ANTI-JEWISH DISORDERS MAY FORCE CZERNOWITZ U. TO CLOSE FOR YEAR

BUCHAREST, March 29. (JTA) -- Officials of the University of Czernowitz today threatened to close the school for one year unless students agreed to preserve order inside and outside of the university grounds.

The threat followed an uninterrupted campaign of terrorization waged by anti-Semites against Jewish students which has made it impossible for the latter to continue with their studies.

NAZI ORGAN SAYS REICH WILL PUSH ANTI-JEWISH POLICY

BERLIN, March 29. (JTA) -- The Voelkischer Beobachter, official Nazi organ, declares in an editorial that there is no basis for the hope that the Government will make any modifications in its anti-Jewish policy.

The Government, the newspaper emphasizes, is determined to push its racial policy with unabated vigor.

"The German nation," the editorial states, "will stand behind the Fuehrer and the Government."

NAZIS ORDERED TO SING ELECTION HYMN WRITTEN BY JEW

BERLIN, March 29. (JTA) -- Although Jews have been prohibited from voting in today's election, all Germany was ordered to sing a hymn translated from the Dutch in 1877 by Josef Woyl, a Jewish poet.

The hymn, known as the "Dutch Prayer of Thanks," was to be sung as soon as Fuehrer Hitler completed his election speech at Cologne.

FRENCH LEADERS URGE REMOVAL OF OLYMPICS FROM BERLIN

PARIS, March 29. (JTA) -- A resolution asking the French Parliament to reject requests for funds enabling French participation in the Olympics was adopted here at a meeting of noted sportsmen and political leaders.

The meeting, with Senator Justin Godart presiding, voiced its opposition to France playing a role in the Games at Berlin and urged that they be removed to another site. Speakers included Levi Oulman, president of the newly formed Amis des Sports and Jean Bernard Levy, president of the Paris Racing Club.

BOYCOTT MOST EFFECTIVE IN U.S., NAZI LEADER'S FRIEND WRITES

BERLIN (JTA) -- The boycott of German goods and services is most effective in the United States, it is established in a survey, "Germany's Fight for International Trade," by a writer who signs himself "Albrecht Forstmann," but is known to be one of the closest collaborators of Chancellor Hitler's deputy, Rudolph Hess.

Reviews and references to the book in German newspapers have been prohibited because it reveals differences of opinion in the cabinet and shows that beliefs held in high circles clash with Nazi economic principles.

The book aims to disprove the economic theories of Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, Minister of Economics and head of the Reichsbank. Among the proposals it advocates are devaluation of the mark, reduction of wages and increase in hours of labor to permit German manufacturers to compensate for higher cost of raw materials.

Surveying the effects of the anti-Nazi boycott, the book states that in the United States the boycott is so strong "that certain German commodities cannot be sold there despite dumping prices." It emphasizes that the movement has "a strong Jewish shade, although not in every State."

"As far as the United States is concerned," the book continues, "the boycott is mostly an expression of antipathy of the American population, inspired chiefly by reports of American correspondents stationed in Berlin."

After the United States, the boycott is most effective in South Africa, Holland, Poland and the Baltic states, the survey shows.

KORAN TRANSLATED INTO HEBREW BY JEWISH SCHOLAR

JERUSALEM (JTA) -- Translation into Hebrew of the Koran, Moslem bible, has been completed here, after twenty years of work, by Dr. Joseph Rivlin, an instructor at the Hebrew University. Dr. Rivlin, who is a native of this city, teaches Arabic in the Jerusalem Hebrew Teachers Seminary. The Koran was once before translated into Hebrew, but the translation was not highly considered because of its inaccuracy.

SAMARITAN BRIDES AT PREMIUM

JERUSALEM (JTA) -- The marriage problem is causing great concern to the ancient and fast-dwindling Samaritan community in Nablus, whose members do not marry outside their own community. They now number 200 souls in all.

There are twenty-five men seeking wives now and their choice is restricted to the fifteen unwed women. Some of the women are more than thirty years old, which is an advanced age for marriage in the East.

The brides shortage has prompted parents to set high requirements for suitors, including a dowry of \$48. Parents whose daughters work and contribute to the family's support are demanding much higher prices.

In protest against the high cost of marrying, some of the eligible men who are brothers or cousins of marriageable women are exercising their ancient prerogative of insisting that the younger girl not marry until they have been wed. This has brought the marriage market to a stalemate.

Several conferences have been held by the elders of the community, but no solution has been reached.

MRS. AMY WYLE TO HEAD WOMEN'S J.D.C. DRIVE HERE

NEW YORK, March 29. (JTA) -- Mrs. Amy G. Wyle, active in many phases of philanthropic work, has been named chairman of the women's division of the Greater New York campaign of the Joint Distribution Committee, it was announced today by Carl J. Austrian, chairman of the local drive for \$1,500,000. A quota of \$200,000 has been assigned to the women's division.

Jews OF INDIA TARGET OF PROPAGANDA DRIVE

BOMBAY (JTA) -- Violent anti-Jewish agitation conducted by an agency calling itself the Simpson News Service is perturbing Jewish circles and demands are being voiced that the propaganda be halted under the Indian Penal code, which makes it an offense to promote hatred between various groups.

The charge that the Jews finance Christian missionary societies as an entering wedge to "exploit" the Moslems is made by Dr. Khalid Sheldrake in a syndicated article sent out by the news service.

He declares that "the Jews are a race detested by Christians, and even today the spirit of tolerance toward the Jew is marked by contempt," adding that the Jews are the "enemies of Islam."

Addressing himself to the Christians, he asks: "Is the land of Christ (Palestine) to be placed forever under the heel of the people who crucified him? Have they (Christians) forgotten the crucifixion?" He goes on to state that "Israel rules the world today by its capital and even Soviet Russia is not exempt from Jewish control."

Commenting on the article, the Jewish Tribune states: "His propaganda would be welcomed in Nazi Germany, where fundamental rights are denied and where gangster rule prevails."

AUSTRIAN INSURANCE OFFICIAL REPORTED A SUICIDE

VIENNA, March 29. (JTA) -- Section Chief Ochsner, head of the State control department of private insurance societies, was found dead yesterday. He is believed to have committed suicide in connection with the financial irregularities uncovered by the Government in the affairs of the Phoenix Life Insurance Society.

SALE OF LIQUOR IN PALESTINE STIRS QUERIES IN COMMONS

LONDON (JTA) -- The question of whether increasing liquor consumption in Palestine is stirring resentment among the Arabs, whose religion forbids them to partake of intoxicating beverages, provided an interesting interlude in the House of Commons, with J.H. Thomas, Colonial Secretary, rejecting demands from a member that issuance of liquor sale licenses in the Holy Land be halted.

The exchange began when Dr. Salter asked Mr. Thomas whether he was aware that reduction of license fees since Jan. 1, 1934 had resulted in a large increase in production and sale of liquors.

Mr. Thomas replied he was unaware that liquor sale was resented by any large section of the Palestine population, adding that the number of retail liquor licenses was limited.

Said Dr. Salter: "Is he aware of the numerous complaints that have been made by the Mohammedan community to the High Commissioner in respect of this matter?"

Replied Mr. Thomas: "No, I am not aware of that and I am not aware that there is any danger in connection with the sale of intoxicating liquor. On the contrary, the figures he refers to are about one-third of 1930, notwithstanding the increase in the population."

Interpolated Ernest Thurtle: "Can he say whether this wine is both good and cheap wine?"

Mr. Thomas: I am sure if he will consult Dr. Salter and taste it, they will be better judges." (Laughter)
