2 AMERICAN NON-ZIONISTS NAMED TO AGENCY'S EXECUTIVE

LUCERNE, September 6. (JTA) -- Two Americans, Dr. Maurice J. Karpf, head of the Graduate School of Jewish Social Research in New York, and Dr. Maurice B. Hexter, formerly of Boston and now of Jerusalem, were elected non-Zionist members of the Executive of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, at the closing session here this afternoon of the Agency Council. The third non-Zionist member elected to the Executive is Dr. Werner Senator of Jerusalem.

An agreement had been reached late last night by which the non-Zionists were to be given 3 instead of 2 seats in the Executive.

Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America, and Lord Melchett were elected co-chairmen of the Jewish Agency Council. The Council, which had been in session here two days, approved all the resolutions adopted earlier this week by the nineteenth World Zionist Congress.

Describing the difficulties of upbuilding work in Palestine, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, newly elected president of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency, declared in his closing address: "I hear from several sides that Palestine is too small to absorb all the Jews of the world. But I can tell you that four years ago Lord Passfield told us during our negotiations that there is no place in Palestine even for a cat, and look at Palestine now! More than 200,000 Jews entered Palestine during the last two years."

Commenting on the joint activity of Zionists and non-Zionists on behalf of Palestine in the Agency's council, Dr. Weizmann said "The work of the council, whows us that there are not many differences between the Zionists and non-Zionists, and your good start shall contribute to the upbuilding of Palestine."

Other speakers were Neville Laski, president of the British Board of Jewish Deputies, Abraham Harzfeld, labor leader in Palestine; Jacob Lestchinsky, Samuel Schulman and Professor Schorr of Warsaw, Joseph Sprinzak of Palestine, Menachem Mendel Ussishkin, head of the Jewish National Fund, and Dr. Nahum Sokolow, newly elected honorary president of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency.

Mr. Laski criticized the mandatory power for its policy of restricting immigration of Jews at a time when the country requires new workers most urgently. Obviously referring to Transjordan, he demanded that Government land "in Palestine and beyond" be made available for immediate and intensive Jewish colonization.

At the morning session Max Ritter van Anhauch made a strong plea on behalf of Palestine shipping and for maritime training of Jews.

NEW ZIONIST EXECUTIVE HOLDS FIRST MEETING

LUCERNE, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- The newly elected Executive of the World Zionist Organization held its first meeting behind closed doors last night. It is understood that the sole topic of discussion was the future activities of the Executive.

Assignment of portfolios to the new members of the Executive will be made at a meeting of that body in Palestine at the end of October.

DR. MAGNES PRESIDES AT LUCERNE MEETING

LUCERNE, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- Chancellor Judah L. Magnes of the Hebrew University in Palestine, last night presided at a meeting here of the Executive for Jewish Study at the University. Professor Martin Buber, Professor M. S. Balaban, and Professor Schorr participated.

The meeting considered reorganization of the executive of the department. Dr. Magnes arrived here yesterday afternoon to attend the meeting on Sept. 8 of the board of governors of the university.

GREEK ARMY CHIEF COUNTERACTS GENERAL'S ANTI-SEMITIC SPEECH

SALONICA, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- The address of General Papadopoulos to the Serrai military forces yesterday in which he coupled Communists and Jews as the enemies of Greece resulted today in an order being sent by General Apapagos, commander-in-chief of the Greek army, to all Macedonian forces in which he called the Jews "a valuable element in the progress of civilization."

General Apapagos' statement, which was ordered read to the soldiers three times, came after vigorous protests against the address had been lodged with him by leaders of the Jewish community. Chief Rabbi Zvi Hirsch Koretz of Salonica visited the commanderin-chief to protest against the address.

General Apapogos' statement follows: "All Greek Jews are moved by patrictic feelings. They differ from the Greeks only in religion and they are a valuable element in the progress of civilization.

Military authorities were commanded to explain to the soldiers that no distinction is to be made between Greeks on the basis of creed.

Meanwhile, the governor of Serrai, after an official inquiry into the speech, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency the Papadopoulos incident had probably been exaggerated in order to evoke discontent among the Jews against the Greek government.

ITALIAN KING OPENS PALESTINE PAVILION AT LEVANT FAIR

ROME, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- King Victor Emanuel III today paid a fifteen-minute visit to Bari where he inaugurated the Palestine Pavillon at the Levant Fair now taking place there.

The King evinced the greatest interest in Palestine affairs, asking numerous questions about the development of agriculture and the growth of Jevish immigration in Palestine.

11 POLISH JEWS SUE REICH FOR RUINING THEIR BUSINESS

WARSAW, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- Eleven Polish Jews are filing a 1,000,000-mark damage suit against the German government in a Berlin court, it was learned today. They charge ruination of business and damages from physical and moral suffering undergone while they carried on their business in Germany.

The action is based on a recent order of the German government that foreign citizens can be compensated for losses sustained as a result of the Nazi regime.

REICH ZIONISTS WILL NOT ATTEND REVISIONIST CONGRESS

BERLIN, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- German Zionists will not participate in the constituent congress of the new independent Zionist Revisionist organization to be held in Vienna beginning tomorrow night, it was disclosed today.

Germany sent 34 delegates to the world Zionist Congress which closed in Lucerne last Tuesday. The independent congress represents right-wing Zionists who bolted the World Zionist Organization at the 1933 congress.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR SESSLER, PHILADELPHIA BIBLIOPHILE

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- Funeral services were held today for Charles Sessler, noted bibliophile who died here at the age of 81 after a long illness. He specialized in Dickens first editions and was a connoisseur of art and music. Mr. Sessler is survived by his wife, a son, J. Leonard, and two daughters, Mrs. Arthur Goldsmith and Mrs. Paul Blieden.

WAR-SCARE ABATES IN PALESTINE, HOARDING DECLINES

JERUSALEM, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- The war-scare occasioned by the Italian-Ethiopian orisis, which has been keenly felt in Palestine, is gradually abating here following assurances in the entire Araband Jewish press.

Food hoarding and the withdrawal of cash from the banks is decreasing, a survey reveals.

The Palestine population became alarmed by reports that certain Arab leaders were holding conferences at which possibilities were discussed of getting rid of the British regime in case of a world war involving England.

Reports were also circulated that Ethiopian agents were secretly at work in Palestine enlisting the sympathy of Arab leaders and recruiting young Arabs to fight for Haile Selassie. Arabs in Palestine, Syria and neighboring countries are in definite sympathy with Ethiopia.

LASKI DISAVOWS CRITICISM OF J.T.A,

LUCERNE, Sept. 6. (JTA) -- Neville Laski, president of the British Board of Jewish Leputies, today disassociated himself from an official publicity service's report which created the false impression that he had criticized the Jewish Telegraphic Agency for a story in connection with the recently concluded world Zionist congress.

Mr. Laski, who is co-chairman of the Jewish Agency Council which today ended its fourth session here, announced to the council that the statement attributed to him had been made in his capacity as chairman. He explained that he had made the statement because he had been requested to do so, but that it did not represent his own opinion.

The statement referred to called the attention of the Jawish Agency Council to reports by the Jawish Telegraphic Agency of resolutions adopted by the political committee in its plenary session at the congress. It characterized these reports, according to the official publicity service, as containing "countless digressions from the text of the resolution as adopted by the congress" and as being "premature and unauthorized."

Mr. Laski, after receiving a statement from the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in which it was pointed out that the complaint was absolutely unfounded and that it is customary to report important resolutions when they had been adopted by parliamentary committees, made a statement on the matter before the Agency Council. He declared that he took exception to the false impression this report created. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency also submitted proof that the official publicity service had committed the exact blunder, attributed to the former by publishing a story on the resolutions in the Warsaw press on Tuesday morning when the resolution was not adopted until Tuesday afternoon.

The official agency was charged with having falsified the reports that Laski said the Jewish Telegraphic Agency story contained "countless digressions." This, it was stated, was entirely invented.
