's High Commissioner of Mr. Lester has been openly defied by the Nazi administration in Danzig. He therefore requested that the League once and for all define

named by those already elected.

Joseph J. Hurwitz of Baltimore was elected secretary with Jacob Bass of Washington, treasurer, To Stress Education

The program launched in the southeastern region will lay particular stress on the extension of Jewish education to Jewish youth and to bring these young people closer to the fold of orthodox Judaism. A resolution adopted by the conference urged that organiza-tional and educational activities among Jewish youth be considered by the Union as major undertakings.

Sees Reich-U.S. Split Justified Speaking earlier in the day, Sen-ator William H. King of Utah indicated that severance of diplomatic relations with Germany "might be justified" in view of the treatment which the Hitler government has accorded Jews. In his address Senator

praised Orthodox Jewry for its ad-herence to the Orthodox faith during times of religious and racial persecution and condenned Germany for its persecution of Jews. Asserting that "Hitler policies are inconceivable in this age of civilization," Senator King said, "when nations with which we have inter-national relations adopt policies which are cruel, bigoted and inconsistent with civilization, I am not sure but what the severance of diplomatic relations might be jus tified."

Greater Role for Orthodox William Weiss of New York, pres ident of the Union, called upon Orthodox Jews to become a more ar-ticulate force in the affairs of American Jewish life.

"The most signal contribution that American Jews can make to the United States in this period of economic readjustment," Mr. Weiss declared, "is to revitalize and perpetuate those spiritual principles and ideals of life which have sustained the Jewish people throughout the centuries, in spite of perse cution and hardship." Pointing out that the Union was

founded thirty-seven years ago, Mr. Weiss said that the organization represents seventy-five per cent if not more of the Jews of America."

Because of this large representa tion, Mr. Weiss contended, "the voice of Orthodox Jews should be

more articulate and influential in the affairs of Jewry in America Mr. Weiss read to the convention letter from President Roosevelt,

who expressed his good wishes and lauded the purpose of the meeting. Other speakers included Repre-senative Sol Bloom of New York,

Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein of New York, Judge Fromberg, and rabbis from all important cities of the southeast. The convention was Washington, chairman of the convention committee.
