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"Any municipality," Mueller further declares, "is fully entitled to prohibit Jews from entering municipal baths or other municipal institutions, or to issue anti-Jewish posters to deter Jews from entering the city."

At the same time, Mueller counsels against displaying signs "Jews enter this city on their own risk." Such signs, he says, are "apt to create the impression that the city is on the verge of terror, and besides, the ways of dealing with Jews are sufficiently unlimited so that it does not pay to display threats publicly."

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Meanwhile, Count Wolf von Helldorf, president of the Berlin Police, and notorious leader of the anti-Jewish street attack on Kurfuerstendamm on Rosh Hashonah eve four years ago, today notified the executive of the Jewish Community of Berlin that complete protection would be given by the police to Jews during Rosh Hashonah prayer hours.

In connection with this special notification, Dr. Heinrich Stahl, president of the Berlin Jewish Community, is issuing an appeal to all Jews of Berlin to maintain order when leaving the synagogues and not to crowd in front of the exits, thus avoiding any possible provocation. The appeal also requests Jews not to congregate in front of the synagogues and not to park autos there.

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This question has given rise to the opinion that since the Jews are now classed officially as non-citizens as well as "non-Aryans," the Reich sports authorities will use this fact in explanation of the absence of Jewish athletes from the German Olympics squad when it is finally constituted.

Just what affect the laws will have in this respect, however, is not clear even to the authorities who were questioned on the matter today by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

A clear cut decision on the question is not expected before Minister of the Interior Wilhelm Frick works out complete regulations as to how the laws are to be carried out in the daily life of the country. The regulations are expected within the next few days.

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
