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5,000 ANTI-SEMITIC YOUTHS MARCH ON BUCHAREST; DISORDERS GROW

BUCHAREST, June 24. (JTA) -- High tension gripped Bucharest today as troops patrolled the city's streets following receipt of information by the authorities that an army of 5,000 anti-Semitic youths was marching on the capital from the provinces and had reached the city's outskirts.

Streets in the vicinity of the palace were especially guarded by heavily-armed patrols.

The anti-Semitic army was called to Bucharest by leaders of the various anti-Semitic parties, who are openly urging pogroms against the Jews.

Publication of an undisguised call to pogrom in Universul, conservative and most widely circulated paper in Rumania, stirred a panic in Jewish circles. Fear of the consequences was intensified by the knowledge that the article must have been passed by the Government censor before publication.

Emulating Nazi methods in the early days of the Hitler regime, blue-shirted Cuzists (Rumanian Nazis whose leader is Dr. Alexander Cuza) seized all Jews and Jewish-appearing persons in the neighborhood of the Blue House, their headquarters, dragged them inside and attacked them. Police failed to intervene.

Other Cuzists dragged Jews from buses and trams in the heart of the city undisturbed by police.

Shots were fired in street fights between anti-Semites and Democratic groups, but there were no casualties.

Democratic newspapers charged that present disturbances were financed from Germany and that the anti-Semitic press was acting as paid agent of the Reich to pave the way for entrenchment of Hitlerism in Rumania.

Alexander Vaida-Voevod, head of the National Peasants' Party, urged closer relations with Germany in an address to a meeting of the Rumanian Front.

"Hitler is the real democrat," he said, "not those political parties which are financed by Jews to pay them later with concessions."

Jewish newspapers in Kishinev, reporting attacks on Jews in parks and on boulevards, appealed to local police not to remain indifferent.

Police failed to prevent bonfires of Jewish Democratic newspapers in various parts of Bucharest, including one in front of the Foreign Office and another in front of the German Legation where a mob of youngsters sang German Nazi songs and gave the Nazi salute as the fire burned.

For the first time since the disorders began, foreign papers, mainly French, were seized from newsdealers and burned.

Despite the intensity of the situation, the authorities have granted permission for a Cuzist convention to be held in Bucharest Sunday.

At an emergency meeting of the Cabinet, Minister of the Interior Inculetz reported that anti-Semitic disorders throughout the country were showing no signs of abatement.

UNIFORMED ENDEK BAND PLUNDERS TOWN IN NOCTURNAL RAID

WARSAW, June 24. (JTA) -- Reporting yesterday's seizure of the town of Myslenice by a band of anti-Semitic marauders, Jewish newspapers today charge it was executed by uniformed Endeks (Nationalists) who entered and left the town in military formation.

The marauders, estimated at 150 in number, stole 17 rifles and 700 cartridges from the police, whom they disarmed at the outset of the invasion.

Seven Jewish shops and two truckloads of merchandise were destroyed by the invaders, who had taken the precaution of cutting all telephone and telegraph wires. One Jew, a baker's assistant named Leib Wachsberg, is reported to have been injured. The District Commissioner's home was completely wrecked.

Myslenice, which is not far from Krakow in West Galicia, is a town of 6,200 inhabitants, of whom 2,000 are Jewish. The raid was executed at four a.m. yesterday, but news of it failed to reach Warsaw until late at night.

PALESTINE PROMISED TO JEWS, NOT ARABS, MELCHETT WRITES

LONDON, June 24. (JTA) -- Lord Melchett, industrialist and Jewish leader, writing in the Daily Mail today declares that Palestine was never promised to the Arabs but to the Jews in return for their support during the War and for Dr. Chaim Weizmann's assistance.

The writer states that "responsible Arabs always knew what the future for Palestine was." He denies that the present difficulties in the Holy Land have been caused by Jews acquiring half of the fertile land or by the activities of Jewish extremists, citing the restraint being exercised by the Jews and asserting that the unrest has largely been stirred by foreign money.

WORLD LABOR PARLEY URGES EARLY LEAGUE ACTION ON REFUGEES

GENEVA, June 24. (JTA) -- The League of Nations is urged to "take all necessary steps" at the 1936 Assembly meeting to solve the problem of refugees from Germany in a resolution adopted today by the International Labor Conference in session here.

ITALIAN AIMS IN NEAR EAST AIRED IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

LONDON, June 24. (JTA) -- Questions raised in the House of Commons today revealed that members are still nervous over alleged designs of Italy on Egypt and Palestine.

The persistent report that plans for an Italian attack against Egypt had been found in the wreck of an Italian plane that crashed last August in the Sudan was brought up by Geoffrey Mander, Liberal.

Viscount Cranborne replied that no plans had been found in that particular crash, but asked time before answering a further question as to whether plans had been found in any other crash.

Peter Mac Donald, Conservative, urged the Colonial Office to arrange to receive and examine the Arabic broadcasts from Italy to the Near East, particularly Palestine and the Transjordan.

Colonial Secretary Ormsby-Gore said the matter was receiving the most careful consideration of the Palestine Government.

Replying to a query by James Maxton, Independent Laborite, the Colonial Secretary revealed that he has already approached individuals on accepting appointments to the Royal Commission, but that he would not reveal their names until the entire commission was constituted.

Mr. Ormsby-Gore denied the charges of W. Gallacher, Communist, that Jaffa's old quarter had been dynamited without warning and declined to accept his statement that troops mishandled Moslem women and old men while searching for arms in the town of Yezur.

To Gallacher's demand that the Palestine Government abandon collective punishment of Arab villages for terrorism, the Colonial Secretary replied, "Most certainly not!"

ENDEKS SPREAD POISON FOOD RUMORS AGAINST JEWISH SHOPS

WARSAW, June 24. (JTA) -- Anti-Semitic Nationalists (Endeks) in the town of Minsk Mazowiec, thirty miles from Warsaw, spread rumors today that Jewish shopkeepers were selling poisoned food to destroy the Christians. The reports were spread in an effort to strengthen the anti-Jewish boycott being pressed in the town, which was the scene of anti-Jewish disorders recently.

BRITISH TROOPS KILL 3 ARABS; STRIKE SEEN SUBSIDING

JERUSALEM, June 24. (JTA) -- At least three Arabs were killed and a British corporal and a Jew wounded in scattered engagements today as disorders against the Government and the Jews continued in their tenth week.

Launching of a new leaflet campaign by the Arab Strike Committee for continuation of the general strike was taken as indication the strike was weakening.

Six Arabs were sentenced to terms ranging from one to six years at hard labor in District Court of Jaffa today for participating in recent disturbances. Randolph Copland, president of the court, meted out a five-year sentence to one Arab for setting fire to a Jewish house. The other five drew one to two year sentences for plundering Jewish stores and houses.

Two Arabs were killed and three wounded at Diraban when the villagers resisted a search of their homes by troops. The Government forces suffered no casualties.

Another Arab was killed at Beth Alpha in the Jezreel Valley when a military patrol replied to snipers' rifle fire.

An unascertained number of Arabs fell in brushes with a military detachment in a lorry at Safed, at Kinereth and later near Tulkarem.

An official communique said a convoy of the Palestine Potash Co. was fired on between Jericho and Jerusalem. Police, reinforced by troops, returned the fire. There were no casualties among the passengers or guards.

A British corporal was slightly wounded when Arabs fired at a military patrol near Segera.

Shots were fired during the night at Mekor Haim and Neveh Jacob. A Jew was slightly injured.

Troops searching the village of Balah near Anebta demolished three houses in which they discovered ammunition. Crops were seized as security for a collective fine. Nine Arabs were arrested and twelve others detained for an inquiry.

Two Arabs were arrested in Haifa for concealing a bomb, automatic revolver and bullets in their homes.

A railway between Rafa and Khanyunis was damaged. Telephone wires were cut and repair men called to restore the lines were fired on.

Unsuccessful attempts were made to damage a railway line at Ras-el-Ain, Kalkillia and near Ramleh. Shooting was reported near Lydda and Latrun. Three bombs were thrown at Beersheba. Another exploded at Gaza, causing no damage.

Palastin, Arab Christian daily, reported that in addition to 98 houses demolished in the Old City quarter of Jaffa for construction of roads to the harbor, the Government was intending to raze 150 more shortly, adding that an official announcement was on its way which would order evacuation from the condemned houses within ten days.

Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, British High Commissioner, flew to Afuleh in the Jezreel Valley, where representatives of the Jewish colonies in the valley asked the transfer of Government offices from the Arab city of Nazareth to Afuleh, construction of a paved road from Ganigar to Nahalal and compensation for the sufferers from recent disturbances.

Sir Arthur stated that the Government had approved appointment of additional Jewish special policemen and expressed regret at property losses.

The Sharon Plain correspondent of Haboker, Hebrew daily, reported the movement of suspicious Arab bands forty to fifty strong in the vicinity of Tel Mond. An Arab watchman who saw them said they wore khaki uniforms and told him they were from the Nablus and Jenin hills en route to Wadi Falk. The correspondent suggests that they are remnants of rebel bands smashed by troops.

Arabs set fire today to a stone-crushing machine in a Jewish-owned quarry in Jerusalem. A bomb was thrown into a Jewish chauffeur's room opposite a Jewish home for the aged in the Pomema quarter of Jerusalem, but injured no one.

Bus transportation between Tel Aviv and the Judea colonies was restricted today to five trips daily. The Government assigned only five convoys to the route.

2,261 JEWS ENTERED PALESTINE IN MAY

JERUSALEM, June 24. (JTA) -- Despite unabated disturbances Jewish immigration into Palestine is continuing unchecked, as revealed by figures published today in the Government gazette. Jews numbering 2,261 entered the Holy Land in May, including 183 in the capitalist category.
