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Lay Bias to Post Office In St. Louis

Civil Liberties Union Says 3 Were Fired in Anti-Semitic Spirit

(Special to the J.D.B.)

WASHINGTON, June 28—Charges of anti-labor and anti-Jewish discrimination by Post Office authorities against members of the St. Louis branch of the National Association of Substitute Post Office Employees will be made here tomorrow by the American Civil Liberties Union.

The Union announced that it will call on Postmaster General Farley to submit the cases to arbitration by some impartial body, such as the Labor Board to be created under the Wagner-Connery Labor Disputes Act.

Charging that Acting-Postmaster W. R. Jackson at St. Louis had forced the dismissal of three substitutes, Theodore Bronstein, Samuel Raban and Samuel L. Rosen, who had been active in the substitute's organization, the Union declared that the efforts of its attorney, Frederick A. Ballard, Washington, D.C., to secure arbitration had been unsuccessful.

How Case Started

"These three cases," the Union said, "grew out of an utterly inoffensive letter written last Summer by Wm. F. Hill, president of Local No. 9 of the N.A.S.P.O.E., to a St. Louis newspaper criticizing the Farley program of economy and the failure to appoint substitutes to vacancies. Charges of 'disloyalty' were promptly filed against Mr. Hill. When substitutes rallied to his support, the three men now

Plan Federation Of Austria Jews

Groups to Be Welded, Vienna Conference Decides

VIENNA, June 28—The hope that the Austrian authorities will not place obstacles in the way of the formation of a Federation of Jewish Communities in Austria, was expressed here at a conference of delegates from various communities throughout the country held for the purpose of creating a united front in Austrian Jewry.

The conference pointed out that there is an urgent need for the creation of an authoritative, comprehensive organization of the Jews in Austria. As a result of the conference, a Federation of Jewish Communities has been projected, and the Jewish community of Vienna was instructed to take all necessary steps to bring this Federation into existence.

The Vienna Jewish Community has also been authorized by the Conference to inform the Federal Minister of Education and Public Worship, of the formation of this Federation.

Levin Memorial Rites To Be Put on Records

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 28—The memorial session Sunday evening at the thirty-eighth annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America for Shmarya Levin, the late Zionist leader who played an important role in the upbuilding of the Zionist movement in America, will be recorded for posterity, according to an arrangement between the Zionist Organization and the Audio-Scriptions of New York.

The records will be sent by the Z.O.A. to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem as a gift.

Rumania Lifts Restrictions On Funds Transfer

Releases Money Raised By Jews for Use in the Holy Land

BUCHAREST, June 28—The Rumanian government today decided to permit the transfer to Palestine of funds collected in Rumania among the Jews for work in upbuilding the Holy Land.

This decision was adopted after representations made by Zionist leaders to lift the existing restrictions on taking money to foreign countries.

The first 5,000,000 lei (over \$50,000) will be transferred to Palestine in five monthly instalments, it was announced.

The money will be transferred through the Rumanian National Bank. The authorities expect that this step will lead to improved commercial relations between this country and Palestine and to an increase in the export of Rumanian goods to the Holy Land.

The largest item of export from Rumania to Palestine today is timber, which is used in Palestine for packing boxes for oranges.

Quit Activity On Boycott Poles Warn

Members of Closed Anti-Hitler Group Warned By Government

WARSAW, June 28—The government today informed every member of the Central Anti-Hitler Boycott Committee in Warsaw that the resumption of activities by the committee will be punishable.

The headquarters of the committee, which were closed by the authorities last week, have not been reopened. The activities of the boycott committee are still not hindered in the provincial cities.

Two leaders of the anti-Semitic National Democratic Party were today sent to a concentration camp for the recent anti-Jewish disturbances which broke out in the township of Sokoly near Lomza.

2 Others Imprisoned

The authorities have also sent to a concentration camp two ringleaders of the recent anti-Jewish riots in Suwalki near Grodno. Both are members of the Polish National Democratic Party.

The Municipal Council in the city of Wilno today ordered the closing down of two large Jewish schools where 700 pupils were registered. In issuing the order, the Council explained that the measure was taken as an economy move.

Elections to the Jewish communities throughout the country will take place after the elections to the Polish Parliament have been concluded.

Czech Zionists to Send 10 to World Congress

PRAGUE, June 28—The Zionist Organization of Czechoslovakia will be represented at the next Zionist Congress in Lucerne with ten delegates, it was announced here today, at the conclusion of the election of delegates to the Congress.

Aged Reich Refugee Released by French

PARIS, June 28—Jacob Frommer, well known Jewish writer on philosophic subjects, who is a German refugee, was released today after spending seven days in a Paris prison for not having left the country upon the expiration of his visa.

Mr. Frommer, who is 72, was today given a week's time by the French authorities to leave the country. His situation is tragic since he has no visa to enter any other country. He was arrested in Germany during the World War as a pacifist and had to leave Germany when the Nazis came into power.

Urges Reform Zionist Party For Palestine

Heller Proposal Greeted With Enthusiasm At Chicago

CHICAGO, June 28—The formation of a "Reform Zionist Party" in Palestine, similar to the Mizrahi Orthodox Zionist Organization, was urged today by Rabbi Heller of Cincinnati at the convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis being held here at the Congress Hotel.

The recommendation was made at a midnight session of the convention which lasted until four o'clock in the morning. The suggestion was met with thunderous applause.

Prior to opening the midnight session the Central Conference of American Rabbis paid a glowing tribute to Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver at a meeting held at the Ravisloe Country Club, near Chicago.

Ovation for Silver

Rabbi Silver was given a great ovation at the conclusion of the reading of his paper, which dealt with the definition of Judaism. A discussion followed, led by Rabbi Samuel H. Goldenson, president of

Hitler Given Warning by Dr. Schacht

Is Told New Anti-Jewish Drive May Kill Reich's Chance for Loan

BERLIN, June 28—A warning to Hitler that a new wave of anti-Semitism in Germany may spoil the efforts of the Nazi government to obtain a loan abroad, was given by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, Minister of Economics, it was learned here today in diplomatic circles.

Dr. Schacht emphasized that it will be difficult for Germany to pull through the Winter if this loan is not obtained.

A mob threatened to storm a Jewish department store in Falkenberg yesterday when the owner was charged with refusing to reinstate a discharged "Aryan" employee. The owner of the store was arrested.

Hess Probes Merchants' Origin

Rudolf Hess, Nazi Minister without portfolio and Hitler's right hand man, started an investigation today into the racial origin of the owners of the Wertheim Department Store, one of the oldest and largest in Berlin. At the same time Minister Hess issued an order to discontinue the propaganda in the Nazi press against the Wertheim enterprise.

An official announcement published today discloses that 12,207 "non-Aryans" were dismissed from the German Post Office system for their Jewish descent. Of this number, 10,069 were civil service servants, and 2,138 were classed as laborers.

Bureya Railway Employs Jews

Old Russian Tradition Broken Over Protest Of Officials

MOSCOW, June 28—Numerous Jewish settlers in Biro-Bidjan, the Jewish autonomous district in the Far East, are adjusting themselves as railway workers in the district, according to a survey made public here today.

The survey reveals that, due to the fact Jews in Russia were never employed on railroads, it was difficult in the beginning to induce them to undertake that type of work. On the other hand, officials in the Far East objected to the employment of Jews on the railroad because of the old tradition barring them from such work.

A number of rail officials have been dismissed for hampering the employment of Jews, the survey discloses. At present, Jews are working as engineers, conductor, signalists, railway telegraphers and are represented in practically all branches of railway work in numerous stations in the Far East.

1,962 Jews Quit U.S. for Holy Land in Year; Took \$5,500,000 With Them, Report Reveals

A total of 1,962 Jews left America to settle in Palestine during the last twelve months, according to a report to be submitted to the thirty-eighth annual convention of the Zionist Organization which opens this morning (Sunday) at the Ritz Carlton Hotel in Atlantic City.

Of this number, 1,601 entered Palestine as capitalists, bringing with them a total of not less than \$5,500,000.

The average number of inquiries with regard to immigration into Palestine made by American Jews in the Palestine Department of the Zionist headquarters is given as 150 per week in the report which was compiled by Dr. S. Bernstein, director of the Palestine Office in New York.

The membership of the Zionist

Organization of America has increased from 7,000 in 1932 to 18,000 in 1935, according to the presidential message which was to be delivered Saturday night by Morris Rothenberg, president, at a meeting of the national executive committee. The income of the Zionist Organization of America during the last twelve months was \$112,000, according to Mr. Rothenberg.

The sum of \$17,500 was sent to the World Zionist Executive in London for Shekolim. A total of \$17,000 was expended during the year on The New Palestine, weekly organ of the Z.O.A.

Mr. Rothenberg, in his presidential message, reviews the achievements of the Jews in Palestine during the past year and recommends the complete reorganization of the structure of the Z.O.A. He

also suggests a new form of representation in the Jewish Agency in order to make the latter a more effective instrument.

More than 400 delegates are expected to participate in the convention, which will last through July 2. Emphasizing the precarious position of the Jews in Germany and in Poland, Mr. Rothenberg finds that Palestine is now the only place where Jews can find refuge.

Mr. Rothenberg voices sharp opposition against the newly revived proposal of the Mandatory Power to establish a Legislative Council in Palestine. The time is not yet ripe for such an institution, Mr. Rothenberg says in his message. "A Legislative Council in which Jews will be a minority must be resisted by the Jewish people to the uttermost," he emphasizes.

Capital Comment

A CONCERTED move to enact anti-alien legislation is taking shape in the House of Representatives as the closing days of the present session of Congress approach. The hope is that action will be taken on these restrictive measures during the last few days of the session when legislative blocks normally gain the opportunity of riding their proposals through the bill in the rush of last-minute business.

The anti-alien bills have already been reported out of the House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization.

Altogether there are about a half dozen such measures, with more than twenty additional proposals pending before the committee. In the main all of the restrictive measures are of two types. One type would make it easier to deport aliens while the other would either partially or wholly bar immigration to the United States.

ONE OF the leaders of the new movement is Representative Martin Dies, who has introduced a notable string of anti-alien bills. His most famous bill would prohibit entry of new immigrants who seek to establish a home in this country. It would make mandatory deportation of aliens of illegal entry regardless of what the circumstances of their entry may be. It would force aliens already in this country to become citizens within twelve months, or else they would be deported. It would require that all aliens obtain Labor Department permits to work in this country and permits would be issued only to employers on proof that they could not obtain United States citizen to do the work. The only liberal part about the measure is that it would permit the gradual reunion of families not likely to become public charges when the economic condition of the country is improved.

Representative Dies claims that there are approximately 6,000,000 aliens in this country who would be deported if his bill were enacted into law. He blames the problem of unemployment on the aliens. He says he has informa-

tion that Germany has deported 3,000,000 of its aliens in an effort to solve its problems, and wonders why the United States should not do the same. Perhaps Mr. Hitler can tell him. In any event, the Texan is engaged in a drive to gain support for his measure. He claims that "at least 150 Congressmen" favor his bill. One of these is Representative Thomas Blanton, also from Texas and user of the same figures on the number of aliens in this country.

JUST WHAT is behind all of this anti-alien raving is not very hard to understand. All indications point to a manifestation of intolerance on the part of those who freely talk about American principles of freedom of speech, freedom of the press and freedom of religious and political views. The number of bills introduced during the present session of Congress and directed against aliens and immigration, remind one of the wartime days when anti-alien feeling was running high.

Most of the anti-alien propaganda will not stand the spotlight of truth and facts. Take for instance the figures used frequently by Representatives Blanton and Dies. Daniel W. MacCormack, Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization in the Department of Labor, has referred to the figures as "fantastic exaggerations."

WHILE Representative Dies contends that there are 3,500,000 aliens in this country who have entered illegally, Commissioner MacCormack says the facts are that there are "probably less than 100,000." The highest estimate made by the Department of Labor is under 200,000. And if those aliens who entered legally but who cannot prove their legal admission are counted, the best available estimates from official sources indicate that the total, including those who entered illegally, would not exceed 400,000.

The Labor Department itself, is suspicious of the anti-alien movement which has made marked headway during the last few years. Sponsors of anti-alien legislation are ever ready to paint the alien as a menace to our form of government. They say that he endangers the American standard of living. These same people point to the depression and cry out that the alien is the cause of nation-wide unemployment. In order to prove their points, they cite what Commissioner MacCormack has termed "fantastic exaggerations."

COMMISSIONER MacCormack admits that "there is in this country today an anti-alien prejudice which affects indirectly a third of our population—for one person out of every three in this country is of foreign birth or foreign parentage." From this it is quite evident that it took more than the so-called "natives" to make this country the great nation that it is today.

And yet, Representative Dies reports plans for an organization to support his anti-alien bill. This organization would be nation-wide in scope and would be called "The Americans." State units would be formed. Membership would be open only to native-born and naturalized citizens.

THE NEXT week or two may be expected to give a clearer picture of what the outcome of the present legislative drive will be. Meanwhile, close watch must be kept of the various activities of the proponents of this type of legislation. The thinking members of Congress are opposed to restrictive measures which have for their sole purpose the destruction of the real principles on which this country was founded.

In view of the rising tide of prejudice against aliens, it would seem highly desirable that every effort be made to obtain the real facts of the alien situation. Perhaps a thorough study of the whole alien situation needs to be made. The Labor Department would do well to arm itself with every additional fact available or which could be made available through research in order to meet a development which may be expected to grow. In obtaining these facts, it seems quite important that the real motives behind the instigators of the anti-alien movement be uncovered. Only through a complete expose of the whole movement of anti-alien prejudice and the ultimate destruction of this drive, can this country continue to be regarded as a safe place for the law-abiding alien to live.

Feinerman, secretary of the American branch of the Yiddish Scientific Institute. Mr. Feinerman is sailing to attend the institute's tenth anniversary congress at Wilno, Poland.

Former Ambassador to Germany James W. Gerard, General Sessions Judge Otto A. Rosalsky and James Speyer, banker, were to sail on the Cunard liner Majestic.

Mrs. Edward Jacobs, president of Hadassah, was to leave on the

Italian liner Conte di Savoia for her seventh visit to Palestine after which she will attend the Lucerne World Zionist Congress.

Rabbi Harry J. Stern of Montreal and Rabbi Leon Fram of Detroit were to sail for Palestine on the Italian liner, Conte di Savoia.

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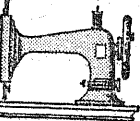
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Appeal to Realism

THE Jewish press is very much agitated over the naval agreement Great Britain has made with Germany. I cannot understand why. Have we been so naive as to believe that any great power would be sufficiently unselfish to sacrifice its national interests for the Jews or for "civilization"? If so, then we have learned nothing from nineteen tragic centuries.

Clarence Darrow once said to me that he could not recall a single altruistic act that had ever been performed by any nation. Having even for lapses of memory, his contention is essentially correct. Whereas individuals are capable of altruism, nations apparently are not. National self-interest is not only the dominant but the exclusive motive in international relations. There is, of course, a difference between blind and enlightened selfishness, and occasionally a nation rises to the latter. But in the light of history, no nation can be expected to sacrifice a single advantage to promote the interests of any other group or of society as a whole.

WE JEWS had better be realistic about the struggle with Hitlerism. It is our struggle, and ours alone. There isn't a nation on earth that would not be ready to strike a profitable bargain with Hitler, regardless of how it affected the German Jews. Does this seem too cynical? Then look at the immigration statistics. Has any nation's heart bled so sympathetically for the Nazis' victims that it gave them refuge in any substantial number? Voices may have been raised against their mistreatment, but no nation was prepared to make any real sacrifice for them.

What about labor and the church? Certainly, these have been attacked by the Nazis. Nevertheless, I can see nothing fundamentally different between what Hitler and Mussolini have done to the labor unions. And I anticipate that the protests of labor in one case will be about as short-lived and ineffective as in the other. American labor as a whole is hardly aware of the anti-Nazi boycott and may be expected soon to ignore it altogether.

WITH regard to the church, it must be remembered that important international religious bodies, like the Baptists, have met in Germany since Hitler came to power, and although there were occasional guarded insinuations or disapproval, nothing was said or done to indicate to the German nation that they were prepared to fight against Hitlerism.

Now must we forget what has happened in Russia. In Germany, the forms, at least, are being preserved. In Russia, the Communists set out to destroy religion completely. Of course, there were bitter protests at first from the outraged churches of the world. But where are they today? The destruction of religion in Russia has been finally accepted as a fact. And at present, increasing numbers of clergymen are going there to study approvingly the "great social experiment."

IT IS not cynicism but realism which leads me to have no faith in the continuous moral indignation of mankind. The other nations will make bargains with Hitler when it suits their advantage. Tourists will return with glowing reports of the increased prosperity, efficiency, and orderliness of Germany under the Nazis. The churches will work out some *modus vivendi* with Goebbels and Rosenberg. Labor will accept and adjust itself to the realities of the situation.

For the Jew, however, no adjustment, no compromise, no bargain is possible. Even if we should wish to come to terms with the Nazis, it could not be done. For they have declared war not on our ideas or institutions, but on our blood. Something flows in our veins, they say, which makes us everywhere and at all times inferior and undesirable.

VERY well then, war it must be, even though the odds are against us and we fight alone. Not war with arms, but with ideas and economic sanctions. Self-defense demands that we meet every Nazi lie with the truth, in the faith that eventually the truth will prevail. Self-respect demands that we have no traffic with the Nazis, even though it affect not in the least their attitude or their activities. If the corner grocer abuses my wife and threatens to attack my children, shall I continue to patronize him, even though I know that my refusal to do so will not put him out of business? To the extent that there is economic power behind the boycott, it will serve as a warning to other nations that may be tempted to emulate Hitler. Regardless, however, of its practical effects, the absolute boycott of Nazi Germany is the only self-respecting position the Jew can decently take.

Although we wage the battle alone and even appear to be worsted, there is the assurance not only of our own integrity but that we have found this fight before and somehow have prevailed. The Titus who wrote "*Judaea Capta, Judaea Devicta*" is a name on an ancient stone, but the very hill from which he hurled his firebrands at Jerusalem is now the seat of a great Hebrew University, a testimony to the imperishable faith and destiny of the Jew.

Anti-Nazi Conclave Maps Boycott Aid

Measures to Counteract Propaganda Here Discussed At United Conference

A program of action providing for support of the anti-Nazi boycott, relief and agitation for the release of political prisoners in Germany and measures to counteract Nazi propaganda in the United States were to be adopted at the United Anti-Nazi Conference Saturday at the New School for Social Research, 66 West Twelfth Street. Scheduled speakers were: James Waterman Wise on national minorities, Paul Reid, executive secretary of the American League Against War and Fascism, on Nazi activities in the United States; Hans Fleischer, German refugee; Eleanor Brannan on the position of women in Germany; Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld, exiled former Prussian minister of justice and F. Clayton Powell, Jr., pastor of the Abyssinian Baptist Church, Harlem.

Warsaw Poetess Arrives

Kadia Molodofsky, Yiddish poetess of Warsaw, arrived Friday on the S.S. Washington for a prolonged visit. Miss Molodofsky is the author of three books of verse, the latest of which, "Freidke," has just been published.

Salonica Jews Appeal To Government for Aid

SALONICA, June 28—An appeal to the Greek government to aid in the maintenance of local Jewish institutions was addressed today by the leaders of the Salonica Jewish Community, who emphasized that only government aid can save a number of Jewish institutions in this city of 60,000 Jewish inhabitants.

At a press conference today, leaders of the Jewish community explained that the continued deficit of 1,000,000 drachmas each year makes the position of the Jewish community critical.

'Too Many Generals' Held Jews' Trouble

Quality of Leadership Hit by Rabbi Margolis at Young Israel Convention

The complaint that Jewry is "beset with too many generals" was voiced by Rabbi William Margolis of Congregation Ohav Zedek in an address which was to be delivered at a convention luncheon of the Council of Young Israel Saturday at Asbury Park, N. J.

He blamed upon poor leadership the failure of the Jews to "stem the tide of Hitlerism" and to arrive at national unity.

Declaring that the men of Young Israel "have sat back complacently too long," he urged them to banish the "self-appointed Jewish leaders." The convention will continue today (Sunday).

Jewish Chautauqua Lists Lectures for Summer

A series of lectures on Hebrew and Jewish lore in various cities of the United States were announced for the Summer by the Jewish Chautauqua Society. Among the lecturers are: Rabbi Adolph H. Fink, Rabbi Abraham Cronbach, Rabbi Abram Brill, Rabbi Sidney L. Regner, Rabbi Samuel Wolk, Rabbi Ira E. Sanders and Rabbi Edward N. Calisch.

Says Torgsin Service Is Expanding in U. S.

Reports that recipients of Torgsin orders in Soviet communities become objects of suspicion were declared "entirely baseless" by I. I. Gordeeff, general representative of Torgsin in the United States and Canada, in a press statement Friday. He cited the constant expansion of the Torgsin service as refutation of the charge.

The year 1934-5 has witnessed
 an intensification of Zionist ef-
 fort and Zionist sentiment in the
 United States. The membership
 of the Zionist Organization, sup-
 plemented by the Roll Call, has
 continued to grow, though admit-
 tedly not commensurate with lat-
 ent Zionist sentiment. Palestine
 fund-raising has been stimulated;
The New Palestine, the official
 organ of the Zionist Organization
 of America, has been expanded
 and improved; Zionist propaga-
 nda has been heightened through
 lectures, literature and meetings
 of a variety of character; the
 Palestine Department has broad-
 ened its service. All the existing
 forces within the Zionist move-
 ment have been conserved. New
 Jewish elements, and Jewish and
 non-Jewish opinion in support of
 Palestine upbuilding have been
 enlisted through the Washington
 Conference and Palestine Day.
 We have taken our part in the
 shaping of World Zionist policy.

For the first time in the history
 of the Zionist movement in
 America a campaign for election
 of delegates to the World Zionist
 Organization was carried on in a
 manner to bring home to Zionists
 and to Jewish public opinion the
 significance of the Zionist Con-
 gress in Jewish life, and a clarifi-
 cation both of the technique of
 campaign procedure and of the
 issues agitating the Zionist mind,
 which have had a highly educa-
 tional value.

There were many activities
 which the Zionist Organization
 wished to undertake but could
 not, for lack of financial means.
 This subject goes to the very
 heart of the future of the Zionist
 Organization, and should receive
 the most earnest consideration of
 this convention.

Notes Big Rise
In Membership

Three years ago when this Ad-
 ministration assumed office, the
 membership of the Zionist Orga-
 nization of America was at a
 very low ebb, approximately 7,000
 in number. Today the official
 membership roster shows 18,000
 members. This figure by no
 means represents what may, with
 steady application, be attained,
 but the maximum figure will only
 be reached when the way is
 found for the employment of an
 adequate field staff. Voluntary ef-
 fort, though invaluable, will be
 found inadequate to cope with the
 problem of organization. There
 are literally hundreds of small
 towns in the United States, stag-
 nant because of their failure to
 receive the stimulation of the
 spoken Zionist word.

An expression of deep apprecia-
 tion is due to presidents and
 other officers of regions; presi-
 dents, secretaries, treasurers and
 other officers of local Zionist
 districts, and to their co-workers
 throughout the country, for the
 work that has been performed by
 them in the several branches of
 Zionist activity. We know that
 we have taxed them to an un-
 usual degree. Their patience,
 their devotion to Zionist ideals,
 constitutes the greatest asset of
 our movement.

Roll Call Brought
20,000 New Shekolim

The Roll Call which was under-
 taken pursuant to a decision of
 the last convention did not real-
 ize expectations. About 20,000

have enrolled. This activity ran
 concurrently with preparations
 for Palestine Day and the Wash-
 ington Conference. This may in
 part account for the inadequate
 results. However, it must be
 frankly admitted that there was
 no genuine interest in this spe-
 cial activity, many Zionists in
 various parts of the country look-
 ing upon it as competitive and
 injurious to membership enroll-
 ment. The one positive result
 from the Roll Call endeavor was
 the securing of 20,000 additional
 Shekolim.

The effort to enlist groups as
 members in the Zionist Organi-
 zation has not been tested. Ob-
 stacles of a technical and finan-
 cial character were too many to
 achieve this aim.

Deficit Remains
About the Same

Despite the substantial increase
 in expenditure in connection with
 several activities undertaken, the
 deficit has but slightly changed.
 It is fixed in the financial report
 at \$59,000 as against \$57,300 last
 year and \$125,750 in 1932, when
 the present Administration took
 office. Were it not for the addi-
 tional expenditures entailed by
 the expansion of *The New Pal-
 estine*, Palestine Day, the Wash-
 ington Conference, the Congress
 elections—the deficit would have
 been materially reduced.

The finance committee, consist-
 ing of Messrs. Louis P. Rucker,
 chairman; Harry P. Fierst, treas-
 urer; Isidore Goldberg, Abraham
 Krumbein, Abram Liebovitz, Sig-
 mund Thau, Louis Rinsky, and
 Morris Weinberg, has given close
 attention to the finances of the
 organization, and they are enti-
 tled to an expression of our ap-
 preciation of their efforts. A
 special word of appreciation is
 due to Mr. Rucker, the chairman
 of the finance committee, for his
 unremitting attention to our fi-
 nancial problems and his unhesi-
 tating helpfulness at all times.

The Extension Fund
Limited by Appeal Drive

Pursuant to authority of the
 administrative committee, the Zi-
 onist Extension Fund was estab-
 lished in November, 1934. It was
 the aim to secure the sum of
 \$100,000 throughout the country,
 to enable the Zionist Organi-
 zation of America to undertake a
 larger program of activities
 among which was contemplated a
 Department of Education; an ex-
 pansion of *The New Palestine*,
 and a wider support of youth ac-
 tivities.

It was found that to lay the
 proper foundation for the raising
 of this sum it would be necessary
 to engage in considerable field
 work. With this end in view,
 Mr. Mendel Fisher, one of the
 outstanding field directors of the
 United Jewish Appeal, was per-
 suaded to take a leave of absence

from his regular work and devote
 himself to the Zionist Extension
 Fund. He prepared the ground
 for a mid-western tour by the
 president of the Zionist Organi-
 zation of America, who visited all
 of the principal Jewish communi-
 ties between New York and Kan-
 sas City.

The work got fairly well under
 way when the United Jewish Ap-
 peal pressed forward with its ac-
 tivities and the Jewish National
 Fund, departing from its previ-
 ous policy of small collections,
 undertook a campaign aiming at
 a goal of \$500,000. Simultane-
 ously the districts were being
 pressed for results in connection
 with the Washington Conference,
 Palestine Day and the Roll Call.
 Under these circumstances, it was
 practically impossible for the Zi-
 onist Extension Fund, an entire-
 ly new undertaking, the purposes
 of which had first to be made
 clear to Zionists, to proceed.

\$13,500 Realized
In Brief Effort

The addition of a new fund re-
 lated to Palestine objectives add-
 ed to the already existing confu-
 sion in the minds of Zionists
 throughout the country. The Uni-
 ted Jewish Appeal began to take
 exception to the activities of the
 Extension Fund. Rather than re-
 flect on the good faith of the
 Zionist Organization of America
 in connection with its obligations
 to the United Jewish Appeal, the
 efforts of the Extension Fund had
 therefore to be confined to the
 tour of the president, a short
 period of activity in New York,
 and a mail solicitation.

Under these limitations, the
 sum of \$13,500 in cash was se-
 cured. We are quite convinced
 on the basis of the experience
 had that a very substantial part
 of the \$100,000 goal could have
 been secured if a persistent ef-
 fort were continued, regardless
 of its effect on other Palestine
 Funds. But it is a matter which
 should receive the earnest con-
 sideration of this convention,
 whether a method cannot be em-
 ployed in the raising of the Ex-
 tension Fund which would not in-
 volve competitive effort.

That the Zionist Organization
 of America must have a special
 fund for its activities to supple-
 ment its present income is clear.
 Without additional revenue it is
 idle to speak of a more compre-
 hensive program of activities for
 the Zionist Organization of Amer-
 ica. At every turn the organiza-
 tion is hampered by lack of funds
 in important tasks it must fulfill.
 It borders on the absurd that the
 Zionist Organization, the funda-
 ment on which rests all Zionist
 effort, should give the right of
 way to every affiliated and sub-
 sidiary organization and permit
 its own program to dry up for
 lack of nourishment. In any ar-
 rangement that may be made for
 the raising of Funds in the ensu-
 ing year, the Zionist Extension
 Fund must take its proper place.

Urges Palestine Day
Be Made Permanent

Pursuant to the action at the
 last convention, Palestine Day
 was fixed for January 20, 1935.
 Palestine Day was intended to
 symbolize the age-long hope of
 the Jewish People for the recon-
 struction of their National Home;
 to memorialize the great service
 rendered in the translation of
 that hope by Jews, by Christian
 statesmen, and by noble Chris-
 tian spirits everywhere, and by
 public opinion in this country
 and in other lands.

The preparations for Palestine
 Day were somewhat interfered
 with by the fact that the Nation-
 al Conference on Palestine was
 fixed for the same day, January

20, and the concentration of ef-
 fort was on the Washington Con-
 ference, rather than on Palestine
 Day. Nevertheless, what trans-
 pired in connection with this
 event made it clear that this is a
 feature which should remain per-
 manent, and that Palestine Day
 should become a fixed day of cele-
 bration in the Jewish calendar.

Palestine Day can be made a
 source of far-reaching Zionist
 propaganda as well as to bring
 considerable revenue to the Zion-
 ist Organization. Celebrations
 were held on Palestine Day in
 nearly every important Jewish
 community in the United States.
 The governors of the states of
 New York, Connecticut, Georgia,
 Indiana, Massachusetts, Missouri,
 New Jersey, issued special procla-
 mations calling upon the citizens
 of their states to observe Pales-
 tine Day. A special book was
 issued, entitled "Guide Book for
 Observance of Palestine Day,"
 which furnished material to be
 used by the Zionists throughout
 the country in connection with
 Palestine Day.

I would earnestly urge that a
 longer period of adequate prepa-
 ration be devoted to Palestine
 Day in the future, and that a
 qualified person be placed in
 charge exclusively of this under-
 taking on a permanent basis.
 There are large possibilities both
 of a propaganda, educational and
 financial nature connected with
 Palestine Day, which may be uti-
 lized to the advantage of the Zion-
 ist cause if intelligently planned.

Washington Conference
A Notable Gathering

This was unquestionably the
 most notable gathering of Jews
 in connection with Palestine up-
 building, since the constituent
 assembly of the Jewish Agency in
 Zurich in 1929. It brought to-
 gether representatives from every
 section of American Jewry, and
 it demonstrated the unifying
 force which Palestine represents
 in the life of the Jewish people.
 It gave evidence of a renewed
 and reinforced united front for a
 rebuilt Palestine, which made a
 profound impression on Jewish
 as well as non-Jewish public op-
 inion throughout the world. Fifty-
 two national organizations and
 one hundred and forty-one cities
 were represented at the confer-
 ence. It is conservatively esti-
 mated that in the aggregate over
 1,300,000 Jews voiced their senti-
 ments through the conference.
 The meeting was distinguished
 by a message from Franklin D.
 Roosevelt, President of the Uni-
 ted States, and by many notable
 addresses. The stirring address
 delivered by the Hon. Harold L.
 Ickes, Secretary of the Interior,
 may be said to have carried much
 political significance.

The conference had the practi-
 cal result of establishing a na-
 tional committee to bring into be-
 ing an Economic Planning Com-
 mission, the function of which
 would be to formulate and ex-
 ecute a plan for the ordered eco-
 nomic development of Palestine.
 The action thus taken by the
 conference had its repercussions
 in England, where the English
 Zionist Federation also adopted a
 resolution calling for the estab-
 lishment of an Economic Commis-
 sion. It is confidently hoped that
 at the forthcoming Congress this
 idea projected by the National
 Conference will be translated into
 action. The National Conference
 on Palestine was an eloquent
 demonstration of the widespread
 interest which exists in the Amer-
 ican Jewish community for the
 upbuilding of the Jewish Nation-
 al Home, and of the new forces
 in American Israel willing to be
 enlisted in Palestine tasks.

Exile Problem Non-Sectarian, McDonald Says

Speaks at Appeal Fete in His Honor on Eve Of Departure

That relief for victims of Nazi persecution constitutes a nonsectarian rather than a Jewish problem was emphasized by James G. McDonald, League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, at a United Jewish Appeal luncheon in his honor at the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria Friday.

Mr. McDonald told 1,000 women who had paid \$25 each to attend that there were more than 1,000 scholars and scientists among the 1,000 who were obliged to flee from Germany.

"Palestine," he said, "remains the chief country of refuge. It continues to be the only country, so far as I know, in the whole world which is so prosperous that it has a shortage of labor."

Other speakers were Mrs. Herbert H. Lehman, Mrs. Felix M. Warburg, Mrs. David E. Goldfarb and Mrs. Bernard S. Deutsch. Mrs. Richard P. Limburg presided.

Mr. McDonald was to sail for Europe Saturday aboard the Ile de France.

440 Communities Aiding Appeal Drive

Isidor Coons, national campaign director of the United Jewish Appeal, revealed Friday that 440 communities in the United States are sharing in raising the \$3,250,000 quota for rehabilitation of European Jews.

Arab's 700-Year 'Deed' Fails To Win American Jew's Land

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM—An Arab's attempt to gain control of a tract of land bought by Israel Nesson, an American Jew, by invoking an alleged 700-year-old deed, was defeated by the Jerusalem Land Court which affirmed Nesson's right to the property.

Nesson bought the land, a 100-dunam rocky tract near Beit Hakerem, twelve years ago and returned to the United States, leaving behind an Arab watchman to protect the property and put up boundary stones.

Recently Nesson returned with surveyors and remained there a number of months without interference. At the end of last January, certain members of the Elzeim family threatened to drive Nesson off the land by force if he did not leave.

Nesson took action against the Elzeims in Magistrates Court as

trespassers, but Magistrate Hubbard ordered him to prove his claim. Nesson then brought an action in the Jerusalem Land Court for confirmation of his claim.

The Arabs contested the claim, maintaining that the land was "Maitan Waqf," Moslem holy land which cannot be sold, and that he had permission to enter it by an old deed.

The court ruled, however, that Nesson had not been given the necessary notice of this fact and, further, that the contention could not be established in the Land Registry.

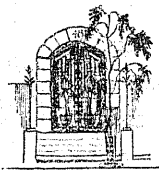

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Movie Palace Soon to Replace Old Pavilion Theatre in London

LONDON, June 28 — London's East End is losing another of its famous old landmarks and the Yiddish theatre one of its oldest homes when the wreckers start early next month the work of demolishing the old Pavilion Theatre in Mile End, for the last fifty years the home of Yiddish entertainment.

Where the Pavilion stands today there will soon be erected a huge cinema house and the shadowy stars of Hollywood and Elstree will hold the rapt attention of audiences where, for a half century, the stars of the Yiddish drama and musical comedy have trod the boards.

The old architectural monstrosity with its odd little tower and its drab, dingy, draughty interior—the last permanent home of the Yiddish theatre in England, will soon be replaced by a modern, glittering picture house on the American model and young Whitechapel Jews will take their girls to see Hollywood films where their fathers took their mothers to see the current offerings of Yiddish dramatists.

The last Yiddish production in the old house was "A Gedulla Oif Der Bubbeh," (Grandma's Pride and Joy) by Moses Broderson and H. Rubin, presented by a typical Yiddish stage troupe visiting from Poland. It was to have a run of three weeks, on the completion of which the wreckers were to take

over the theatre.

So, as an old actor takes his last bow smiling, the old Pavilion will take hers to laughter, rather than the quick tears which the Yiddish theatre is so adept at providing.

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In the Book and Literary World

Critic Hits Portrayal Of Jew

Fortune and Men's Eyes. By GEORGE CRONYN. 381 pp. New York: Covici, Friede, Inc. \$2.50.

FEW months ago, in William Faulkner's latest novel, "Pylon," I pointed out a case of a highly objectionable use of a Jewish character in contemporary fiction. Although since that time I have found other instances of the same type of thing, I am convinced that this curious habit of non-Jewish authors is rather the result of carelessness and a general condition of mind rather than of any specific animosity, conscious or subconscious. If novelists handled their other characters with

the superficiality of their Jewish ones, if they permitted themselves always to draw caricatures of stock types, the novel would sink to a low ebb indeed. George Cronyn's new novel is a case in point. I know Mr. Cronyn personally, and am certain that he would be shocked should the slightest degree of anti-Semitism be imputed to him. And yet the character of Raymond Hassburger in "Fortune and Men's Eyes" is so drawn that it becomes just that much more confirmation for the attitude out of which anti-Semitism springs.

In point of fact, Mr. Cronyn defends the hero of his novel, Byron Peirce, in his friendship for Hassburger, a member of one of the few Jewish families in the small mid-western town of Culverton. There is an issue over this, because when Byron insists upon associating with Hassburger, he loses another very good friend. But despite Cronyn's passionate argument for tolerance, there is much in the characterization of Hassburger that will lead the reader to recall all the familiar anti-Semitic charges.

ALTHOUGH Hassburger's brilliant mind has a beneficial effect upon the troubled psyche of Byron Peirce, and although his abundance of money helps him over several tight spots, he emerges as pretty much of a worm. He always is scheming to get on the inside track. He is arrogant and flashy. He resembles his father, who, when the Masons turned him down for membership in the local lodge, gave the town a park site on the condition that it erect a tablet bearing these words: "Given by a Jew for the pleasure of all." Later Hassburger, the least militaristic of individuals, becomes a Cadet Corps officer. Byron asks him why. Here is his answer:

"I'm a Jew, not good enough for their damn silly frats. So I went into the student corps and made myself a good officer, in spite of plenty of jealousy and dirty work. Same way, I'd go into the service. Pride, I suppose."

Later Hassburger does indeed go into the service, when war is declared, and becomes one of the leading German-baiters in the university. Here is all the old action and reaction of anti-Semitism in stereotyped form. Pride is the normal and simple reaction insult. It is an old, dull song, unworthy of Mr. Cronyn's iteration. The only service that a friendly non-Jewish novelist can do us is to show that

there are many of us who are not driven to the vices of character which are the all too easy compensation for prejudice against us. Mr. Cronyn's liberalism backfires, because it makes his readers see, not the causes of anti-Semitism, but certain unpleasant characteristics in Jews which sometimes result from it.

FOR the rest of the novel—and Hassburger does not play a leading role—I have nothing but praise. It tells the story of the havoc wrought within one family by the conflict of natural impulses with accepted conventions and a rigid social structure. With stirring drama, through the device of a psycho-analytic treatment of the hero after his brother has committed suicide and he himself has reached a desperate mental state, the account of the gallant conflict of the Rev. Charles Worden Peirce against sexual and intellectual taboos of a small town is unfolded. The elder Peirce married a wife high in the town's social circles, and so this conflict was brought within the Peirce family life.

Each of the three boys, of whom Byron was one, in some fashion or other had his whole life distorted by this basic antagonism between husband and wife. Clyde becomes a restless wanderer over the face of the earth, a lost soul seeking to drown in the rhythm of physical action the desolation of his spirit. Max becomes a worshipper of Mammon; when Mammon fails him, he kills himself. Byron is the passive element in the conflict; his sympathies are first on one side and then on the other. This makes a nightmare of his early life. He becomes an architect, marries, and finds himself plunged into a situation similar to his father's. When he sees his father's grim fate looming before him, his mind becomes temporarily unhinged. The moving series of events that ensues I will leave the reader to discover.

George Cronyn has a vast capacity for acquiring information, and great skill in imparting that information in narrative form. His great fault is that he lacks distinction of style, a quality upon which, unfortunately, Americans do not set great store. So it is not too rash to predict success for him in the future as a novelist.

involved were particularly active. "At a conference called in September which all substitutes were compelled to attend, Postmaster Jackson is alleged to have cast aspersions on the Jewish race and to have called active members of the N.A.S.P.O.E. 'rats.'

"Meanwhile in October Mr. Ballard appeared in behalf of Mr. Hill. While no official decision was ever announced, the charges were dropped and Mr. Hill received an appointment as a regular worker.

3 Fired at Intervals

"However, badgering of the Jewish members of the Substitutes' Association continued. Finally, in November, charges were made against Mr. Bronstein, in December against Mr. Raban, and in March against Mr. Rosen. All three have been removed from the service.

"It is our conviction that the vague accusations against the men such as 'conduct unbecoming a postal employe' would not stand up in a fair and open hearing. Their dismissal has been justified on the ground dear to union-smashing reactionary private employers, that they were trouble-makers. However, we are convinced that these men were dismissed because they were Jews and were active organizers for the N.A.S.P.O.E.

"Typical of the attitude of the Post Office in these cases was its flat refusal to permit Attorney Ballard to copy affidavits for the Rosen case which he had filed with the Department in handling the Hill appeal.

"Postmaster General Farley must share with Postmaster Jackson of St. Louis responsibility for an anti-labor, anti-Jewish attitude. Once again we urge the Postmaster General to authorize arbitration of

the Conference. All speakers from the floor agreed that the paper by Rabbi Silver was one of the most brilliant presentations made before the Conference.

The discussion centered around the definition for Jews as a race, religion or nation.

The discussion last night opened with a paper written by Rabbi Samuel Schulman of New York, now in Europe. The paper was read by Dr. Joshua Liebman of Chicago. Rabbi Schulman in his paper insisted that Judaism must be considered as a religion. He emphasized that the creative power of Judaism lies in religion. He added that Reform Judaism has failed owing to lack of mysticism.

"In the myth of Israel, the genius of Israel is expressed," Dr. Schulman said in his paper. "Israel and Law are bound together. The hope of Israel is the unification of humanity."

Dr. Schulman's paper concluded with an appeal for unity in Israel. "Israel has much to teach the world, but first it must teach itself," the paper said. "Palestine will lead us to an ethical content of Judaism. Do not stand aloof,

A uniform marriage law for all States was also favored by the Conference.

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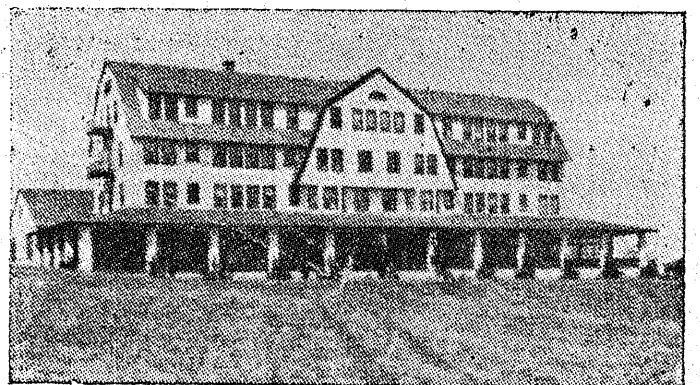
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
