## Arab Press Sees Council By Autumn

### Declares Wauchope Will Quit If Not Upheld By London

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)  
JERUSALEM, June 4.—The Arab press of Palestine and Egypt today announces that a Legislative Council in Palestine will be established in the Autumn, at which High Commissioner Wauchope returns from his summer vacation in England.

At Ahrum, a usually well informed Egyptian daily, states that Sir Arthur is determined to resign should the Colonial Office in London disagree with him on the immediate establishment of the Council.

At Difa, Palestine Arab daily, reports that the order for establishment of the Legislative Council will be published in the Autumn of 1935, but that elections to the Council will be held in the Spring of 1936. The paper describes what it believes will be the set-up of the Council.

**Leaders Silent on Story**  
Jewish leaders here refused to comment on these reports. It is understood that the various Jewish groups in Palestine will continue to oppose the establishment of a Legislative Council, since such an institution would be detrimental to Jewish interests in the country.

Commissioner Wauchope, it is learned, has made some changes in the original prospectus for the proposed Council. These changes, however, are far from satisfactory to the Jews.

The government committee to establish an Agricultural Bank in Palestine, from which Arab landowners will benefit most, held a meeting today under the chairmanship of Mr. Johnson, treasurer of the Palestine government. Plans discussed at the meeting reveal that the bank will soon begin to function.

### Holland's Queen Gives To Fund for Invalids

## Latvia Zionists To Be Absent From Lucerne

### Ban on Political Parties Precludes Election of Congress Delegates

RIGA, June 4.—For the first time in the history of Latvia no delegates from this country will be sent to the World Zionist Congress which opens in Lucerne August 27. The order prohibiting the existence of political parties in Latvia, including the Zionist Organization, is responsible for this situation. With the Zionist party no longer existing officially in the country, no elections can be held here for the Nineteenth Congress and hence no representatives can be sent.

At the last Congress Latvia was represented by seven delegates. An effort was made by Zionist leaders here to obtain permission of the World Zionist Executive to send the same number of delegates to the Congress without conducting elections. The request was refused.

Although the existence of the Jewish National Fund has not been prohibited in Latvia, the authorities have nevertheless issued an order to remove all the Jewish National Fund collection boxes from Jewish homes.

### Ex-Berlin Doctor Gets Post in Cairo Hospital

CAIRO, June 4.—Dr. Hugo Picard, formerly of the Jewish Hospital of Berlin, has been appointed Chief Surgeon of the Jewish Hospital here.

## Note Rise in Labor Lists Of Ukraine

### 137,000 Jews Found Engaged in Soviet Industries There

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)  
MOSCOW, June 4.—There are now 137,000 Jewish workers employed in Soviet industries in the Ukraine, the results of a survey made public today disclose.

The survey discloses that the Jewish workers in the Ukraine constitute now about ten per cent of the total number of workers there. The census of 1926 showed only about 57,000 Jewish laborers in the Ukraine.

In White Russia Jewish workers were found to total 32,000 of the entire 131,000. In 1926 their number was 13,400.

**F. Ains Bureya Bid**  
S. D. Stashten, the chairman of the national minorities department in the Central Soviet Government, addressing a meeting in Minsk, White Russia, on the question of the immigration of foreign Jews to Biro-Bidjan, said that the decision of the Soviet government to admit foreign Jews is not due to the lack of immigrants in Soviet Russia.

"On the contrary," Mr. Diamant said, "the movement to Biro-Bidjan has never been so great as now. It was necessary previously

## Migration From Lithuania Rises

### Jews Constitute 85% of Total Quitting the Country

KAUNAS, Lithuania, June 4.—Jewish emigration from Lithuania in the last few years has grown to a point where it now constitutes eighty-five per cent of the total, according to figures made public here today.

In the course of the first three months of 1935, 599 Jews left Lithuania as compared with 280 in the same period of 1934 and 273 in 1933.

The chief country of settlement for these emigrants, this year and last year, has been Palestine. Of the 599 who left Lithuania this year, 164 men and 225 women settled in the Holy Land.

### B'nai B'rith Lodges Unite on Social Work

—CHICAGO, June 4.—A city-wide program for the unification of the philanthropic, social, charitable and educational work of the city's seven B'nai B'rith lodges has been launched here with the formation of an All-City Council and election of officers for that organization.

Justin Turner was named president; Benjamin I. Morris, vice-president and Julius Rubenstein, second vice-president.

### Carlist Death Cell Dug Up in Warsaw

WARSAW, June 4.—A secret execution chamber of the Carlist secret police was discovered today by workers excavating the so-called Simons Passage in Warsaw, in the very heart of the Jewish quarter.

The workmen uncovered about 100 skeletons believed to be the remains of Jews executed by the Carlist secret police in Warsaw for revolutionary activities.

## Separate Body Wins Big Vote In Polish Cities

### 67,489 Revisionists for Own World Zionist Organization

LONDON, June 4.—A total of 67,489 Revisionists in 325 cities in Poland voted for the establishment of an Independent Zionist Organization, while 1,231 voted against it, according to latest returns of the Revisionist plebiscite, received today by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency from Warsaw.

Open war against the World Zionist Organization was declared yesterday by Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the Revisionists, in an address before a large meeting in Vienna.

"The Zionist Organization has no monopoly to represent world Jewry," he declared. "Article 1 of the Mandate definitely provides also for other groups interested in Palestine."

Mr. Jabotinsky announced that the Independent Zionist Organization which he will now establish in competition with the World Zionist Organization will permit every Jew to vote, provided he recognizes the principle of a Jewish State.

### Salonica Would Borrow Minutes of Berne Trial

SALONICA, June 4.—The Salonica Jewish Community today asked the Jewish Community of Berne to let it have the minutes and all other material concerning the recent "Protocols" trial in Berne, for use in fighting anti-Semitism in Greece.

## Report Turkey Has Released Jailed Colonial Leader

JERUSALEM, June 4.—A report which reached Palestine today during the trial of the raid on Yli. Therniak's house.

The Jewish community in Istanbul, according to the report received here, is greatly worried about the fate of the 400 Jews whose name appear on this list, since the Turkish government suspects every progressive emigrant to Palestine of being a Zionist. The Zionist movement is prohibited in Turkey.

## Sterilization Of All Jews, Is Nazi Aim

### Signs Posted in Bavaria Signal Opening of New Drive

BERLIN, June 4.—A campaign for the sterilization of the Jews in Germany was started today throughout the country as part of the general anti-Jewish drive being conducted in the Reich.

Thousands of posters, reading "Sterilize the Jews," have been mounted in conspicuous places in Bavaria and in other provinces where the anti-Jewish propaganda is conducted more severely than in Berlin and in cities where the Nazis fear foreign observers.

The sterilization of those who are married to Jews is also urged in an article which appeared today, allegedly written by an American, Prof. C. G. Campbell of New York. The professor is described as a "well-known anthropologist" and "president of the Society for Eugenic Research."

The article, which is published in the Westphälischer Landeszeitung, carries the title, "Jewish Parasites." Prof. Campbell declares in his article that the Jews have not passed the Nomadic stage. Unlike Gypsies, he asserts, they always try to profit from the rights given to them as guests in the countries where they reside.

"These parasites," the article continues, "try to destroy social institutions and moral and religious ideas through racial mixture with their hosts."

The article urges that marriages between "Aryans" and Jews should be declared void and that those who intermarry with Jews should be stifled.

The theory that only an "Aryan" is fit to act as guardian for an "Aryan" child, has been upheld by the Prussian Supreme Court, according to Deutsche Justiz, and consequently now has the force of law.

According to this legal publication, the court ruled in the case of a woman seeking to set aside the guardianship exercised by a "non-Aryan" over three "Aryan" children. The only basis of argument

## Refugee Work in France

The great need for funds with which to diminish privation and prevent actual starvation among the helpless refugees from the German terror now in France, is described by Edith M. Pyle, of the Society of Friends (Quakers), who has been most active in relief assistance work for these refugees.

In Paris under the German Emergency Committee does not diminish," she declares in a report to The Friend, organ of the society, "the thousands in March there were applications from sixteen new cases over and above those who are being dealt with, in April there were eighty-seven, that is from twenty-seven heads of families or single men; but from seventy persons in all, in addition to the 169 who came on the regular consultation days."

### Shortage of Funds

"I attended one of the mornings set aside for new cases, and two sittings of the Case Committee. At one there were twenty cases discussed and the sums needed to help them added up to 4,594 francs. But through shortage of funds, the whole list had to be reduced, and cut down by as much as half. When aid had been done, as was agreed on by the General Committee, there remained but thirty francs for the whole of the rest of the year unless the French appeal brings in more funds."

"The following were some of the cases dealt with:

"A lawyer, very well known in Germany, cannot return there for political reasons. He has been working as a butler, his wife a *jeune dame*. They are both very well, but themselves till he broke to keep himself, which made work impossible. He applied for help and quite broke down at having to ask for it."

### Plight of a Tailor

"A tailor, with wife and three children, aged 15, 12 and 7 (states). Had his license to trade, sold his personal property to trade, still his goods in the market. Was able to keep whole family till January, 1933, when all his papers were taken away from him, and he was given an expulsion order. He lost his work immediately, was unable to sell as his permit was withdrawn. They hung on until when they applied for aid, as their gas and electricity had been cut off for non-payment, and they owed a large sum for bread on which they had been living. They are being children have school feeding through Assistance Médicale, and the gas and electricity bills were paid for."

# Between the Lines

## At the Mandates Commission

It appears that the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations will pay more attention to Palestine at its present session than it has in the past.

The discussion which opens tomorrow at the Mandates Commission on the report of the Palestine government is scheduled to last two days. Not since the Palestine riots of 1929 did the report of the Palestine government provoke such a lengthy discussion.

The fact that Prof. Brodetsky, head of the political department of the Jewish Agency, has gone to Geneva, is evidence that the matters which will be discussed by the Commission are of great importance to the Jewish future in Palestine. It shows that despite the fact that the Jewish Agency, certain dangers are in the air for the Jewish political rights there.

The establishment of a Legislative Assembly is one of these dangers. Although the Jewish Agency in its recent fight succeeded in having the establishment of such an Assembly postponed for the time being, it was definitely reported at the last session of the Zionist Action Committee in Jerusalem that the project has not been killed.

On the contrary, it was emphasized that it may come up again in the New Year session.

The Mandates Commission supports the idea of establishing a Legislative Assembly in Palestine. The fact that its members look upon the project as a sort of Democratic Parliament in which Jews, Arabs and the Mandatory Power will be equal is a very important factor.

Zionists Agreed in 1921 The difficulty of the Jewish position with regard to the Legislative Assembly lies in the fact that the Zionist Organization practically has its consent to the British government to have such an Assembly established. Warned that unless they agreed to this, the establishment of such a body in Palestine the League of Nations would not ratify the Mandate over Palestine.

More Land Cultivated This year there is more land under cultivation, the fruit-tree groves given by the Committee have rooted well, and there are three good cows and a heifer in the stables, the former yielding twenty-five quarts of milk a day for sale at present.

"There are several families of healthy young rabbits, the hens are laying well, and the two ducks are sitting on their own eggs."

"It would be of immense help if some young Englishmen could go to Mosset to help with the summer work. There is a delightful camp at Mosset, where the head of all the help offered. There is a great deal that needs to be done in addition to the agricultural work."

In Paris there were only thirty francs with which to face the needs of the month, there was not even that sum in London for general relief, after the allocations had been made at the last sitting of the Committee, though a general one has been received towards the permanent settlement of the third cases who are now awaiting the same type of help.

The same type of need here, the same cutting down of allowances, the same facing of starvation, makes the contact with the refugees, the themselves, simply heart-breaking.

## Children's Paper

### Comments on Nazism

The *Children's Newspaper*, an English publication, writes as follows on Nazi Germany:

In Bremen the Nazi Governor denounces the Bible as trash. A number of Christian ministers who will not bow to Nazi dictation are thrown out of their congregations and into concentration camps.

As for the Jews, their humiliation and oppression continue in full rigor. For more than half a million men, women, and children have become an intolerable degradation, a disgrace to the name of Germany, and a crime against humanity which has shocked the whole world.

Germany is following Italy in beginning the training of children at eight years of age. The child of eight is to enter, voluntarily, the Young Folk organization, the youth corps in the Hitler Youth Group is then expected to take the young life and train it until 18. Then the youth passes to the Storm Troops, the backbone of the Nazis. At the age of 18 there is conscription in the Labor Battalions and the Army. The essence of it all is discipline, the young are old, and old are continued throughout life.

## How Czechoslovakia

### Treats Minorities

The *New Statesman and Nation* of London gives the following impression of its correspondent on how Czechoslovakia treats its national minorities:

Her national minorities are better treated than most national minorities elsewhere, and much better than national minorities under dictatorships. Each national minority has its own schools, with the teaching in their own language. In its own tongue, I visited, in the Eastern parts of the Republic, not only Czech and Slovak schools, but Ruthenian schools.

Is feared the projected Assembly would take it to amend the Citizenship Law in Palestine so as to make it difficult for Jews to become naturalized. Such a step would prevent the Jews from ever becoming a majority in Palestine. No matter how large the Jewish immigration into Palestine, the majority of immigrants might under such a law, be forced to retain the status of foreigners for many years. The League of Nations, however, has decided that such a law could also promulgate new taxation laws that would hit Jewish industry, commerce and investment.

The fight against the establishment of a Legislative Assembly is, therefore, one of the most serious facing the Jewish Agency today. The present action of the Mandates Commission in Geneva may have something to say about this fight, if the discussions on Palestine will actually last two days, as scheduled.

## Ludwig Lore Surveys

### The Austrian Situation

Ludwig Lore, quoting in the *New York Post* the News Letter published in the Bulletin of May 31 on the Jewish situation in Austria, comments as follows:

In theory Austrian Fascism recognizes no discrimination against the Jew. In practice the Jewish population is acutely conscious of the lack of equality. The Viennese administration, which is controlled by the Schuschnigg faction, leads the way in anti-Semitic measures.

Jewish physicians in the employ of the city, Jewish engineers, teachers, clerks, technicians, etc., have been dismissed. Jewish school children are being forced to attend ghetto schools, and many find it impossible to become university students. Jews everywhere are exposed to anti-Semitic excesses of every description without the assurance of protection by the authorities.

When Jewish citizens report such attacks there are desultory investigations. But nothing ever comes of these. The police office suggests to the complainant that Jews for their own sake would do well to take such trifles without a fuss, that the Government has no right to interfere with thewehr and Nazi troubles without bothering with the Jews.

It was high time that the fiction of "equality for the Jew" in Austria had exploded. Captain von Friedlmann's outrageous speech painted conditions in Austria as they are. Nothing, of course, will come of it.

The Austrian Jew will have to resign himself to the fact that respoigning Fascism in its beginnings does not buy immunity from its evils.
