Arabs Ask Cancelling Of Mandate

3 Other Petitions Aired Secretly by League Commission

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

GENEVA, June 14—Cancellation of the Palestine Mandate is demanded in the petition which Arabs submitted to the League of Nations and which is now being discussed in camera at the session of the Mandates Commission here.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed today that the Mandates Commission has before it three other Arab petitions which demand the following:

1. Annulment of the concession which the Jews have obtained over Huleh, on the Palestine-Syria border.
2. Prohibition of Jewish immigration into Palestine.
3. Stoppage of the sale of land to Jews in Palestine.

The Mandate Petition

The petition to cancel the Palestine Mandate was submitted to the League by the Syrian delegation of which Emir Shekib Arslan is the head. The petition points out that the Palestine Mandate is incompatible with the promises which were made by Great Britain to the Arabs during the World War.

The petition against the Huleh deal comes from an Arab group in Syria. It demands that the Huleh concession obtained by the Jews be annulled, contending that the land was sold to Jews by Arabs in Syria who are "traitors to the Arab cause."

The petition demanding cessation of Jewish immigration into Palestine comes from the Arab

Nathania Names New Square for Wauchope

JERUSALEM, June 14—Sir Arthur Wauchope, the High Commissioner of Palestine, today officially opened Wauchope Square, named in his honor by Nathania colony, which was established in memory of Nathan Straus, late American-Jewish philanthropist.

Wauchope Square will be fifty dunams long, of which fifteen dunams have been set aside for a Wauchope Park.

Wider Support For Education Noted at Parley

Hurwich Surveys Decade Of Progress in Talk At Lake Placid

(Special to the J.D.B.)

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., June 14—Greater support is being given to Jewish education now by Jewish communities, and professionalization of Jewish teaching personnel has progressed in the last ten years, Louis Hurwich of the Boston Bureau of Jewish Education declared here today addressing the opening session of the tenth annual conference of the National Council of Jewish Education.

The National Association Jewish Center Executives also opened its annual convention here today while the National Conference of Jewish Social Service opens its forty-sixth annual meeting tomorrow night at a general session to be attended by all groups.

Despite depression, the Jewish community has helped support the higher institutes of Jewish learning granting higher degrees, Mr. Hurwich pointed out in his summary of ten years of activity of the Educators' Council.

Mr. Hurwich appealed for planning education on a broader basis, for experimentation, research and making large Jewish masses "education conscious."

Halt Protest On Films, Nazis Told

Makes It Hard to Sell Nazi Product Abroad, Goebbels Explains

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, June 14—Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Nazi Minister of Propaganda, today issued an order that no demonstrations be staged in Germany against the showing of films produced in foreign lands in which Jewish actors appear as stars.

"Such demonstrations endanger the German film industry," the Nazi Minister stated, explaining that it makes it difficult to sell German films abroad when foreign films are met with open hostility in Germany.

Bar Exams to Students

The German Minister of Interior yesterday ordered that "non-Aryan" medical and dental students who entered German universities in 1933 and are still continuing their studies are not to be admitted for final examinations. No degrees are to be conferred upon such students, the order provides.

A distinction is made in the order between "non-Aryan" students of German citizenship and those who are citizens of foreign lands. Foreign students who are "non-Aryans" can be admitted to final examinations but are not to receive final degrees, the order states.

The Minister of Interior in Saxonia ordered that among the "non-Aryans" who are not to be admitted to final examinations, nurses and midwives are to be included. Exceptions may be made only in special cases and by special permission from the Ministry.

War Veterans To Visit Verdun

International Meeting to Hear Jabotinsky and Laski at Paris

PARIS, June 14—Neville Laski, president of the British Board of Jewish Deputies, who is a captain in the British Army, and Vladimir Jabotinsky, who commanded the Jewish Battalion in the World War, are expected to participate in the first world conference of Jewish War Veterans which opens here tomorrow.

The conference will be officially welcomed at a reception to be given by the Paris Municipal Council. The ex-service men will make a pilgrimage to the battlefields of Verdun.

Delegates from the United States, Great Britain, France, Belgium, Lithuania, Latvia, Poland, Palestine, Czechoslovakia, Austria and South Africa, will participate in the conference.

At 103, Plane Ride Is His Only Ambition

LONDON, June 14—Asked what his life's ambition is, Joseph Levis, 103 today, said he wanted most to go up in an airplane.

Levis was born in Poland. He had nine children, two of whom are alive and reside in England, supporting their aged father. Levis is also receiving an old-age pension.

One University Is Urged For Europe's Jews

Vienna Educator Asks For Separate Schools In Austria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, June 14—Declaring that he rejects absolutely the Nazi blood theory, Dr. Lugmayer, head of the educational department of Vienna, came out today with a project that a completely autonomous Jewish school system be created in Austria.

"This system should be independently administered by the Jews, just as all purely cultural matters affecting Judaism should be conducted by the Jews themselves," Dr. Lugmayer urges.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Dr. Lugmayer explains that the reason he asks for an independent Jewish school system is not because he fears that Jewish children exercise an unfavorable influence on non-Jewish children.

"My many years of experience as professor at the Vienna High School, with a large Jewish body of students, are utterly at variance with this idea, but I consider that the Jews have a right to their own autonomous school system," the head of the educational department said.

The project provides that the autonomous Jewish school system begin with the elementary school and continue up to the university. "If a Jewish university cannot be created in each State, it can be established in one State to serve all of Central Europe," the Lugmayer plan states.

Touching upon the question of citizenship rights of Jews, the Austrian

Riot Flares In Salonica; 10 Arrested

Many Jews, Greeks Hurt In Street Fighting; Order Restored

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

SALONICA, June 14—Rioting broke out last night in the Jewish quarter here, resulting in injuries to dozen of Jews and Greeks.

The riots followed an altercation between a Jew and a Greek. The quarrel led to extensive street fighting which developed into excesses.

Seven Greeks and three Jews were arrested as a result of the outbreak. Order was restored by the police, who patroled the Jewish quarter all night in order to prevent a recurrence of the outbreak.

Propaganda Continues

Despite the fact that the anti-Semitic press is not permitted to appear in Greece since the Venizelos revolution, anti-Jewish propaganda is still continued in the country. This propaganda found particular expression during the election campaign to the Greek Parliament last week.

Two Jews were elected to the Greek Parliament on the Government Party list, which was supported by the entire Jewish population. The fact that the Jews are supporting the Government was utilized by the anti-Semitic agitators for anti-Jewish propaganda during the elections.

With the Government Party gaining 285 seats of the 300 in the Parliament at the election last Sunday, the Jewish population feels confident that any attempt at anti-Jewish outbreaks will be crushed.

Premier Panayoti Tsaldaris as well as all the other members of the Cabinet are known for their friendly attitude towards the Jews.

Mizrachi Parley Opens In Cracow August 10

JERUSALEM, June 14—The World Conference of the Mizrachi, Orthodox Zionist Organization, will open in Cracow on August 10, ten days before the opening of the World Zionist Congress, it was announced here today by the Mizrachi headquarters.

Polish Officials Urged to Act In Harmony With All Citizens

WARSAW, June 14—Polish officials were urged today by the Minister of Interior in a special order to "cooperate harmoniously with all citizens" and to acquaint themselves with the provisions of the new constitution.

The Dziennik Narodowy, organ of the anti-Semitic National Democratic Party, which has succeeded the defunct Gazeta Warszawska, today fiercely attacks the changes in

the new Polish electoral law.

"The changes in the new electoral law actually mean that the Jews are being given privileges," the anti-Semitic paper says. "The law provides for one deputy for every 120,000 inhabitants in the towns, while in the villages it requires 180,000 to elect a deputy. The towns are inhabited by Jews, thus the Jews are now placed in a privileged position," the paper asserts.

Yiddish and Hebrew Library To Be Installed on Normandie

PARIS, June 14—For the first time in the history of modern navigation, libraries in Yiddish and in Hebrew will be installed on the French steamer Normandie, the world's largest and most luxurious liner, it was announced here today by the French Line.

More than 28,000 pieces of Limoges china and nearly 3,500 articles of cutlery, have been acquired by the Normandie for the kosher kitchen service on the steamer. The kosher service, according to today's announcement, is conducted

by a Jewish staff, including Jewish cooks, Jewish waiters and Jewish supervisors.

Emphasizing that the Line is anxious to secure a maximum of Jewish passengers, the announcement states that the Normandie will have a special room for Jewish religious services, with a Torah, offered by M. Pernikoff, director of the Palestine Lloyd in Paris. The library will also include the complete Talmud, Ein Yakob, Mishna-yot, Shulchan Aruch and other Jewish religious books.

Capital Comment

WASHINGTON.

WITH Germany, Mexico and other foreign countries increasing their persecution drives against minority groups within their borders, Washington officialdom is beginning to think that sooner or later the United States will have to reiterate its abhorrence of racial, religious and political intolerance by any nation.

Two years ago this month, eight innocent protest against the persecution of Jews in Germany. These were Senator Robinson of Arkansas, Metcalf of Rhode Island, Cope land of New York, Walsh of Massachusetts, Hatfield of West Virginia, Tydings of Maryland, Lewis of Illinois and Wagner of New York.

IN SPITE of all that has been said and written about persecution in Germany, the Hitler government continues its drive against minority groups with more fervor than ever. The words of protest have fallen on deaf ears. Senator King of Utah has made the suggestion that in view of Germany's continued drive against minority groups, it may be well for the United States to withdraw its friendly relations with that country. Several resolutions have been introduced in both houses of Congress for the purpose of requiring the State Department to enter an official protest to the Hitler government against the persecution of Jews. The State Department has ruled against the wisdom of such procedure.

While persecution of minorities continues unabated in Germany, a new country has come into the limelight for similar activities. This country is Mexico, where, according to reports, Catholics and Jews are suffering from intolerance. Efforts to have the United States "interpose its good offices" on behalf of these people have failed in spite of precedents.

IN THE light of increasing intolerance against Catholics, Jews and other minority groups in foreign countries, Representative John P. Higgins of Massachusetts holds that "the American people find themselves confronted by a challenge of the fundamental principles and ideals that are the cornerstone of the structure of our government." He believes that the source of that peril is Mexico, because of that country's proximity to the United States.

"The problem which confronts our country today, in common with all his neighbors in America is: Shall we continue to maintain the high standards of justice, those eternal principles of human rights, upon which our system is founded and which are the lifeblood of our nation, or shall we stand idly by while systems develop which deny and denounce those principles?" Representative Higgins asks.

THE Representative from Massachusetts points out that "to the everlasting credit of the noble Jew-

ish race in America it can be said that because of their forcefulness and organization they have on numerous occasions received from our government the exercise of its mighty influence in behalf of their persecuted brethren in foreign lands. Since this was a just and proper exercise of the resources of both diplomacy and statesmanship, I am in hearty accord with every movement that aims to enlist the influence of our government in a humane cause, and I am at a loss to understand why this principle cannot be consistently applied now."

Saying that "it was fitting and proper for the representatives of our government in the Senate of the United States two years ago to express their disapproval of the policy of Hitler toward Jewish men and women in Germany," Representative Higgins wants to know "why should there be silence and this discrimination?" "The Catholics and Jews are being persecuted in Mexico at this very time."

"IT IS a well-recognized principle of the law of nations," Representative Higgins says, "that when one nation conducts its internal affairs in such a manner as to injure the tranquility of another nation, strong official representations may be made to the offending government. If there is any doubt that the tranquility of 50,000,000 Christians and Jews has been disturbed by the intolerance of the Mexican government, let them read the religious press. The American Christian and Jew have an incontestable right to expect and require their government in pursuance of the policy of 'good neighbor' to intercede for the oppressed and persecuted Mexicans, among whose co-religionists are found one-half of the total population of the United States."

Since the State Department has adopted a "hands off" attitude, Representative Higgins holds that the matter now rests with the President. "The duty is plainly upon the President of the United States to speak his disapproval of the barbarous policies of the present Mexican government and thus protect the lives and prosperity of Americans and reiterate the doctrine of human rights that has been so eloquently expressed by many of his predecessors in office under similar circumstances to those that exist in Mexico today."

Speaking for the committee, Rose Nelson denied both that the boycott has lost force and that it is aimed against any labor union.

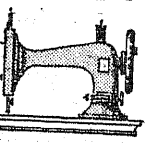

BLACK on WHITE

By EUGENE LYOSN

NEWS dispatches out of Moscow in recent weeks have been most intriguing to people acquainted with the intimate background who have learned to read between and under the lines of official pronouncements.

One piece of news that went almost unnoticed here seems particularly significant. That was the dissolution of the Society of Old Bolsheviks by dictatorial fiat. The action was ostensibly taken, as usual, "at the request" of the veterans themselves. But only political morons accept such things at face value. The "voluntary" character of everything imposed by force and fear and the perfect "unanimity" with which everything transpires are almost the earmarks of dictatorship.

The fact is that an organization hitherto treated reverentially, as a depository of living traditions, has been suddenly liquidated. It is as though President Roosevelt were to issue an edict wiping out the Daughters of the American Revolution (not that that would be a great loss). Only more so. The Old Bolsheviks, unlike the D.A.R., had not yet become fossilized.

The romantic revolutionary struggle the memory of which they kept alive was not a second-hand heritage but something out of their own lives. Their chief function as an organization, indeed, was to pass on that memory untarnished to their younger comrades.

My private guess is that the liquidation of the most respected of the many organizations in that land came because heresy in some form had lifted its red head in the ranks of the veterans. I claim no special credit for this deduction. It is unquestionably the private guess of millions of Soviet citizens who read of the dissolution in their newspaper.

The older generation of Bolsheviks often finds it hard to adjust itself to new interpretations of Marx and Lenin and new concepts of orthodoxy. It has seen many of its greatest figures exiled and humiliated. It has seen some of its most cherished ideals revised and distorted—perhaps for better, perhaps for worse, but in either case the spectacle must have pinched many an old Bolshevik heart.

The presumption of anti-Stalinist sentiment among the revolutionary veterans is therefore not far-fetched. It would have been more remarkable had there been no resentment among the old-timers.

Most of them, like veterans of all causes, were inclined to exaggerate their own importance. They must have proved difficult material to handle. Their liquidation as a class breaks another link—perhaps the most important—between the revolutionary past and the orthodox present in the land of the hammer-and-sickle.

a decade. Those moral delinquencies on the basis of which he has just been expelled from the Bolshevik party and deprived of all political offices are not sudden discoveries.

They were winked at by the bosses in the more Puritanical days of 1928-33. Why have they been punished in the more spacious days of 1935?

The real story is in the answer to that question. Did Yenukidze, in his expansive life-loving way, show tolerance for some Oppositionist backsliders from the true faith? Did his interest in the lighter side of mortal existence lure him into excessive contacts with foreigners?

I can easily imagine the fascinating theories being worked out in a thousand whispered conversations over vodka and tea glasses. Life is more interesting in places where the government lets its subjects know only as much as is good for them and leaves the rest to their imaginations.

Says Arab-Jewish Amity Is Increasing

Dr. Gordon Sees Prosperity In Palestine Aiding Better Feeling

(Special to the J.D.B.)

ATLANTIC CITY, June 14—As a result of Palestine's prosperity, hard-feeling between the Jews and Arabs is diminishing, according to Dr. Cyrus H. Gordon of the American School for Oriental Research in Baghdad, who addressed a meeting of local Zionists.

"Palestine is the most prosperous country in the world today," Dr. Gordon declared. "There is no unemployment problem. In fact, labor is scarce in some sections so that Jewish industrialists have to hire Arabs, and a better understanding has been the result."

He also pointed out that the Palestine government is maintaining all necessary functions with full payrolls and piling up treasury surpluses every year.

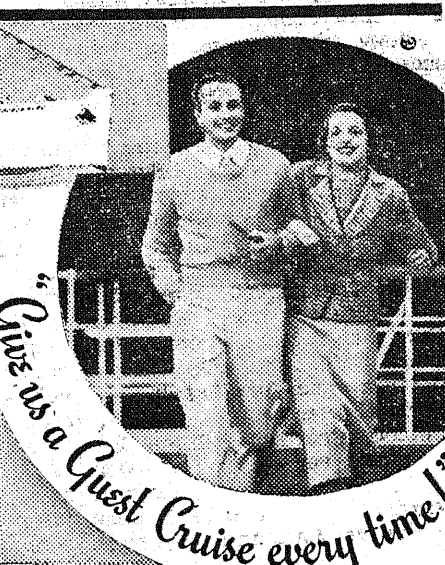

Untermeyer Letter
Clears Hospital

A letter from Samuel Untermeyer
clearing the Beth Moses Hospital
of charges that its executives
sought reparation for the German-
Jewish leader of its employees and
that the hospital used German
goods was made public by Dr. M.
L. Dryfus, medical director of the
hospital, Friday.

In a letter addressed to Morris
Walzer, president of the hospital,
Mr. Untermeyer said that "it is evi-
dent that the charges against the
hospital . . . are baseless and ap-
parently malicious and they are un-
reservedly withdrawn with apolo-
gies."

On the complaint of a group of
the Brooklyn hospital's workers,
Mr. Untermeyer had written for an
explanation and the apology was
sent after a satisfactory reply was
received.

Untermeyer Declines Bid
To Aid Rutgers Probe

Samuel Untermeyer has decided to
decline the invitation of Governor
Harry Hoffman of New Jersey to
participate in the investigation of
the Rutgers University Board of
Trustees into alleged Nazi propa-
ganda activities at the university,
he told the Jewish Daily Bulletin
Friday, because the probe is not
equipped with the power of sub-
poenaing witnesses and placing
them under oath.

"It is for that reason," he said,
"that I want a legislative investi-
gation."

A WEEK'S EVENTS IN REVIEW

GENERAL RYDZ-SMIGLY

At least 100 Jews were injured
this week—one of them fatally—in
anti-Jewish riots which took
place in different parts of Po-
land. In the city of Grodno alone
there were sixty Jewish victims.

The Polish authorities confiscat-
ed the newspaper which re-
ported the details of the riot. It
has also seen to it that the news
of these riots should not reach
the foreign press.

These are the first riots which
have broken out since the death
of Marshal Pilsudski. The Polish
authorities claim that the riots
were organized by underworld
elements. According to press re-
ports from Warsaw it seems,
however, that they were inspired
by anti-Semitic political parties.

All Eyes on the
Marshal's Successor

The eyes of Polish Jewry are
now turned towards General Ed-
ward Rydz-Smigly, successor to
Marshal Pilsudski, and towards
Premier Valery Slawek who was
Pilsudski's right-hand man. Should
these two leaders of the present
Polish regime fail to take the
same strong measures against
anti-Jewish excesses as did the
late Pilsudski, then there is reason
to fear that the riots of this
week are only the beginning of a
series of anti-Jewish events on a
large scale.

Delegations from the Jewish
communities where the riots took
place appeared before the central
government in Warsaw to plead
for protection. While thirty
Poles are now under arrest as the
ringleaders of the riots, at least
300 Jews in Grodno alone regis-
tered as having suffered heavy
property damages.

The riots in Grodno started
from a clash between Jewish and
Polish youths in a dance hall. A
Polish youth was stabbed. This
was the signal for an organized
attack on Jewish pedestrians, for
smashing windows of Jewish
houses and for pillaging Jewish
stores.

As the police did not display
sufficient activity in checking the
wild mob, a Jewish self-defense
was organized on the spot to pro-
tect Jewish life and property.
Eight of the leaders of the self-
defense were arrested. They were,
however, later released when the
authorities established that nothing
remained for the Jews to do but to
defend themselves as best they could.

Panic Lasted
Over Three Days

The panic in Grodno lasted
more than three days during
which Jews were afraid to ap-
pear on the streets. Mothers
feared to send their children to
school. At least a dozen of the
sixty Jews injured in Grodno are
still in the hospitals. One Jew-
ish youth was stabbed to death
by the rioters.

The excesses in Grodno found
an echo in the city of Suwalki
and in two other townships where
similar anti-Jewish excesses were
staged by organized anti-Semitic
forces. The excesses broke out
by a whistle signaling that
everything was ready to start the
riot.

While the riots took place in
the provinces, the leaders of the
Government Party started nego-
tiations with Jewish leaders in
Warsaw to secure the support of
the Jewish population in the
forthcoming parliamentary elec-
tions. The Jews were offered by
the Government Party six seats
in the Polish parliament.

Agudath Israel Schools
Put on Public Basis

Simultaneously, the government
proclaimed the religious schools
of the Agudath Israel, a Jewish

orthodox pro-government party,
as full-fledged elementary public
schools, privileged to enjoy the
same rights as government
schools.

The schools maintained by the
Agudath Israel are only a small
fraction of the general school sys-
tem in Poland which receives no
government subsidy and enjoys
no special rights. Of the 160,000
children attending Jewish schools
in Poland a very small proportion
attend the religious schools of
the Agudath. The majority of
Jewish parents send their chil-
dren to the modern Jewish
schools where all subjects are
taught in Yiddish or in Hebrew.
These modern schools were ig-
nored by the government this
week while special rights were
given to the religious schools of
the Agudath.

Kahn Reports
On Polish Survey

A graphic picture of the Jewish
situation in Poland today, not
long after the death of Pilsudski,
was given this week in New York
by Dr. Bernhard Kahn, European
director of the American Joint
Distribution Committee. Dr. Kahn
just returned from a survey
which he made in Poland, and his
report to the Joint Distribution
Committee in New York is heart-
breaking.

Dr. Kahn relates in his report
that almost all of the 160,000
Jewish children of school age
come to their classrooms hungry,
since even bread is a luxury in

their homes. He reports that in
Warsaw alone 60,000 Jews de-
pend on bread-lines and soup
kitchens. A million Jews of all
ages—a third of the entire Jew-
ish population—lives on charity.
Doctors, lawyers and other pro-
fessionals have been reduced to
a starvation level. About 150,000
Jewish workers are unemployed
and have no unemployment in-
surance. Jewish industrialists are
being squeezed out of their posi-
tions by heavy taxation and by
all kinds of economic restric-
tions. Among those considered
as employed are people earning
just a dollar or two a week.

Situation Likened
To Famine Years

The situation of Polish Jewry
is now back to where it was dur-
ing the famine years which were
experienced in Poland immediat-
ly after the war. Jews are dying
of hunger and the necessity of
opening soup kitchens to feed
thousands of them is one of the
immediate problems.

The Polish government does
nothing for its unfortunate Jew-
ish citizens, although it realizes
that the economic ruin of mil-
lions of Jews must soon affect the
entire country. Leaving the Jews
to their fate the Polish govern-
ment continues to add pressure
to their economic life by all
kinds of economic discrimina-
tions.

Side by side with the gloomy
picture drawn by Dr. Kahn on
the Jewish situation in Poland, is
the report on the prosperity in
the Jewish colonies in Crimea
which was made public this week
by the Soviet government. While
Jewish children in Poland suffer
hunger, the Jewish children in
the Crimean Jewish colonies en-
joy good nourishment and are
well provided for. Not a single
Jewish colony in Crimea is with-
out a school. Not a single Jew-
ish settlement there is without
medical care. Food is plentiful
not only for the youth but for
everybody. Life goes on without
any worries for the future.

Thousands Dream
Of Going to Soviet

Under such circumstances there
is little wonder that hundreds of
thousands of Jews in Poland

dream of proceeding to Soviet
Russia. There may be no place
for them in Crimea, but the So-
viet government is firm in its de-
cision to permit Polish Jews to
settle in Biro-Bidjan for which
an added four million roubles
were allocated this week by the
Soviet government to promote
the Jewish agricultural work
there.

The sad life of the Jews in Po-
land as compared with the life
of the Jews in Soviet Russia is
stimulating not only Polish Jews
to proceed to Biro-Bidjan but also
Jews from the Baltic countries,
and from Rumania, particularly
from the Bessarabian part of Ru-
mania which formerly belonged
to Russia and where the entire
population is suffering under the
Rumanian regime.

Quota System for
Rumanian Universities

A decisive step against the
Jews in Rumania was taken this
week by the Minister of Educa-
tion, Dr. Constantin Angelescu,
who ordered all universities in
Rumania to make drastic cuts in
the number of students in the
Rumanian universities. These
cuts will affect the "national mi-
norities and chiefly the Jews,
since the entire issue revolves
around the question of how to re-
duce the number of Jews in the
professions of medicine, law and
in commerce.

This order of the Rumanian
Minister of Education means that
the campaign which the anti-Se-
mitic student bodies in Rumania
carried on during the last few
months against Jewish students
has had successful results for
these bodies. The order is obvi-
ously a capitulation of the pres-
ent government to the demand of
Dr. Vaida-Voevod, former Ruma-
nian Premier, who has insisted
that a "numerous valachius" be
introduced in Rumania to elimi-
nate the Jews from commerce
and the professions.

False Report
From Albania

A false alarm was given this
week with a report that the Al-
banian government invites Jews
for settlement in Albania. This
report was, however, denied from
Tirana, the capital of Albania.
Members of the government ex-
plained that only those who wish
to invest capital in Albania will
be permitted to enter the coun-
try. Even in the case of such
immigrants, the applications for
entrance will be closely exam-
ined, the Minister for Public Wel-
fare made clear in his explana-
tion.

This again leaves Palestine and
Biro-Bidjan the only places still
open for Jewish immigration.
There are naturally more people
anxious to proceed to Palestine
than to Biro-Bidjan, but there
are many Jews, especially among
the youth and the artisans, who
would be willing to proceed to
Biro-Bidjan if they were only
given the facilities to do so.

Zionism Suffers Great Loss
In Dr. Levin's Death

The Jews in Palestine and the
Zionists all over the world suf-
fered a great loss this week when
Dr. Shmarya Levin, the veteran
Zionist leader, died suddenly last
Sunday in Haifa. Dr. Levin was
one of the most brilliant orators
in the Zionist movement and was
considered the most able orga-
nizer. He organized the Zionist
movement in America in the
years after the War and was also
responsible for bringing the Jews
in Germany nearer to Zionism.
He was buried in Tel Aviv side
by side with Bialik and Achaad
Hafam.

What Bulletin Readers Say

Overheard in a Cab

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin:
I am a taxi driver and hear many
conversations in my cab during the
course of the day. But one that
hurt me happened yesterday when
I overheard a conversation between
two Jews, who were talking about
hiring Italian labor because it was
cheaper although Jewish labor was
better.

One of them said to his comrade,
"Look at the poor Jews on Seventh
Avenue. Out of work, starving for
a piece of bread." And their own
kind don't employ them.

The Jews in Germany always
thought themselves above other
Jews of different lands. But when
Hitler came into power, they
looked to the Jews they thought
lower than themselves to help them
in their distress.

I would rather support the Polish
Jews ninety per cent and the Ger-
man Jews ten per cent. I appeal
to you that something must be done
to unite us Jews into one body.
Make us understand that Jews
must support one another, espe-
cially with regard to employment,
or we will have the same serious
conditions here as there are in
Germany.

Now it is up to us to help our
Jewish brethren, while we still
have the chance, for if we don't,
we might as well be exterminated
forever.

HODGE-PODGE

By PHILIP S. BERNSTEIN

WE WERE walking up the steps of the State Capitol in Montgomery. Our Good Will Pilgrimage, consisting of Father Riggs, Doctor Clinchy and myself, was about to address a special joint session of both Houses of the Alabama Legislature. I inquired how this invitation happened to be offered. For Alabama, as I recalled, had not always been the most tolerant State in the Union. Its present Governor, Bibb Graves, ran in his first campaign on the Ku Klux Klan ticket, and was elected. My companion replied that Senator Hodges of Fayette had introduced the resolution to invite us and had secured its adoption. I expressed a desire to meet this broad-minded Alabama legislator.

"There he is," said my friend, "waiting to greet us." I quickly thought of what I would say to this distinguished Southern gentleman. I wondered whether to call him "Cuh-nel" and to discuss the greatness of Robert E. Lee. Should I praise the beauty and purity of Southern womanhood or pay tribute to the heroism of his people in the War Between the States (fortunately I remembered it is not called the Civil War down there)? By this time we had reached the Senator, a well set up man of about fifty.

"SENATOR Hodges," said my friend, "I have the honor to present Rabbi Bernstein." "Sholom Aleichem," said the Senator. "Aleichem Sholom," I responded, rather weakly. "I'm a Litvak," said the Senator. "Kovno?" I asked. "No—Suvalki," he replied.

"How did you get the name Hodges?" "It was Choydesh and I changed it to Hodges. What's the difference, Choydesh or Hodges, so long as you make a living and you bring your children to be good Jews?"

BY THIS time I had regained my composure sufficiently to make some inquiries about the Senator. It appears that he is the only Jew in Fayette County. Thirty years ago when as a green immigrant he was peddling, he came upon this little town and liked it. To it he brought his bride and there they settled and raised a family. He

opened a little dry goods store and prospered. The hill billies liked him even though they laughed at his foreign ways. He was honest, decent and kindly, and with the passing of years won for himself a vast host of friends.

Once, before election time, some of these friends urged him to run for the Legislature. He laughed at the thought of an immigrant Jew representing Fayette County. But they prevailed on him—and he made a friendly campaign and was elected by an unprecedented majority. Each election he is returned by ever greater majority. Senator Hodges of Alabama!

PEOPLE go to Mexico to see Popocatepetl, bull fights, and the frescoes of Diego Rivera. Of the snow-capped mountain I could not get enough; of the slaughter of bulls for amusement—a little was too much; meeting Diego Rivera was a great experience.

The foremost mural painter of our time lives in a gaily colored modernistic house in the fashionable San Angel suburb of Mexico City. He told me that he had reduced about 100 pounds in the last year; he now weighs a mere 250. He speaks English fluently and colorfully, and he loves to talk. Here are some of the sparks that flew from his anvil.

Henry Ford, he thinks, is the greatest artist in America. Only the intellectual regards an automobile factory as messy or unpleasant; the worker knows what a thing of beauty it really is. The Ford plant is a masterpiece.

Stuart Chase, whose book on Mexico he illustrated, is a nice

man, but doesn't know much about Mexico. When he wrote the book, he was thoroughly disillusioned with American industrial civilization, then in the worst throes of depression, and he became enamored of the simple agricultural life of the Indian. Had he learned a little more about the Indian, said Rivera, he would have realized how profoundly impoverished and miserable he really is. The only hope for the Indian is industrial civilization, but socially owned.

THE present Mexican government, Rivera says, is Socialist in name only. In reality, it is the police agent of Wall Street. Only Communism will redeem Mexico. But not the Communism of the Third Internationale. For that, he thinks, has also sold out to Wall Street. Rivera is a Trotskyist; that is, he believes in World Revolution. For this, the Russian Communists who are ready to make bargains with Wall Street in order to promote the success of the Russian experiment, have expelled him from the party.

He refused to compromise in the Rockefeller Center controversy, not because of principle, but to advance the Revolution. If he had deleted Lenin's face, it would have made no essential difference in the picture. But then only a relatively small number of people would see the picture and learn of his views. If he refused to do it, a controversy would arise; the press would be full of it, and a hundred million people would be exposed to his Communist ideas. He would gladly destroy all of his paintings if that would hasten by a day the coming of the Revolution.

WHILE discussing the Jewish question in Mexico, he told me some interesting and little known facts about himself. His grandfather was a Spanish nobleman who participated in an unsuccessful Revolution, and fled to Mexico. There he met and married a Portuguese Jewess. Their son was a mining engineer and an educator of the Indians. He married a Mexican woman, half Spanish and half Indian. Diego was the product of this union.

"Does your Jewish descent mean anything to you?" I asked.

"My Jewishness is the dominant element in my life," he replied. "Wherever I have gone, I have acknowledged myself a Jew. Whatever disabilities our people have suffered, I have experienced with them. From this has come my sympathy with the downtrodden masses which motivates all of my work."

Amazing people—these Jews.

The Stage in Review

The Yiddish Theatre Season

The Yiddish theatre in New York is now closing its season in the red artistically as well as financially. Never before, not even in the depression year of 1929, did the Yiddish theatre in New York show such a deficit as during this season.

To begin with, the public felt this season the absence of the Yiddish Art Theatre, conducted for years by Maurice Schwartz. This particular group was considered the best Jewish theatre in the world. And rightly so. It was Schwartz's theatre that brought out the best there is on the Yiddish stage in repertory as well as in acting and scenic effects. The productions of the Yiddish Art Theatre could be compared favorably with any of those on Broadway.

Likened to Guild

In fact the Yiddish Art Theatre under Maurice Schwartz was to the Jewish stage what the Guild Theatre in New York is to the American stage. It was an inspiration for Jewish playwrights. It was an inspiration for the Jewish actor. It inspired the young Jewish artist in his ambitions for a stage career, and served as a goal for the Jewish producer.

With the Schwartz group no longer in existence, the other Yiddish theatres in New York—perhaps a dozen of them—have lost their meaning. The serious-minded Jew was never enthusiastic about most of the other Yiddish theatres. Patronizing as he did the Yiddish Art Theatre, he cared very little for the others. Missing his favorite Yiddish theatre this season, he turned his attention to the English theatre. This may explain in part the success of such plays as "Awake and Sing" and "Rain from Heaven," dealing with Jewish content. It also accounts for the extraordinary success of the Arteff Theatre, a Jewish little theatre movement, now playing at 247 West Forty-eighth Street.

A sincere effort was made by a group of serious Jewish actors, led by the highly talented Jewish artist Joseph Buloff, to take the place of the Yiddish Art Theatre and to carry on its work. A number of distinguished Jewish artists—the majority of them members of the former Yiddish Art Theatre—formed a company on a collective basis in the same theatre on Second Avenue which had once housed its productions, and imbued with the desire to continue the fine tradition which the Yiddish Art Theatre had initiated under Maurice Schwartz as its director.

Proves Failure

This effort, however, was not successful. With no capital to provide for good costumes and original scenery, the new group barely brought its season to a normal close. Most of its productions, though well played, could not attract large audiences because of their poor stage settings. Spoiled by the rich and extravagant settings of Maurice Schwartz, the audience invariably left the performances of this group with a feeling of not having gotten what it had expected. The group was, therefore, compelled after long experimenting with other plays to close its season with an ordinary comedy, "The In-Laws" by Chono Gottesfeld, which had been played in this theatre before and which is far from the standard of those plays which Schwartz produced.

A similar situation developed also in those Yiddish theatres in New York which do not pretend to give artistic productions. Most of these Yiddish theatres specialize in musical comedies, and the best of

them has always been the Second Avenue Theatre, with Molly Picon starring in the title roles.

Will Molly Quit Stage?

The name Molly Picon has always been a sufficient attraction for hundreds of thousands of Jewish theatre goers. This vivacious little Jewish actress—the Sweetheart of the Jewish public—has always packed them to the doors, running usually one performance for an entire season.

This year, however, Miss Picon had to change her program at least three times. With the lowered prices on theatre tickets, the settings in Miss Picon's theatre did not display this season their usual elaborateness and originality, which had formerly contributed a good deal to the play and to the pleasure of the public.

The result of all this was that the Second Avenue Theatre experienced one of its worst seasons since its inception. Whether Miss Picon will return next season to the Yiddish stage is the subject of speculation in Jewish theatrical circles. Rumor has it that she is scheduled for Hollywood to star in the making of moving pictures dealing with Jewish life.

Musicals Lose Out

With the Second Avenue Theatre on the decline this season, the other Yiddish musical comedy productions, which can hardly compete with Miss Picon, faced an even more dismal season. A number of them indeed closed before the season was over. Others tried to exchange their leading artists and their programs. To little avail; the Yiddish theatregoer for some reason had lost its interest in musical comedy.

A good deal of this lack of interest in Yiddish musical plays may be attributed to the movies. Excellent movie operettas with leading musical comedy stars, gifted dancers, and gorgeously produced are now being shown in the Jewish sections of the city in well equipped theatres at very low prices. Furthermore, the young Jewish generation is not only critical of the Jewish theatre but influences the older

generation to abstain from it and to prefer the movies.

The moving picture is thus little by little pushing the Jewish light theatre out of existence. It achieves what the Jewish stage can never achieve. It serves as a bridge between the parents and their children. A Jewish mother going to the same movie to which her young daughter goes has later something in common to discuss with her daughter. This is not the case with the Yiddish theatre.

Lean Days Ahead

A lean future is thus predicted for the Yiddish stage in New York, which constitutes a large industry around which thousands of families gain their livelihood. With no new immigrants coming to the United States and with the older generation gradually falling out from the ranks of the public which still goes to see a Yiddish play, there is no reservoir from which the Yiddish theatre can draw its audiences.

With a poor season to look back upon and with a still poorer outlook for the future, a number of the best Jewish artists are now contemplating trying their lot next season somewhere in Europe or in South America. Mr. Schwartz was the first to sail, and left last month for Europe with the intention of producing there his latest and most successful play, "Yoshke Kalb." Two weeks later he was followed by a group of gifted artists who had agreed to join him in Europe to appear in this production. They intend to play in London, Paris and possibly Poland.

In the Book and Literary World

An Exile's First Novel

CAT ACROSS THE PATH. By RUTH FEINER. Translated from the German by Norman Alexander. 380 pp. New York: J. B. Lippincott Co. \$2.50.

RUTH FEINER has made her home in London since the advent of the Nazi regime. Before her exile she achieved considerable success as a composer and performer of popular songs, and she has used her knowledge of the ways of band leaders and cabaret owners in her first novel, "Cat Across the Path." If she had any great stake in Germany that she regrets, if she is troubled by any thoughts about the social or political conditions which made Hitlerism possible, she shows no symptoms in this frothy, romantic story. The German refugees are in an unfortunate position as novelists. There is little that they can add to the vast body of anti-Nazi literature, and yet they write without pertinent reference to the Hitler nightmare only at the risk of inconsequentiality, shallowness and seeming callousness. In the case of Miss Feiner's novel it seems a great waste of emotional energy to pity the three people who get themselves into a tangle for none but romantic reasons. Well, let's chalk that up to prejudice, and get back to the novel itself. The early chapters serve to introduce us to as perfect an array of stock characters as we are likely to come across.

Harold Strauss

THERE is the pale young man with an inferiority complex, of dull, struggling middle-class family (the type ruined by the inflation), gifted with a talent for music. There is the heavy father, rant, proverb-mumbler, reactionary, ear-tweaker. There is the shallow mother characterized only by her love for her son. There is the glamorous young friend, also gifted musically, wealthy, kindly, sympathetic, who tries to shake our pale young man out of his rut.

There is the old roué, Dr. Egon Kiess, noted music critic and seducer of women, who is finally driven into obscurity by a scandal bit too thick even for him. There is his lovely daughter, Sula, for years languishing in a girls' school, who suddenly breaks away and miraculously steps from job to job in his world of unemployment until he meets the wealthy young man and falls in love with him.

MEANWHILE our pale young man is living an agonizing existence. His father's shop has been bankrupted, and his forbidden pursuit of a musical career has become the only means of his parents' support. The very fact that he can play a piano has had to be kept secret from them.

But at last his stream of excuses or returning home at dawn from the cabarets where he entertains goes dry, and is forced to confess. His father, instead of exploding, is pleased by the thought that he must let his son, the breadwinner, dictate his terms. Our pale young man has lost track of his friend and former benefactor, who has assumed the name of Johnny Grove and become the Jazz King of Europe. With Sula attached to his entourage, Johnny is travelling from capital to capital and resort to resort. An American tour in the offing, however, makes it necessary to leave Sula behind. He must appear simon-pure to idol-worshipping American womanhood. Sula takes his decision very badly, and rushes off in a tantrum.

THE comes upon our pale young man in a night club. The one reminisces about the friend and the other about the lover by whom each has been deserted, without realizing that they are the same person.

Handy Volume on U. S. Jews

The Jews in American Life. By Rachel Davis-DuBois and Emma Schewpe. 136 pp. New York: Thomas Nelson and Co. \$1.00.

A slight but handy volume on the Jewish contributions to American life has been published by Thomas Nelson and Sons. Called "The Jews in American Life," it has been edited by Rachel Davis-DuBois and Emma Schewpe as the first of a series of volumes dealing with the contribution to American culture of the various races which have made up the "Melting Pot." It was prepared under the direction of the Service Bureau for Education in Human Relations.

As stated in the volume's preface, it aims to be an introduction for the students of America "toward attaining a fuller and eventually more adequate understanding of the backgrounds and strength of each nationality, cultural and racial group."

The book is written so as to be within the scope of any high school student. It briefly presents a panorama of Jewish life in this country from the days of Columbus to the present. It establishes the thesis that Jews are a component part of America. As a good-will medium, if widely enough distributed, this book may prove very valuable.

German Press Praises Career Of Dead Banker

But Fails to Note That Von Mendelssohn Was 'Non-Aryan'

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, June 14—The entire German press carries laudatory obituaries on Franz von Mendelssohn, famous banker and member of a distinguished German-Jewish family, who died yesterday in Paris at the age of 70. He was a descendant of the famous composer.

In the obituaries no mention is made of the fact that von Mendelssohn was a "non-Aryan."

Franz von Mendelssohn was a member of the general council of the Reichsbank. He was also a member of the League of Nations Consultative Committee on Economic Organization. He contributed greatly to the strengthening of the German financial position and was the first German president of the International Chamber of Commerce.

A senior member in the banking house of Mendelssohn and Company, Herr von Mendelssohn was also known as a patron of art and spent large sums of money for charity.

Carrying many honorary titles bestowed upon him by the German government, Von Mendelssohn gave up all his honorary posts when the Nazi regime came into power. It was then that he also withdrew from the directorate of the Reichsbank. He has since been living in retirement at his home in Berlin. He is survived by his wife, Marie Westthal.

Farm Groups Ready To Repay Loans

Ain Harod Colony Will Make First Payment of \$7,500 To Keren Hayesod

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, June 14—Commencing with the new agricultural year next October, the farm settlements in the Emek Israel will begin to repay to the Keren Hayesod the loans granted by it for their farm equipment, it was announced here today.

The first settlement to sign the contract with the Keren Hayesod was the Ain Harod colony, which must repay \$300,000 borrowed to settle 120 families. The colony will make its first payment of \$7,500.

trian official declared that these rights are inviolable and above all discussion. "The international relations of the Jews," he said, "constitute no obstacle to love of the country in which they live. On the contrary, these relations may be an advantage to the country in which the respective Jewish groups reside, and very often are."

To Launch Movement For Yiddish College

A conference called for the purpose of starting a movement to establish a Yiddish college in America will be held today (Sunday) at the Hotel Pennsylvania. The meeting is called by the Jewish Teachers Seminary in connection with academic rights recently granted it by New York State. Jewish cultural and labor organizations will be represented.

TRAVEL NOTES

FOR the past few years the steamship companies have noted an ever-increasing interest in Soviet Russia. Messrs. Schechter and Berman of the Central Steamship Agency agree that Russia, Palestine, and Poland are attracting large numbers of tourists this Summer. The popularity of the North Cape Cruises have not abated, however, they claim.

Berthold Gumbel, a director of the Palestine Shipping Company, arriving in New York and issued the following statement to the Anglo-Jewish Press:

"The Palestine Shipping Company was founded exclusively by Jewish business-men and its whole capital is in Jewish hands. The manager in Palestine is Dr. Ginsberg, well known in Zionist circles, and the Haifa office is in charge of Bernard Hirskevich.

"The kitchen is strictly kosher, wines are from the Rishon le Zion cellars. There is a synagogue and prayer books for all Jewish holidays. Already seventy per cent of the crew is Jewish and other Jews are employed as fast as they are trained for the sea. The 'Tel Aviv' at present gives a living to about 400 Jewish families in Eretz Israel.

"The S.S. 'Tel Aviv' is the beginning of a merchant marine for the Jewish National Home and her export trade."

Winter Advises Separate Drive For Polish Jews

Parley at Asbury Park Voices Sorrow at Pilsudski's Death

A resolution mourning the death of Marshal Josef Pilsudski was to be adopted Saturday night at the opening of the twenty-seventh annual convention of the Federation of Polish Jews at the Clarendon-Brunswick Hotel, Asbury Park, N. J.

The session was to open with a message from Benjamin Winter, president of the Federation, and with the annual report of Z. Tygel, the Executive Director.

In his message, Mr. Winter points out that the Federation was not founded for the sole purpose of aiding the Jews of Poland politically and financially. The principal aim of the founders, he emphasizes, was to unite all American Jews of Polish descent in order to help Jews of Poland wherever they may happen to be.

Urges Independent Drive

During the past year, however, circumstances have made the Federation give serious consideration to the idea of launching an independent relief campaign in America in behalf of the Jews of Poland, according to Mr. Winter. If undertaken this will be the first special American campaign for the benefit of the Jews in Poland only.

Urging that the convention give full power to the administration of the Federation to organize such a separate campaign, should it find this necessary, Mr. Winter points out that the Jews of Great Britain have launched a similar campaign for the Jews of Poland, with the full support of British Jewry. This campaign in America, Mr. Winter emphasized, should be under the supervision of a committee composed of all elements in American Jewry without distinction as to the country of their origin.

Mr. Winter also recommends "as a matter of principle" that the convention approve a project now sponsored by the Federation of Polish Jews in Great Britain, to form a united body of the Federations of Polish Jews all over the world. A world conference of representatives of the Federations in various countries will take place in London, either in August or in October, according to Mr. Winter.

Peoples Party of Transjordan. The petition denies that the Arabs of Transjordan would welcome Jewish immigration into Transjordan. It points out that the Arabs in Transjordan are against the Balfour Declaration which promises to establish a Jewish National Home in Palestine. It concludes with the request that the Mandates Commission should prohibit Jewish entry to Palestine in the future and that laws be issued preventing Jews from acquiring more land.






