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Hitler Plans To Lead New War on Jews

Will Direct Personally Renewed Drive, Nazi Leaders Told

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, July 12—Adolf Hitler, Nazi ruler of Germany, will soon turn his attention to home problems and will personally supervise an intensified anti-Jewish drive in the Reich, it was learned here today following a secret meeting of Nazi leaders held last night in Gue-tengoetz Castle.

The announcement of Hitler's intentions was made at the meeting by Herr Jagow, commander of the Nazi Storm Troops in Berlin. Herr Jagow, who was one of the principle speakers at the gathering, outlined a plan to carry out stronger measures against the Jews, in order to force them out of Germany.

Court Rules for 'Non-Aryans'

A verdict that "Aryan" firms have no right to point out to their customers that their competitors are "non-Aryans," was handed down today by a district Supreme Court. The only exception in this respect may be for customers who are Nazi officials and who are forbidden to purchase from Jews, the verdict says.

In issuing this verdict, the court emphasized the order promulgated by the German Ministry of Trade, not to interfere with the trading activities of Jewish firms.

35 Lose Citizenship

Thirty-five German-born "non-Aryans" were deprived of their citizenship today in Magdeburg, and the naturalization of eight "non-Aryans" was revoked by order of the Magdeburg civil authorities.

In the city of Ansberg, the local authorities ordered a strict investigation into the Jewish butcher shops on the pretext that their hygienic condition is not satisfactory.

To Map Plans for 1936 World Jewish Congress

Lodz Acts Against Aldermen Who Rioted

LODZ, Poland, July 12—Sixteen aldermen of the dissolved Lodz Municipal Council were summoned by the authorities today in connection with the disorders staged by the anti-Semitic aldermen several weeks ago at a session of the Municipal Council during which Jewish councilors were attacked and injured.

Eleven of the sixteen aldermen are members of the anti-Semitic National Democratic Party. There are also two Jews among the group.

Bid to Refugees Is Denied By Albania Official

Jewish Delegation Not Asked to Tirana for Parley, J.T.A. Told

LONDON, July 12—That the Albanian government has not extended an invitation to German-Jewish refugees to settle in Albania, and that no Jewish delegation has been invited by the Albanian Cabinet to come to Tirana for negotiations, was made clear here today in an official statement issued by Fuad Aslani, Albanian Minister in London, to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

The Minister issued the statement after making an official inquiry of his government. In the written statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, he emphasizes that if Jews are willing to come to Albania they must bring along with them sufficient funds to invest in the country.

"My government," the statement reads, "would consider favorably applications of Jews who wish to settle in Albania, providing they are desirous of establishing themselves in our country by investing funds in agricultural and in industrial enterprises of the country. Such Jews would be enabled by the government to acquire Albanian citizenship.

"On the other hand," the statement continues, "no invitation, official or otherwise, has been extended to Jews to settle in Albania. Similarly no delegation has been asked to come to Tirana to discuss this subject."

This statement by the Albanian Minister in London definitely discredits the report that the Albanian government is ready to admit

Will Admit Reich Exiles, Peru States

Assurances Are Given to League Aide by President

LIMA, Peru, July 12—Assurances have been given by the president and several ministers that Peru will open its doors to an undetermined number of Jewish refugees from Germany.

These assurances were given to Dr. Samuel G. Inman, secretary to the League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, James G. MacDonald. Dr. Inman came to Peru on behalf of the German refugees and especially to gain some concessions from the Peruvian government for German-Jewish professors and intellectuals.

In connection with Dr. Inman's visit, an immigrant aid committee was organized here, consisting chiefly of German Jews, who until recently took no active part in Jewish social life in Peru. The chairman of this committee is Herr Leopold Weil.

Starts Jobs Campaign

The committee maintains contacts with the Jewish immigration society in Paris known as HICEM, and will also establish contacts with the secretariat for German refugees of the League of Nations.

The committee has already waged a campaign among local Jewish businessmen and manufacturers to provide employment for a certain number of refugees who will shortly arrive here.

In order to avoid chaos in the immigration of refugees, the committee has arrived at an understanding with Dr. Inman that in every case when immigrants are brought to Peru, the local committee in Lima is to be consulted first. "The uncontrolled immigration of German Jewish immigrants to Peru would endanger the existence of the Jewish Community here," the committee said, "because too many immigrants could not be supported by the local Jewish community."

Algeria Jails Moslem Rioters

3 Given 7-Year Terms For Role in Pogrom At Constantine

ALGIERS, July 12—Three more Mohammedans were each sentenced today to seven years at hard labor, as guilty in the Constantine pogrom last August.

The total of those sentenced for complicity in the riots now numbers nine. Two of the group on trial today were acquitted.

The anti-Jewish pogroms in Algeria last August were a subject of grave concern to the French Administration. A number of Jews were killed. Among the victims were women and children. The pogrom lasted for several days.

Cyclists 'Too Fluent' in Hebrew, Rabbi Finds

PATERSON, N. J., July 12—Eleven Palestine motorcyclists clad in blue jerseys rolled into Paterson and were met by a committee of prominent local officials.

In the midst of the reception, Rabbi Max Zucker of Passaic, acting as interpreter, got into difficulty.

"Their Hebrew is too fluent," he admitted laughingly.

The cyclists are touring the world in behalf of the Palestine Maccabi Association.

Vienna Sought By Revisionists As Parley Site

Jabotinsky Aides Ask Austria Permit for First Congress

VIENNA, July 12—Representatives of Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the Zionist Revisionist Party, arrived here today for the purpose of negotiating with the Austrian authorities to permit the holding in Vienna of the first world congress of the newly proclaimed Independent Zionist Organization.

It is understood that the Austrian authorities are considering the Jabotinsky proposal sympathetically. The Revisionists have selected Vienna as the potential site of their first congress since it is the city where Dr. Theodor Herzl, founder of the political Zionist movement, is buried. Praha, capital of Czechoslovakia, has also been considered.

The congress will be held in September. It will open a few days after the Nineteenth World Zionist Congress adjourns in Lucerne.

Expect Record Attendance At Lucerne Congress

LUCERNE, July 12—The nineteenth World Zionist Congress, which opens here on August 20, will be the largest in the history of the Zionist movement as regards its representation of World Jewry, it was announced here today by the Congress Bureau.

Col. Dreyfus Dies in Paris At Age of 75

Imprisonment in 1894 On Devil's Island Created Furore

PARIS, July 12—Col. Alfred Dreyfus, Jewish officer in the French Army whose unjust imprisonment on Devil's Island in 1894 created a world-wide furore, died here today after a long illness. He had celebrated his seventy-fifth birthday last October.

Col. Dreyfus had been seriously ill for the last year of a bladder ailment. To the last, he was reported haunted by continual nightmares of his experiences on the notorious penal island.

At his bedside when Col. Dreyfus breathed his last were his wife, his son, Pierre, a daughter, Jeanne, and the latter's husband, Dr. Pierre Paul Levy, who attended him.

The Dreyfus case, which started in 1894 when a French spy posing as a charwoman in the German Embassy in Paris, fished a crumpled note out of a waste basket, became a cause celebre for Jews and liberals throughout the world. The note implicated Col. Dreyfus in the alleged sale of French army secrets to the German War Office.

Documents Were Forged

It was later proved that this and subsequent documents in the affair had been forged and it was generally conceded that a gross injustice had been perpetrated against Col. Dreyfus.

After Col. Dreyfus, at that time a Captain, was convicted of treason by a court martial in 1894, a bitter wave of anti-Semitism, accompanied by anti-Jewish rioting, swept the country.

In 1898, Emile Zola, startled France and the world with his celebrated novel, "J'Accuse," which presented the case for Dreyfus so powerfully that a new trial was ordered. At this trial, however, a second verdict of guilty was returned, by a vote of 5 to 2, and Dreyfus was sent back to Devil's Island for a ten-year term.

Col. Dreyfus was finally cleared, and President Loubet granted him full pardon, reinstatement to the army with the rank of major and awarded him the Legion of Honor.

One of the most interesting by-products of the international affair was that it was one of the most important factors inspiring Dr. Theodor Herzl to start his political Zionism movement.

Tel Aviv Hires 30 Young Jews To Bolster Its Police Force

TEL AVIV, July 12—Tel Aviv will shortly get thirty new policemen, it was learned here today.

Thirty-one Jewish young men have enrolled and were sent to the Police School at Jerusalem. One of the group will remain on duty in Jerusalem, while the others return to maintain law and order in the 100 per cent Jewish city.

A special delegation was recent-

ly appointed by Vice-Mayor Reuch of Tel Aviv to meet with government authorities to discuss the alarming decrease of Jews of the Tel Aviv police force.

Small pay and other adverse conditions have been forcing Jews to seek more lucrative employment elsewhere and the Tel Aviv force was gradually losing its Jewish character as a result of the influx of British policemen.

Capital Comment

WHITE HOUSE orders for Congress to adjourn within the next four weeks have spurred legislators and lobbyists into intense activity for the passage of various pet measures. Every effort is being made by the various groups to rally last-minute support for these proposals in the hope that in the rush of things these measures will be squeezed through the legislative mill and enacted into law.

Most of the spade work is being done under cover. Conferences behind closed doors are the rule. The proper foundation must be laid before the sponsors of these various pet measures can come out into the open and make a real fight for enactment. The whole game is an old one, but becomes increasingly popular as the close of a session of Congress nears.

SPONSORS of various immigration measures are especially active these days. Representative Samuel Dickstein of New York, chairman of the House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization, is particularly active in building up support for legislation designed to humanize existing immigration laws.

At the same time, sponsors of anti-alien legislation are engaged in a fight of their own. Headed by Representative Martin Dies of Texas, a member of the House immigration committee, this group is carrying on open warfare in an effort to gain support for a measure which will stop immigration to the United States and drive out those who are not citizens of this country.

IN THIS drive for restrictive and non-restrictive alien legislation, there is no hesitancy on the part of both camps to call each other names. Representative Dickstein charges that advocates of anti-alien legislation are responsible for the existence in this country of "an anti-alien prejudice." He says that efforts have been made to "paint the alien as a menace to our form of government, to our jobs, and to our standards of living. This could not be done without showing that there were aliens here in such numbers as to constitute a threat in these respects. This need for numbers to prove the existence of a serious alien problem has given rise to gross exaggerations as to the number of aliens in the country, and particularly as to the number of those that have entered illegally."

In spite of authentic figures made available by the Department of Labor and various independent agencies, Representative Dies continues to cite figures which have been branded by officials as "fantastic exaggerations." In reviewing these figures, Representative Dickstein denies that there exists

an alien menace in the United States. He holds that the law-abiding alien in the United States should not be handicapped, in these distressing days, by threats of wholesale deportations and compulsory naturalizations.

REPRESENTATIVE DIES, who has introduced a drastic anti-alien bill, has his own way of fighting back at critics of his proposal. He has made the charge that Col. D. W. McCormack, immigration commissioner of the Department of Labor, who made public official figures on the number of aliens in this country, "inspired propaganda designed to raise religious and racial prejudice" against the Dies anti-alien measure.

The Texan charged that the immigration commissioner used government funds to influence members of Congress on legislation and asserted that Col. McCormack "instructed immigration inspectors to get published a statement he issued on June 20, carrying misleading information." The statement to which Representative Dies referred was one which Col. McCormack had presented before the House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization at the request of Representative Dickstein who desired that the country become familiar with the true facts and figures on the alien situation in the United States.

WHILE fighting anti-alien legislation, Representative Dickstein is urging enactment of legislation to humanize immigration laws. The New Yorker's efforts are centered on obtaining support for the Kerr bill, H. R. 8163. This measure was introduced by Representative John H. Kerr of North Carolina, another member of the House immigration committee.

Under the existing inflexible deportation laws, the law-abiding alien whose only offense is that he came here some years ago without submitting to proper inspection by an immigration official, is subject to mandatory deportation even if that harsh action results in a broken home with an American-born wife and American-born children left here without means of self-support. But, deportation is not possible in the case of a hardened criminal who has managed to escape with light sentences or fines for numerous criminal offenses over a number of years. This individual is free to continue his criminal activity until he is convicted of two or more crimes involving moral turpitude and for each conviction is sentenced for one year or more. The Kerr bill would make it possible to adjust such cases to meet the basis of facts in the case and in the spirit of equal justice and for best public interest, Representative Dickstein holds.

HE POINTS OUT that the Kerr bill is so framed that limited discretion may be given to a spe-

cially appointed committee made up of officials from the Departments of Labor, State, and Justice. Establishment of such a committee to handle immigration problems was originally suggested by the Wickersham Commission on Law Enforcement and Observation, set up a few years ago when Herbert Hoover was president.

"Surely, no right-minded, patriotic American citizen will stand up and claim that such a committee will jointly permit such abuse of discretionary power as to utterly break down all our laws relating to immigration and deportation," Representative Dickstein said.

Those who oppose the Dies bill say that it will break down existing immigration and deportation laws. Which side will win out in this fight on immigration and alien legislation will not be known until the present session of Congress comes to an end. In the meantime, the activities of the restrictionists will bear watching by all fair-minded citizens.

Nazi Mob Gives Demonstration For Children

School's Classes Taken To Watch Attack on Butcher Shop

LONDON—The intensified persecution of the German Jews is illustrated by incidents reported in the Manchester Guardian.

At Wesseling, for instance, classes of school children were taken to see an anti-Semitic mob demolish the interior of a Jewish butcher shop. The owner's nephew had been sentenced for immoral conduct at a trial held in camera. There was reason to believe he would not have been found guilty had he not been a Jew, the Guardian's correspondent states.

In Cologne, a storm-trooper buying some meat in a Jewish shop, upon learning that the owner was not "Aryan" dragged him out into the street with the aid of two other men and beat him up. A policeman stood by and observed the process without making a move.

An arrest was made—the victim was taken into "protective custody" by a squad of police which arrived later. The shop was closed down.

The windows of all Jewish butcher shops at Frochen were soiled with lye.

The Guardian correspondent reported that the persecution seems to be becoming unpopular with the people and that it is continually fomented "from above" for political reasons.

Realtors to Map Plans For Aid to Appeal Drive

Jewish real estate men will hold a luncheon next Tuesday at the Hotel Commodore to consider plans for participation in the Greater New York United Jewish Appeal's campaign to aid the Jews of Germany and eastern Europe. Sponsors of the luncheon are Samuel Levy, Borough President of Manhattan; S. Richard Davis and Everett Jacobs. Rabbi Jonah B. Wise will be the chief speaker.

British 'A' Unit Seeks to Mend Cracow Split

Leader Hopes General Zionists Will Reunite Before Congress

LONDON.—Hope that all General Zionists will combine again into one world organization before the forthcoming World Zionist Congress was expressed here by J. K. Goldbloom, chairman of the Executive of the English Zionist Federation and one of the leaders of the recently created General Zionist Confederation consisting of Group "A" Zionists who quit the World Union at Cracow.

The statement was made at a press conference called by the English Federation to hear reports of the Cracow Conference. Dealing with the reasons for the breakup of the Cracow Conference, another spokesman for the British Zionists said that this was because of differences on the following two issues:

"First, at the previous Conference of the Weltverband a pledge was given that in no circumstances would the question of a labor organization in Palestine be raised or prejudiced until the coming Congress. In spite of this," the speaker declared, "there had been established in Palestine a General Zionists' trade union, with the approval of the World Union. The Federations of Germany, Czechoslovakia, Latvia and Jugoslavia accordingly demanded a declaration that the General Zionists would not recognize or support this trade union, but, failing to get it, these Federations had retired from the World Union. Secondly, this new trade union (the Irgun) was demanding not only recognition from the General Zionists, but also the establishment of a special fund for General Zionist workers, a General Zionists' Bank to support General Zionist colonization, and an organization of General Zionist employers who would bind themselves to employ only workers who accepted the General Zionist policy.

The English Federation could not agree to these demands, he said, and it was decided to form the new Confederated.

It was also disclosed at this conference that the Executive of the General Zionist Confederation has entered into informal negotiations with the leaders of the Histadruth with a view of obtaining some sort of autonomous rights within the Histadruth for the General Zionist workers.

The Provisional Executive of the Confederation, it was reported, would shortly issue a statement making their policy clear.

In the first place it would be emphasized that General Zionism must not be the prerequisite of any one class or group. Secondly, they stood for the upbuilding of Pales-

tine in a planned and systematic way. Thirdly, they would demand that the youth be educated in Jewish culture under a centralized Board under the control of the movement—not of any Party.

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Romance in Russia

A MOST interesting news item has come out of Russia. It deals not with war or revolution, not with harvest or steel output, but with marriage and the home. The Soviet government has decided to strengthen the family. This was foreshadowed by a well-photographed walk that Comrade Stalin took through the park a few weeks ago, patting children on their heads and permitting them to cluster about him and call him "Uncle." Obviously something was wrong.

And something was wrong! The Soviet press was about to begin a concerted attack on the evils of divorce. New laws, tightening the institution of marriage, were about to be issued, and with good reason. In the month of May, forty-four out of every hundred marriages contracted in Moscow had ended in divorce. Even these figures, disturbing though they were, did not tell the whole story. For most of the couples who live together in Moscow are not registered. I think it not unreasonable to conjecture that three-quarters of the unions consummated in the Soviet capital are sundered in a fairly short time.

THEORETICALLY this should not trouble the Communists. They believe that love should be free and that sex relations are the concern only of the persons involved. Therefore, they deliberately set out to destroy the traditional safeguards of marriage—religion, private property, and all the *mores* that both sheltered woman and gave her an inferior position.

The results were what everyone anticipated but the Communists themselves. Perhaps they weren't quite as bad as Panteleimon Romanov suggests in the story "Without Flowers": "There is no longer any love among us. There is only sex relationship. Girls easily unite with Comrades for a week, for a month, or casually for one night. . . . Those who seek in love something more than physiology are viewed with ridicule like mere half-wits."

BUT they were bad enough. One day, as I sat in the Zags office in Moscow, a young man came in alone to get a divorce. He was dressed in white pants and a gym shirt, and was carrying a tennis racket. He was still perspiring from the game he had just played and was impatient for the proceeding to end so that he might return for the next match.

By actual timing, the divorce was granted in four minutes. The questions the clerk asked were strictly factual and had nothing to do with the reasons for the divorce or its consequences. I learned that the couple had been married only two weeks. I may never know the reason for this hurried, perspiring, casual divorce, but I will always nurse the suspicion that his wife had just beaten him at tennis and he couldn't "take it." Anyway, he was given a divorce card and was told that his wife would be informed of the divorce by mail the next morning.

MULTIPLY this sort of thing by the millions and you can realize what has been happening in Russia. Even this situation did not produce its worst consequences until the peasants were collectivized, for it was limited almost exclusively to the urban centers. And Russia is very largely a country of peasants. The Muzhiks did not discard their wives so readily. Not only were they conservative by temperament, not only were they still under the influence of the Church, but these infernal Commissars had made a law, decreeing that in the event of a divorce, all property must be divided between husband and wife. The peasant decided it would be better to put up with a shrewish wife than to lose half his land. But when agriculture was collectivized, the peasant lost not only his religion and his individualism, but also his prop-

erty. Now that these bulwarks of marriage were removed, he began to carry on like the "city feller."

The consequences have been so disastrous in the disruption of home, family, marriage, and normal childhood that the Communists have finally begun to realize the truth of what Bernard Shaw, himself something of a Bolshevik, pointed out long ago, viz., that sexual intercourse is not a private matter, but is profoundly social in its implications and consequences. They have discovered that even a Communist society requires a reasonable amount of stability and fidelity in sex relations.

AND they have learned that the proper rearing of children demands some of the conventional bourgeois virtues and safeguards which they thought were unnecessary. Not that Soviet Russia has deliberately neglected its children. They have been given the best treatment that conditions made possible. Stern obligations were imposed on parents to support their children and the law was severe with those who did not give them adequate care. Nevertheless, it was found that children brought up in an atmosphere of free love and easy divorce somehow did not make the best kind of citizens.

Even their exposure to Communist ideology was seen to be no adequate substitute for mother love and a stable home life. Perhaps that accounted for the decision in a trial that I attended on the occasion of my last visit to Moscow. An important Communist official and his wife had agreed to separate. But they disagreed as to the custody of their 10-year-old son. The father claimed the child on the ground that he was the better Communist and would give the boy the proper ideological background. The mother, who admitted she was more bourgeois in outlook, maintained that the child needed her. The court in a decision which reversed all Soviet procedure gave the boy to the mother on the basis that mother love was even more important than Communist ideology in rearing a good citizen. The decision at first shocked Moscow, but was eventually accepted as a turning point on the road to a sane middle ground in Soviet morality.

religious customs or obsolete divorce laws, are tragically numerous. The suffering and the inhibitions which economic inability to marry imposes on young people who are biologically ready for mating, is both pathetic and serious in its social consequences. The double standard of morals is unfair and in many ways vicious.

At these evils the first Communist commonwealth in history has delivered lusty and well deserved blows. But it has learned, somewhat to its sorrow, that the Ten Commandments are not outmoded by-products of capitalism, but still epitomize the accumulated wisdom of mankind.

Hebrew Listed For Admission To Palestine

Polish Jews Told They Must Learn Tongue To Get Visas

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, July 12—Jews who wish to emigrate from Poland to Palestine will not receive immigration certificates from the Jewish Agency unless they first master the Hebrew language, it was announced here by Isaac Gruenbaum, head of the immigration department of the Jewish Agency.

Mr. Gruenbaum, now on a visit here, emphasized that this restriction will enter into force in April of 1936.

"We do not intend to close the doors of Palestine. We insist, however, that prospective immigrants should be best fitted for life in the country. Knowledge of the Hebrew language is one of the major requirements," Mr. Gruenbaum said.

In Line With Ruling The announcement by Mr. Gruenbaum is in line with a decision adopted recently by the Executive of the Jewish Agency in Palestine to give preference in granting immigration certificates to those who speak Hebrew.

Beginning next year every candidate for an immigration certificate to Poland will have to pass a special examination in the Palestine offices in Poland, as well as in other countries to prove sufficient knowledge of Hebrew before the immigration certificate will be granted.

Mr. Gruenbaum, addressing a Zionist gathering here, condemned the Jewish illegal immigration into Palestine. He pointed out that most of those who enter Palestine illegally are undesirable elements. He also emphasized that the Jewish Agency would have received more certificates from the Palestine government if there were no illegal immigration.

Hyamson's statement that the
Jews and fifty League of Nations
members would object because the
Balfour Declaration is embodied in
the mandate, Col. Wedgwood says:
"I imagine that the Jews would
be better satisfied with a new
pledge and a democratic constitu-
tion and self-government would be
granted as soon as both Jews and
Arabs asked for it. As for the fifty
nations to be 'squared,' a good
many fragments of the peace
treaties are back in the melting pot
just now and something for Eng-
land too does not seem unreason-
able to hope for. But, seriously,
does Mr. Hyamson suppose that
France with Syria, and Italy with
Abyssinia, and both wanting our
help as never before, are likely to
object to our changing the name of
our protection over a somewhat
troublesome Province and prob-
lem? We do not have to consult
Germany."

Role in All Jewish Affairs Urged on Rabbis' Groups

A WEEK'S EVENTS IN REVIEW

By BORIS SMOLAR

The unusually hot Summer sea-
son seems to have no effect what-
soever on the wave of anti-Jew-
ish discrimination in Europe and
especially on the anti-Jewish per-
secutions in Germany.

Conditions in Germany reached
such a point last week that the
Jewish Community in Berlin has
seen itself compelled to issue an
appeal to the Berlin Jews asking
them to act with the utmost re-
straint, especially in public places
and in restaurants, and not let
themselves be provoked by hu-
miliating acts of the Nazis.

In Frankfurt-am-Main, once the
oldest and richest Jewish com-
munity of Germany the position
of the Jews was reported as be-
ing worse than in Nuremberg, the
domain of Julius Streicher. It
seems that the Nazis are now
concentrating their forces on
driving the Jews out of Frank-
furt-am-Main in every possible
way, by depriving them of all
civil and human rights.

Order Anti-Jewish Posters in Factories

To make the situation for the
Jews worse an order was issued
to display anti-Semitic posters in
all factories and offices all over
the country. In numerous pro-
vincial cities local authorities
were instructed not to permit
Jews to trade in the local cattle-
markets.

Since a great percentage of
the population in Germany is ob-
jecting to the persecution of the
Jews, the Voelkischer Beobachter,
the chief organ of the Nazi gov-
ernment has found it necessary
to publish a warning that any
statement by a Nazi party mem-
ber to the effect that the Jews
are of the white race will lead to
his trial.

Similarly, the chief organ of
the Nazi government warned
"trustworthy Germans" not to re-
peat the claim that there are also
decent Jews in Germany who do
not deserve the mistreatment
which is generally accorded to
the Jewish population in the
Reich.

British Quakers Urge Hitler to Quit Persecution

Touched by the sufferings of
the Jews in Germany, the exec-
utive committee of the Quakers of
Great Britain addressed a letter
to Hitler asking him to stop the
anti-Jewish persecutions. The
letter emphasized that Germany
cannot obtain good will abroad if
it continues to use coercive
measures against the Jews.

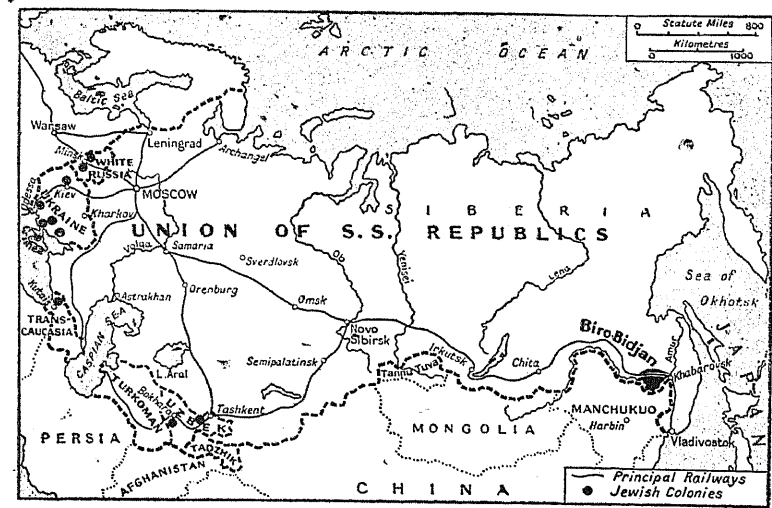
A similar step was taken also
by Catholic organizations in Bel-
gium. La Libre Belge, the lead-
ing Catholic paper of Belgium,
came out openly with a demand
that the world-wide boycott
against Germany should be spon-
sored by all Catholics through-
out the world and until the per-
secutions of Jews and Catholics
in Germany cease.

Renew Propaganda In Foreign Lands

Not limiting itself to anti-Jew-
ish propaganda within Germany
the Nazi government has em-
barked on a renewed anti-Jewish
propaganda policy also for for-
eign countries. A group of more
than 100 German agitators in
Brazil were enabled by the Nazi
government to proceed to Ger-
many in order to study on the
spot the various methods of anti-
Jewish propaganda for the pur-
pose of spreading it later in
South American countries.

Similarly the Nazi government,
which subsidizes the anti-Jewish
league in Rumania, has helped
effect a united front in that coun-
try between the anti-Semitic

party led by Professor Goga and
that led by the notorious Prof.
Alexander Cuza. This union,
aided by funds from Germany,
will bring about an increased
anti-Semitic campaign in Rumania
which is the exact wish of the
Nazi leaders in Germany.

Anti-Jewish Outbreaks In Polish Upper Silesia

Anti-Jewish propaganda seemed
also to gain the upperhand this
week in Poland. Encouraged by
the fact that the Polish govern-
ment is now definitely pro-Nazi,
anti-Jewish elements launched
attacks in the Polish part of
Upper Silesia and in Pomerania,
smashing the windows in many
Jewish houses and shops in the
town of Rybnick and calling on
the population in these districts
to boycott Jewish firms.

The riot in Rybnick broke out
despite the assurances given by
the Polish authorities. Such as-
surances were given to Jewish
leaders immediately after the
anti-Jewish excesses in Grodno,
Suwalki and other places a few
weeks ago.

Polish Police Accused Of Aiding Anti-Semites

The Federation of Polish Jews
in America in a memorandum ad-
dressed to the Polish Embassy in
Washington definitely accused
the Grodno police not only of re-
fusing to protect the Jewish
population during the excesses
but even in spreading the anti-
Semitic rumors which caused
these excesses.

The accusations made by the
Federation were based on au-
thentic information compiled in
Grodno. The charges against the
Polish authorities are very grave
and certainly require an explana-
tion on the part of the Polish
government.

The policy of eliminating Jews
from commercial and public life,
now being followed by Latvia
and Lithuania, was given new
impetus in these two countries
when the government of Lithu-
ania considered adoption of a
plan to monopolize the entire
grain trade in the country and to
eliminate the Jews from trading
in grain. This plan, if effected,
will be a severe blow to thou-
sands of Jews in Lithuania.

In Latvia the government liqui-
dated the Jewish Parents Union
which was one of the few Jewish
organizations still permitted to
exist in the country. With the
liquidation of this educational
organization the entire Jewish
social life in Latvia is now prac-
tically dead, since even the
Zionist movement is no longer
permitted there.

Ray of Light From Soviet

A ray of light in the dark pic-
ture of Jewish life in Europe are
the reports from Soviet Russia.
One report last week emphasized
the shortage of labor in the Jew-
ish colonies of Crimea. The
other report disclosed that the
Soviet government has assigned
the enormous sum of sixty mil-
lion roubles—nominally thirty
million dollars—for the further
development of Biro-Bidjan as an
autonomous district. The money
will be used for the completion
of various industrial enterprises
in Biro-Bidjan within the next
six months.

The invitation made once by
the French government to Jews
to settle in Syria was repeated
this week in a more outspoken
form by M. Candace, the French
Under-Secretary for Colonies.
The spokesman of the French
government emphasized that the
French authorities are willing to
give the Jews wide opportunities
to develop Syria along the same
lines as they have developed Pal-
estine.

Bid Is Result Of Negotiations

This repeated invitation is no
doubt a result of the negotiations
going on behind the scenes be-
tween certain Jewish groups in
France and the French govern-
ment for a large Jewish immigra-
tion into Syria. An expedition
consisting of Jews from Ger-
many has already made a sur-
vey in certain parts of Syria. The
results of this survey were not
made public. They were, how-
ever, reported to Jewish institu-
tions in Berlin and in Paris.

While the French government
is openly proclaiming its desire
to see Jews immigrating into
Syria, which is a French man-
dated territory, the British gov-
ernment seems to be firm in its
policy of checking Jewish immi-
gration into Palestine. At the
House of Commons this week it
was admitted by government offi-
cials that the system of asking
tourists for bonds before giving
them a visa to Palestine is ap-
plied to Jewish tourists only.

Wants 3,000,000 Jews in Palestine

An appeal to the British gov-
ernment to relax its restrictions
against Jewish immigration into
Palestine was made by Lord Mel-
chett who expressed a desire to
see British interests protected
not less than the interests of the
Jews. In his appeal Lord Mel-
chett visualized that Palestine
has the potentialities of becom-
ing an important British port

next to Singapore, with a Jewish
population of not less than
3,000,000 people.

Whether the prediction of Lord
Melchett will ever be realized is
difficult to say under the present
political circumstances. Plain
figures made public this week by
the Jewish National Fund on the
growth of the population in Pal-
estine disclosed the startling fact
that while the number of Jews in
Palestine has grown from 59,000
in 1919 to 320,000 at the end of
1934, the number of non-Jews in
Palestine has increased from
537,000 in 1919 to 870,000 at the
end of 1934.

Comparative Increase Rate Problem for Congress

The problem of Jewish and
Arab growth in Palestine will no
doubt be one of the major prob-
lems which the Zionist Congress
in Lucerne will discuss next
month. Should the Arab increase
match the pace of growth of the
Jewish population at the height
of Jewish immigration into Pal-
estine, then the Jews may always
face the danger of remaining the
same minority they were twenty
years ago.

The question whether the Jews
will ever have a chance to be-
come a majority in Palestine is
now being openly discussed in
London between leading mem-
bers of the Jewish Agency and
representatives of the British
government. With the Palestine
mandate in power for eight years
more only the answer to fate of
the Jewish National Home lies
in whether Jews will be aided to
become a majority in Palestine
within this period. Should such
help not be forthcoming before
the Mandate terminates no one
can foretell the terms under
which the Mandate may be re-
newed or whether it will be re-

Bureya Farms Beat Crop Quota Despite Storms

Jewish Autonomous Dis- trict Sets Record in Wheat Planting

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
MOSCOW—The autonomous Jew-
ish district of Biro-Bidjan took first
place among far-eastern districts in
volume of crop-planting, a report
made public here reveals.
Despite heavy rains during six
weeks of the Spring plowing sea-
son and a number of other obsta-
cles, Bureya collectives managed to
outstrip even the State-owned
farms in planting, the report says.

The farms met their planting
quota and even exceeded it eleven
per cent in wheat, while State
farms only reached ninety-six per
cent of their quota.

Bad weather hampered trans-
portation of food, building materials
and fuel for tractors and other
farm machinery.

The inclement weather also in-
terfered with Bureya building op-
erations. As a result, building pro-
jects which should have been be-
gun long ago only got under way
recently. Delay in completion of
plans and in allocation of necessary
funds by the government also im-
pede building operations.

About 100 units are under con-
struction in Biro-Bidjan, capital
city of the district. They are main-
ly homes, communal buildings, a
railroad depot, a combination mun-
icipal bath and laundry, schools,
hospitals and workers' club.

More than 700 building workers
are employed by the city, exclusive
of those employed by the Soviet.

German Nazi Doctors Not Wanted

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin:
From the standpoint of American democratic freedom, nobody can raise any objections when German steamship companies, in order to stem the tide of its declining passenger trade, bring to these shores for ridiculous low prices, among others, groups of German physicians. But the situation is entirely different when such a group, under the leadership of a man close to the Nazi Ministry of "Culture," is officially invited to this country and received by the Chicago Medical Association.

We believe that sickness, like birth and death, is to be kept out of daily political struggles; that the physician, standing outside of such struggles, is to be judged only by his human and medical qualities. However, it can easily be proven that this axiomatic principle has been discarded completely by the physicians of Hitler Germany.

We detest nothing so much as the excited and dishonest exaggerations of a propaganda which believes in discovering atrocity stories in order to give vent to its resentments. We talk only of facts. Not about the fact that Jewish and "Left Aryan" physicians are being tortured, martyred and murdered by ignorant, wild, misled "Aryan" roughnecks. We only want to point out that German doctors themselves, without the excuse of ignorance, have coldly organized themselves to drive out their Jewish colleagues because of economic and political motives; that, with few exceptions, Germany's most eminent physicians are no longer inside the boundaries of the Reich; that German science and research has not brought forth a single important work within the last two years, because nearly all outstanding German scientists have been compelled to forsake their laboratories, work and positions, regardless of age, calling, and unquestionable political disinterestedness.

In view of this disregard of all humane principles, because of these "cold" murders by medical men, the invitation by an American medical society makes a mockery of all human justice, decency and honor.

On the C.C.A.R. Presidents

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin:
In your issue of Sunday, July 7, I find the statement that Rabbi Felix A. Levy is the first Zionist to be elected president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

This statement is incorrect. Rabbi Max Heller was the first Zionist to be thus honored when he was elected to the Presidency in the year 1909.

Although the members of the Conference were, with a very few exceptions, opposed to the Zionist movement at that time, they yet elected a Zionist to the highest office.

This happened in this wise. I had been vice-president for two years, 1905 to 1907. In accordance with the tradition of the Conference I was slated for the election to the presidency in 1907. The chairman of the nominating committee came to me and said that his committee was in something of a quandary.

It was felt by some that for a number of reasons Rabbi Max Heller should be nominated for the vice-presidency. Others, however, held that because of the divergency of our views on Zionism, Rabbi Heller might be unsympathetic to me. The chairman was none other than my very dear friend, that white-souled servant of God and man, Moses J. Gries. He asked me to tell him frankly whether I entertained any strong objection to the nomination of Rabbi Heller.

I replied that although Rabbi Heller's and my attitude on Zionism were strongly antagonistic, I

yet felt that this should not stand in the way of receiving an honor which because of his service he really deserved. Thereupon the name of Max Heller was reported by the nominating committee for the vice-presidency, to which office he was duly elected. Two years thereafter, in 1909, he succeeded me as president and held this office for two years.

The Chicago Conference

Kindly permit me to correct several erroneous statements in Mr. Boris Smolar's column in your issue of Sunday, June 27, concerning the proceedings of the recent meeting of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, in Chicago.

Mr. Smolar writes: "It was also for the first time that the Conference of Reform Rabbis adopted a neutral stand on the Jewish work in Palestine in place of its former attitude of opposition."

This statement is inaccurate and very misleading. The stand of the Conference on the Jewish work in Palestine has never been a neutral one. It has always been a favorable one. The Central Conference of American Rabbis has never opposed the upbuilding of Palestine as a haven of refuge for those Jews who desired it, nor as a cultural and spiritual center for Judaism.

The Central Conference of American Rabbis did not "adopt a neutral stand on the Jewish work in Palestine." It simply declared that it would take no official stand on the question of Zionism and underscored its intention to continue, as in the past, to cooperate in the upbuilding of Palestine.

Conflicting Views Are Offered On State of Doctors in Reich

Conflicting views on the position of Jewish doctors in Germany were expressed by a group of American physicians returning from a visit to Germany and a group of German physicians visiting the United States.

Dr. William B. Peck, speaking for fifty-two American physicians who returned Thursday from Germany said: "The condition of Jewish doctors has improved definitely."

Dr. Herman Brauneck, speaking for sixty German physicians visiting the United States said earlier in the week: "The future policy of the German government will be to decrease further the number of Jewish doctors."

Dr. Peck, managing director of the Post-Graduate Medical Association of North America, returning from a two-month tour of European medical centers on the United States liner Manhattan, said:

"When I was in Germany a few years ago the Jewish scientists and doctors were very much alarmed. They were afraid of losing their posts, and of being compelled to leave the country. But on this last visit I found that many of them had been restored to their posts and that they were able to work without interference."

Dr. Peck was considerably at

variance with the visiting Nazi doctors who arrived here last week, seemingly well-informed, and said that Jewish doctors would not be allowed to practice on "Aryans."

He was also at variance with Dr. John Haynes Holmes, pastor of the Community Church, who returned on the same ship and told reporters that the Jewish situation was desperate and that there was no possibility of exaggerating "the black tragedy of German Jewry."

"That in the face of such a horror," Dr. Holmes added, "there can be American Jews who counsel patience, forbearance, calm, is more than I can understand."

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In the Book and Literary World

A Different Arnold Zweig

PLAYTHINGS OF TIME. By ARNOLD ZWIG. Translated from the German by Emma D. Ashton. 250 pp. New York: The Viking Press. \$2.50.

GERMANY'S emigré writers, great as well as small, are confronted with the problem, which becomes more ominous with the lapse of each month and year, of maintaining their spiritual lives on alien soil. No matter how congenial the Riviera may seem to cosmopolitan Thomas Mann or Switzerland to the quiet-loving Zweigs, they will become but dying trees propped upright in strange earth if their roots to not survive the transplanting and bring new sap to the creative process.

Thomas Mann, after attempting to stand four-square upon the crossways of liberalism in "The Magic Mountain," has, no doubt under duress of circumstance, retreated to safe and obscure researches into the epistemology of the Bible. His brother, Heinrich, chooses rather to write of Henry of Navarre than of Hitler. Stefan Zweig has never concerned himself with any but the most immaterial and delicate manifestations of the human spirit, so perhaps he may be excused for his current preoccupation with personages long dead.

But in Arnold Zweig we have a writer who showed at least twice, in "The Case of Sergeant Grischka" and again in "De Vriendt Goes Home," that he could cast an impassioned attack upon barbarousness and iniquity in the mould of great realistic art. And yet he too, by the slight evidence of the recently written stories in this volume, has resorted to the beguiling compensations of the fairy tale. It is he, of all living writers, whose art could render the greatest service to the Jews of Germany. And yet he permits his contemporary political interests to be represented in this volume by a charming but feeble story, "A Silesian Tale," which pictures such hidden poverty in the Hitler regime that an eight-year-old boy, Karl Findel, sets out to petition the gnome, Ruebezah, for relief for his desperate mother and himself; and by a warm but socially insignificant story about an old Jew, once rich, but now ruined by the inflation, who finds that his only mail, the only sign that any one in the outside world remembers him, is the circulars he still receives from his old synagogue, petitioning him to subscribe to the aid of his impoverished brethren.

In the first story Karl Findel fortunately finds his Ruebezah in the person of a rich and benevolent Jewish merchant week-ending with a woman who selects Karl as her mascot; in the second story the old Jew finally masters his pride and appeals to the congregation to transfer his name from the roster of potential donors to the lengthening list of petitioners. Both these stories are rich in pathos and compassion. But neither the predicaments they describe nor the solutions they proffer are very eloquent comment on the plight of masses of humanity.

FAR BE IT for me to suggest that Arnold Zweig should attempt a mass-action novel. No, I am decrying the lack of something quite different, something that was intensely present in "Grishka" and that, above all else, made it a great book. I mean Zweig's ability to make of Grischka a symbol for all humanity.

When Grischka marched before the firing squad, all the good and humble and simple people of the universe marched with him. But when Karl Findel finds his good fairy or old Siegfried Kraeutel wallows his pride, well, we have gained nothing but a gentle, wist-

ful account of an incident of the day. For that matter, the three or four older stories which deal with the war are pretty much repetitions of the theme of Grischka; and because they are mere particularizations of an impassioned argument the strength of which was its generalization, its inclusiveness and massiveness, they must be stigmatized as not merely insignificant, but positively bad.

FAR BETTER are those happy stories which steer away from the reefs of social problems. Arnold Zweig is a great lover of dogs, and "Kong at the Seashore" is a little masterpiece in the way of a dog story. A young boy is offered a fantastic price for his faithful dog, so that a willful young lady can shoot it. The sum mentioned would have meant a college education for the boy, but he comes through the ordeal beautifully, and not without a witty sally at the young lady's expense. Two stories, "The Apparition," and "A Spot on the Eyeball," are quaintly humorous. The latter traces the effect of a spot of color which clouds the retina of a man's eye upon his fundamental outlook upon life with startling conclusions. "Apes" is a curious little piece about a bookseller who suddenly learns that subway guards and ticket-takers are not the robots he has assumed them to be. And finally there is that macabre story, "The Snake," which Zweig could only have written with his tongue in his cheek.

I understand that a new novel by Arnold Zweig will soon be forthcoming. That should be better news than anything I can report about "Playthings of Time."

Germany, charging that the people are being incited to acts which result in violence and even bloodshed. "When will this lunacy stop?" he exclaimed.

"Germany is now asking for proper treatment herself by the nations of the world," he said. "But when she asks for equity she must be ready herself to deal equitably with others. Like that old maxim in the law of equity, she must come to us with clean hands if she desires justice for herself."

"I hope," he concluded, "that in the negotiations taking place between this great empire and the German rulers, they will be given to understand how abhorrent is their type of action to the British people."

Mr. Janner's speech made a strong impression on the other parliamentarians, who frequently showed agreement with his remarks.

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The History of a Fund

History of the Baron de Hirsch Fund. By SAMUEL JOSEPH, Ph.D. Jewish Publication Society, Philadelphia.

The question of readjusting American Jews to different professions is recently occupying a great deal of attention. It was discussed at great length at the recent convention of Jewish Social Workers in Lake Placid. It is being discussed constantly wherever American-Jewish leaders come together.

The "History of the Baron de Hirsch Fund," published by the Jewish Publication Society, gives a key to this problem. It shows how the problem of adjusting Jews in America to all kinds of work has been dealt with for years by the trustees of the Baron de Hirsch Fund.

Dr. Samuel Joseph, the author of this book, has put in several years of labor in compiling the material. For this task every historian will be grateful to him. The intensive work of adjusting Jewish immigrants to trade and to farming, and the distribution of Jewish immigrants from congested urban centers to smaller communities is related in Joseph's work, which shows how successfully the trustees of the Baron de Hirsch Fund have carried out the purpose for which the fund was established.

The principle of the fund being the Americanization of Jewish immigrants, there is hardly a single Jewish immigrant in America who has not benefited directly or indirectly from the activities of the institutions created by this fund. The aid and protection of Jewish immigrants at American ports, the legal and legislative assistance given them, the relief granted many of them, the agricultural training and trade education with which many were provided, the removing of Jewish immigrants from urban centers—all these activities conducted by the Baron de Hirsch Fund are described in detail by Dr.

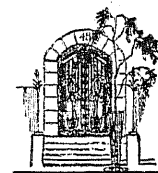
Joseph in his book on the basis of historical data.

His volume is actually a history of Jewish growth in the United States. The book is indispensable to every intelligent Jew interested in studying the development of the Jewish community in America for the last fifty years. It gives a clear idea of the transplantation difficulties which nearly one-third of the Jews of Eastern Europe face in adjusting themselves to American life.

Students who are interested in Jewish occupational re-direction which has now become a major problem for American Jews should read the "History of the Baron de Hirsch Fund." This is a book which deserves the attention of every person interested in the social problems now affecting American Jews. MILTON BROWN.

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Labor Groups Honor Schwartz, Zionist and Jewish Legionaire

During the World War, Velvel Schwartz was one of the first to join the Jewish Legion in Palestine. Officers of his regiment knew him as the young American who threatened to foment a mutiny in the ranks every time he got the idea the "boys" weren't being treated right.

Two years ago, Schwartz died of heart-failure. At noon today (Sunday) the Poale Zion-Zeire Zion organization and the Jewish National

Workers Alliance will unveil a monument over his grave in the Montefiore Cemetery.

Schwartz, who was 42 when he died, was a leading labor Zionist. He was unique in that he never held an office in the movement to which he devoted his life, except to serve in the Poale Zion executive, and he never made a public speech.

Jewish refugees if they are not capitalists. It denies all reports which were spread abroad by irresponsible elements that the Albanian Cabinet held a special session at which it allegedly decided to open the doors of the country to Jewish refugees.

An official statement from Remzi Celo, the Albanian Acting Consul General in Salonica, whence the misleading reports emanated, also makes it clear that no Cabinet meeting was held on the question of admitting Jewish refugees, and no invitation was extended in any way or form to initiate settlement of Jewish refugees in Albania.

Charge Jews Delayed Mufti's League Missive

JERUSALEM, July 12—A complaint that the memorandum of Mufti's party to the League of Na-

tions has not as yet been transmitted by the Palestine government to the Mandates Commission, was voiced today by the local Arab press. "Jewish influences" are charged with responsibility for this delay.

The Executive of the Palestine Arab Party has appealed to the High Commissioner to investigate the delay and fix the responsibility.

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Exiles in Luxembourg Get Order from Reich

LUXEMBOURG, July 12 — A number of Jewish refugees from Germany, who are living in Luxembourg on income from German securities, were informed by the Nazi authorities today that they must return to Germany at once.

No reason for this order was given. Those who do not obey it will lose the income from their securities, which will be stopped by the German government, the notification warns.

than a million shekolim certificates were sold for this Congress, enabling that many Jews to vote for delegates. Prior to the last Zionist Congress 839,291 shekolim were

sold. This number included the shekolim bought by the Revisionists.

The elections of delegates to the World Zionist Congress have not yet been held in several countries. In Switzerland and Argentine the elections are scheduled to take place Sunday. In Palestine they will be held July 24. In Poland they are scheduled for next week.

Not less than 110,000 shekolim certificates were sold in Palestine. The Palestine delegation will therefore be the largest at the Congress.

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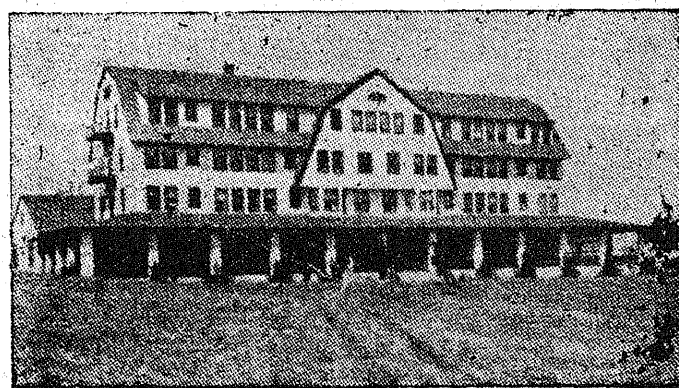
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
