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WARSAW POLICE ARREST ANTI-NAZI YOUTHS

WARSAW, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- The police have arrested two Jewish youths after dissolving the Anti-Hitler Organization of Jewish Youth, of which they were members.

It was learned that the arrests were prompted by complaints on the part of cinema owners that leaders of a boycott movement against Nazi films were using terroristic tactics.

Similar charges by movie owners in Lwow, it was reported here, were responsible for the arrest of three officers of the Anti-Hitler Committee. They are being held for trial.

Meanwhile, the UFA, German film concern, rented the film hall of the Warsaw Philharmonics for a year, evidently in order to be assured an outlet for its productions.

NAZI PRESS COMPLAINS OF "ARYAN" SEEKING BARGAINS IN JEWISH STORES

BERLIN, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- Long lines of "Aryan" bargain-hunters virtually besieging Jewish-owned stores to take advantages of post-holiday inventory sales have roused the ire of the provincial Nazi press.

While the tendency to seek bargains in Jewish-owned shops was noticeable in the capital as well as throughout the country, the Berlin newspapers failed to comment. Provincial papers, however, led by the Munich edition of Hitler's Voelkischer Beobachter, launched an attack on the "unfaithful Aryan women."

The Beobachter declared: "These women who are standing in front of Jewish stores are violating national morality and self-respect. They are selling the national honor for a few pfennigs."

BERLIN APPEALS COURT BARS TRANSFER OF BUSINESS FIRM

BERLIN, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- The Berlin Court of Appeals prohibited the transfer of a firm from a Jew named Levy to a brother-in-law named Lehman. It ruled that while the name Levy is unmistakably Jewish, Lehman might be mistaken for an "Aryan" name.

BORUCH KAHN, BUNDIST LEADER, DIES IN WILNO

WILNO, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- Boruch Wirgili Kahn, a leader of the Bund, Jewish labor organization, in Russia during Tzarist days, is dead at the age of fifty-two.

Before his death, he was president of the Central Education Committee, member of the praesidia of the Jewish Scientific Institute and the ORT Union and leader of various Jewish cultural organizations.

JEWISH LEADERS ADDRESS PALESTINE CONFERENCE IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- More than 1,200 delegates from 42 national Jewish organizations and scores of communities converged on Washington for the National Conference on Palestine over the weekend.

Sir Herbert Samuel, Viscount Bearsted and Simon Marks, comprising a delegation of British Jews consulting with American Jewish leaders on transferring Jews from Germany, were on the speakers' list as well as Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Dr. Israel Goldstein and other American Jewish notables.

In connection with the conference, a report was given showing that by January 1 there were 375,000 Jews in Palestine, comprising 29.8 per cent of the population. It was pointed out that this represents the largest Jewish population proportionally of any country in the world.

Between 1928 and 1935, the report showed, 300,000 Jews emigrated from European countries to overseas lands. Of these 162,000 more than half, went to Palestine. During 1935, 61,541 Jews entered Palestine while the total who emigrated to all other lands was 12,000.

The report, prepared by H. Frunkin, Palestine statistician, continued:

"A total of 190,000 Jewish newcomers entered the country during 1932-36, bringing a total Jewish population to 375,000 by Jan. 1, 1936...Of these 135,000, or 36 per cent, were in Tel Aviv and district; 70,000 or 18.7 per cent in Jerusalem and district and 50,000 or 13 per cent in Haifa and district; while 91,000 or 24.3 per cent were in Jewish rural areas.

"The vocational distribution of Jews in Palestine was as follows:

"In agriculture, 50,500 or 13.5 per cent; in building trades, 49,600 or 13.2 per cent; industry, 82,500 or 23.9 per cent; in transport, 25,000 or 6.6 per cent; liberal professions, 31,800 or 8.5 per cent; and in trade, domestic service, etc., 123,400 or 32.9 per cent."

HADASSAH GETS \$18,000 FOR ALIYAH FUND

NEW YORK, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- Contributions totaling \$18,000, including two gifts of \$5,000 each, have been received by Hadassah for its Youth Aliyah fund for the transfer of Jewish children from Germany to Palestine, it was announced today by Mrs. David B. Greenberg, chairman of the National Youth Aliyah Committee of Hadassah.

Among the contributions were \$5,000 from Mrs. Felix Fuld, of South Orange, N.J., an anonymous gift of \$5,000 and \$1,000 each from Mrs. Felix M. Warburg, Mrs. Rebekah Kohut and Miss Florina L. Lasker.

Mrs. Greenberg said a national committee of prominent Jewish women had been formed to promote the project. She also announced that a countrywide tour of the United States will be made by Mrs. Ilse Warburg, of Berlin and Jerusalem, a Youth Aliyah leader, who is expected here from Palestine early this month. Mrs. Warburg is the daughter-in-law of Prof. Otto Warburg, of the University of Berlin and a relative of the New York Warburgs.

GOVERNOR LEHMAN ENDORSES BROTHERHOOD DAY

NEW YORK, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- Brotherhood Day, to be observed throughout the country on February 22 and 23 was officially endorsed yesterday by Governor Herbert H. Lehman in a communication to the National Conference of Jews and Christians, under whose auspices the observance will be held.

In endorsing the observances, Governor Lehman said:

"I am heartily in accord with the purposes of Brotherhood Day and of the National Conference of Jews and Christians. I think your organization has done much to bring about a greater understanding among those of different faiths and races. I hope its sphere of influence will ever grow wider."

Officials of the National Conference said the slogan of this year's observances will be "Make America Safe for Differences." The emphasis will be upon the contributions which Jefferson, Adams, Madison, with the Lords Baltimore, Roger Williams and other colonial and revolutionary leaders, have made to the American tradition of civil and religious liberty.

EDUCATION SEES RENAISSANCE OF AMERICAN JEWISH LEARNING

CINCINNATI, Feb. 2. (JTA) -- A renaissance of American Jewish education is taking place today, Dr. Emanuel Gamoran of Cincinnati, educational director of the Commission on Jewish education, said today on his return from a series of Jewish educational association meetings in the East.

Jewish people in this country are developing an intensified Jewish consciousness as a direct result of present world conditions, Dr. Gamoran believes.

He sees an increasing awareness of Jewish values on all sides. "Parents--Jewish adults, in general--are becoming more and more interested in a knowledge of their own past, in an understanding of their present, in a study of what the possibilities are their future. Such an interest gives rise to the need for comprehensive Jewish educational literature and for study circles which would make use of such literature."

GOEBBELS TELLS U.S. NOT TO CRITICIZE NAZIS

BERLIN (JTA) -- In a belated comment on the Lindberghs' self-imposed exile, Propaganda Minister Joseph Goebbels has told Americans to look to conditions in their own country and not criticize Germany's treatment of the Jews.

Addressing a meeting of 18,000 Nazis here, he stated:

"A nation whose national hero, Lindbergh, is forced to live outside his own country, in which his baby has been murdered, had better look into its own affairs rather than maintain that in Germany Jews are being maltreated."

Lashing out against foreign criticism of Nazi anti-Jewish measures, he declared, "If the world loves our German Jews so much, let it adopt them."

LONDON TIMES SEES REICH JEWS "CAUGHT LIKE RATS IN TRAP"

LONDON (JTA) -- "Between Nazi pressure, the German foreign exchange restrictions and the immigration regulations of possible countries of refuge, the great majority of the Jews in Germany appear to be caught like rats in a trap," declares the Berlin correspondent of The Times.

Describing possibilities of exporting capital from the Reich as "almost non-existent," he predicts that although "conditions for the Jews are likely to get worse rather than better, there will not be an exodus in the catastrophic numbers expected by League experts."

Outlining the methods of exporting capital to Palestine and Italy, the correspondent states that "for the poorer Jews there is not much hope, unless they have the qualifications for agricultural work, but the young people can get to Palestine if they are willing to take one of the Zionist training courses."

He scouts the idea that the Economics Ministry is deliberately placing obstacles in the way of Jewish emigration, declaring that Germany is compelled to get the maximum foreign exchange out of her export trade.

HAAVARA STATES NO TRANSFER MADE IN LAST YEAR

BERLIN (JTA) -- The revelation that the Havaarah office in Germany has not made a single transfer of Jewish capital to Palestine in the last twelve months, was made in an official statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency representative by the Haavarah headquarters here.

In the statement, the Haavarah discloses that "since February 7, 1935, not a single deposit has been accepted in Germany by the Haavarah office for transfer to Palestine." This is explained by the fact that not enough German goods have been sold in Palestine under the transfer agreement to meet the requirements of the Reichsbank for further transactions. The Haavarah has, however, according to the statement, so far enabled 1,600 Jewish families to take out their capital from Germany under the transfer agreement since it has come into force.

The capital so far taken out through the Haavarah is given as over 26,000,000 Marks. This includes funds taken out for the Keren Hayesod and other Zionist institutions in Palestine. At present, the Haavarah limits its activities to registering applicants and assigning the numbers indicating the order in which their turn comes in case further transfer of capital will be made possible from Germany under the Haavarah agreement. Applications now amount to 27,000,000 Marks. These are filed in the Haavarah office, but no action can be taken regarding them for the time being.

MAIMONIDES STREET IN CAIRO

CAIRO (JTA) -- The Egyptian Government has named one of the streets in Cairo Maimonides Street, in commemoration of the 800th anniversary of the birth of the great Jewish philosopher.

GREEK ZIONISTS PROTEST LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

SALONICA (JTA) -- King George II, has sent a telegram to the Eleventh Greek Zionist Conference, thanking it for the message of congratulations on his accession to the throne.

The conference adopted a series of resolutions for the formation of a territorial Zionist organizations, condemning the proposed Legislative Council in Palestine, associating itself with the

15th anniversary celebration of the Keren Hayesod and supporting Keren Hayesod work in Greece, supporting the Jewish National Fund, urging a greater sale of Shekolim in Greece, and expressing confidence in the Executive of the Zionist Organization and satisfaction at the return to office of Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

A copy of the resolution opposing the Legislative Council was delivered by a special delegation to the British Consul in Salonica.

GERMAN CHALUTZIM TO RECEIVE ONE THIRD OF PALESTINE CERTIFICATES

BERLIN (JTA) -- One-third of the entire number of immigration certificates granted by the Palestine Government under the new labor schedule are assigned for German Chalutzim, the Palestine office in Berlin has been advised by cable from Jerusalem. The cable states that 950 labor certificates, 32% of the entire schedule are allocated for German Jewry. Of this number 160 are to be granted to German Jews now residing outside Germany.

The 500 certificates the Palestine Office received in November, out of the 1,000 certificates advanced, will be deducted from the total and the Palestine Office in Berlin, therefore, will now receive only 290 certificates. They will reach Berlin shortly.

The Palestine Office announced that "the minimum programme" for the knowledge of Hebrew will be introduced and requested of every applicant for an immigration certificate.

107,000 TOURISTS IN PALESTINE IN 1935

JERUSALEM (JTA) -- A total of 107,000 tourists visited Palestine in 1935, it was reported at a meeting of the Palestine Tourist Association. The meeting urged the Government to extend facilities for tourists and to encourage tourist traffic.

JEWISH MATHEMATICIAN HONOURED BY COLLEGE DE FRANCE

PARIS (JTA) -- The famous French Research Institute "College de France" celebrated recently the 50th anniversary of the Jewish savant and mathematician, Jacques Hadamard. The Minister of Education and numerous official personalities and delegates of learned bodies participated at a reception given by the College de France.

Mr. Hadamard is active in the League to Combat Anti-Semitism and in a number of other Jewish organizations.

"JUDENHOF" REMAINS IN WUERZBURG BUT STREETS NAMED FOR JEWS CHANGED

BERLIN (JTA) -- The municipality of Wuerzburg has announced that it will not change the names of the sections of the city known as Judenhof and Judenplan. The announcement explains that new names will be given streets named after Jewish personalities, but not streets or sections the names of which are indicative of former Jewish residence there.
