Sees Danger **Growing for Polish Jews**

Ruling Party Absorbing Endeks, Socialist Leader Warns

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, May 28-The danger which the near future holds for the Jews of Poland is pointed out today by M. Niedzialkowski, a leader of the Polish Socialist Party in the Sejm, in an article in "Robotnik," official organ of the party.

The Socialist leader discloses that the Government Party is now quietly absorbing large sections of the anti-Semitic National Democratic Party, (Endeks) thus taking in increasingly large doses of political anti-Jewish doctrines.

Keep Anti-Semitism

Dissatisfied with the present tactics of the National Democratic Party, especially after the death of Pilsudski, many members of this anti-Jewish group which was in opposition to the present government are now changing their minds and joining the pro-government ranks.

These elements do not, however, change their minds as to their anti-Jewish attitude. Their influence in pro-government party may therefore spell eventual danger for Polish Jewry.

While the analysis of the Polish Socialist leader on the Jewish situation in the near future may be correct, Jewish leaders here abstain from committing themselves to any opinion. Their policy today is one of watchful waiting, since the country is still mourning the death of the late Marshal Pilsudski.

Soviet Rejects Many For Biro-Bidjan

Rail Strike Looms in Palestine

Government Is Warned By Employes to Raise Wages

JERUSALEM, May 28-The possibility of a railway strike in Palestine was discussed today at a convention of railway workers held in Haifa in connection with the new government laws regulating wages for workers.

Dissatisfied with these laws, the convention today decided to send a delegation to the High Commissioner of Palestine to demand that the laws be amended so as to secure higher wages for the railway workers. Instructions were given to the delegation to warn the government that "quick action had better be taken" with regard to the wage

Predict Wide College Probe

Ask State Investigation Of Pro-Nazism at Rutgers

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., May 28 -A nation-wide investigation into all American colleges to establish the extent of Nazi propaganda there, may be the outcome of the investigation now being held here in connection with the charges against Dr. Frederick J. Haupt mann, it was indicated today.

Dr. Hauptmann, head of the German department of the women's college of Rutgers University, is charged with spreading anti-Semitism and pro-Nazi propaganda among the students of his depart-

No hearing was held today by the investigation committee. The hearing will be resumed tomorrow.

Meanwhile, great interest was aroused here by the resolution introduced yesterday in the New Jersey Assembly at Trenton, calling for a State investigation into the un-American activities and the spreading of Nazi propaganda in the New Jersey Women's College.

Efforts to Aid **Doctors Fail** In Austria

Physicians' Union Cites Continued Bias in State Hospitals

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA. May 28-The plight of Jewish doctors in Vienna as a result of the anti-Jewish discrimination in State and Municipal institutions, is described today in a report by the Union of Jewish Doctors ni Austria, made public here.

"The position of the young Jewish doctors in the medical institutions continus to be the subject of repeated effort, petitions, representations and negotiations," the report says. "We must regretfully state that we have not achieved anything in this regard."

The report complains that Jews continue to be passed over in medical appointments, except for iso non-Jews in violation of the regulalated instances. The principal of ignoring Jewish applicants is being carried so far that positions are left vacant for no other reason than that there are no other candidates but Jews, the report emphasizes.

In the General Hospital of Vienna, there are only two Jews now among the sixty-one doctors and assistants. The Franz Josef hospital has only seven Jews among the forty medical assistants. These seven will be leaving the hospital on October 31. The Wilhelmina Hospital has only two Jews among its eighty medical assistants. In the Rudolf Hospital there is only one Jew.

The Bureya's First Birthday

MOSCOW.

Soviet Russia this month celebrated the first anniversary of the proclamation of Biro-Bidjan as an autonomous Jewish region with the customary fanfare in the press. The Jewish papers in particular, as would naturally be expected, printed a great deal about the region, reviewing the accomplishments of a year and describing the plans

and personalities bulking large in the future of the Russian Jewish

They agree that great progress has been made during the twelve months since May 9, 1934 when the Central Executive Committee of the Soviets proclaimed Biro-Bidjan an autonomous Jewish region. They point out that in recent years sentiment with respect to the new region in the Far East of Siberia has changed and that the Comzet, the government organization for settling Jews on the land, is now flooded with applications from prospective settlers. The old problem of re-emigration is dead, since the conditions that formerly led settlers to abandon the region no longer exist.

Points to Progress

"During the past year," declares is a Tartar Republic. the Emes, Communist Yiddish daily, "the Jewish autonomous region has taken great forward strides. The area under cultivation has increased twenty per cent. Ten thousand hectares of land have been ameliorated, the industrial and co-operative enterprises have been consolidated, and have produced the quotas assigned to them. There is a more systematic housebuilding activity. The town of Biro-Bidjan, the center of the region, has had new roads built, post and telegraph services have been help," the paper concludes. improved and the budget for cultural work has been increased by 5,000,000 roubles this year.

"There are ninety schools in the region, attended by more than 10,000 children. There is a State theatre, a talkie cinema, ten hospitals, a radio station, etc.

Re-emigration Checked

"Re-emigration has completely stopped this year. Many who had left Biro-Bidjan are now anxious to be sent back there. The Comzet is flooded with applications from settlers to allow friends and relatives to join them.

'One of the most important problems for the whole of the Far East, and particularly for the Jewish autonomous region, is to increase as rapidly as possible the population which is needed for building up the Region and mastering its natural wealth.

A "Refugee Stamp"

The Duchy of Luxembourg has now embarked upon a novel method of helping Jewish and other refugees from Germany. It has issued a special set of postage stamps bearing a surplus tax, which will be devoted to the assistance of refugees.

The number of refugees from Germany now in Luxembourg is not large. Considering, however, the small size of the country, any influx of foreigners dependent upon charity, is a burden to the government.

As a country which covers the major part of its budget by issuing stamps which are of value to stamp collectors, the administration of Luxembourg hopes that

The special tax levied on the postage stamps this year will be sufficient to provide the necessary relief for the refugees.

International Relief

In issuing the special set of stamps, the Luxembourg government feels confident that these stamps, because of their purpose, will attract interest, not only in Luxembourg but all over the world. The government believes that the new stamps will be regarded as a means for an international relief action to alleviate the distress of the displaced scientists, artists and other professionals from Germany and to afford them a breathing spell until they can adjust themselves to a new life.

These stamps are of exceptional interest. They display symbolic images of those whom the issue is meant to help. They represent a professor, a painter, journalist, an engineer, a chemist, a lawyer and a physicianall those who have been ousted from their positions by the Nazis in Germany as non-Aryans.

One Year in Circulation

The "refugee stamps" now issued by the Luxembourg Government will be in circulation for one year only. They will travel all over the world proclaiming the warm-hearted generosity of a minute country which has given practical expression to its sense of duty toward humanity by help. ing those to whom humanity owes so much.

There are hundreds of refugees now in danger of actual starvation, not only in Luxembourg but in other countries neighboring Germany. The humanitarian postage stamps issued by the Duchy of Luxembourg will no doubt be of benefit also to those refugees who are not at present in Luxembourg. It is expected that a proportion of the income which the Luxembourg government expects to derive from the "refugee stamps," will be dviided also why the "refugee stamps Luxembourg through special committees.

Combatting Indifference

In these days of political insecurity and economic depression, when innumerable professional workers in Germany, Austria and other countries are deprived of the possibility of carrying on their professional activities and earning a livelihood, the novel method of relief devised by the Luxembourg government will in a measure serve to rouse other nations from the general indifference to the position of the professional in exile. It will make the purchasers of the "refugee stamps" feel that they are directly contributing toward the alleviation of the precarious position of the refugees.

This is why the government of Luxembourg ought to be congratulated for its original idea. This

World Press Digest

Sees No Hope For Jews Under Nazis

Frederick T. Birchall, analyzing the Jewish situation in Germany, cables the following from Berlin to the New York Times:

The prospect is that so long as this National Socialist regime lasts there will be no future for German-born or alien-born Jews in Germany. Their relegation to an inferior status is now an integral part of the law of the land and denial of their German status is a cardinal point in the Nazi creed. Only a few weeks ago an eminent Jewish advocate who had been touring Germany counseling his people to sit tight, keep quiet, obey the law and wait for better times was summoned before constituted authority and directed to end his activities.

Jews, whether law-abiding or not, are not wanted in Germany, he was told, and the best thing they can do is to get out.

The position of the great Jewish bankers is easy to understand. They do not emigrate because their entire resources are tied up in Germany and cannot be extricated without physical danger to themselves. They are tolerated -and -even -well-treated because they are necessary; and, in these circumstances, they are taking the long chance of remaining because they, too, hope for a change, under which they can remain.

But the position of the Jews as a whole has not changed nor is it likely to under this regime except possibly for the worse. Julius Streicher, their bitterest foe, is just now enjoying great favor and his activities are extending. He is perfecting plans for issuing his Jew-baiting newspaper, the Stuermer, now published in Nuremberg, in all the great cities throughout Germany, including Berlin.

It has been argued that gifts divert the attention of the child from the main purpose of confirmation which is initiation into Judaism, and the suggestion has been made that in lieu of gifts, relatives and friends should make donations to charitable institutions in honor of confirmants. We are one hundred percent in favor of contributions to worthy institutions and we think it beautiful to make them in honor of confirmants-but discourage a child from accept ing gifts is bad Judaism and worse psychology. Some people are naive enough to expect children to act like angels when it is sufficient that they act like normal children. We believe that it is a wonderful thing for our children to receive confirmation gifts, for thereby the importance of this ceremony is concretely accentuated.

Mosley Queried on Streicher Hints

The Sunday Referee, a London newspaper, carries the following editorial under the headline "Yes or No, Sir Oswald?":

Those simpletons who believe that British Fascism is more virtuous than the German brand would do well to ponder the correspondence, published in the German Press, between Sir Oswald Mosley and Julius Streicher, chief Nazi anti-Semite.

In reply to a telegram from Streicher, Sir Oswald is reported to have said: "I value your message. . . . The forces of Jewish corruption in all great lands must be defeated before the future of Europe can be ensured in justice and peace. . . ."

If this message is an incorrect report, Sir Oswald ought to disclaim it at once. If it is true, then the British people will know their man.

Bentwich Ends His Drive Here To Aid Appeal

League Aide Is Given Farewell Reception By Leaders

With the plaudits of Jewish communities in scores of cities ringing in his ears, Norman Bentwich, associate on the League of Nations High Commission for Refugees, was preparing yesterday for his ue parture to Palestine after a visit here of two months.

During his stay, Mr. Bentwich, who is professor of international relations at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, made many appearances in behalf of the United Jewish Appeal's nation-wide campaign for \$3,250,000. He leaves tomorrow night on the Berengaria.

At a farewell reception Monday night at the home of William Rosenwald, a national co-chairman of the Appeal, Mr. Bentwich made a final plea to America for "understanding of the gravity of the need" of the refugees from Germany and of persecuted Jewish masses in Germany and other European lands.

Commenting on visits he had made to more than a score of cities throughout the East and Middle West on behalf of the refugees from Germany, Mr. Bentwich said that he "admired everywhere the largeness and the efficiency of the organization, the vision and the zeal of the leaders in the communities, the devotion of the workers,' but added that he felt that "the response of American Jewry seems to me to be inadequate for the greatness of the cause and the urgency of the need."

The liberals and Christian bodies of the United States have contributed little for the 15,000 Christian refugees from Germany, and "their need is not less grave than that of the Jewish refugees," Mr. Bentwich declared, and reiterated the remark of Lord Cecil that "what has happened in Germany is a challenge to the principles of Christian civiliza-

Mr. Rosenwald presided, and others who spoke were I. Edwin Goldwasser, co-chairman of the Greater New York campaign, and Samuel J. Bloomingdale.

Meat Boycott Closes 3,500 Kosher Shops

Packers Meet Public Today in Effort At Peace

With the consumer-retailer boycott against kosher meat packers spreading throughout the city, a delegation of the City Action Committee against the High Cost of Living will meet with representatives of the Institute of American Meat Packers this afternoon at the office of Commissioner William Fellowes Morgan, Jr., of the Department of Public Markets, Weights and Measures, in an attempt to reach an agreement.

The Action Committee estimated yesterday that about 3,500 kosher butchers had closed their shops in sympathy with the housewives' efforts to force a ten-cent per pound reduction in the price of meat.

It was learned that executives of the Federation of Kosher Butchers held a secret conference yesterday to consider a course of action. The executives have been closeted in conferences ever since the rank-andbutchers voted last Sunday night at Webster Hall to strike in sympathy with the consumers.

Shops Picketed

A number of butcher shops, notably in Manhattan where the boycott is the weakest, were still being picketed by women adherents

Charges that certain kosher butchers had stored meat for more than the ritual limit of seventytwo hours were discounted yesterday by George Ringler of the State Department of Agriculture and Markets. He said that on returning from Albany where he conferred with the department officials, he investigated the complaints and found them baseless.

Rebuffed Monday in presenting demands for a price-cut to meat packers, a committee of three representing the action committee interviewed Commissioner Morgan at his office yesterday. He expressed a desire to be helpful and arranged this afternoon's meeting.

Mr. Morgan was non-committal about charges that the meat packers are keeping wholesale prices high to increase their profits. said he had not investigated the ac cusations as yet.



Explaining that "this sudden outburst of opposition to the World Zionist Executive is due to the fact that the Labor group won domination at the last Zionist Congress," Rabbi Kohn says that although it cannot be denied that labor in Palestine is responsible for the finest ideals, labor in general has been unsympathetic toward Judaism "as we understand it in a traditional sense." Rabbi Kohn believes, however, that if the Laborites in Palestine are given support in their social upbuilding, they will come in time to see that a Palestine without Judaism cannot prevail.

The London paper discloses that the Jewish shops in Munich suffered in Saturday's attack more than Jewish firms in Berlin suffered two years ago on the famous "picketing day" of April 1, 1933. Shop windows painted with indelible acids gleamed in letters four and five feet high with the word "Jew." Half-a-dozen of the most prominent shops attacked include firms which are only 100 yards away from the Bavarian Ministry of Justice.

Among the shops attacked were also some owned by Catholics of Jewish ancestry, the Morning Post reports. The glaziers were busy on Monday throughout the business district, scraping plate glass win dows to remove traces of anti-Semitic defacement, the London paper relates.
