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Exile Aide Is Reported Set to Quit

London Office Denies McDonald Will Give Up League Post

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
GENEVA, May 31—A report that James G. McDonald, League of Nations High Commissioner for Jewish and other refugees from Germany, is planning to quit his post because the League is not sufficiently supporting his work, was emphatically denied today to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by Mr. Wurfhaj, the High Commissioner's secretary.

The report appeared in a number of newspapers abroad. Mr. Wurfhaj, in his statement today, declares that Mr. McDonald is still in South America negotiating with the Brazilian and other South American governments for the settlement of refugees from Germany. He will not return to New York before the beginning of July, Mr. Wurfhaj stated.

Push for Permanent Body

The High Commissariat for German refugees and the various organizations interested in protecting the mare continuing their efforts to create a central organization for the protection of all exiles as a permanent institution under the auspices of the League of Nations.

The opinion prevailing in Geneva is that concerted international action through the League could, at very little cost to the individual nation, mitigate considerably the sufferings of refugees, and of relieving unemployment among them.

Reports which have appeared in a number of newspapers abroad to the effect that a group of fifty German refugees have returned to Belgium from Brazil because they could not find an opening there and have been refused readmission to Belgium, were also denied here today.

"There is no foundation whatever for these reports," the denial states.

It was recently reported from Buenos Aires that the Argentine government had refused to give Mr. McDonald the cooperation he asked of it in easing its immigration laws to admit refugees from Germany.

Erin Gets Its First Anti-Semitic Paper

DUBLIN, May 31—The first self-avowed anti-Semitic newspaper in Ireland appeared in Dublin today. It is named Aontas Gaedheal (Weekly Post).

The paper declares that its policy will be "anti-Semitic, but not attacking Jewish religion." The first page of the publication is illustrated with the maps of Ireland and Palestine, on which the name of Jerusalem appears in place of Dublin, and Tel Aviv in place of Cork. "Irishmen and not foreigners should control Ireland's destiny," is the slogan of the paper.

Poland Probes Lodz Clashes In City Council

Official Pictures Taken Of Rioting to be Used In Court Action

WARSAW, May 31—State Prosecutor Karobski today took personal charge of the investigation into Tuesday evening's anti-Jewish riots in the Lodz Municipal Council.

The Ministry of Interior, which is interested in the case, announced today that photographs were taken by an official of the Ministry during the riots at the session of the Municipal Council. These photographs will figure in the court proceedings as material evidence.

The Lodz riots, which were carried out by councillors who are members of the anti-Semitic National Democratic Party (Endeks), have aroused a wave of indignation throughout the country. A number of Jewish and Socialist members of the council were injured when the anti-Semitic councillors hurled furniture and inkwells at them.

M. Karobski announced today that the proceedings against the councillors guilty of starting the riots will be based on the section of the Penal Code which provides a sentence of two years' imprisonment.

In view of excitement throughout the country, the National Democratic newspapers in Lodz and in Warsaw are busy in their efforts to prove that the Lodz outbreak was the result of "a Jewish provocation."

Police Stage Home Raids In Turkey

Employees of Jewish Col- onization Association Are Searched

ISTANBUL, May 31—The homes of all employees of the Jewish Colonization Association in Turkey were searched by police last night as a result of a raid made on the headquarters of the association last week.

During the raid, the police arrested M. Tcherniak, director of the association's local office, and confiscated all records of the organization. No reason for the raid and the arrest was given.

An effort was made today by representatives of the Jewish Community here to communicate with Tcherniak in jail. The authorities refused them permission to see the prisoner or communicate with him. Tcherniak is being held incommunicado, it was explained.

It is believed here that the Jewish Colonization Association's main office in Paris will intervene through French diplomatic channels for an inquiry into the situation. The association had been active in Turkey for many years under the old regime as well as under the regime of Kemal Pasha, and its work was devoted exclusively to helping Jewish emigration and Jewish land settlement.

Holland Rejects Schechita Bar

Turns Down S. P. C. A. Request for Ban on Ritual Slaughter

AMSTERDAM, May 31—Queen Wilhelmina today rejected a petition urging that "schechita," the Jewish method of slaughtering animals, be prohibited in Holland. A similar petition was also rejected by the Dutch Foreign Minister, A. C. de Graeff.

The petitions were submitted by prominent members of the Dutch Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. The Dutch government was urged to place a resolution before the League of Nations calling for international regulation of slaughtering methods.

In rejecting the petition, the Dutch Foreign Minister declared that he could not undertake anything of this nature.

Polish Jews to Play Role in Red Cross

WARSAW, May 31—For the first time in the history of Poland, Jews are participating in the Polish Red Cross.

A Red Cross committee was formed here today with important Jewish organizations invited to cooperate.

Tel Aviv Lifeguards Threaten to Strike

TEL AVIV, May 31—While a new heat wave brought thousands of bathers to the beaches here, the municipal lifeguards today announced that they would declare a strike if their wages are not immediately increased.

The threat is creating great consternation among the population. Efforts are being made to reach a compromise between the lifeguards and the municipality in order to allay the concern of the bathers. The beaches in Tel Aviv are on the shores of the Mediterranean Sea.

Reich Zionists Will Attend World Parley

Boycott Talk Kept Unit Away from Last Congress

BERLIN, May 31—The Zionist Federation of Germany which did not participate in the last Zionist Congress because of the Hitler regime, announces today that it will have a strong delegation at the next Zionist Congress which opens in Lucerne August 27.

This announcement is interpreted as an indication that the Nazi authorities have no objection to contact between Zionists in Germany and Zionists abroad. One of the reasons why the Zionists in Germany refrained from sending a delegation to the last Zionist Congress was that they did not want to be accused of maintaining contact with Jews abroad.

Another reason why the Zionist Federation of Germany was not represented at the last Congress was the fact that discussion of whether or not to support the boycott of German goods in different countries was to be a feature of the session. Now that it is clear that the Zionist Organization has nothing to do with the anti-Nazi boycott and that the barter agreement between Germany and Palestine is not opposed by the Zionists, the leaders of the Zionist movement in Germany have been given to understand that they have nothing to fear if they participate in the next Congress in Lucerne.

Reich Moves To Purge Citizen Lists

New Drive Aimed at Non- 'Aryans' Naturalized After War

BERLIN, May 31—The Nazi government today started the withdrawal of citizenship from non-Aryans naturalized after the war.

Hitherto the withdrawal of naturalization was applied to Jews only. Today sixteen non-Jews who were not pure "Aryans" also had their citizenship cancelled on the ground that they obtained it after the war.

The cancellation of citizenship of non-Jews who are considered of Jewish descent, started in Berlin but will be spread systematically throughout the country. An announcement from Mannheim today reports that in the nearby city of Ludwigshafen, the authorities started an investigation into the records of all non-Jews who are considered non-Aryans, in order to establish when they obtained their naturalization.

Seek Migration Advice

More than 100,000 Jews in Germany have applied for advice and information as to how to leave the country, it was announced here at a meeting of the administrative committee of the Hilfsverein for German Jews. The meeting was presided over by Max M. Warburg.

Jews from Germany have emigrated during the last two years to about thirty countries, it was reported at the meeting.

Many emigrants have succeeded, after a comparatively short time, in establishing themselves in the new lands and are now already in a position to bring over their relatives to join them.

More than 11,000 Jews were enabled to emigrate from Germany by the financial assistance of the Hilfsverein, it was reported at the meeting.

Get Used to Idea, Nazi Paper Tells Jews

Britain Asked to Take Action To Spur Exports to Hungary

LONDON, May 31—The refusal of the Hungarian government to permit the import of Palestine oranges was under consideration today in the Colonial Office, after an inquiry made last week in the House of Commons.

It was established that Hungary exported to Palestine last year goods valued at over \$600,000 and in return purchased goods and material from Palestine valued at about \$5,000.

"The Hungarian government must be asked to withdraw its present refusal to permit the importation of Palestine oranges into Hungary," Sir Wilfrid Sugden informed Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister.

Sir Philip, who was present at the meeting in the Colonial Office, declared that he was aware of the trade situation and of the difficulties arising out of the import and exchange restrictions in operation in Hungary.

Brith Abraham Parley to Seek Peace in Jewish Ranks Here

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 31—The question of Jewish unity in America will be discussed at the forty-eighth annual convention of the Independent Order Brith Abraham opening here Sunday in the presence of 1,200 delegates.

The convention will continue for three days and will be presided over by Max Silverstein, Grand Master of the order. One of the recommendations which Mr. Silverstein will make in his Grand Master's message will be that "the Order should endeavor to make peace between the American Jewish Congress and the American Jewish Committee and other national Jewish organizations."

The administration of the society, one of the largest in the world, will report a substantial decrease in membership. It is estimated that the order has lost more than 23,000 members due to internal dissension and to the present economic depression. The total membership is estimated at about 70,000, while at one time it had 214,000 on its rolls.

Capital Comment

WASHINGTON.

THE House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization has recommended the enactment of a law which would make it possible for the Federal government to exclude and deport aliens who are Fascists, Nazis or Communists. The measure recommended was introduced by Representative Martin Dies of Texas, a member of the committee. The bill is a direct outgrowth of un-American activities conducted during the last year.

It is pointed out that the necessity for enactment of this bill arises from the lack of definite legislative provision for the exclusion or deportation of Fascists, Nazis or Communists, as such, under existing Federal law. The act of October 16, 1918, as amended by the act of June 5, 1920, is the present basic act of Congress under which deportation proceedings are now instituted against aliens who are Communists. The application of this law in such cases is predicated upon court decisions, now effective as law, which have held that certain well-known groups are organizations—the principles, beliefs and activities of which are of such character as to class members thereof within the purview of the provisions of these basic acts of Congress.

IT is interesting to note that the acts of 1918 and 1920 centered around the anarchistic idea of "opposition to all organized government." On that basis alone Communist, Nazi, or Fascist aliens differ in that while they may be imbued with opposition to non-Communist government or opposition to non-Fascist governments, they are not opposed to all organized government, according to the House Committee on Immigration.

The committee points out that the decided differentiation of the subversive activities dominating anarchists, Communists, and Fascists rendered necessary the enactment by Congress of a bill similar to the Dies bill in order to enable the Federal government's immigration and naturalization authorities to have a statute to guide them in handling cases of Communists, Nazis, and Fascists.

* * *

WHILE the bill incorporates drastic language in defining the three elements because of the changed character of their subversive activities as carried on by certain classes of aliens, some legislative protection has been written into the measure as a safeguard for aliens who become the victims of the subtle methods by which these subversive groups carry on their activities. In this protective provision, it is stated that "No alien shall be held to be a Communist or Fascist under the provisions of this act if he shall prove that he became a member of such organization on account of fear, duress, compulsion, misrepresentation, or fraud."

The introduction of this safeguard places the burden upon the alien under investigation to prove the nefarious circumstances that resulted in his affiliation and membership which contributed to his detention for observation under this act by immigration officials.

THE House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization has recommended to the House that the Dies bill be enacted into law. This measure is one of several others introduced by various members of Congress following the revelations of the committee investigating un-American activities which was headed by Representative John W. McCormack of Massachusetts.

In recommending this type of legislation to curb subversive activities in the United States, the immigration committee emphasizes that it is now quite generally conceded that insofar as the United States is concerned, "our immigration question is a domestic question," and therefore Congress is within its province when it declares that, as such, alien Communists, Nazis, or Fascists shall be subject to deportation or exclusion from the United States. The committee further emphasized that "current events and current knowledge concerning subversive activities of these classes of aliens convinces the committee that this bill should be enacted at the earliest possible opportunity."

AS reported to the House, the Dies bill is one of the most drastic anti-alien measures reported out for action during this session of Congress. Many leading national organizations, and groups of individuals have protested legislation of this kind on the ground that it endangers free speech and the free press.

The immigration committee, however, points out that the Dies bill does not affect any alien who, or the alien members of any organization which, although subscribing to the doctrine of a system of common ownership of property and the abolition of private property or the common ownership of the means of production, abstains from advising, advocating, or expressing belief in the establishment of such a doctrine, or doctrines, in the United States "through the use of force and violence or other methods incompatible with our constitutional procedure."

MEMBERS of the immigration committee are hopeful that the House will consider the Dies bill within the next couple of weeks. In the meantime, many members of Congress are studying the proposal and trying to determine just what it means.

Meanwhile, it may be expected that private organizations which favor the Dies bill will conduct a lobby in order to obtain its passage. Such a bill should not be enacted into law without mature thought and full consideration of its consequences. Representatives in Congress should consider every angle involved before they act on this far-reaching bill.

Results of Plebiscite by Revisionists to Be Known Monday

A plebiscite to decide whether the Zionist Revisionists should create an independent Zionist Organization will be held today (Sunday) among the Zionist Revisionists throughout the United States and Canada.

Holders of the Revisionist Shekel, known as the Dinar, will be entitled to vote in the plebiscite.

In New York voting will start at noon and will last until six o'clock in the evening. The polls are located in the White and Blue Center at 122 Second Avenue.

The Zionist Revisionist Organization of America has issued an appeal to all Revisionists in the United States and Canada to make the plebiscite as complete as possible. Polls have been placed in every American city for the voting on Sunday. It is expected that the results of the plebiscite will be announced on Monday.

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Revery at a Tomb

LAST week I stood beside the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. How wise they were who chose that hill above the Potomac for his final resting-place. The open wind-swept hill is so much more fitting for a soldier's grave than the stuffy gloom of Westminster Abbey or the thoroughfare for motor traffic on the Champs Elysee. In Arlington he lies under the wide and starry sky, surrounded only by the nation's honored dead. His simple, handsome tomb stands before a marble amphitheater of chaste beauty, a memorial to all who have died in their country's service. It faces the nation's capital, which rises like a fairy city beyond the river.

As I stood beside the tomb and watched the bayoneted guard march back and forth in mock tribute to the dead, I wondered whether the Unknown Soldier had been a Jew. Why not? Had not thousands of Jews given their lives for their country in the last holocaust? I knew many of them personally. They trained with me in Plattsburg Barracks in the early Summer of 1918, and then embarked on the long journey from which they did not return. Some were ordinary fellows but full of the love of life, and never really believed they would be killed.

Then there were the gifted men who were touched by the war's idealism and gladly gave their lives in sacrifice. Like David Hochstein. He was the outstanding American-born violinist. A marvelous career of glory, wealth and artistic satisfaction lay before him. Then came the war. For him it became a holy cause. The old evil world had to be destroyed and a shining new one erected on its ruins. He would not take advantage of his justified exemption from the military draft. Nor would he accept an offer to play in a regimental band, which would have kept him behind the lines and free from danger. It was a good fight and he wanted to be in it. . . . He was killed in action shortly before the war ended.

PERHAPS the Unknown Soldier was my Plattsburg bunk-mate, Morton Cohen. He was a budding poet. His verses were tender, romantic and almost feminine in their sensitiveness. He was the very last person who should have gone to war. But his spirit had been stirred by the President's flaming phrases. He truly believed it was a war to end war, a crusade to make the world safe for democracy.

I remember the first day we marched together on to the drill field for bayonet practice. Our instructor was a British officer, just returned from the front. With joking curses he aroused us to an insane fury against the strawummies he was teaching us to attack as Germans. He pointed out the vulnerable parts of the human body, where a thrust meant a sure kill.

"Don't stick the Hun in the eye," he cautioned, "for if you do, you may get a death grip on the throat and you will lose it!" I looked at Morton and he looked back at me, disturbed but resolute. That evening we went for a long walk. I asked him whether he had realized before that war was so evil that in it a piece of steel becomes more precious than a human life. He admitted he had never thought of it this way but felt none the less that the good to be accomplished more than justified the evil means that had to be employed. Bloodshed and suffering are the price we pay for humanity's progress," he maintained. "If we can save the world from tyranny and war, it will justify anything."

Morton's brave young life was ended out by poison gas at the Somme. If it is he who rests beneath that tomb at Arlington, I am grateful he does not see the light of this day, does not know that the war which destroyed him also destroyed the ideals for which he died.

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Hits Solicitation of Olympics Funds

Money Will Help to Build Barracks for Hitler Army, Is Warning of Untermyer

The seventy-two athletic organizations which comprise the American Olympic Association were warned Friday in a letter from Samuel Untermyer that they will place themselves "in the position of soliciting funds to pay for new barracks for the Hitler army" if they ask contributions to send American athletes to next year's Berlin games.

The letter said the contributions are intended, in part, to defray the cost of the Olympic buildings and declared these structures "have been constructed by conscript labor and have been pledged to the Reichswehr following the games."

Writing as the president of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League to Champion Human Rights, Untermyer concluded:

"Permit me to say that we cannot conceive of any self-respecting man . . . entering Germany or participating in these games on German soil so long as the persecutions that are being constantly intensified against Catholics, Protestants and Jews, organized labor and Masons, continue."

League Unions to Air Reich-Jewish Issue

A WEEK'S EVENTS IN REVIEW

STANLEY BALDWIN

The resignation of Premier
Ramsay MacDonald, and the ele-
vation of Stanley Baldwin to suc-
ceed him, will take place at the
end of this week.

This is considered a certainty,
and in connection with this
change, predictions are being
made that Malcolm MacDonald,
the son of the Premier, will be
appointed Colonial Secretary to
replace Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister.

Although the Jews would like
to see the young MacDonald in
the position of Secretary for the
Colonies, it is, I believe, safe to
say that the chances for the
Premier's son to obtain this posi-
tion are very slim. Age plays a
very important role in British
politics, and the appointment of
Malcolm MacDonald as member
of the British Cabinet would
meet strong opposition because
of his youthfulness.

Appointment Seen Pro-Jewish Step

The appointment of Malcolm
MacDonald as Colonial Secretary,
if it became a fact, would turn
over a new leaf in British-Jewish
relations, as this would be defi-
nitely interpreted as a pro-Jew-
ish step. The young MacDonald
is known to be favorably inclined
toward Zionist work. He was re-
sponsible for the famous "Mac-
Donald letter" which came as a
modification of the White Book
and the Shaw Report, against
which the Jews all over the world
protested. He is in constant
touch with Jewish leaders in
England and is deeply interested
in the problems affecting the up-
building of a Jewish National
Home in Palestine.

The appointment of young Mac-
Donald as Colonial Secretary
would serve as the best assur-
ance that the projected establish-
ment of a Legislative Council in
Palestine will not take place.
The danger of establishing a Leg-
islative Council is still imminent
now, under Cunliffe-Lister. It
may come up immediately after
the next session of the Mandates
Commission this month. It may
be postponed for a long time,
however, if young MacDonald re-
places Cunliffe-Lister.

Mandates Body Will Not Consider Council

The session of the Mandates
Commission of the League of
Nations which opens this week
in Geneva will not deal directly
with the question of establish-
ing the much feared Legislative
Council. References to this ques-
tion are made, however, in the
report which the Palestine gov-
ernment submitted to the ses-
sion.

Ambitious to establish the Leg-
islative Council in Palestine be-
fore this term as High Commis-
sioner expires, Sir Arthur Wau-
chope makes it clear that the
Arab-Jewish relations in Pales-
tine can, in his opinion, greatly
benefit by the establishment of
such a Council, which should
consist of representatives of the
Jews, Arabs and British officials.

Besides the report of the Pal-
estine government, the present
session of the Mandates Commis-
sion will also have in its posses-
sion a report of the Jewish
Agency. It is in the latter that
Jewish views on the present
situation in Palestine are ex-
pressed.

The Mandates Commission at
its present meeting will probably
have no discussion at all on Pal-
estine. It will accept the report
of the Palestine government
without question and with a vote
of confidence.

A point of interest at the ses-
sion of the Mandates Commission
may be the petition submitted by

the Zionist Revisionists of Pales-
tine asking that Palestine be pro-
claimed as a Jewish State. Such
a petition was already submitted
to the Revisionists last year, and
was rejected by the Mandates
Commission. The Commission ex-
plained that the Mandate on Pal-
estine provides only for "the es-
tablishment of a Jewish National
Home," and that there is a dif-
ference between a Jewish State
and a Jewish National Home.

Defeated once before the Re-
visionists are now coming again
to Geneva with the same demand
for a Jewish State. Their peti-
tion will no doubt be rejected by
the Mandates Commission now
just as it was last year. It seems,
however, that the Revisionists
have made up their minds to ap-
pear at every session of the Man-
dates Commission with this peti-
tion, until the members of the
Commission acquire a funda-
mental knowledge of the Revi-
sionists' claims.

Good and Bad Radio Bills

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin:

Recently I have listened to some
very excellent Jewish radio pro-
grams, which included some really
beautiful singing of Russian songs,
among other things. It is quite a
welcome change from those which
I had been accustomed to hear and
which I used to avoid as a plague.
What I would like to know is,
how can we stimulate the good
Jewish programs and weed out the
bad? I can think of no worse
propaganda than the bad ones, and
of no more excellent propaganda
than the good ones.

I believe the best way is this:

'Jewish Season' At Geneva

The "Jewish season" in Geneva
which usually starts with the ses-
sion of the Mandates Commis-
sion, began this time a week
earlier with the Jewish petition
to the League of Nations against
the Danzig Nazi administration.
This petition, which came up last
week, culminated in a victory for
the Jews. The president of the
Danzig Senate, who appeared be-
fore the Council of the League
of Nations, admitted that the
Jewish position in Danzig has be-
come worse since the Nazis came
into power in the Free City. He
agreed that a special committee
appointed by the League should
investigate to what extent the
of the Free City is violating the
constitution of Danzig by anti-
Jewish legislation.

Although the results of this
committee's investigations will not
be reported until the September
session of the League Council, it
is assumed that the Nazi-con-
trolled Senate of Danzig will now
be more careful in its anti-Jew-
ish policy. Still under the con-
trol of the League of Nations,
the Danzig Senate, though domi-
nated by a Nazi majority, will
not want to expose itself to a
more rigid control by the League
because of the 8,000 Jews resid-
ing in Danzig. The anti-Jewish
policy in Danzig may therefore
be alleviated as a result of the
Jewish petition.

The Nazi Rioting In Bavaria

Defeated in Danzig, the Nazis
this week carried out a number
of anti-Jewish outbreaks in Ba-
varia which culminated in riots
in Munich. Jewish stores in
Munich were forced to close by
Nazi pickets who were organized
in the City Hall by local officials
and who indulged in open fights
with the local Catholic popula-
tion which tried to patronize the
Jewish stores in defiance of the
pickets. The anti-Jewish riots in
Munich assumed such a menac-

ing character that a great num-
ber of Jews were considering
leaving the city. The repercus-
sions which the riots produced
abroad were such that Hitler
himself ordered an investigation.

As a result of Hitler's personal
order, the Bavarian Minister of
Interior, Adolf Wagner, arrested
a number of ringleaders of the
Nazi pickets, and issued a com-
munique in which he blamed ex-
pelled Nazi members for the
riots. In his communique, the
Minister carefully avoided men-
tioning that he himself congrat-
ulated the Nazi pickets for their
"good piece of work" a day be-
fore the order from Hitler ar-
rived. Most of the pickets were
not criminals, as the Nazi Min-
ister asserted, but students of the
local university who were well
organized by State officials to
picket Jewish stores and smash
Jewish windows.

Munich a Link

In Anti-Jewish Events

The Munich riots against Jews
were only a link in the chain of
anti-Jewish events which con-
tinued to take place throughout
Germany last week, and which
included also the liquidation
of the largest Jewish agricul-
tural settlement in Gross Gaglow,
near Berlin, where Jews were
trained for farm work.

Ambitious to acquire colonies,
the Nazi government this week
sent out its Ambassador in
Egypt for a trip throughout the
entire Near East. The Nazi Am-
bassador will visit all the coun-
tries in Arabia and will go as far
as Persia and Afghanistan, which
are situated on the frontier of
the Asiatic part of Soviet Russia.

The importance which the Nazi
government attaches to this trip
can be seen from the fact that
the Ambassador, after complet-
ing his tour, will immediately
have to report to Berlin in per-
son. His voyage is considered as
a reconnaissance trip to establish
whether Germany can find a foot-
hold in Arabia, just as Italy has
now in Ethiopia.

Nazis Held to Blame For Lodz Outbreaks

The anti-Jewish Nazi move-
ment in Germany is held respon-
sible also for a bloody outbreak
which took place this week in
Lodz, Poland, at a session of the
Municipal Council in that city.
It was sufficient for one of the
councillors to make a remark
against the Nazi spirit, when
chairs and inkwells began to fly
from the side where the anti-
Semitic members of the National
Democratic Party have their
seats. A number of municipal
councillors were seriously in-
jured, others slightly, in the fight.

The bloody clash in Lodz may
lead to the liquidation of the
present Municipal Council by the
central authorities. An investiga-
tion has been started by the
State's Attorney, the outcome of
which may lead to the imprison-
ment of those guilty of starting
the riot.

An important event this week
was the decision in Rumania to
abolish the university autonomy
for all universities in the coun-
try, in order to be able to bring
police into university grounds in
time of anti-Jewish disturbances.

This decision was adopted at a
joint conference of rectors of the
universities with representatives
of the government. The govern-
ment seems anxious not to have
any anti-Jewish disturbances re-
peated in the universities, but it
does not seem so anxious to
hamper the anti-Jewish propa-
ganda in the Rumanian press,
despite the fact that the present
martial law in the country pro-
hibits anti-racial propaganda.

R. D. B. Speaks

LONDON.

THE Bänderlog people of Germany, otherwise Nazis who are residuary legatees of Kipling's tree-top jumpers, have decided that it would be an excellent move to inaugurate a nice comfortable *entente cordiale* between the Nazis and the unsuspecting British. So they have started an Anglo-German Friendship Society which they hope will cause Britons at once to forget all the stupidities, the churlish international manners and the brutalities committed with impunity by the world's clumsiest people.

We all know, of course, that the Germans are, as they have always been, noted for their hopeless failure in understanding the psychology of other peoples but it is somewhat surprising to find that stupid though they are, they cannot understand why the majority of Englishmen speak of them with derision. It would perhaps be useful for the press director of the Camarilla to study one of Germany's old aphorisms and explain it to his duped and liberty-deprived German victims.

IT IS true in Germany as elsewhere that "Wer einmal luegt den glaubt Man nicht und esenn er auch die Wahrheit spricht." I would like to take liberties with this aphorism by quoting it thus: "Once a liar always a liar."

Actually translated it says, "He who lies once is not again believed even though he speaks the truth."

Now among the virtues and the vices of the English, the Heaven-born virtue of truth-telling is cherished above all things. Children from infancy up are dragooned with the necessity for telling the truth in all conditions. Remember the old saying that has always been current in the outlying ends of the earth: "An Englishman's word is his Bond!" And the Englishman, though he may be innately given to mental exaggeration, fibbing, romancing, prevarication in thought but seldom in deed, remembers the props of his national up-bringing and makes Truth his shibboleth.

HE HAS now discovered that the foundations of human diplomacy, statesmanship and public dealing rest on falsehoods, and on "scraps of paper" that may be thrown into the fire with impunity whenever it may omit Teutonic policy.

Wherefore the slow-thinking, once bit twice shy, Briton looks with suspicion on any overtures that may be preferred in the direction of amicability.

England has not yet forgotten the effort to pull the wool over the eyes of the astute Sir John Simon, when the "peace loving" Herr Hitler played the now familiar Siren song to be followed a couple of days later by the publication of the German conscription disclosures.

ENGLAND still awaits Herr Hitler's withdrawal of his warlike, bloodthirsty sentiments expressed in his fiery book. He has made many superficial peace statements and will make many more for outside consumption but he has not

yet made a speech or written a line to say that his views as to overcoming your neighbor with a sharp sword have changed.

Nor has the delectable Herr Goebbels, who swashbuckles with a fountain pen, aided his hero in this direction. Perhaps it is just as well, for if Hitler recanted on the sharp sword phrases as Goebbels wrote some characteristic gibberish to that effect, no one in England, not even the envious Sir Tom Mosley, would believe him. You see, "wer einmal luegt," etc.

AND now on top of all this, Herr Goebbels and the Gargantuan General, his rival, have designed this happy Lieber Fest with the English; and who is it, do you think, has been selected to be the president of the London end of this affair? I am told that some of the Yunker gentlemen of the Nazi Foreign Office who, parenthetically, are not Nazis at all, but just simple Yunkers in disguise, are laughing up their sleeves as they laugh over so many other Nazi gaffers whenever they feel sure that they are not watched.

They are laughing because they know that their chiefs do not know, that the London president of the Joy Fest is none other than my old friend and comrade, Lord Mount Temple, a most exemplary public man, a true British patriot, a great gentleman and the father of Lady Louis Mountbatten and the Hon. Mrs. Cunningham Reid, wife of a British M.P.

IS THERE anything to laugh at in this recital of qualifications of which any of us would be proud? Yes, there is something. Lord Mount Temple's deceased wife, the mother of the two ladies mentioned above, was the daughter of Sir Ernest Cassel, the eminent Anglo-German Jewish financier!

Lady Louis Mountbatten is married to the scion of a once German princely family, the Battenbergs—royalty on both sides, yet, under the ruling of the Hitler camarilla, Lady Louis would not be *Hoffuehig*

in Germany No Jews need apply! On her husband's side, German, Bulgarian, Russian, royalty; on her father's side immediate descent from Lord Dhaflesburn, Lord Melbourne, Lord Palmerston—great names in British history.

But her mother's father was the Right Hon. Sir Ernest Cassel, party Councillor, who has the proud privilege of being a Jew. He was a great financier and he gave away vast sums in charity.

WE ARE all waiting with deep interest for the scene when the Gargantuan General and the Gregarious Goebbels give a party to Lord Mountbatten and his inseparable non-Aryan daughter!

Meanwhile the sawdust figures of the new pagan cult of Germany, the Wotuns and Siegfrieds and Tristans with their sonorous and primal savagery, are leading what is left of Germany straight behind the walls of the world's lunatic asylum. It seems almost pathetic to have to apply a few more turns to the international boycott screw; but that, I fear, is the only way to cause them to think seriously. The symbolism of the "new religion" and the antics of its priests leave open no other course; for the self-styled "Aryan" has ever only seen sense through his pockets.

Dominion War Against Libel Spread Widely

Congress Sets Up Bodies To Fight Defamation In 64 Communities

(Special to the J.D.B.)
MONTREAL, Que., May 31—Sixty-four committees to combat defamation have been organized by the Canadian Jewish Congress, a report on the first year's activities disclosed today.

A total of 268 defamation cases has been handled, some of which were considered of historic importance. Cases taken care of during February, March and April of this year numbered 133.

The report told of "encouraging progress" in the fight against employment discrimination.

"A number of important employers of labor have reinstated a large number of Jewish workers as a result of our meditative intervention," the account said.

The boycott against Nazi Germany was revealed to be encountering difficulties, partially because of the government's lax marking regulations for imported goods. Another reason why the boycott is not going as well as desired, the report said, is that "our boycott committee is only permitted to exert moral pressure and persuasion against Jews who persist in boycott violations."

Campaigns for the relief of stricken Jewry have been conducted in forty-seven communities after contact was established with 215 localities.

"The educational work done in this respect cannot be exceeded," the report said.

Vote to Broaden Citizenship Plan

B'nai B'rith Delegates Want More Extensive Program Of Americanization

HAZLETON, Pa., May 31—Extension of the Americanization program of B'nai B'rith was voted at the annual convention of District Grand Lodge No. 2, held here this week.

The district also approved a large appropriation to its youth movement and the Hillel Foundation and decided to inaugurate a foundation at Pennsylvania State College.

Pittsburgh was selected for the 1936 parley. About 600 delegates attended the convention here.

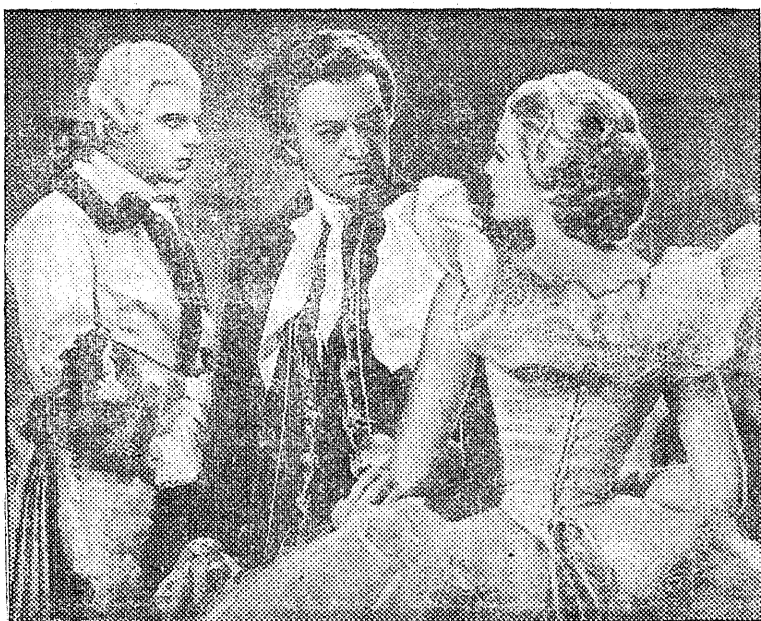

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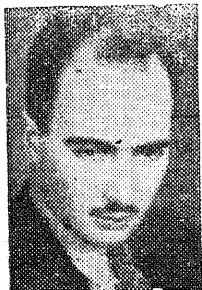
In the Book and Literary World

The New Golding Novel

THE CAMBERWELL BEAUTY. By LOUIS GOLDING. 312 pp. New York: Farrar & Rinehart. \$2.50.
TORTILLA FLAT. By JOHN STEINBECK. 317 pp. New York: Covici-Friede. \$2.50.

MR. GOLDING'S imagination shows sign of temporary exhaustion. In order to put together his latest novel he has been forced to employ a curious agglomeration of material which not even his experience and craftsmanship have been able to master. His story starts in London, in the home of Mr. Peveril, a gentle soul who has retired from law practice to indulge his passion for butterflies and his paternal interest in the servants of his friends. So far so good. Peveril is essentially one of those creations whereby Mr. Golding has earned comparison with Dickens. Instead of advancing into the affairs of the Chiswick Green servants' quarters, however, we are snapped to far-off Sicily.

It seems that one of the girls who once frequented Mr. Peveril's backstairs salons married a young man of good family and went to Syracuse on her honeymoon. There her husband became interested in black magic and spiritualism, and the couple went to live in the Collegium Artium Mysticarum, run by one Machatan. Dire events apparently followed. The young man died under suspicious circumstances, and the girl, after finding some trouble in escaping, hurried back to appeal to the paternal Mr. Peveril to avenge her husband, if indeed he had been murdered.

MR. PEVERIL, who is of course unable to resist such an appeal, assembles a fantastic group of assistants to sleuths to take with him to Sicily. There is the refined young Leslie, an Oxford undergraduate who knew the dead man; there is brawny Alf Tarleton, the kennel-man; there is frail old Mrs. Granton, who collected china since her husband's death, and Lizzie, her maid. The adventurers arrive in Syracuse and soon uncover a hot trail of black magic; but before

they can follow down their clues, Alf and Leslie are kidnapped by the Mafia. It seems that Mussolini's attempt to stamp out secret societies stirred Mr. Golding, especially in the final phases of a semi-military campaign against the mountain nests. He has the Mafia kidnap our two heroes not for profit, but as a gesture against Mussolini. So here we have a plot compounded of black magic, butterfly collecting, the adventures of the Mafia, and international politics. Mr. Golding is very learned indeed in his references, but it would be far better all around if he kept his scholarly researches out of his novels. The London, especially the Jewish inhabitants of London, handled so well by him in the past is certainly far more fertile soil for him than the schemes of Machatan (who turns out to be a thrifty cockney skilled only in draining full purses of idle American females) or the Mafia.

IN RECENT months there has not been a novel so unanimously and freely praised by the critics as "Tortilla Flat." John Steinbeck's work has been known to the critics for some time, but only now does he appear to have hit his stride. He is a rare phenomenon—a born writer who with the fewest of strikes, lightly and delicately, can produce from his pen charming, glowing utterly real and yet utterly impossible characters. It is hard to analyze the unique charm of this book. It is filled with laughter and tears and music and warmth and a gargantuan drinking of wine. It is the story of Danny and of Danny's friends and of Danny's house. Danny was a *paisano*, that is, a native of California whose ancestry includes most Mediterranean

and some American Indian strains and whose means of support are all invisible. The *paisanos* work very hard indeed in order to avoid working at all. They will put in days of labor to steal a jug of wine, when they could much more easily have earned it honestly; they sleep under bushes, their few garments seem to drop from the sky, and they never manage actually to starve. As for a woman's smile, well, God made the women of Monterey complaisant—especially if one had a jug of cooled win under one's arm.

Danny, unburdened with possessions, inherits two houses. This made him a great man in Tortilla Flat, the shantytown of Monterey. But the worry and fret of his property becomes Danny's undoing. He tries to palm off one house on his friend Pilon, but Pilon insists on owing him rent—another worry. It is a great day when the first house burns to the ground. Pilon moves with Danny into the second. They gather to them two more *paisanos*. I cannot begin to suggest the strange adventures, the mystic experiences, the romantic adventures and in the end, the gentle sorrow which come to the quartet. And to do so would be to spoil the freshness and uniqueness of Mr. Steinbeck's book.

Precious Bible Shown In Cincinnati Exhibit

CINCINNATI, May 31—Among the rare bookss, manuscripts and ceremonial objects being displayed by the Hebrew Union College at the Municipal and Industrial Exposition is a page from the Gutenberg Bible printed in Mainz, Germany, 1450-55; the first dated Latin edition of the Bible, published in Augsburg in 1470, and a Dutch silver ark of the Torah from the eighteenth-century.

The London Book Scene

A LONDONER'S literary fare these days is strikingly similar to that offered in New York. Most of the recent books by Jewish authors or on Jewish themes have been, or are about to be published in New York.

Michael Matveev's searing account of a Russian-Jewish refugee family in Rumania, published here by Cassell as "Bitter Draught," received literary notice strikingly similar to that accorded it in America where it appeared as "Weep Not for the Dead."

Gertrude von le Fort's sympathetic story of "The Pope from the Ghetto," which Sheed and Ward brought out in New York and London, received attention here as an engrossing study of an interesting day and life.

Ruth Feiner's Novel

A first novel by a young German-Jewish refugee, Ruth Feiner, who now lives in England, "Cat Across the Path," (Harrap) attracted much attention and the young novelist, whose book was snapped up by the book-of-the-month groups, is being hailed as a second Vicki Baum. The novel is not on a Jewish theme but revolves around two musicians, one wealthy, the other poor, and the beautiful girl with whose life those of the two musicians are closely interwoven. I understand that Lippincott will bring this book out in New York soon.

Another first novel that attracted some niterest here was "Waters of Babylon," a story of intermarriage. It is by Stephen Ronley, a former newspaperman previously best known for his magazine short stories. Ronley, so it happens, is one of those rare specimens, a convert to Judaism, and is married to the daughter of an orthodox family. "Waters of Babylon," however, he assures me, is not autobiographical in any sense. It deals with the romance of a beautiful Jewish girl from a Whitechapel tenement, the talented son of a prosperous English family, their marriage, happiness and the tragedy of his sudden death. The Whitechapel scenes in the book are especially well done.

Other Fiction

Other recent fiction includes Miss G. B. Stern's "Shining and Free," which, for some reason or other, did not arouse the customary excitement usually associated with Miss Stern's books, and Louis Golding's "The Camberwell Beauty," in which the pugilist-traveller-author forgets Magnolia Street and reveals a new technique. The former was published in America. The latter, I have no doubt, will be very shortly.

Sir Herbert Samuel, Liberal statesman and Jewish leader, is revealed as a philosopher of no mean distinction in "Practical Ethics," brought out by Thornton Buterworth in the Home University series. C. E. M. Joad, writing in the New Statesman and Nation, finds a "Greek flavor" about it and wonders "whether the message of this sane and temperate book is likely to make itself heard amid the shouting voices of the age."

Joseph Roth's "Anti-Christ," which has been reviewed in The Bulletin's pages, put the critics here at odds. One of them found that the anti-Christ he happened not to like.

2 Historical Works

Two historical studies of especial Jewish interest are F. E. Baily's "Lady Beaconsfield and Her Times," (Hutchinson) and Lucy Cohen's "Lady de Rothschild and Her Daughters, 1821-1931," (John Murray). Of these, more later. One might also call "Fifty Years of International Socialism," by M. Beer (Allen and Unwin) history because of the years' it spans. It is the

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Plan to Build Dental Clinic On Mt. Scopus

J.N.F. to Supply Land; Vienna Professor is Named Director

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, May 31—The first Dental Institute in Palestine will be established in Jerusalem, it was announced today by the Palestine Association of Dentists.

The Institute will be built on Mt. Scopus, near the Hebrew University. Land for the clinic will be assigned by the Jewish National Fund. An internationally known professor from Vienna, whose name has not been disclosed, will be the director.

The main purpose of the Institute is to help dentists become more accomplished in their profession. A campaign will be started among Jewish dentists in Palestine and abroad in order to raise a fund of \$50,000 for establishment of the Institute.

Of the 7,600 immigration certificates received by the Jewish Agency from the Palestine government for the next six months, 4,283 have been assigned for "chalutzim" and unskilled laborers, Isaac Gruenbaum, member of the Jewish Agency Executive and head of the Immigration Department, announced at a press conference yesterday.

Of the remainder, 917 were assigned for skilled workers and 600 for workers whose applications were made by individual Palestine industrialists. A total of 1,750 certificates was assigned for relatives of Palestine residents. Mr. Gruenbaum disclosed that no less than 15,000 applications of Pales-

Delegates at Coney Parley To Discuss Ways to Aid Brethren Overseas

The third annual convention of the Association of Hungarian Jews will be held July 21 at the Half Moon Hotel, Coney Island, it was announced Friday.

Discussions will be conducted on vital problems affecting the Jewish population of Hungary and other European countries where Jews are in distress.

According to Dr. Max Krauss, president, the organization has passed the 600 mark in membership and has become affiliated with the American Jewish Congress. Election of officers will also be on the order of business for the convention.

Parents Criticized For 'Misdirection'

Professor Blames Them for Plight of Collegians; 'About-Face' Urged

(Special to the J.D.B.)

CINCINNATI, May 31—"Victims of their parents' misdirection"—that is how young Jewish college graduates and undergraduates are described by Prof. Selig Perlman in an interview in the June issue of the B'nai B'rith Magazine.

They have been lulled to a sense of security by the prosperity era in which they were reared, says Prof. Perlman, who teaches labor prob-

lems at the University of Wisconsin. Launching their careers in a world economically unable to absorb them, they become disillusioned and frequently drift toward communism.

"There should be more conscious group planning and an about face toward new economic lines of endeavor, such as manual labor and farming," the professor recommends. "It should be understood that the Jewish community is, in itself, unable to support Jewish professional men."

The purpose of the gathering, as disclosed Friday, is to formulate the platform of the party for the elections to the nineteenth World Zionist Congress, which is to be convoked in Switzerland next August. A number of delegates from cities outside New York are expected.

Jacob de Haas is to deliver an address on "The Political Situation in Zionism," while Prof. Chaim Tchernovitz will discuss "The Jewish State Party and the Nineteenth Zionist Congress." Julius L. Fishbach will speak on "Jewish Youth Problems in America."
