Latvia Zionists To Be Absent From Lucerne

Ban on Political Parties Precludes Election of Congress Delegates

The order prohibiting the exist ence of political parties in Latvia, including the Zionist Organization, is responsible for this situation. With the Zionist party no longer existing officially in the country, no elections can be held here for the Nineteenth Congress and hence no representatives can be sent.

137,000 Jews Found Engaged in Soviet Industries There

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) MOSCOW, June 4—There ow 137,000 Jewish workers ployed in Soviet industries in the Ukraine, the results of a survey made public today disclose.

The survey discloses that the Jewish workers in the Ukraine con stitute now about ten per cent of the total number of workers there. The census of 1926 showed only about 57,000 Jewish laborers in the Illergine

In White Russia Jewish workers were found to total 32,000 of the entire 131,000. In 1926 their number was 13,400.

Sterilization Of All Jews, Is Nazi Aim

Signs Posted in Bavaria Signal Opening of New Drive

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN June 4-A campaign for the sterilization of the Jews in Ger-many was started today throughout the country as part of the general anti-Jewish drive being conducted in the Reich.

Thousands of posters, reading "Sterilize the Jews," have been mounted in conspicuous places in Bavaria and in other provinces where the anti-Jewish propaganda is conducted more severely than in Berlin and in cities where the Nazis fear foreign observers Wives of Jews Included

The professor is described as a
'well-known anthropologist" and

The article, which is published in the Westphaelischer Landeszeitung carries the title, "Jewish Para-sites." Prof. Campbell declares in his article that the Jews have not passed the Nomadic stage. Unlike Gypsies, he asserts, they always try to profit from the rights given to them as guests in the countries where they reside.

"These parasites," the article continues, "try to destroy social in-stitutions and moral and religious ideas through racial mixture their hosts."

Refugee Work in France

= By a J.T.A. Correspondent ==

The great need for funds with which to diminish privation and prevent actual starvation among the helpless refugees from the German terror now in France, is described by Edith M. Pyc, of the Society of Friends (Quakers), who has been most active in relief assistance work.

"The need assistance work. hem. Application has been made in Parls under the German Emergency Committee does not dimingency Committee does not diministall," she declares in a report to

The Friend, organ of the society.
"Whereas in March there were applications from sixteen new cases over and above those who are be-ing dealt with, in April there were twenty-seven, that is from twenty-seven heads of families or single men; but from seventy persons in all, in addition to the 169 who came on the regular consultation days.

Shortage of Funds

"I attended one of the mornings set aside for new cases, and two sittings of the Case Committee. At one there were twenty cases dis-cassed, and the sums needed to help them added up to 4,594 francs. But through shortage of funds, the whole list had to be reconsidered and cut down by nearly half. When and cut down by nearly hair. When this had been done, as was agreed on by the General Committee, there remained but thirty francs for the whole of the rest of the month, unless the French appeal brings in more funds.

Finds Process Slow

"The co-operation with the other committees working for refugees is excellent. All the actual work for emigration is undertaken by Hicem, and they are apparently succeeding in finding a certain number of openings, but the process is very slow, and the deterio-ration in health of those waiting to go, through privation and anxiety, is very serious.

"Through the help of the Emergency Committee, a restaurant was opened by some German refugees, and an arrangement was made whereby meal tickets can be given and an excellent meal received there for three francs. More use could be made of this if more money were available. The character of the work done in the office Rue Rataud, seemed to me to be of a very high order. The spirit of all the workers is delightful.

"I spent three days and a night at the farm at Mosset in the Pyrenees, and am able to give an ex-cellent account of its progress in spite of the difficulties continually arising from shortness of personnel

More Land Cultivated

"This year there is more land under cultivation, the fruit-trees given by the Committee have rooted well, and there are three good cows and a heifer in the stables. the former yielding twenty-five litres of milk a day for sale at present

"There are several families of healthy young rabbits, the hens are laying well, and the two ducks are sitting on their own eggs.

"It would be of immense help if Englishmen could go young to Mosset to help with the summer work. There is a delightful camping site, and Helmuth N——, who speaks fluent English, and orgaspeaks fluent English, and orga-nized all the education of the ap-prentices in the Builders' Trade Union in Germany, knows just how to make the best use of all the help offered. There is a great deal that needs to be done in addi-tion to the confectional week

tion to the agricultural work. "If in Paris there were only thirty francs with which to face the needs of the month, there was not even that sum in London for general relief, after the allocations had been made at the last sitting of the Committee, though a generous gift has been received towards the permanent settlement of the thirty cases who are now awaiting emigration. The same type of need here, the same cutting down need nere, the same cutting down of allowances, the same facing of starvation, makes the contact with the refugees themselves simply heartbreaking."

At the Mandates Commission It appears that the Mandates Commission of the League of Na tions will pay more attention to Palestine at its present session in Geneva than ever before.

The discussion which opens tomorrow at the Mandates Commis-sion on the report of the Palestine government is scheduled to last two days. Not since the Palestine riots of 1929 did the report of the Palestine government provoke such a lengthy

discussion.

The fact that Prof. Brodetsky, head of the political department of the Jewish Agency, has gone to Geneva, is evidence that the matters which will be discussed by the Commission are of great importance to the Jewish future in Palestine. It shows that despite the economic prosperity of Palestine, certain dangers are in the air for the Jewish political

Legislative Assembly Danger The establishment of a Legis-lative Assembly is one of these adverse Assembly is one of these dangers. Although the Jewish Agency in its recent fight succeeded in having the establishment of such an Assembly postponed for the time being, it definitely definitely reported at the last session of the Zionist Actions Committee in Jerusalem that this project has not been killed. the contrary, it was emphasized that it may come up again in the that it may come very near future.

The Mandates Commission supports the idea of establishing a Legislative Assembly in Pales-tine. A number of its members look upon the projected Assembly as a sort of Democratic Parlia ment in which Jews, Arabs and Mandatory Power will be equally represented.

Zionists Agreed in 1921 The difficulty of the Jewish po-sition with regard to the Legislative Assembly lies in the fact that in 1921 the Zionist Organiza-

tion practically gave its consent to the British government to have such an Assembly established Warned that unless they agreed to the establishment of a body in Palestine the ue of Nations would not ratify the Mandate over Palestine, Zionist leaders, headed by Dr. Weizmann, against their better judgment, gave their consent. Now the High Commissioner of

Palestine demands that this agreement be kept. The Colonial Office in London concurs in the demand. The Mandates Commission in Geneva has not had its say on this subject as yet, but may do so at its present session.

What the Assembly Means The establishment of a Legis-ative Assembly in Palestine at time, when the Jews are still a minority in the country, means hampering the upbuilding of Palestine as a Jewish National Home. It also means that the estine a Jewish State will become

very remote.

Although the Legislative Assembly, according to the present project, will not deal with immigration matters nor with quesconcerning land tions, it will actually be the Parliament of the country, once it is established. It will be in a position to promulgate laws which will certainly not be in the interests of Jewish development.

How Czechoslovakia Treats Minorities

Her national minorities are better treated than most national minorities elsewhere, and much better than national majorities under dictatorships. Each national minority has its own schools, with the teaching and text-books in its own tongue. I visited, in the Eastern parts of the Republic, not only Czech and Slovak schools, but Ruthenian schools,

Ludwig Lore Surveys The Austrian Situation

Ludwig Lore, quoting in the New York Post the News Letter published in the Bulletin of May 31 on the Jewish situation in Austria, comments as follows:

In theory Austrian Fascism rec ognizes no discrimination against the Jew. In practice the Jewish population is acutely conscious of a marked lack of equality. Viennese administration, which is controlled by the Schuschnigg faction, leads the way in anti-Semitic measures.

Jewish physicians in the employ of the city, Jewish engineers, teachers, clerks, technicians, etc., have been dismissed. Jewish school children are being forced to attend ghetto schools and many find it impossible to become university students. Jews everywhere are exposed to anti-Semitic excesses of every descrip-tion without the assurance of protection by the authorities.

When Jewish citizens report such attacks there are desultory investigations. But nothing ever comes of them. The police officer suggests to the complainant that Jews for their own sake would do well to take such trifles without a fuss, that the Government had its hands full with Heim-wehr and Nazi troubles without bothering with the Jews, It was high time that the fic-

tion of "equality for the Jew" in Fascist Austria was exploded. Captain von Friedmann's courageous speech painted conditions in Austria as they are. Nothing, of course, will come of it.

The Austrian Jew will have to resign himself to the fact that supporting Fascism in its beginnings does not buy immunity from its evils.

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
