30 WOUNDED BY POLICE FIRE IN TEL AVIV DEMONSTRATION

TEL AVIV, April 17. (JTA) -- More than thirty Jews were wounded today when police fired upon a crowd demonstrating against the Government after the funeral of a Jew killed Wednesday in a hold-up by Arab brigands.

The Hadassah hospital and the Red Mogen David (Jewish red cross) tonight reported that fourteen persons had been registered as wounded during the demonstration. Four were seriously injured.

With the beginning of Sabbath, the city became quiet. Police said ten persons had been arrested.

The police fired when a mob greeted an order to disperse with a barrage of stones. Among the wounded were M. Samet, reporter for the Hebrew daily, Haaretz, and a Jewish policeman who was struck by a stone.

In an effort to restore order, steel-helmeted non-Jewish police invaded homes in this all-Jewish city, dragging out residents suspected of having participated in the demonstration and handling them roughly.

Police truncheons were seen covered with blood. One of the bearers of a black-bordered Zionist flag of mourning was beaten into unconsciousness. A number of the demonstrators were arrested, including several of the wounded.

Numerous street fights continued for an hour after the demonstration had ended. Tension was increased by a report that one of the Jews wounded in the hold-up, Zvi Dannenberg, had also died.

Police threw cordons around Allenby Square to prevent further disorders, as enraged speakers continued to shout:

"If the police are unable to guard the Jews, let us guard ourselves."

The rioting started when, following the funeral, speakers addressed the crowd. Among the speakers was a young Salonica Jew, who demanded that the crowd go to Jaffa, an Arab center, to avenge the death of Israel Chazan, the victim of the brigands, also a native of Salonica.

Instead, the mob proceeded to City Hall, where municipal officials addressed them from the balcony, appealing for order and requesting them to disperse. The officials promised to bring to the attention of the Government the crowd's protests against the "one-sided policy" which was blamed in leaflets for the fatal hold-ups.

"Nothing must hinder the Jews from the peaceful upbuilding of Palestine," declared Israel Rokach, acting mayor. Dov Hos, a City Councillor, also spoke.

The crowd went to City Hall after police had prohibited eulogies at Chazan's funeral. A procession to the Great Synagogue was permitted, where "kaddish," the Jewish memorial prayer, was intoned. During the funeral leaflets of unknown origin were distributed demanding the resignation of High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope. Many of these were seized by the police.

Hebrew newspapers appearing before the funeral demanded immediate suppression of brigands' activities.

It was learned, meanwhile, that the tracks of the brigands lead to the tents of Arab workers near Nur el Shmash, close to which the hold-up took place. No arrests had been made tonight.

Another Jew, Joshua Napcha, had been wounded in the hold-up of a caravan of ten automobiles between Amabta and Nur el Shamsh, near Tul Karem. It was the third in recent weeks in which Jews were killed or injured.

NAZIS OPEN NEW DRIVE TO OUST JEWISH MEAT DEALERS

BERLIN, April 17. (JTA) -- An organized campaign got under way today to oust Jews from the meat, poultry and cattle industries. It has for its slogan the charge that the Jews of Germany constitute an "economically unreliable element."

It was reliably learned that instructions have been issued to railway station masters to inform Nazi farm leaders of the names and addresses of sellers and buyers of cattle loaded from trains. By this means the Nazis will be enabled to discover the names of farmers who are selling cattle to Jews.

The official Reichshahrenstand (food bureau) has also taken measures to oust Jews from the poultry trade, especially as exporters. Non-Jewish importers have been ordered not to deal with Jews on the pretext that Jews are "economically unreliable."

Jewish meat dealers of foreign citizenship are being informed by non-Jewish importers and wholesalers that they will no longer deal with them because, "being owners of foreign passports there is danger that they might leave Germany without payment of debts."

It is estimated that the new anti-Jewish drive will affect adversely about 3,500 meat traders.

JEWS AMONG WOUNDED IN LWOW LABOR CLASH WITH POLICE

LWOW, Poland, April 17. (JTA) -- Order was restored here today following yesterday's clash between police and workers marching in a funeral procession during which, according to an official communique, eight persons were killed and sixty wounded.

Although the disorders had no anti-Jewish character, lawless elements took advantage of them to loot shops, many of them Jewish, which suffered heavy losses. As a result many stores were closed today. Shops in the suburbs were particularly hard hit.

Members of the Bund, Jewish labor organization, participated in the funeral procession and a number of them were reported among the wounded. Whether or not any Jews are among those killed has not yet been ascertained.

The clash resulted when the workers refused to bury one of their comrades, killed in a riot of unemployed, in a remote corner of the municipal cemetery. When the procession, in which 50,000 marched, started toward a cemetery in another section of the city, police opened fire.

WAUCHOPE WELCOMES "GERER RABBI" OF POLAND TO PALESTINE

JERUSALEM, April 17. (JTA) -- High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope today received the "Gerer Rabbi" of Poland and Rabbis Moshe Blau and Dushinsky of the Agudath Israel, extreme orthodox group. He discussed with them the plight of the Jews through the world.

Sir Arthur congratulated the "Gerer Rabbi," a world-famed Jewish sage, on his decision to take up residence in Palestine.

Later, Rabbi Blau, Rabbi Uziel and Moshe A. Amiel, chief rabbi of Tel Aviv, were received by Sir John Hathorn-Hall, chief Government secretary, who evinced sympathy with requests that the status of married immigrants who entered the country illegally be made legal.

JABOTINSKY WARNS WAUCHOPE ON ARAB DEMONSTRATIONS

LONDON, April 17. (JTA) -- Vladimir Jabotinsky, head of the New Zionist Organization, today telegraphed Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, High Commissioner of Palestine, declaring that the authorization of Arab manifestations on an unprecedented scale would "inevitably result in bloodshed." He called attention to fears of "imminent anti-Jewish outbreaks."

WILL EMPHASIZE "NATIVE AUSTRIAN FOLKDOM," SCHUSCHNIGG STATES

VIENNA, April 17. (JTA) -- Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg declared in an address to the Catholic students' organization today that although the State respected religious peace, "we consider ourselves by duty bound always to emphasize our native Austrian folkdom."

He said, "Our Catholic state respects religious peace and no one need complain of the State's interference in the sphere of conscience."

Referring to recent disclosures of financial difficulties of the Phoenix Insurance Co., the chancellor said nothing would be hidden and the public would be informed of the company's true position.

11,000 PALESTINE CERTIFICATES SOUGHT BY JEWISH AGENCY

JERUSALEM, April 17. (JTA) -- It was learned today that the Jewish Agency for Palestine has submitted an immigration schedule to the Palestine Government in which it asks 11,000 certificates for laborers for the ensuing six months.

ARABS REPORTED ASKING 9 BE SENT TO LONDON COUNCIL PARLEY

JERUSALEM, April 17. (JTA) -- High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope today received Arab leaders, continuing his discussions with them on the composition of the Arab delegation which has been invited by Colonial Secretary J. H. Thomas to confer with him in London on the proposed legislative council for Palestine.

The Arabs are understood to have demanded that the delegation number nine persons, whereas the original invitation specified it be confined to six. Efforts of the Arabs to select six leaders for the London conference have thus far met with failure.

LIVERPOOL DAILY DEFEATS LIBEL ACTION BY ANTI-SEMITE

LIVERPOOL, England, April 17: (JTA) -- The Court of Assizes today dismissed a libel action brought by Charles Frederick Ashton against the Liverpool Daily Post which had denounced him as an anti-Jewish agitator.

The court accepted the contention offered by counsel for the defendant that the phrase "foul propoganda," used by the paper in describing Mr. Ashton's utterances, was justified.

GIRL WHO CALLED POLISH RIOTERS "CATTLE!" TO BE TRIED IN MAY

WARSAW (JTA) -- A young Jewish girl student of Warsaw University, Ziviah Asterblum, will go on trial in May on a charge of "insulting the Polish nation" by shouting "Cattle!" at rioters beating Jews on the university grounds. She has been released on 10,000 zlotys bail after spending several days in jail.

The authorities had originally demanded that bail of 25,000 zlotys be set because of the alleged seriousness of the offense since one of the anti-Semitic students charged the girl had shouted, "Polish cattle!" He also accused the girl, who comes from a prominent assimilationist family, of leading a Jewish self-defense unit.

ARAB VOTERS COMPRISE 2.5% OF POPULATION, JEWS 14.7%

LONDON (JTA) -- Only 2.57 per cent of the Palestine Arab population and 14.71 per cent of the Jews are eligible to vote in municipal elections, it was declared by J.H. Thomas, Colonial Secretary, in reply to a query by Mr. Copeck-Jones in the House of Commons.

He said the number of persons entitled to vote under the Municipal Corporations Ordinance of 1934 was considerably larger than in 1927. The comparative totals of the more important electorates were given as:

COWS CLOG JERUSALEM TRAFFIC, MAY BE RUED OFF STREETS

JERUSALEM (JTA) -- Cows, unable to keep up with the rising tempo of a city fast becoming westernized, are in danger of being ordered off the streets as a traffic menace.

The Jerusalem City Council has before it complaints that the ambling bovines clog up traffic in the center of the city, fail to observe traffic regulations and terrify children and elderly people.

NAZI CRUISER TO GET RECEPTION IN BALTIMORE DESPITE PROTESTS

BALTIMORE, April 17. (JTA) -- Despite protests of a number of organizations, Mayor Jackson will extend an official welcome to the German cruiser, Emden, through an exchange of courtesy calls when the vessel reaches here Tuesday, it was disclosed today.

A group of objectors, led by Rabbi Edward L. Israel, plans to stage a demonstration at the dock on Wednesday. German-American societies of Baltimore have completed an elaborate program of entertainment for the officers and crew during their ten-day stay here.

SENATE HEARS WEALTHY MEN AIDED ANTI-SEMITIC BODY

WASHINGTON, April 17. (JTA) -- A letter from an official of the Sentinels of the Republic, an anti-New Deal group, indicating it was anti-Semitic was read into the record of the Senate Lobby Committee today by Senator Schwellenbach, Washington. Testimony showed that noted men of means have contributed to the organization.

The Senator also read a letter from W. Cleveland Runyon, Plainfield, N.J., attorney, to Alexander Lincoln, Sentinels official, referring to President Roosevelt and "the Jewish brigade" he took to Washington. The letter said:

"This fight for Western Christian Civilization can certainly be won, but only if we recognize that the enemy is world-wide and that it is Jewish in origin. All we need here is money..The time is getting short. Can you not do something?"

In his reply, Lincoln said: "I think, as you say, that the Jewish threat is a real one. My hope is in the election next autumn, and I believe that our real opportunity lies in accomplishing the defeat of Roosevelt."

The Pitcairn family of Pennsylvania was shown in testimony to have advanced \$103,000 to the organization. Raymond Pitcairn, a director of the Pittsburgh Plate and Glass Co., contributed \$91,000 and other members of the family lesser amounts.

Other contributors to the Sentinels included: E. T. Stotesbury, a J.P. Morgan & Co. partner, \$1,000; Nicholas G. Roosevelt, \$500; George Wharton Pepper, \$500; A. Atwater Kent, \$1,000, and Alfred P. Sloan Jr., \$1,000.

\$16,000 PLEDGED FOR HEBREW UNIVERSITY AT ANNIVERSARY DINNER

NEW YORK, April 17. (JTA) -- About \$16,000 was pledged for the Hebrew University in Jerusalem last night at a dinner of the American Friends of the Hebrew University at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel celebrating the university's eleventh anniversary. The largest contribution was \$5,000 from Arthur M. Lampert.

Co-hosts and speakers at the dinner were Dr. A.S.W. Rosenbach, president of the "Friends"; Samuel J. Bloomingdale, Elisha M. Friedman, Hiram J. Halle, Mr. Lampert, Edward A. Norman, Dr. Nathan Ratnoff, Dr. J. J. Golub, Roger W. Straus, Edward M. M. Warburg, Maurice Wertheim, Rabbi Milton Steinberg and Samuel B. Finkel, director of the organization.

Mr. Finkel said an enlarged quota would be sought next year to place additional German-Jewish professors at the university. Rabbi Steinberg said the university "is more than a haven of refuge for Jewish scholars expelled from lands of persecution, important as that function may be. It represents a significant instrument for the revival of Jewish culture in Palestine." A message of good wishes was received from Governor Lehman.
