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## Berlin Puts Quietus on Nazi Zealot

### Streicher Boycott Efforts Curbed; Report 2 Jews Slain in Munich

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, June 30—The extension of Streicher's anti-Jewish boycott in Berlin is being suppressed by the government, according to a report by its special correspondent published in the Manchester Guardian.

The correspondent voices the belief, however, that this is only a temporary emasure promulgated by the government only to vitiate somewhat the effects of anti-Jewish excesses throughout Germany last week.

German government circles, the report adds, feigned ignorance of the extent of the anti-Jewish boycott, and issued the order to terminate it because of the detrimental publicity which it may call forth in the outside world.

#### 2 Killed in Munich

It was disclosed for the first time by the Manchester Guardian that as a result of the particularly vile anti-Semitic propaganda spread by Julius Streicher in his Munich edition of the Stuermer, two Jews were killed there last week.

The report from Berlin goes on to state that in many other centers outside of the capital the persecution of Jews is taking on extreme forms.

In Munich especially, the excesses continue unabated. The chief instigator there is the Bavarian Minister of the Interior.

#### 'Aryan' Butchers Warned

According to a report from Goettingen, cattle-dealers and butchers in the District of Muenden, were warned today by the local district commissioner not to deal with Jews.

The names of all "Aryan" caught dealing with Jews, the commissioner threatened, will be published in a conspicuous place in the local Stuermer and all true "Aryans" will be ordered to shun them.

In the village of Stammhamm, near Ingolstadt, signs were erected today reading: "Jews are not wanted here."

The Nazi press throughout Germany today reprinted an order originally promulgated in April, 1933, concerning the application for release submitted by prisoners in recently held confined in Nazi concentration camps. According to that

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## Reich Press Praises Young Jew's Heroism

HAMBURG, June 30—The German newspapers here published a long article today praising the heroism of John Tunes, 25-year-old Jew, who risked his life to effect a spectacular rescue of a drowning man.

This is the second time within a month that Jews in Germany have been cited for heroism. On June 5 two Jewish war veterans, on Hitler's personal order, were awarded medals for saving the life of a high-ranking Nazi official.

## Arabs in Haifa Form Nazi Club; Well Financed

### 'The Red Moon' Is Part Of Near East Drive By Hitler Regime

HAIFA, June 30—Arab youths here have organized a Nazi club, it was learned today.

The club has already established headquarters and goes under the name of "The Red Moon."

Apparently the organization has strong backers, for all of its deficits are promptly met, and it seems able to draw upon unlimited financial resources.

This is viewed as another manifestation of an intensive Nazi anti-Semitic activity sponsored by the Hitler government, and which has broken out throughout Palestine and the Near East. Nazi agents have appeared in various parts of the country in an attempt to incite the Arabs against the Jews. They have been particularly successful among Arab nationalist youth.

Groups of brown-clad Arab youths are now organized in the larger cities.

Recently the Federation of Arab Youth in Palestine petitioned Hitler to help them prevent the Jews from obtaining additional land in Palestine.

## Zurich Forbids Sale Of Streicher's Paper

ZURICH, June 30—The police of this canton today issued an order restricting the sale of Der Stuermer in Zurich.

According to the decree, Julius Streicher's lurid anti-Semitic weekly, published in Nuremburg, can no longer be sold on the streets of Zurich.

## Avoid Stand On Peace At Chicago

### Rabbis Shelve Strong Resolution Backing Pacifism

CHICAGO, June 30—The Central Conference of American Rabbis tonight closed its annual conference at the Congress Hotel without taking a definite stand on war and peace.

Instead, it was decided that a special committee be named to formulate the Jewish attitude toward peace in relation to the Jewish view of war in past history. This committee will report at the next conference.

It was also decided that the peace resolution under discussion today and all other peace resolutions be referred back to the Peace Committee for the purpose of making an academic study and determining the attitude of various Jewish leaders. These views and the reports of individual members of the conference will be gathered throughout the year with the purpose of making a final pronouncement on the rabbis' attitude toward war at the next conference.

At an earlier session, a resolution on war had been referred back to a special committee, headed by Rabbi Max Currick of Erie, Pa., because it was too "pacifistic." Today, the committee returned a res-

## Tel Aviv Debates Police Problem

### Official Fears Force Is Losing Its Jewish Character

TEL AVIV, June 30—The contemplated changes in the Tel Aviv police system were discussed here today at a meeting of government officials and representatives of the Tel Aviv City Council.

Israel Rokeach, vice-Mayor of Tel Aviv, condemned what he described as an attempt to nullify the Jewish character of the police force in the only all-Jewish city in the world. The Tel Aviv police department, he said, must remain essentially Jewish in personnel.

The fact that Jewish policemen are leaving the Tel Aviv force because of the low pay has been viewed here with grave concern. British policemen are replacing them, and gradually the force is losing its Jewish character.

## Leaders in Clash At Zionist Parley

### Feuchtwanger Film Banned in Vienna

VIENNA, June 30—Local authorities today refused to grant a permit for the showing of the movie "Jew Suss." They declared that the time is inopportune for an exhibition of the film, since it might serve to incite anti-Semitic elements in Vienna.

The film, based upon Lion Feuchtwanger's historical novel, "Power," had been especially rearranged for a Vienna showing.

## Plan New Curb Upon Jews in Vienna Bar

### Propose to Eliminate Post-War Entrants To Austria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, June 30—The careful elimination from the Vienna bar of all immigrant lawyers who came into the country after the War, was advocated in an authoritative statement made public here today.

The statement rejects the proposed plan of establishing the Bar Association on a racial basis. Racial discrimination, it says, is alien to the tradition and spirit of Austria, which is a Catholic country. At the same time, it is necessary to curb the number of "non-Aryan" elements that are entering the legal profession in Vienna.

Jewish lawyers here viewed this statement with great alarm. A majority of Viennese lawyers are Jews, and many of them are prominent in the Bar Association.

This new declaration, it is felt, is merely a subterfuge to eliminate Jews from the legal profession.

Recently the government ordered a change in the election procedure of the Bar Association. Henceforth, the government decreed, officials of the Bar Association must be appointed instead of being chosen by direct elections. Thus the government plans to make it virtually impossible for Jews to hold office in the Bar Association.

## Lipsky Group Loses First Tilt With Rothenberg

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 30—Internal friction within the administration of the Zionist Organization of America and a vigorous attempt by the Louis Lipsky group to prevent Morris Rothenberg's reelection as president marked the opening of the thirty-eighth annual Z.O.A. convention at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel here today. More than 400 delegates were present at the opening session.

The battle started last night at a stormy public session of the national executive committee under the chairmanship of Ezra Shapiro of Cleveland which lasted until long after midnight.

Led by Maurice Samuel, members of the Lipsky faction vigorously attacked the Rothenberg administration and demanded a "new deal." The issue of the attack was the defeat of the Z.O.A. in the election of American delegates to the World Zionist Congress.

#### Defeat for Lipsky Group

The first round, however, brought defeat for the Lipsky group and indicated that the majority of the delegates intend to support Rothenberg to the very end.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, Samuel Margoshes, Abe Goldstein, Prof. Gustave Klausner and other leading delegates pointed out that if the Histadruth ticket was victorious in America against the Z.O.A. ticket, it was because "certain members" of the Z.O.A. administrative committee, instead of working for the Z.O.A. ticket, went out of their way to stimulate sentiment for the Histadruth, thus preparing their own defeat.

Dr. Margoshes, in a spirited address, emphasized that the General Zionists in America overdid their pro-Histadruth propaganda. There is no monopoly on social justice in Palestine, he said. All Zionists helped the chalutzim; the Histadruth is taking too much credit for itself, Dr. Margoshes declared.

Mr. Rothenberg, in a calm, analytical speech, replied to his opponents and emphasized that never under any other administration did so many Zionists vote for the Z.O.A. ticket in the Congress elections as this year, despite sabotage by some Z.O.A. leaders, and also despite certain machinations re-

## Jews Can Take Magyar Names, Hungarian Minister Avers

BUDAPEST, June 30—Dr. Nikolaus Kozma, Hungarian Minister of the Interior, today denied that Jews are not permitted to change their foreign-sounding names for the more acceptable Magyar names.

This statement came in answer to a question asked him in the Parliament about the alleged charges that the Ministry of the Interior is

withholding such permission from Jewish applicants.

He himself, he stated, has granted numerous such petitions to Hungarian Jews to Magyarize their names.

The rush of Jews to change their foreign-sounding names is occasioned by the recent increase in anti-Jewish feeling throughout Hungary.

## Hebrew U. Students Call Strike; Demand School of Agriculture

JERUSALEM, June 29—Mount Scopus will witness its first student strike this Tuesday, according to a decision of the student body at the Hebrew University.

The student body decided to call the strike for Tuesday to draw attention to its demand that an agri-

The entire student body is expected to participate in the strike. Establishment of an agricultural branch of the university has been urged upon the authorities for some time and has been the subject of many protest meetings.

## The Jews in Scotland

GLASGOW.

SO OFTEN is Great Britain referred to incorrectly as England that most people are apt to forget that an integral part of the British Isles is Scotland, in which a considerable number of Jews have settled within the last twenty or thirty years.

In the absence of any definite statistics, it is reckoned, more or less accurately, that something like 25,000 Jews are resident in the land of the heather and the haggis, the biggest portion—about 18,000—having settled in Glasgow, and 5,000 in the capital of Scotland, Edinburgh. A few hundred families are to be found in Greenock, Falkirk, Dunfermline, Dundee, Ayr, and they have even taken by storm that stronghold of thrift and Scots stories—Aberdeen.

ACTUALLY Edinburgh was the first Scottish city to attract Jewish settlers and in 1816 some twenty families were resident in that East of Scotland town, while it was thirteen or fourteen years afterwards that a community was established in Glasgow. The latter city, with its great industrial activity, proved most popular with the Jews as is seen by the figures of the present-day dispersion of Scottish Jewry.

We find the Jews of Glasgow driving their first bargain in 1832, when one of their number died of cholera. The community, small as it then was, had not obtained a burial ground, and they immediately applied to the committee which was arranging for the opening of the new Necropolis in Glasgow. The Jewish delegation to the committee pleaded the urgency of their case and, although the ground had not been officially opened, they offered £100 if the committee would grant them space for a Jewish cemetery. The committee agreed but later stated that the Jewish offer had been much less than afterwards obtained from other parties for similar pieces of ground!

LET us briefly survey Glasgow Jewry, for in this case Scotland and Glasgow are synonymous. At one time in Glasgow, Gorbals was the recognized Jewish quarter, but with their material progress, the Jews have wandered out to the new suburbs, and are thus causing a serious disruption in the community. Charitable institutions find it difficult to follow up subscribers who suddenly remove; synagogues lose their members and are faced with financial disaster; new synagogues are being built and are used merely on the festivals; in many districts there are as yet no

schools, with the result that Hebrew education is being seriously neglected.

Figures just issued show that the Glasgow Talmud Torah, situated in the Gorbals, has suffered so much by the removal of Jewish families, that the number of pupils has dropped from 400 to 250 in the last two years. A further sign of the general disinterest shown by the community in communal activity is the manner in which officials of the various institutions—who for the most part would willingly relinquish their posts—are annually returned to office without the slightest opposition.

Is it a good sign when healthy criticism and competition is not forthcoming?

ON THE first German Fund appeal, Glasgow Jews responded nobly with subscriptions totalling £3,000, but in succeeding appeals the enthusiasm was not so great and the funds suffered accordingly.

This forgetfulness of what has happened in Germany is emphasized in the way in which local Jewish firms are displaying in their windows goods clearly marked, "Made in Germany." The boycott campaign was hopeless, because of a lack of leadership. This dearth of men to take the reins and guide the community is responsible for its gradual disintegration.

Glasgow Jewry has the material of which leaders are made, but those who might attain positions of responsibility are either too intent on improving their business connections or are "studying medicine," for we are told that all the Jewish students at Glasgow University are without exception brilliant. Someone has prophesied that within a decade there will be more Jewish doctors in Glasgow than patients.

THE community has two really fine organizations—the Board of Guardians and the Jewish Representative Council.

The Guardians, well organized, disburse some £5,000 annually amongst the poor of the local community; grants loans to help small traders who find themselves in temporary difficulties; assist families in which death or illness has meant a serious reduction in the income; and supplies about a tenth of the community with the necessities for the observing of the Passover every year.

The other institution, the Representative Council, is a body of great possibilities, and it must be admitted that it has done good work in the twenty-one years it has been in existence. The Council is composed of delegates from all the principal senior organizations; eleven synagogues; and from the main charitable institutions, and its business is to look after the affairs of Jewry in general.

One of its latest cases is an excellent example of how the Council, which is a miniature Board of Deputies, works. Recently one of the delegates brought to the notice of the Council the fact that a certain insurance company had issued instructions to its agents not to accept motor insurance business from Jews. The Council communicated with the company concerned with such good effect that the cir-

# Between the Lines

## Persecution in Turkey

Reports from Turkey indicate that the Jewish position there is becoming more and more serious. It seems that the authorities have embarked on a definite policy to start trouble for the Jews there.

Though no official censorship exists in Turkey, the press there is not in a position to report all the discrimination which has been introduced against the Jews during recent weeks. Briefly, however, these discriminations can be summed up as follows:

1. Persecution of the Jews by the local authorities in Turkish Thrace.
2. Persecution of Turkish Jews desiring to emigrate to Palestine.
3. Discrimination against German-Jewish professors who were invited by the Turkish authorities to settle in Turkey.

## Terror in Thrace

The persecution in Thrace consists of continued terror which forces the Jewish population to leave this territory. Several months ago the Jews of Thrace still had an opportunity to sell their property. Now even this privilege is no longer enjoyed by them.

Under the pretext of protecting Jewish property from being sold for a trifle, the Turkish government has issued a law prohibiting the Jews in Thrace to sell their belongings to the non-Jewish population. The result is that the Jews, being forced to leave the territory because of the continued terror, are not in a position to realize any cash at all for their immovable property which they leave behind them.

Jewish Shechita is officially prohibited in Thrace and the Turkish press is not permitted to report the fact. Because of this prohibition the entire Jewish population of Thrace, which is extremely religious, has not been able for weeks to taste meat. The Jews dare not complain to the central authorities because such complaints would only result in greater trouble for them.

## Palestine Emigration Prohibited

Zionism being prohibited in Turkey, the Turkish authorities have begun a campaign in all parts of the country against those Jews who are registering themselves for emigration to Palestine. Two hundred Palestine emigration certificates were granted by the Zionist Executive to the Jews of Turkey to be distributed through the offices of the Jewish Colonization Association in Istanbul, but the Turkish government has indicated that no Jew who is a Turkish citizen will be permitted to make use of these certificates. The 200 Palestine visas will have to be utilized by Jewish residents in Turkey who are not citizens of the country, the government insists.

It is in connection with this policy towards Palestine that the recent raid on the Jewish Colonization Offices in Istanbul was made. In the same connection Saadia Cherniak, head of the J.C.A. in Turkey, was kept under arrest for several days.

## German Jews Restricted

The German-Jewish professors and doctors who had been invited by the Turkish government to occupy chairs in the Turkish universities were recently given to understand that they had better not indulge in private practice. Many of them are now popular with the inhabitants who seek

## Jewish Quarter Shifts In Manchester.

The Manchester Evening News, in an article on Jewish life in Manchester, reports:

Leaders of Jewish religious life in Manchester are becoming somewhat concerned at the exodus of Jews from the Cheetham area of the city to districts farther north—Heaton Park and Prestwich in particular.

They believe that in another twenty years Cheetham will be almost entirely deserted by members of the Jewish race and that a part of the city which was once their stronghold will know them no more as residents.

Jewish shopkeepers are moving to Heaton Park, Whitefield, and Prestwich to keep pace with the exodus and new synagogues are being built in the northern side of Manchester.

their medical advice, considering them superior to the Turkish doctors. In natural science, however, with the over-emphasis of Einstein, it still holds sway. We must recognize that it is unworthy of a German—and indeed only harmful to him to be the intellectual follower of a Jew. Natural science properly so-called is of completely "Aryan" origin and Germans must today also find their own way out into the unknown. Heil Hitler!"

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# Jews Urged To Settle In New Countries

## So. America, Uganda and Angola Suggested by 'Territorialist'

LONDON.—Emigration of Jews to unsettled countries such as exist in South America, Uganda and Angola was advocated by Dr. Joseph Kruk, exponent of the "new territorialism," in an address before The Maccabees, a society of Jewish professional men.

Prof. Norman Bentwich expressed himself as skeptical as to whether Jews would be willing to go to unpopulated countries. Mrs. Israel Zangwill declared that the old enthusiasm about the Territorialist movement no longer exists.

Sir Philip Hartog, who presided, announced that although the old I.T.L. (Jewish Territorial Association) had been abolished, he and several other people have joined in publishing a manifesto calling for new efforts to settle Jews on uncultivated territory as a solution to the emigration problem.

In his address, Dr. Kruk asserted that Jews ought never agree to be recognized as second class citizens but should unite with all the best forces of other nations for freedom and peace.

Palestine, he declared, can never hold all the Jews and therefore a new land should be sought where Jews can settle on a progressive and cooperative basis.

Four million Jews have emigrated in the last century, Dr. Kruk said, and the desire for agricultural colonization today is much greater than before the war. There are 65,000 Jews living by agriculture, he said.

## Force Jews to Wed 'Aryans,' Is Shaw's Advice to Germany

George Bernard Shaw contends that Hitler should compel German Jews to intermarry with "Aryans" in an interview with Donald F. Wickets in this week's Liberty Magazine.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise comments in the same issue that the idea is "wired nonsense." He tells Shaw, "Quit your kidding! Marriages are not arranged in just that way." The interview follows in part:

"There is," Shaw observed, "much to be said for Hitler, but his anti-Semitism is nonsense."

"Hitler," the playwright went on to say, "added to Chamberlain's racial theory the unsound practice of 'keeping the race pure,' instead of insisting upon cross-fertilization."

"The Jews are not entirely free from blame if they are misunderstood. They have reared ghettos around themselves. In the beginning there was no great distinction between Christians and Jews, until the Jews emphasized the differences between themselves and the Nazarenes by adopting all sorts of rigmarole which made it impossible for Christians to worship in the same temple."

"However, whatever may be the origin of the unhappy tension existing between Jews and non-Jews, Germany made a great mistake when she set the Jews against herself. They are a clever people and it is not wise to court their hostility."

Asked if he considered the Jewish boycott of Germany "very clever?"

"I do not think so. The boycott

## Jewish Leaders Call On Polish Premier

### Cite Unfairness to Jews of New Electoral Law Limiting Representation

WARSAW, June 30—Premier Walerj Slawek today received a delegation of prominent Polish Jews, including Rabbi Levin and Deputies Minzberg and Wiszlicki.

The delegation called to his attention the fact that the new law governing the elections to the Polish Parliament is unfair to the Jews, giving them virtually no direct representation. They pointed out to him that the six Jewish deputies who will be permitted in the new Sejm, will in reality be elected by non-Jews and will therefore be dependent on the good graces, not of the Jews whom they will nominally represent, but of their non-Jewish electors.

sorted to by the Laborites at the polling stations.

Greeted by a stormy ovation, Mr. Rothenberg opened the convention with a message from President Roosevelt reiterating his interest in the work of American Zionists for Palestine as a national home for the Jewish people.

"The solution of the numerous pressing problems," the President wrote, "with which the convention is faced will be made easier, I am sure, by a realization of the progress which has been made in Palestine. To this progress, the Zionist Organization of America has contributed both spiritually and financially in a large measure and the Jews in the United States may well feel proud of the part they have played in the rebirth and upbuilding of the Holy Land."

Other messages, by Morris Margulies, Z.O.A. secretary, were from Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Nahum Sokolow, the London Zionist Executive and the American Pro-Palestine Federation.

In a presidential address in three parts, Mr. Rothenberg occupied the entire early session with a review of the achievements in Palestine and the growth of Zionist sentiment in the United States. He emphasized that large sections of Jews who have hitherto been unmoved by Zionist thought are now receptive to its influence.

#### Urges Radical Changes

New methods, however, are necessary to attract them for practical participation, he declared. To this end, Mr. Rothenberg today submitted a revolutionary proposal which will be the center of discussion at the convention.

The proposal urges that permanent Palestine community councils be established in 141 Jewish communities in America and that these councils embrace representatives of all local Jewish organizations, including synagogues, temples, Y.M.H.A. groups, fraternal organizations, community centers and any other local Jewish bodies that may exist.

Terming the present form of partnership between the Zionists and the non-Zionists as "unworkable" and "obsolete," Mr. Rothenberg proposed that a unified body be created, at least in America, which would include the Zionists and the so-called non-Zionists, without placing emphasis on the differences between the two groups, but rather on the common object which unites them.

"Such a body," he asserted, "could appropriately select the American representatives to the International Council of the Jewish Agency." He explained that in this way the question of a constituency for those unaffiliated with the Zionist Organization could be removed because a national conference on Palestine in America would include both affiliated and unaffiliated groups.

Speaking on Palestine, Mr. Rothenberg declared that the existing conception of Palestine's capacity to solve the Jewish problem "must be radically revised."

The 50,000 Jews who entered Palestine during the past year, he declared, cannot be considered the maximum that Palestine can absorb. "Large stretches of land are

## Nazis Can Whistle For This Tax Bill

Leading opponents of the pacifist stand were: Rabbis Solomon Foster of Newark, Leo Franklin of Detroit, Morris Newfield of Birmingham, Max Richler of Brooklyn, and Ira E. Sanders of Little Rock.

#### Avoid Stand on Zionism

Avoiding a definite stand on the question of Zionism, the Conference at an earlier session nevertheless passed a resolution which automatically wipes out its previous official opposition to Zionism. Despite the efforts of Zionist rabbis, the Conference refused to go on record as definitely favoring Zionism.

The resolution, which was passed by a vote of eighty-one to twenty-five, after a heated debate in one of the stormiest sessions in the forty-six years of the organization's existence, reads as follows:

"Whereas, it certain foregoing conventions of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, resolutions have been adopted in opposition to Zionism, and

"Whereas, we are persuaded that the acceptance or rejection of the Zionist program should be left to the determination of the individual members of this conference themselves,

"Therefore, be it resolved: that in keeping with its announced intentions, the C.C.A.R. will continue to cooperate in the upbuilding of Palestine and in the economic, cultural and spiritual tasks confronting the growing and evolving Jewish community there."

A paragraph in the original resolution stating that the opposition to Zionism no longer reflects the sentiment of a very substantial section of the Conference membership, was deleted after a very heated debate.

## Planning Body Urged as Aid to Orthodox Jews

### Young Israel Advised by Hoenig to Take Lead In Its Formation

(Special to the J.D.B.)

ASBURY PARK, N. J., June 30—Declaring that the Young Israel organization is "insurance for the preservation of our religion," Moses H. Hoenig, in his presidential report to the Council of Young Israel's annual convention here, recommended that Young Israel take the initiative in organizing a planning commission for Orthodox Jewry.

The commission would do research and plan for the future so that "things would not be conducted haphazardly," Hoenig said. Among the members of the commission would be Prof. Nathan Isaacs, General Sessions Judge Otto A. Rosalsky and Dr. Bernard Revel of Yeshiva College.

Mr. Hoenig was reelected president of the organization.

#### Support Mizrachi

Resolutions were adopted to campaign for measures making possible Sabbath observance, pledging support to the Mizrachi organization in increasing religious observance in Palestine, urging the Mandatory Power to liberalize Palestine immigration, demanding that Hebrew teachers be religious, hailing the increased use of Hebrew, expressing sympathy with the German Jews and calling for support of the anti-Nazi boycott.

Other resolutions deplore the fact that the Kashruth Association "is controlled by interested rabbis," and express sorrow at the death of Shmarya Levin.

Irwin Steingut gave greetings from Governor Lehman.

In his report, Hoenig pointed out that the economic distress which is "sorely trying" young people today works particularly hard on Orthodox Jews because they cannot accept jobs obliging them to work on the sabbath. The Young Israel sabbath committee, he said, has made it possible for sabbath observers to take civil service examinations scheduled for Saturday, on Saturday evening.

He reported that the employment bureau organized by Young Israel attracts 10,000 applicants annually. "Only about twenty-five per cent of the Jewish employers cooperate with us," Hoenig said, "and the result is that we place one out of every four applicants. . . . Careful investigation shows that if Jewish employers did cooperate, we could unquestionably obtain a job for every sabbath observer in New York."

He deplored the "rapidly declining" influence of the Torah in Palestine, and declared that "the basic principles of our religion such as kashruth and the sabbath are openly desecrated in public institutions."

Hoenig urged that Young Israel "lend every possible aid to stem the tide of irreligion" in the Jewish homeland.

He proposed that a surcharge be added to the price of kosher meat to pay for kashruth enforcement and to support yeshivas and religious Hebrew schools.

"Kashruth is a community problem," he said, "and the community should benefit by it. We have made a beginning by trying to analyze the ingredients of various food articles in order to ascertain their kashruth. The public must realize that these matters cannot

## Sees World Critical If Nazis Drop Drive on Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, June 30—Speaking at a Nazi rally in the Tempelhof Airport here last night, Alfred Rosenberg, spiritual head of the Third Reich, declared that Jews represent a menace to the whole world. "By relaxing its treatment of the Jews," he stated, "Germany will earn not gratitude, but the condemnation of the whole world."

In a speech preceding Rosenberg's, Paul Joseph Goebbels, Hitler's Minister of Propaganda and Enlightenment, said that "bourgeois Jewry is again too much in evidence."

"We don't want the Jew," he declared. "He has nothing to look for in the community of German people. We request him to adapt himself to the rules of hospitality and not to conduct himself as though he were an equal."

"If the Jew seeks to intimidate us through the medium of the foreign press," he went on to say, "our answer is: 'We know that little game and won't be fooled. Our extended contacts with the Jews of the German press has made us wise.'"

## Mizrachi Youth Severs Ties To Senior Body

### Adopts Name of Hapoel Mizrachi at 13th Parley Here

Severing all connection with the Mizrachi Organization of America, the Mizrachi Youth Organization yesterday changed its name to Hapoel Hamizrachi of America, Inc., and announced its support of the "Torah vavodah" movement, which calls for the upbuilding of Palestine on the basis of social justice as expressed in the Bible.

The action was taken by 250 delegates to the thirteenth annual convention of the organization at Yeshiva College, 186th Street and Amsterdam Avenue. The fact that the Mizrachi Youth is the American representative of the Palestine Hapoel Hamizrachi and the belief that all its energies must be concentrated on Hapoel's "Torah vavodah" movement were given as the reason for the split.

The resolution for the cleavage was adopted after a morning of heated debate. It was pointed out that authorization for setting up an autonomous organization was given at the 1925 Antwerp world Mizrachi conference.

#### Silber Backs Program

Support of the program was urged at a banquet last night by Rabbi Saul Silber, president of the Chicago Theological College, who criticized the present Zionist Executive. Rabbi Silber declared that the Executive deserves little responsibility for the economic prosperity of Palestine and is chiefly responsible for the lack of "constructive accomplishment" along political and immigration lines.

If Palestine merely offers a sound economic structure, it is no different from the United States twenty-five years ago, Rabbi Silber asserted. What Mizrachi wants, he said, is that Jewish life in Palestine be established at "its former glory."

Other speakers at the dinner were Leon Gelman, editor of the St. Louis Jewish Record, and Isidore Epstein, president of the organization.

In his presidential address at the opening of the convention, Mr. Epstein declared, "If the present party in control of the Zionist movement places the interest of Zionism higher than its party interests, it must provide the possibility for every faction within Zionism to be represented in the Zionist World Executive and thereby save Zionism from further splits and ultimate destruction."

Rabbi Seymour M. Zambrowsky, executive director, asserted that this year's convention will mark an important epoch in the history of the Mizrachi youth movement. Rabbi Israel Goldstein, president of the Jewish National Fund, commended the organization for its cooperation with the J.N.F.

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
