Arabs Ask Cancelling Of Mandate

3 Other Petitions Aired Secretly by League Commission

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

GENEVA, June 14-Cancellation of the Palestine Mandate is demanded in the petition which Arabs submitted to the League of Nations and which is now being discussed in camera at the session of the Mandates Commission here.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed today that the Man-Commission has before it three other Arab petitions which Hurwich Surveys Decade demand the following:

- 1. Annulment of the concession which the Jews have obtained over Huleh, on the Palestine-Syria bor-
- 2. Pronibition of Jewish immigration into Palestine.
- 3. Stoppage of the sale of land to Jews in Palestine.

The Mandate Petition

The petition to cancel the Palestine Mandate was submitted to the League by the Syrian delegation of which Emir Shekib Arslan is the The petition points out that the Palestine Mandate is incompatible with the promises which were made by Great Britain to the Arabs during the World War.

The petition against the Huleh deal comes from an Arab group in Syria. It demands that the Huleh concession obtained by the Jews be annulled, contending that the land was sold to Jews by Arabs in Syria who are "traitors to the Arab cause."

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., June 14-Greater support is being given to Jewish education now by Jewish communities, and professionalization of Jewish teaching personnel has progressed in the last ten years, Louis Hurwich of the Boston Bureau of Jewish Education declared here today addressing the opening session of the tenth annual conference of the National Council of Jewish Education.

The National A Center Executives also opened its annual convention here today while the National Conference of Jewish Social Service opens its forty-sixth annual meeting tomorrow night at a general session to be attended by all groups.

Despite depression, the Jewish community has helped support the higher institutes of Jewish learning granting higher degrees, Mr. Hurwich pointed out in his summary of ten years of activity of the Educators' Council.

Mr. Hurwich appealed for planning education on a broader basis, for experimentation, research and making large Jewish masses "education conscious."

Halt Protest On Films, Nazis Told

Makes It Hard to Sell Nazi Product Abroad, Goebbels Explains

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, June 14-Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Nazi Minister of Propaganda, today issued an order that no demonstrations be staged in Germany against the showing of films produced in foreign lands in which Jewish actors appear as

"Such demonstrations endanger the German film industry," the Nazi Minister stated, explaining that it makes it difficult to sell German films abroad when foreign films are met with open hostility in Germany.

Bar Exams to Students

The German Minister of Interior vesterday ordered that "non-Aryan" medical and dental students who entered German universities in 1933 and are still continuing their studies are not to be admitted for final examinations. No degrees are to be conferred upon such students, the order provides.

A distinction is made in the order between "non-Aryan" students of German citizenship and Foreign students who are lands. "non-Aryans" can be admitted to final examinations but are not to receive final degrees, the order states.

The Minister of Interior in Saxonia ordered that among the "non-Aryans" who are not to be admitted to final examinations, nurses and midwives are to be included. Exceptions may be made only in special cases and by special permission from the Ministry.

Vienna Educator, Asks For Separate Schools In Austria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) VIENNA, June 14 - Declaring that he rejects absolutely the Nazi blood theory, Dr. Lugmayer, head of the educational department of Vienna, came out today with a project that a completely autonomous Jewish school system be created in

"This system should be independently administered by the Jews just as all purely cultural matters affecting Judaism should be conducted by the Jews themselves," Dr. Lugmayer urges.

Telegraphic Agency, Dr. Lugmaye explains that the reason he asks for an independent Jewish school system is not because he fears that Jewish children exercise an unfavorable influence on non-Jewish children.

"My many years of experience as professor at the Vienna High School, with a large Jewish body of students, are utterly at variance with this idea, but I consider that the Jews have a right to their own autonomous school system," the head of the educational department

The project provides that the autonomous Jewish school system begin with the elementary school and continue up to the university. "If a Jewish university cannot be created in each State, it can be established in one State to serve all of Central Europe," the Lugmayer plan states.

Riot Flares In Salonica; Arrested

Many Jews, Greeks Hurt In Street Fighting; Order Restored

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

SALONICA, June 14 - Rioting broke out last night in the Jewish quarter here, resulting in injuries to dozen of Jews and Greeks.

The riots followed an altercation between a Jew and a Greek. The quarrel led to extensive street fighting which developed into excesses.

Seven Greeks and three Jews were arrested as a result of the outbreak. Order was restored by the police, who patroled the Jewish quarter all night in order to prevent a recurrence of the outbreak.

Propaganda Continues

Despite the fact that the anti-Semitic press is not permitted to appear in Greece since the Venizelos revolution, anti-Jewish propaganda is still continued in the coun-This propaganda found particular expression during the election campaign to the Greek Parliament last week.

Two Jews were elected to the Greek Parliament on the Government Party list, which was supported by the entire Jewish popula-The fact that the Jews are utilized by the anti-Semitic agitators for anti-Jewish propaganda during the elections.

With the Government Party gaining 285 seats of the 300 in the Parliament at the election last Sunday, the Jewish population feels confident that any attempt at anti-Jewish outbreaks will be crushed.

Premier Panayoti Tsaldaris as well as all the other members of the Cabinet are known for their friendly attitude towards the Jews.

Capital Comment

WITH Germany, Mexico and other foreign countries increasing their persecution drives against minority groups within their borders, Washington officialdom is beginning to think that sooner or later the United States will have to reiterate its abhorance of racial, religious and political intolerance by any

Two years ago this month, eight indignant protest against the persecution of Jews in Germany. These were Senator Robinson of Arkansas, Metcalf of Rhode Island, Copefand of New York, Walsh of Massachusetts, Hatfield of West Virginia, Tydings of Maryland, Lewis of Illinois and Wagner of New

IN SPITE of all that has been said and written about persecution in Germany, the Hitler government continues its drive against minority groups with more fervor than ever. The words of protest have fallen on deaf cars. Senator King of Utah has made the suggestion that in view of Germany's continded drive against minority groups, it may be well for the United States to withdraw its friendly relations with that country. Several resolutions have been introduced in both houses of Congress for the purpose of requiring the State Department to enter an official protest to the Hitler government against the per secution of Jews. The State Department has ruled against the wisdom of such procedure.

While persecution of minorities continues unabated in Germany, a new country has come into the limelight for similar activities. This country is Mexico, where, according to reports, Catholics and Jews are suffering from intolerance. Efforts to have the United States of Interpose its good offices" on behalf of these people have failed in spite of precedents.

IN THE light of increasing intolerance against Catholics, Jews and other minority groups in foreign countries, Representative John P. Higgins of Massachusetts holds that "the American people find themselves confronted by a challenge of the fundamental principles and ideals that are the cornerstone of the structure of our governnient." He believes that the source of that peril is Mexico, because of that country's proximity to the United States.

"The problem which confronts our country today, in common with all his neighbors in America is: Shall we continue to maintain the high standards of justice, those eternal principles of human rights, upon which our system is founded and which are the lifeblood of our nation, or shall we stand idly by while systems develop which deny and denounce those principles?" Representative Higgins asks.

Saying that "it was fitting and proper for the representatives of our government in the Senate of the United States two years ago to express their disapproval of the policy of Hitler toward Jewish men and women in Germany," Representative Higgins wants to know "why should there be silence and this discrimination" where Carnones and Jews are being persecuted in Mexico at this very time.

T IS a well-recognized principle of the law of nations," Representative Higgins says, "that when one nation conducts its internal affairs in such a manner as to injure the tranquility of another nation, strong official representations may be made to the offending government. Says Arab-Jewish Amity Is Increasing

Dr. Gordon Sees Prosperity In Palestine Aiding Better Feeling

(Special to the J.D.B.) ATLANTIC CITY, June 14-As a result of Palestine's prosperity, hard-feeling between the Jews and Arabs is diminishing, according to Dr. Cyrus H. Gordon of the American School for Oriental Research in Baghdad, who addressed a meeting of local Zionists.

"Palestine is the most prosperous country in the world today," Dr. Gordon declared. "There is no unemployment problem. In fact, labor is scarce in some sections so that Jewish industrialists have to hire Arabs, and a better under standing has been the result."

He also pointed out that the Palestine government is maintaining all necessary functions with full payrolls and piling up treasury surpluses every year.

Untermyer Letter Clears Hospital

A letter from Samuel Untermyer clearing the Beth Moses Hospital of charges that its executives sought reportation for the German-Jewish leader of its employes and that the hospital used German goods was made public by Dr. M. L. Dryfus, medical director of the hospital, Friday.

In a letter addressed to Morris Walzer, president of the hospital, Mr. Untermyer said that "it is evident that the charges against the hospital... are baseless and apparently malicious and they are unreservedly withdrawn with apologies."

On the complaint of a group of the Brooklyn hospital's workers, Mr. Untermyer had written for an explanation and the apology was sent after a satisfactory reply was received.

Untermyer Declines Bid To Aid Rutgers Probe

Samuel Untermyer has decided to decline the invitation of Governor Harry Hoffman of New Jersey to participate in the investigation of the Rutgers University Board of Trustees into alleged Nazi propaganda activities at the university, he told the Jewish Daily Bulletin Friday, because the probe is not equipped with the power of subpoening witnesses and placing them under oath.

"It is for that reason," he said, "that I want a legislative investigation."

A WEEK'S EVENTS IN REVIEW

By BORIS SMOLAR

At least 100 Jews were injured this week—one of them fatally—in anti-Jewish riots which took place in different parts of Poland. In the city of Grodno alone there were sixty Jewish victims.

The Polish authorities confiscated the newspaper which reported the details of the riot. It has also seen to it that the news of these riots should not reach the foreign press.

These are the first riots which have broken out since the death of Marshal Pilsudski. The Polish authorities claim that the riots were organized by underworld elements. According to press reports from Warsaw it seems, however, that they were inspired by anti-Semitic political parties.

All Eyes on the Marshal's Successor

The eyes of Polish Jewry are now turned towards General Edward Rydz-Smigly, successor to Marshal Pilsudski, and towards Premier Valery Slawek who was Pilsudski's right-hand man. Should these two leaders of the present Polish regime fail to take the same strong measures against anti-Jewish excesses as did the late Pilsudski, then there is reason to fear that the riots of this week are only the beginning of a series of anti-Jewish events on a large scale.

Delegations from the Jewish communities where the riots took place appeared before the central government in Warsaw to plead for protection. While thirty Poles are now under arrest as the ringleaders of the riots, at least 300 Jews in Grodno alone registered as having suffered heavy property damages.

The riots in Grodno started from a clash between Jewish and Polish youths in a dance hall. A roush youth was stabbed. This was the signal for an organized attack on Jewish pedestrians, for smashing windows of Jewish houses and for pillaging Jewish stores.

As the police did not display sufficient activity in checking the wild mob, a Jewish self-defense was organized on the spot to protect Jewish life and property. Eight of the leaders of the self-defense were arrested. They were, however, later released when the authorities established that nothing remained for the Jews to do but to defend themselves as best they could.

Panic Lasted Over Three Days

The panic in Grodno lasted more than three days during which Jews were afraid to appear on the streets. Mothers feared to send their children to school. At least a dozen of the sixty Jews injured in Grodno are still in the hospitals. One Jewish youth was stabbed to death by the rioters.

The excesses in Grodno found an echo in the city of Suwalki and in two other townships where similar anti-Jewish excesses were staged by organized anti-Semitic forces. The excesses broke out by a whistle signalizing that everything was ready to start the

While the riots took place in the provinces, the leaders of the Government Party started negotiations with Jewish leaders in Warsaw to secure the support of the Jewish population in the forthcoming parliamentary elections. The Jews were offered by the Government Party six seats in the Polish parliament.

Agudath Israel Schools Put on Public Basis

Simultaneously, the government proclaimed the religious schools of the Agudath Israel, a Jewish Germany.

orthodox pro-government party, as full-fiedged elementary public schools, privileged to enjoy the same rights as government schools,

The schools maintained by the Agudath Israel are only a small fraction of the general school system in Poland which receives no government subsidy and enjoys no special rights. Of the 160,000 children attending Jewish schools in Poland a very small proportion attend the religious schools of the Agudath. The majority of Jewish parents send their children to the modern Jewish schools where all subjects are taught in Yiddish or in Hebrew. These modern schools were ignored by the government this week while special rights were given to the religious schools of the Agudath.

Kahn Reports On Polish Survey

A graphic picture of the Jewish situation in Poland today, not long after the death of Pilsudski, was given this week in New York by Dr. Bernhard Kahn, European director of the American Joint Distribution Committee. Dr. Kahn just returned from a survey which he made in Poland, and his report to the Joint Distribution Committee in New York is heartbreaking.

Dr. Kahn relates in his report that almost all of the 160,000 Jewish children of school age come to their clasrooms hungry, since even bread is a luxury in

their homes. He reports that in Warsaw alone 60,000 Jews depend on bread-lines and soup kitchens. A million Jews of all ages-a third of the entire Jewish population—lives on charity. Doctors, lawyers and other professionals have been reduced to a starvation level. About 150,000 Jewish workers are unemployed and have no unemployment insurance. Jewish industrialists are being squeezed out of their positions by heavy taxation and by all kinds of economic restrictions. Among those considered as employed are people earning just a dollar or two a week.

Situation Likened To Famine Years

The situation of Polish Jewry is now back to where it was during the famine years which were experienced in Poland immediately after the war. Jews are dying of hunger and the necessity of opening soup kitchens to feed thousands of them is one of the immediate problems.

The Polish government does nothing for its unfortunate Jewish citizens, although it realizes that the economic ruin of millions of Jews must soon affect the entire country. Leaving the Jews to their fate the Polish government continues to add pressure to their economic life by all kinds of economic discriminations.

Side by side with the gloomy picture drawn by Dr. Kahn on the Jewish situation in Poland, is the report on the prosperity in the Jewish colonies in Crimea which was made public this week by the Soviet government. While Jewish children in Poland suffer hunger, the Jewish children in the Crimean Jewish colonies enjoy good nourishment and are well provided for. Not a single Jewish colony in Crimea is without a school. Not a single Jewish settlement there is without medical care. Food is plentiful not only for the youth but for everybody. Life goes on without any worries for the future.

Thousands Dream Of Going to Soviet

Under such circumstances there is little wonder that hundreds of thousands of Jews in Poland

dream of proceeding to Soviet Russia. There may be no place for them in Crimea, but the Soviet government is firm in its decision to permit Polish Jews to settle in Biro-Bidjan for which an added four million roubles were allocated this week by the Soviet government to promote the Jewish agricultural work there.

The sad life of the Jews in Poland as compared with the life of the Jews in Soviet Russia is stimulating not only Polish Jews to proceed to Biro-Bidjan but also Jews from the Baltic countries, and from Rumania, particularly from the Bessarabian part of Rumania which formerly belonged to Russia and where the entire population is suffering under the Rumanian regime.

Quota System for Rumanian Universities

A decisive step against the Jews in Rumania was taken this week by the Minister of Education, Dr. Constantin Angelescu, who ordered all universities in Rumania to make drastic cuts in the number of students in the Rumanian universities. These cuts will affect the "national minorities and chiefly the Jews, since the entire issue revolves around the question of how to reduce the number of Jews in the professions of medicine, law and in commerce.

This order of the Rumanian Minister of Education means that the campaign which the anti-Semitic student bodies in Rumania carried on during the last few months against Jewish students has had successful results for these bodies. The order is obviously a capitulation of the present government to the demand of Dr. Vaida-Voevod, former Rumanian Premier, who has insisted that a "numerus valachius" be introduced in Rumania to eliminate the Jews from commerce and the professions.

False Report From Albania

A false alarm was given this week with a report that the Albanian government invites Jews for settlement in Albania. This report was, however, denied from Tirana, the capital of Albania. Members of the government explained that only those who wish to invest capital in Albania will be permitted to enter the country. Even in the case of such immigrants, the applications for entrance will be closely examined, the Minister for Public Welfare made clear in his explanation

This again leaves Palestine and Biro-Bidjan the only places still open for Jewish immigration. There are naturally more people anxious to proceed to Palestine than to Biro-Bidjan, but there are many Jews, especially among the youth and the artisans, who would be willing to proceed to Biro-Bidjan if they were only given the facilities to do so.

Zionism Suffers Great Loss In Dr. Levin's Death The Jews in Palestine and the

Zionists all over the world suffered a great loss this week when Dr. Shmarya Levin, the veteran Zionist leader, died suddenly last Sunday in Haifa. Dr. Levin was one of the most brilliant orators in the Zionist movement and was considered the most able organizer. He organized the Zionist movement in America in the years after the War and was also responsible for bringing the Jews in Germany nearer to Zionism. He was buried in Tel Aviv side by side with Biallk and Achaad Ha'am,

Had he learned a little more about the Indian, said Rivera, he would have realized how profoundly impoverished and miserable he really is. The only hope for the Indian is industrial civilization, but socially owned.

THE present Mexican govern-ment, Rivera says, is Socialist in name only. In reality, it is the police agent of Wall Street. Only Communism will redeem Mexico. But not the Communism of the Third Internationale. For that, he thinks, has also sold out to Wall Street. Rivera is a Trotzkyist; that is, he believes in World Revolution. For this, the Russian Communists who are ready to make bargins with Wall Street in order to promote the success of the Russian experiment, have expelled him from the party.

He refused to ocmpromise in the Rockefeller Center controversy, not because of principle, but to advance the Revolution. If he had deleted Lenin's face, it would have made no essential difference in the picture. But then only a relatively small number of people would see the picture and learn of his views. If he refused to do it, a controversy would arise: the press would be full of it, and a hundred million people would be exposed to his Communistic ideas. He would gladly destroy all of his paintings if that would hasten by a day the coming of the Revolution.



The Stage Review

The Yiddish Theatre Season

The Yiddish theatre in New York is now closing its season in the red artistically as well as financially. Never before, not even in the depression year of 1929, did the Yiddish theatre in New York show such a deficit as during this season.

To begin with, the public felt this season the absence of the Yiddish Art Theatre, conducted for years by Maurice Schwartz. This particular group was considered the best Jewish theatre in the world. And rightly so. It was Schwartz's theatre that brought out the best there is on the Yiddish stage in repertory as well as in acting and scenic effects. The productions of the Yiddish Art Theatre could be compared favorably with any of those on Broadway.

Likened to Guild

In fact the Yiddish Art Theatre under Maurice Schwartz was to the Jewish stage what the Guild Theatre in New York is to the American stage. It was an inspiration for Jewish playwrights. It was an inspiration for the Jewish actor. It inspired the young Jewish artist in his ambitions for a stage career. and served as a goal for the Jewish


With the Schwartz group no longer in existence, the other Yiddish theatres in New York-perhaps a dozen of them-have lost their meaning. The serious-minded Jew was never enthusiastic about most of the other Yiddish theatres. Patronizing as he did the Yidaish Art Theatre, he cared very little for the others. Missing his favorite Yiddish theatre this season, he turned his attention to the English theatre. This may explain in part the success of such plays as "Awake and Sing" and "Rain from Heaven," dealing with Jewish content. It also accounts for the extraordinary success of the Artest Theatre, a Jewish little theatre movement, now playing at 247 West Forty-eighth

A sincere effort was made by a group of serious Jewish actors, led by the highly talented Jewish artist Joseph Buloff, to take the place of the Yiddish Art Theatre and to carry on its work. A number of distinguished Jewish artists-the majority of them members of the former Yiddish Art Theatre-formed a company on a collective basis in the same theatre on Second Avenue which had once housed its productions, and imbued with the desire to continue the fine tradition which the Yiddish Are Theatre had initiated under Maurice Schwartz as its director.

Proves Failure

This effort, however, was not successful. With no capital to provide for good costumes and original scenery, the new group barely brought its season to a normal tion is not only critical of the Jewclose. Most of its productions, though well played, could not attract large audiences because of their poor stage settings. Spoiled by the rich and extravagant settings of Maurice Schwartz, the audience invariably left the performances of this group with a feeling of not having gotten what it had expected. The group was, therefore, compelled after long experimenting with other plays to close Its season with an ordinary comedy. "The In-Laws" by Chono Gottesfeld, which had been played in this theatre before and which is far from the standard of those plays which Schwartz produced.

A similar situation developed also in those Yiddish theatres in New York which do not pretend to give artistic productions. Most of these Yiddish theatres specialize in musical comedies, and the best of A Thackeray Novel Screened in Blaze of Color

them has always been the Second generation to abstain from it and Avenue Theatre, with Molly Picon to prefer the movies. starring in the title roles.

Will Molly Quit Stage?

The name Molly Picon has always been a sufficient attraction for hundreds of thousands of Jewish theatre goers. This vivacious little Jewish actress-the Sweetheart of the Jewish public-has always packed them to the doors, running usually one performance for an entire season.

This year, however, Miss Picon had to change her program at least three times. With the lowered prices on theatre tickets, the settings in Miss Picon's theatre did not display this season their usual elaborateness and originality, which had formerly contributed a good deal to the play and to the pleasure of the public.

The result of all this was that the Second Avenue Theatre experi enced one of its worst seasons since its inception. Whether Miss Picon will return next season to the Yiddish stage is the subject of speculation in Jewish theatrical cir-Rumor has it that she is scheduled for Hollywood to star in the making of moving pictures dealing with Jewis hlife.

Musicals Lose Out

With the Second Avenue Theatre on the decline this season, the other Yiddish musical comedy productions, which can hardly compete with Miss Picon, faced an even more dismal season. A number of them indeed closed before the season was over. Others tried to exchange their leading artists and their programs. To little avail; the Yiddish theatregoer for some reason had lost its interest in musical comedy.

A good deal of this lack of interest in Yiddish musical plays may be attributed to the movies. Excellent movie operettas with leading musical comedy stars, gifted dancers, and gorgeously produced are being sections of the city in well equipped theatres at very low prices. Furthermore, the young Jewish generaish theatre but influences the older

The moving picture is thus little by little pushing the Jewish light theatre out of existence. It achieves what the Jewish stage can never achieve. It serves as a bridge between the parents and their children. A Jewish mother going to the same movie to which her young doughter goes has later something in common to discuss with her daughter. This is not the case with the Yiddish theatre.

Lean Days Ahead

A lean future is thus predicted for the Yiddish stage in New York, which constitutes a large industry around which thousands of families gain their livelihood. With no new immigrants coming to the United States and with the older generation gradually falling out from the ranks of the public which still goes to see a Yiddish play, there is no reservoir from which the Yiddish theatre can draw its audiences.

With a poor season to look back upon and with a still poorer outlook for the future, a number of the best Jewish artists are now contemplating trying their lot next season somewhere in Europe or in South America. Mr. Schwartz was the first to sail, and left last month for Europe with the intention of producing there his latest and most successful play, "Yoshke Kalb." Two weeks later he was followed by a group of gifted artists who had agreed to join him in Europe to appear in this production. They intend to play in London, Paris and possibly Poland.

German Press Praises Career **OfDeadBanker**

But Fails to Note That Von Mendelssohn Was "Non-Aryan"

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, June 14-The entire German press carries laudatory obituaries on Franz von Mendelssohn, famous banker and member of a distinguished German-Jewish family, who died yesterday in Paris at the age of 70. He was a descendant of the famous composer.

In the obituaries no mention is made of the fact that von Mendelssohn was a "non-Aryan."

Franz von Mendelssohn was a member of the general council of the Reichsbank. He was also a member of the League of Nations Consultative Committee on Economic Organization. He contributed greatly to the strengthening of the German financial position and was the first German president of the International Chamber of Com-

A senior member in the banking house of Mendelssohn and Company, Herr von Mendelssohn was also known as a patron of art and spent large sums of money for charity.

Carrying many honorary titles bestowed upon him by the German government, Von Mendelssohn gave up all his honorary posts when the Nazi regime came into power. It was then that he also withdrew from the directorate of the Reichsbank. He has since been living in retirement at his home in Berlin. He is survived by his wife, Marie

Winter Advises Filene and Gottheils Separate Drive For Polish Jews

Parley at Asbury Park Voices Sorrow at Pilsudski's Death

A resolution mourning the death of Marshal Josef Pilsudski was to be adopted Saturday night at the opening of the twenty-seventh annual convention of the Federation of Polish Jews at the Clarendon-Brunswick Hotel, Asbury Park,

The session was to open with a message from Benjamin Winter, president of the Federation, and with the annual report of Z. Tygel, the Executive Director.

In his message, Mr. Winter points out that the Federation was not founded for the sole purpose of aiding the Jews of Poland politically and financially. The principal Another seasoned traveler who is taking aim of the founders, he emphasizes, was to unite all American Jews of Polish descent in order to help Jews of Poland wherever they may happen to be.

Urges Independent Drive

During the past year, however, circumstances have made the Federation give serious consideration to the idea of launching an independent relief campaign in America in behalf of the Jews of Poland, according to Mr. Winter. If undertaken this will be the first special American campaign for the benefit of the Jews in Poland only.

Urging that the convention give full power to the administration of the Federation to organize such a separate campaign, should it find this necessary, Mr. Winter points out that the Jews of Great Britain have launched a similar campaign for the Jews of Poland, with the full support of British Jewry. This campaign in America, Mr. Winter emphasized, should be under the supervision of a committee com posed of all elements in American Jewry without distinction as to the country of their origin.

Mr. Winter also recommends "as a matter of principle" that the convention approve a project now sponsored by the Federation of Polish Jews in Great Britain, to form a united body of the Federations of Polish Jews all over the world. A world conference of representatives of the Federations in various countries will take place in London, either in August or in October, according to Mr. Winter.
