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NAZIS REJECT INTERVENTION FOR CZECH-JEWISH CITIZEN

BERLIN, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- The Foreign Office today notified the Czechoslovakian legation here that it has rejected its intervention on behalf of Rudolph Saudek, Czech-Jewish sculptor, who has lived in Germany the past thirty years.

Mr. Saudek had been notified by the German authorities that he must close an exhibition of his works. A request that he be permitted to work as a carver of tombstones for Jewish cemeteries was refused him on the grounds that Jews were not permitted to engage in any work associated with art. Saudek then appealed to the Czech legation which protested to the authorities that it would not tolerate discrimination against its Jewish nationals.

In its reply to the legation's protest, the Foreign Office reiterated its previously expressed stand that Czech Jews would not be treated differently from German Jews.

REICH COURT UPHOLDS "ARYAN" WHO WITHELD DOWRY FROM DAUGHTER WED TO JEW

BERLIN, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- Ruling that her marriage to a Jew in 1934 was a violation of "German morality and honor," a court today found against an "Aryan" girl who had brought suit against her father for withholding her dowry.

"According to the National Socialist viewpoint," the court declared, "the marriage was nothing but a violation of the morality, honor and law consciousness of the German people."

The court extolled the father for refusing to assist in "this immoral act" by giving his daughter a dowry.

BRITISH JEWS HOLD RITES FOR KING GEORGE

LONDON, Jan. 28. (JTA) --British Jewry joined today in paying tribute to King George V at services held on the occasion of his funeral.

Tributes to the late king were voiced at a meeting of the Jewish Agency for Palestine by Dr. Nahum Sokolow, Prof. Selig Brodetsky and Robert Solomon.

Dr. J.H.Hertz, chief rabbi of the British Empire, presiding at a solemn memorial service in the Great Synagogue at Aldgate, eulogized the late monarch as a "simple, sincere straightforward gentleman, a great king, a good man and a typical Briton who stood for fair play in international relations."

Dr. Hertz added that "he had the Britons' horror of all cruelty and persecution, whether racial or religious." Others who took part in the services were Lionel de Rothschild, Lord Swaythling and Sir Robert Waley-Cohen.

Before the services, Mr. de Rothschild, addressing a special meeting of the United Synagogue Council, of which he is president, declared that although the late King's "high position prevented him from expressing openly the horror he felt at the atrocities against the Jews of Germany, yet I know his sympathy was with them.

"He was pleased that his country could take its share in lessening their burden and open its hospitality as far as could be done without interfering with the welfare of his subjects," he said.

Moving a resolution of condolence, Mr. de Rothschild stated that King George was a personal friend of all his subjects and that he was always friendly to the Jews.

The resolution expressed the sympathy of the members of the United Synagogue with King George's family and extended greetings to King Edward VIII, wishing him a happy and prosperous reign.

PRAYERS FOR KING AT WAILING WALL

JERUSALEM, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- Normal activities throughout Palestine were halted today while the population observed a two-minute period of silence in memory of King George V.

Schools and offices remained closed all day and special ceremonies were held at the Wailing Wall. Services were also held in synagogues throughout the country.

The day had not been officially proclaimed a day of mourning. High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope had stated that the day should be marked by individuals and organizations in the manner they saw fit.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine and of the World Zionist Organization, Mayor Dizengoff of Tel Aviv and other notables attended special services at the Great Synagogue.

In a sermon by Rabbi Jacob Meir, aged Chief Rabbi of the Sephardic Jews in Palestine, read at the ancient Hurvah Synagogue by Rabbi Levi, the hope was expressed that the reign of Edward VIII would witness the rebuilding of the Temple of Biblical days.

WAUCHOFE WARNED AGENCY WILL APPEAL TO HAGUE ON PALESTINE POLICIES

JERUSALEM, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- A warning that the Jewish Agency for Palestine would be compelled to appeal to the Hague Tribunal if the Government's present policy on Jewish matters is continued was made to High Commissioner Wauchope by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Agency, it was learned today.

Dr. Weizmann yesterday visited the High Commissioner in connection with the law curbing sale of land by Arabs which it is understood the Government is preparing.

The entire Government policy of late, Dr. Weizmann is said to have told Sir Arthur during his visit, is submerging the foundations of the Jewish national home. Dr. Weizmann was reported yesterday as having declared to the High Commissioner that he was forcing Jewry "to fight you as we fought against Lord Passfield."

ARAB CHRISTIANS FORMALLY AGREE TO COUNCIL

JERUSALEM, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- Arab Christians today agreed to participate in the proposed legislative council for Palestine, informing High Commissioner Wauchope of their decision in a memorandum in which they asked that four council seats be allotted to them. The memorandum suggests three of the four Arab Christian councillors be elected and one appointed.

The party of the Arab Christians decided recently to submit a separate memorandum when a conference at Nablus of six Arab parties failed to reach a unanimous decision on their attitude to the council.

16 JEWS ADDED TO JERUSALEM POLICE FORCE

JERUSALEM, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- The police force of this city was augmented today by the graduation of twenty-two rookie policemen, sixteen of whom are Jews.

"WONDER RABBI" DIES AT 58 IN POLAND

WARSAW, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- Jerachmiel Kalisz, known as the "wonder rabbi of Amschinow" because of miracles he is reported to have performed, died yesterday of heart disease. He was fifty-eight years old.

FEDERATIONS BODY TO PREPARE MANUAL ON U.S., OVERSEAS AGENCIES

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- The National Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds was under instructions today to prepare a manual of information on national and overseas agencies so that welfare groups can decide whether they deserve financial support.

A resolution adopted at the closing session of the council's general assembly called on the council to prepare a similar manual on Palestinian organizations for 1937.

The three-day assembly, attended by 500 delegates of sixty-seven local agencies, ended on a note of increased cooperation between local agencies and other groups and the necessity of taking measures for social security.

As a result of the convention, declared Harry L. Lurie, executive director, there will be greater recognition of the need for cooperation with community chests, public agencies and other welfare bodies.

"The special problems of Jewish dependents and others in the Jewish group," he said, "cannot be solved apart from the problem of economic and social insecurity, which is the concern of the entire nation."

The need for social security was also emphasized by Dr. I.M. Rubinow, secretary of B'nai B'rith, in an address stressing the fact that with social security there will come an abatement of anti-Semitism. "A secure man does not hate his fellowman," he asserted.

Other speakers were Virginia Frank and Mrs. Kohn of Chicago, speaking for the family welfare group of agencies; Edith Lauer, Baltimore, the child care group; Sigmund Feinblatt, Baltimore, care of the aged; Dr. Ellewlyn Sale, St. Louis, health; Bernard Semel, New York, Jewish education; Gilbert Harris, St. Louis, cultural and recreational; Dr. Joseph Schwartz, Brooklyn, federations.

A resolution was adopted calling for more effective organization of federations and welfare funds and greater cooperation between various organized agencies. The action was taken after Mr. Lurie had warned that unless existing organizations were adapted to meet new problems, the old organizations might have to be scrapped.

"Jewish welfare groups," he said, "must align themselves with other groups concerned with social improvement in order that their joint programs and more active attack may be able to meet the critical needs of the day."

Another resolution recommended that the council develop criteria to enable welfare funds and federations to determine whether or not national, overseas and regional agencies shall be included as beneficiaries. It was in this connection that the council was instructed to compile the manuals.

Dr. Rubinow expressed the opinion that much of the government social security legislation had their inspiration in the principles of social justice announced 2,000 years ago by Jewish prophets.

In the present day, he mentioned the services of Abraham Epstein in old-age security work, Michael Davis in health insurance, Elizabeth Brandeis, Justine Weiss and Prof. Herman Gray on unemployment insurance, as service to the nation of which American Jewry may justly be proud.

MANY WOUNDED IN NEW ANTI-JEWISH RIOTS IN POLISH TOWNS

WARSAW, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- Anti-Semitic disorders broke out today in several towns throughout Poland.

Rioting in the town of Truskolas near Czenstochwa, during which several scores of Jews were wounded, was spreading tonight. Arrests of eleven persons failed to check the disorders.

In Klobuck and Przebyk, Jewish houses were raided and windows smashed. Two Jews, Samuel and Berl Abramowicz, were injured.

Fear of riots prompted the authorities of Przytyk in the Opoczno district to ban the holding of market days for four weeks.

The action was taken as result of a campaign for boycotting Jewish-owned stalls which was being conducted by anti-Semitic nationalists. Pickets stationed before the Jewish stalls prevented peasants from entering.

A bomb thrown by an Endek, who was later apprehended, damaged the Jewish-owned Gerschuni drug store in Wilno. In Lodz, the glassware shop owned by Samuel Winter was completely demolished by a bomb explosion. The thrower escaped.

Several scores of Jews were beaten up yesterday in Truskolas in a riot that followed the spreading of a report that Jews had plundered a local Catholic church. Rioters resisted attempts to restore order, stoning the police.

Anti-Semites had circulated a rumor that the theft of various sacred objects from the church the previous night had been carried out by Jews to revenge the bombing of a synagogue last week.

Peasants from neighboring village arrived in the market place and beat up scores of Jews in their stalls, smashing the windows of all Jewish-owned houses and of a synagogue.

OPPOSING VIEWS ON SO. AMERICA AS HAVEN AIRED BY REICH JEWS

BERLIN, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- Two public meetings, one supporting and the other condemning emigration of German Jews to South America, aroused a storm of discussion in Jewish circles today.

Speaking at the first public rally devoted to migration to South America, Dr. Hirschberg, leader of the Central Union of Jews in Germany, declared that there were many opportunities for settlement in Brazil.

Simultaneously, a rally was held by the Maccabi, Jewish sports organization, at which emigration to Latin American countries was branded as detrimental to the interests of German Jewry.

COURT RULES ON "ARYAN" PARENTAGE OF DIVORCE CHILDREN

DRESDEN, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- A Dresden court has handed down a decision declaring that in the case of separation or divorce in mixed marriages, the children belong to the "Aryan" parent if it is certified that they are of at least thirty-five per cent German blood.

NAZIS PLAN NEW DEPT'T TO "PROTECT GERMAN BLOOD"

BERLIN, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- A "department for the protection of German blood" will be established by the Ministry of Interior to carry out the provisions of the Nuremberg race laws, it was officially announced tonight.

PROMISE HIGHTSTOWN PROJECT WILL BE COMPLETED SEPT.1

NEW YORK, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- Construction of the garment factories at the Hightstown, N.J., federal agricultural-industrial project for New York Jewish garment workers will get under way again, it was announced by Boris Drasin, chairman of the Workers Aim Association, after receipt of a telegram from Will W. Alexander of the Federal Resettlement Administration.

Mr. Drasin said the project, which occupies a 1,265-acre tract, will be completed Sept.1. The project was held up by the opposition of officials of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union to the manufacture of garments at Hightstown on the grounds it might harm the New York industry and the working conditions of New York workers.

Federal officials will take up the problem with labor leaders, Mr. Drasin said.

Sixty families have deposited \$500 each with Rabbi Jonah B. Wise as first payments on their homesteads. The association includes 200 prospective settlers.

LIFE IN BIRO-BIDJAN SUBJECT OF MOSCOW ART DISPLAY

MOSCOW, Jan. 28. (JTA) -- An exhibition of paintings depicting life in Biro-Bidjan, Jewish autonomous region in the Far East, and other Jewish national territories of the Soviet Union, will open here on February 4. The exhibit will include 160 canvasses by thirteen well-known artists.
