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Urges Plan To Redirect Jobs Trend

Dr. Selekman Outlines 10-Year Program at Lake Placid

(Special to the J.D.B.)

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., June 16—A ten-year program of Jewish occupational redirection, to be executed "on a large and adequate scale" in communities large enough to form a basis for full experimentation, was recommended here by Dr. Ben M. Selekman, president of the National Conference of Jewish Social Service, in addressing the first general session of the forty-sixth annual meeting of the Conference.

Pointing out that "the problem of Jewish economic adjustment is inextricably bound up with the problem of the entire American Jewish community," and calling attention to the fact that the recent Supreme Court decision on the NRA indicates that a fundamental change in America must come gradually, Dr. Selekman said that Jewish social workers must think through and help to effect a sound program for recovery and reconstruction.

Must Stir Opinion

"Social workers must help rouse public opinion to enact adequate measures of relief and of social security," he said. "But Jewish social workers must also make some approach to the peculiar problems of economic maladjustment among Jews."

Dr. Samuel C. Kohs, of the Graduate School of Jewish Social Work in New York, recommended the formation of a National Council for the redirection of occupations among Jews. This council, he said, should be joined by large Jewish national, religious and fraternal organizations, as well as by women's and social service agencies.

The problems of economic adjustment of Jews in America should be studied very carefully, Dr. Kohs advised. He emphasized that a study of these problems made in thirty small Jewish communities in the country showed that each community has individual difficulties which must be solved for that community, rather than on a national scale.

Dr. Kohs reported that the Southern and Southwestern small Jewish

Reich Zionists Buy 65,000 Shekolim

BERLIN, June 16—A total of 65,000 Zionist Shekolim have been sold in Germany entitling each Shekel buyer to vote for the election of delegates to the forthcoming World Zionist Congress in Lucerne, it was announced today by the Zionist Organization.

This is the first time that such a large number of Shekolim has been sold in Germany. The Zionists' Federation of Germany will be represented at the next Zionist Congress with a strong delegation.

28,000 March Past Grave Of Herzl in Vienna

Zionists, Chalutzim Join In Marking Anniversary of His Death

VIENNA, June 16—Twenty-eight thousand Jews marched today past the grave of Dr. Theodor Herzl, the father of political Zionism, at the Vienna Jewish Cemetery, commemorating the thirty-first anniversary of Dr. Herzl's death.

All Zionist factions participated in the pilgrimage, including a large contingent of Chalutzim. The procession was led by Dr. E. Feuchtwang, Chief Rabbi of Vienna, and included members of Jewish student societies.

The immediate destruction of folders advertising "Aryan hotels" in the Summer resorts of Austria was ordered today by the Board of Austrian Tourists Bureaus.

The order was issued in view of the fact that dissemination of such folders would prevent the patronage of Jewish guests in many Austrian Summer places and would thus affect the income of the State from tourists.

Prof. Julius Cohen Dies; Was Chemical Expert

LONDON, June 16—Prof. Julius Berend Cohen, author, inventor and professor of organic chemistry, died in Leeds today at the age of 76.

Prof. Cohen was a member of the Leeds University faculty until 1924. He was considered a great authority in the field of chemistry and was an expert on smoke abatement.

Call Boycott Of Resorts In Danzig

Polish Anti-Hitler Group Cites Anti-Jewish Outbreaks

DANZIG, June 16—The Danzig authorities were greatly perturbed today by a call issued in Poland to boycott Summer resorts in the Danzig area because of the anti-Jewish spirit there.

The call was issued by the Central Committee of the Anti-Hitler Economic Campaign in Warsaw. The Summer resorts in the Danzig area depend almost entirely on Jewish patronage.

The boycott appeal discloses that anti-Semitic outbreaks have occurred recently in the Summer resorts of Zoppot, Brezen, Oliva and Gletkow—all under the administration of the Nazi-controlled Danzig Senate.

"In spite of the fact that in the Summer Jewish visitors to these health resorts are the main source of income for the local Germans, the Jews are being terrorized there and publicly insulted," the Central Committee points out.

"With the Summer season approaching, not a single Jew must think of going to the above health resorts," the appeal continues. "On one side Jewish honor is being insulted and Jewish life imperilled and on the other the German hotels are luring Jewish visitors with cringeworthy."

Emphasizing that the constitution of Danzig is being constantly violated to the detriment of the Jews and that the position of the Jews in the Danzig area has grown worse since the Nazis came to power there, the appeal concludes with the advice that Jews ought rather to patronize the health resorts in Poland on the shores of the Baltic Sea than those around Danzig.

Tripoli Deports Its Chief Rabbi

Italian Province Under Rule of Italo Balbo, Ex-Air Minister

ROME, June 16—The deportation of Chief Rabbi Castel Bolognese from Tripoli, which is under the administration of Italy, was reported here today.

Tripoli is the capital of Tripolitania, Italian Libya. It has a mixed Jewish and Mohammedan population. It is being administered by Marshal Italo Balbo, former Aviation Minister who led the flight of Italian aviators to the United States several years ago.

Marshal Balbo performs purely administrative functions, while the legislative power is reserved to Rome.

Trotsky Refuses Bid To Edinburgh U. Post

LONDON, June 16—Leon Trotsky, the Soviet-Jewish Communist leader who was exiled by Stalin from Soviet Russia, has refused an invitation to figure as candidate for Rector of the Edinburgh University, the London press reports.

The invitation to Trotsky was sent by the Edinburgh University. In refusing to accept it, Trotsky declared that although the proposal was very flattering, he felt he had no right to make use of it because of his definite political views.

Pledges Arabs That Council Will Be Formed

Wauchope Tells Defense Party Work on Body Starts Soon

JERUSALEM, June 16—Sir Arthur Wauchope, the High Commissioner of Palestine, has officially assured an Arab delegation that a Legislative Council will be established in Palestine in the very near future despite the opposition of the Jews.

Receiving yesterday a delegation of the Arab National Defense Party, of which Ragheb Bey Nashashibi, former Mayor of Jerusalem, is the leader, Sir Arthur denied a report that he has abandoned the idea of establishing a Legislative Council in Palestine.

"I wish to announce that this is not true. We are going to start negotiations very soon for the establishment of the Legislative Council," the High Commissioner said.

Emphasizing that nothing can change his opinion with regard to the necessity of a Legislative Council in Palestine, the High Commissioner declared that the establishment of such a Council "is in the interests of the country." He added that the Council will be composed of representatives of Arabs, Jews and government officials.

The statement by the High Commissioner created a tremendous impression, both among the Jews and the Arabs. The Legislative Council, if established, will place the Jews in the status of a national minority.

War Veterans of 12 Countries Attend World Parley in Paris

Nazis Bar Rally of Jews In Berlin

Parley Was to Air Theory That Jews Must Stay in Reich

BERLIN, June 16—The German authorities prohibited a meeting called for last night by the Central Union of German Citizens of Jewish Faith for the purpose of advocating the theory that the solution of the Jewish problem in Germany lies within Germany.

Though supporting Jewish emigration from Germany to Palestine, the leaders of the Central Union are of the opinion that emigration alone will not solve the present precarious position of German Jewry. They believe that whether the Nazi government wishes it or not, the majority of German Jews will have to remain in Germany and adjust themselves to the existing circumstances.

Nazis Opposed to Theory

This theory is totally discouraged by the Nazi regime, which wishes to see the Jews out of the country. In prohibiting last night's meeting the Nazi authorities made it clear to the leaders of the Central Union that they will not tolerate any propaganda which aims to encourage Jews to remain in Germany.

At a meeting of Nazi leaders in Berlin it was agreed today to start a more drastic policy against the Jews in the Saar, despite the promise given to the League of Nations that the Jews of the Saar would not be molested for one year after the region joined the Reich.

The proposal to introduce severe measures against the Jews in the Saar was made at the meeting by Dr. Buerckel, Nazi Commissar for the Saar.

Dr. Buerckel asserted that all the Saar Jews voted against Germany in the plebiscite which was to decide whether the Saarland was to become a part of Germany.

Shechita Attacked on Radio By Official Polish Newspaper

WARSAW, June 16—The Jewish population of Poland was considerably stirred today following a radio broadcast attacking Shechita, the Jewish method of slaughtering animals. The broadcast was made by Tadeusz Nieszalowski, a member of the staff of the Gazeta Polska, official organ of the Polish government.

Since radio broadcasting here is controlled by the government, the

talk was taken as an indication that the government approves of the current campaign against the Jewish slaughtering ritual.

It was understood here today that the radio authorities at first were unwilling to permit the broadcast, but their objections were overruled. Embarrassed by the protests which the radio address has provoked, the authorities are now anxious to hush up the entire matter.

Hitler's Victories

LONDON.

Adolf Hitler's biggest victory has been the conversion of The Times, England's most famous newspaper, declares George Malcolm Thomson in an unusual article in the Daily Express.

"The newspapers tell us what the nation is thinking," says Mr. Thomson, discussing the effects on England of Chancellor Hitler's latest speech. "They re-

dress soft words to us, we should return soft words to Hitler."

* * *

Guardian Still Hostile

Daily Herald—"Strongly anti-Hitler in the early days of the Nazi regime, it now has praise for Hitler. It finds comfort in his latest speech . . . the reason is not so much love of Hitler as hostility to the British government."

Manchester Guardian—"Remains hostile to Germany. But the attitude of this Liberal newspaper is determined not so much by fear of German intentions in the field of foreign policy as by hatred of the persecutions of Jews, Roman Catholics, Socialists and Communists which the Nazis have carried out and are still carrying out."

Daily Express—" . . . it got at cross purposes with his (Hitler's) government over the persecutions of the Jews and the attacks on the Roman Catholics. . . . It urges the benefits of a policy of isolation. . . . It is obvious, therefore, that it can have no feeling towards Germany one way or the other."

* * *

Sees Sympathy for Hitler

Thomson's summary of the newspaper stand is:

"Taken all over then, the British press shows much sympathy for Hitler. The Daily Express stands alone for isolation. The Morning Post lifts a lonely banner of alliance with France. The Manchester Guardian encourages no illusions about Hitler. But elsewhere kind words for Hitler, a belief that we should come to terms with that leader."

But do the newspaper accurately represent British public opinion?

"What is more," says Mr. Thomson, "the trade unions have eased up in their hostility to the Nazi regime. When Hitler destroyed the German trade union movement and sent its leaders to the concentration camps, bitter was the denunciation that went forth from the chiefs of the British unions. It seemed that an undying hostility had been proclaimed."

"But the hostility has been damped down. The reason is that Fascism in this country has failed to become a movement of any consequence."

* * *

Deplores Silence of Jews

"Harder to account for is the silence in the Jewish camp. They made an impressive start, but, as things have turned out, they have not fought well against the Nazis. Yet the cause is as urgent as ever. The persecution of Israel in Germany goes on with undiminished severity. And the German government, at the same time, encourages anti-Jewish feeling in this country."

"The campaign against religion in Germany, accompanied by persecution of pastors and priests and by propaganda in favor of a pagan cult, has failed to excite the active horror in Britain that might have been looked for. The Nazis have escaped the condemnation which descended on the Bolsheviks for their anti-God campaign."

"So here is the new fact which we must face: The existence in this country of a large body of opinion favorable to the German point of view, willing to make terms with Germany, offering concessions to the ambitions of Hitler. The movement goes very far. . . .

Between the Lines

A Jewish "Ten-Year Plan"

The National Conference of Jewish Social Service, now taking place in Lake Placid, is one of the most interesting gatherings in American-Jewish life. It deals directly with problems concerning Jewish activities in the United States and with the adjustment of Jewish life here in all its phases.

Of special interest is the project recommended at the conference by Dr. Ben M. Selekman of a ten-year program of Jewish occupational redirection. Dr. Selekman advocates that this ten-year program be carried out on a large and adequate scale. He believes that with the help of such a program Jews in America will become readjusted to new occupations which may reconstruct basically the entire economic life of the Jews in the United States.

Adjusting American Jewry

The problem of adjusting American Jews to new occupations has long been advocated by numerous outstanding Jewish leaders. Prominent men in American Jewry have come out openly with the advice that Jews should go in less for medical and legal professions and should in general adapt themselves to occupations in which Jews are now little represented.

Guided by the experience in Nazi Germany, some of the Jewish leaders in this country have given thought to the idea of reconstructing Jewish life along such lines as would make it impossible for anti-Semitic elements in this country to point out that Jews monopolize certain economic fields and desert others.

A Sound Idea

Dr. Selekman's ten-year plan will therefore attract no little attention. It is a plan which, if carried out, may save American Jewry much worry in the future. The details of this plan will be closely studied not only by Jewish leaders but every Jew interested in the economic and social welfare of the Jews in this country.

Needless to say, if Dr. Selekman's ten-year project is adopted, it will require careful planning and much research before it can be carried out. Plenty of experimentation will have to be done. Plenty of mistakes will probably be made. Plenty of difficulties will have to be overcome.

But the idea of readjusting American Jews to new professions is a sound one. The principle is a healthy one. Execution of this idea should therefore unite all those who wish to see American Jewry living a normal economic and social life.

Spelling Jewish Unity

At the conference in Lake Placid it was suggested by Dr. Samuel C. Kohn that a national council, consisting of representatives of all Jewish national, religious and fraternal organizations, be formed in order to supervise the readjustment of Jews to new occupations, under the ten-year plan outlined by Dr. Selekman. This suggestion deserves serious consideration. Aside from bringing together all important Jewish organizations for the specific purpose of economic readjustment, it would also cement unity in American-Jewish ranks.

Several Jewish national conventions were held this week-end in different parts of America. The convention in Lake Placid, however, may be considered the most important. This convention may spell a turning point in Jewish life in America.

World Press Digest

Looks Into Future Of Jews in Holy Land

The Daily Examiner of Huddersfield, England, discussing the Jews in Palestine, says:

Since the War some very profound changes had been going on in Jewry. Today there were 300,000 Jews in Palestine, and they were increasing at the rate of forty per cent to fifty per cent a year. On that basis of increase it could be assumed that ten years hence there would be roughly 1,000,000 Jews in that land. The Jews would then be in the majority there. What would that mean to the Holy Places sacred to the Christian faith? It seemed likely that those million Jews would be predominantly atheistic, because at the present time the practical expression of Zionism in Palestine was at least irreligious, if not anti-religious. The Jews going back to Palestine had broken all connection with orthodox Judaism. Material success was coming to Palestine, and the more tangible the success of the Zionist movement, as measured by material success, the greater would become the racial pride and the national ambitions of the Jews. As their racial pride and ambition became greater the anti-

Semites would become more antagonistic to them.

Art and Nazism

Held Incompatible

The New York Post carries the following editorial:

Art and Nazism simply do not go hand in hand.

Richard Strauss, famous composer of "Rosenkavalier," "Salome," "Don Juan," "Till Eulenspiegel," etc., is the latest victim of Nazi displeasure because he insisted upon using a libretto by Stefan Zweig, who is Jewish, for his new opera, "The Silent Woman." Strauss's works are reported due for the Nazi ban.

Asked why he employed a Jewish librettist, Strauss replied:

"It isn't easy to find librettists. Writing opera texts is a special art."

Considering the fact that Herr Strauss heretofore has made frantic efforts to get along with the Nazis (he was always something of a politician in such matters), the incident merely shows the idiocy which holds sway in the Reich today. When the complaisant Strauss can't get along with the Jew-baiters, one can only shudder for the fate of other German musicians.

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First Million Subscribed In Appeal Drive

1 Quota by End of Year, Warburg Declares

Announcing that the first million subscribers had been subscribed to date and the \$3,250,000 goal of the Jewish Appeal, Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the national campaign, expressed confidence yesterday that fund-raising campaigns to be projected in scores of important communities throughout America will meet with the same vigorous response as the campaigns recently completed.

King the results to date as an Mr. Warburg said, "My associates and I feel that our quota will be attained by the end of this year."

Mr. Warburg asserted that "there sharpening instead of an amelioration of conditions confronting Jews of Germany," adding that situation of the Jews in Poland is also disastrous."

Need for U.S. Help Jews of Germany

The cultural and economic life of the Jews of Germany is to be served, there must be substantial help from the United States, in opinion of Prof. Joseph P. Chamberlain of Columbia University who was designated by the American government as this country's representative on the Advisory Council of the League of Nations High Commission for Refugees.

Prof. Chamberlain's views were outlined in a letter asking for support of the United Jewish Appeal, addressed to Joseph C. Hyman, honorary secretary of the Appeal.

The committee will have a membership of 100 outstanding Jewish leaders from the communal, literary and Zionist fields, Mr. Eisenman, a friend of Dr. Levin, declared.

The first undertaking of the Shmarya Levin Memorial Committee will be the issuance of a special memorial edition of Dr. Levin's selected works in English.

Hart, Brace & Co., American publishers of Dr. Levin's works, have announced that his books are now in print and that they would cooperate in the publication of this special edition.

Canadian Senator Assails Nazi Regime

Hitler Policy is Menace to Society, He Tells Social Workers at Montreal

MONTREAL, June 16—Emphasizing that the Hitler policy is a menace to society, Senator R. Dandurand, member of the Canadian Senate and former member of the League of Nations Assembly, bitterly assailed the Nazi government today in an address at the closing session of the national conference of social workers here.

Senator Dandurand appealed to the United States to "come to Geneva and save humanity."

A Canadian branch of the American National Conference of Jews and Christians was formed here following a good-will luncheon attended by leading clergymen of all denominations in the United States and Canada. Rabbi Philip Bernstein of Rochester, N. Y., reported on a successful good-will tour in the United States.

400,000 Jews Quit Poland Since War's End

Report by HIAS Affiliate Reveals 153,011 Left In Last Decade

Close to half a million Jews left Poland for other countries beginning with 1918 and ending 1934, it was disclosed yesterday by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society.

In the ten-year period from 1924 to 1934 the number of Jews emigrating from Poland was 153,011. These figures are contained in a report to HIAS by its affiliate, JEAS (Jewish Central Emigration Association).

The exact figures from 1918 to the end of 1934 are 404,22. Of these 360,653 went to overseas countries and 3,769 settled in Continental European lands. The 153,011 who departed from Poland in the decade already referred to, were divided as follows: 40,611 went to the United States and Canada, 48,950 to South America (Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay) and 50,402 to Palestine.

These figures do not include the Polish Jews who migrated to various Continental European countries.

The report points out that as an indication of the urge of Polish Jews to emigrate is to be mentioned the fact that Polish-Jewish emigrants constituted sixty per cent of the total emigration from Poland in 1931, sixty-one per cent in 1932 and eighty-three per cent in 1933.

JEAS, which serves Polish Jewry in all matters regarding emigration, maintains headquarters at Warsaw with branches in many other cities. It is the organization which represents prospective emigrants at governmental departments.

Warsaw Rabbis' School Sends Delegation Here

A delegation under the leadership of Rabbi Salomon Yoskowitz has arrived in America to represent the interests of the Messifita, rabbinical seminary in Warsaw, of which Rabbi Yoskowitz is president.

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
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Brith Sholom Asked to Back Education Plan

Lewis, McDonald Speak At Opening of 30th Convention

(Special to the J.D.B.)

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 16—Only 200,000 of the 1,000,000 Jewish children in America of school age are receiving a Jewish education, it was disclosed today by Judge William M. Lewis, grand master of the Order Brith Sholom, at the thirtieth annual convention of the Order held here.

The convention, also addressed by James G. McDonald, League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees from Germany, is scheduled to last three days.

"It is high time," Judge Lewis said, "that we grapple with the problem of Jewish education as a communal responsibility. The American Jewish community dare not postpone this responsibility any longer."

Judge Lewis expressed the hope that the convention will formulate a constructive plan by which the Order Brith Sholom may have larger resources to be expended in furthering Jewish education among children.

Lauds 2 Groups

Analyzing Jewish life in the United States, Judge Lewis paid special compliments to the work of the American Jewish Committee and the American Jewish Congress.

"We recognize the great service which the American Jewish Committee is rendering the cause of the Jewish people and wholeheartedly support it," Judge Lewis said. "The American Jewish Congress, younger in point of years of service, is an agency for good, fully justifying our support of it."

Demanding that immigration possibilities be opened to absorb as many Jewish refugees from Germany as possible, Judge Lewis urged that a beginning be made in all countries to find a final settlement of the refugee problem. In addition to immigration possibilities, which must be opened, he advocated that reconstruction measures be applied to absorb as many refugees as possible in to the economic life of the country.

Palestine Work 'Epic'

The significance of Palestine was emphasized by Judge Lewis in connection with the Jewish problem in Eastern and Central Europe. "What the Jews have accomplished in Palestine within a brief space of fifteen years is one of the epics of all time," he said. "It is a record of pioneering and of self-sacrificing vision that has few parallels."

Dwelling on the situation in Poland, Judge Lewis declared that Jewish life is being cruelly crushed out in that country by economic discrimination. He emphasized that it is of highest importance for American Jews to take their place side by side with those who would preserve the democratic institutions of the United States and who would keep America free from the fantastic heresies of the supremacy of any particular race.

Judge Lewis concluded his message with an appeal for unity in Jewish ranks. "It is our paramount duty today as Jews to stand together more closely than ever before and to present a united front to the wave of hatred and prejudice now rolling over the world," he said.

communities are largely unaffected by the present depression, but other small Jewish communities, ranging from 1,000 to 5,000 Jews, need occupational redirection.

Joseph E. Beck, of the Jewish Family Welfare Society of Philadelphia, reporting on the economic adjustment problems among Jews, outlined the experience provided by 1,000 clients of a Jewish and a public relief agency.

Others who participated in yesterday's discussion on the economic readjustment of American Jewry, were Irwin Rosen of the Federation Employment Service of New York and Robert C. Hoppock of the National Occupational Conference of New York.

Sees U.S. Jewry Growing At Progressively Lower Rate

(Special to the J.D.B.)

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., June 16—The growth of American Jewry will be at a greatly decelerated tempo in the next few decades, eventually ceasing altogether.

This was predicted today in the presidential report submitted by William Pinsker, president of the National Association of Jewish Center Executives, to the conference of the Association taking place here.

"American Jewry," Mr. Pinsker said, "can no longer count upon accessions of strength from the old reservoirs of Europe. It must seek from within itself the solutions to the problems of survival which it faces."

"The time is coming, Mr. Pinsker continued, "when direction will be as greatly needed as action, and it will be necessary to consciously motivate changes rather than merely adapt ourselves to them as they occur. The Jewish Center will be called upon to take a more aggressive stand on many questions than it has hitherto been requested to take."

Sees Neutrality Ending

Pointing out that the Jewish Center has worked mightily as an instrument for the preservation of Jewish life, rather than as an agency of assimilation, Mr. Pinsker emphasized that in the major conflicts which are dividing American and Jewish communities into opposing camps, the Jewish Center is neutral.

"The time will come, however," Mr. Pinsker warned, "when neutrality will become extremely difficult; when a middle-of-the-road position will mean standing still—where one road will lead to survival and another to disintegration, we shall be called upon to choose which road to follow."

The problem of the American Jewish school system came up for discussion at the National Council for Jewish Education which is meeting here simultaneously with the National Conference of Jewish Social Service and the National Association of Jewish Center Executives.

Nathan Brilliant, Jewish educator of Cleveland, said that the interest now displayed in the work of the Jewish Sunday school is encouraging. The Sunday school, he reported, is rapidly attracting a greater number of children to it and holds its children for a much longer time than any Talmud Torah.

Israel Konowitz, veteran Hebrew pedagogue of New York City, read a critical and stimulating paper on the achievements of the daily Hebrew School in America.

Reports were also rendered at the meeting by Zvi Scharfstein, noted Hebrew educator, Ben Rosen of Philadelphia, Dr. Samuel Dinin, Dr. Barnett R. Brickner and Dr. Louis L. Kaplan of Philadelphia.

An interesting report was rendered by A. P. Schoolman of New York regarding the establishment of a Department of Education at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Mr. Schoolman expressed his satisfaction with the response which this project has received in America.

Find Working Girls In Good Condition

100, Approved by Doctors, Leave Soon for Camps Of Vacation Society

The average Jewish working girl between 18 and 25 years of age is strong, healthy, and of normal weight for her age and height, according to the reports of the three physicians who are making health examinations of girls who enroll for Bay House and Lehman House, both conducted by the Jewish Working Girls' Vacation Society. The doctors, who have already examined the group of more than 100 girls who leave for camp vacations on July 1, have only had to reject one applicant outright, it was announced yesterday by Mrs. Sydney B. Erlanger, chairman of the society's registration committee.

The society, one of the agencies in the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, conducts Bay House at Bellport, L. I., and Lehman House at Big Indian in the Catskills at non-profit rates. Registration periods are maintained throughout the Summer at the Educational Alliance, 197 East Broadway, and the Federation Building, 71 West Forty-seventh Street.

Library Asks for New Copy of Palestine Book

"Modern Palestine," the book published two years ago by Hadassah, has been literally read to death in the New York Public Library.

Dr. Joshua Bloch, director of the Jewish department of the library, has notified Mrs. Edward Jacobs, Hadassah national president, that the copy of "Modern Palestine" in his department is the most widely read reference book on Palestine. So frequently was it handled during the year that it is worn beyond use. He asked for and received a new copy.

Swedish School Creates Post for Reich Exile

STOCKHOLM, June 16—Dr. Ernst Cassirer, an internationally known Jewish philosopher who was dismissed by the Nazis from the University of Hamburg, was appointed today to occupy a special chair of philosophy in the Gotesburg University.

Dr. Cassirer is the author of many books on philosophy which are considered standard works. He was born in Breslau, Germany, sixty years ago. He was an active member of the Academy for Jewish Science.

Asbury Park Convention Mourns Death of Pilsudski

ASBURY PARK, N. J., June 16—A resolution protesting against the recent anti-Semitic excesses in Poland was adopted here last night at the twenty-seventh annual convention of the Federation of Polish Jews in America.

The convention also adopted a resolution mourning the death of Marshal Josef Pilsudski.

"Marshal Pilsudski," the resolution reads, "during his struggle for Poland's liberation and later as its Marshal never discriminated against anyone because of his race or religion, although he never gave utterance to this guiding principle. In his memoirs he speaks of Jewish devotion and love for the cause of Poland's liberation."

The convention, in session at the Clarendon-Brunswick Hotel, is attended by 400 delegates. Today's session was addressed by Mrs. Florence R. Dolowitz in behalf of the ORT, the organization to promote artisanship among Jews, and by Dr. Joshua Goldberg, in behalf of the American Jewish Congress.

Gershon Badder delivered an address eulogizing the late Zionist leaders' Shmarya Levin and Chaim Nachman Bialik. Z. Tygel spoke in memory of Dr. Zemach Szabad and Dr. Z. Bychowski, late leaders of Polish Jewry.

The project advanced by Benjamin Winter, president of the Federation, to launch a separate relief campaign in America for Polish Jews, was warmly accepted by the delegates.

School Seek \$250,000 For Expansion Plan

Granting of State Charter Marked by Teachers' Seminary

An organization council to raise \$250,000 for an expanded program of the Jewish Teachers' Seminary was appointed at a conference the Hotel Pennsylvania yesterday called to take public cognizance of the recent granting to the Seminary of a New York State charter making it the only officially recognized Jewish secular institution higher learning in the country.

Addressing 300 delegates to the conference, Dr. Hayim Fine, professor of literature at Temple University, Philadelphia, urged emphasis on constructive higher learning, rather than concentration on defense against anti-Semitism. He expressed gratitude to Governor Lehman and the State Legislature for recognizing the Seminary.

David Pinski, who presided, outlined a plan for financing a program of education by gaining 5,000 charter members for a seminary-university.

To Invite Reich Exiles

Philip Gingold, executive secretary, explained that the curriculum will include four divisions: teachers' training department, arts course for Jewish students, labor college and an adult education department.

He said that a number of ex-German-Jewish professors will be invited to join the faculty.

Dr. A. Coralnick, associate director of the Jewish Day, urged that the seminary be considered acceptable to all parties and groups in American Jewry.

A message from Prof. Albert Einstein expressing regret at his inability to be present was read. Others who greeted the seminary at morning and afternoon sessions were: B. C. Vladeck, general manager of the Jewish Forward; Samuel Margoshes, editor of The Jewish Day; Zalman Rubashov of the Palestine Jewish Labor Federation; Dr. Chaim Zhitlovsky, Yiddish author, and Carl Sherman, former New York attorney general.

It was announced that similar conferences will be held throughout the country during the Summer and a national convention early in the Fall.
