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7 ARABS, 1 JEW KILLED IN DAY'S FIGHTING IN PALESTINE

JERUSALEM, June 25. (JTA) -- Arabs today answered with bullets, bombs and the torch the Government's dramatic plea, contained in leaflets scattered early this morning from military planes flying low over strife-torn Palestine, that they discontinue their general strike and the campaign of terrorism which since April 19 has claimed upwards of 100 lives.

British troops retorted with a relentless drive that added seven more Arabs to the rapidly mounting toll of deaths.

A detachment of Seaforth Highlanders, attacked by armed Arab bands in the dangerous Nablus hills, engaged them in a sharp battle that lasted from ten o'clock in the morning until three in the afternoon. Four Arabs were slain and three wounded. The troops captured three rifles, a bomb and some ammunition.

Simultaneously another band of Arabs attacked a part of the Seaforth detachment three kilometers away, near Akraba, suffering two killed and one wounded. A British corporal was seriously wounded in the engagement. Three rifles were seized by the troops.

Earlier a band of Arabs twice attacked a convoy between Ras Amar and Kfar Saba. Troops and aircraft repelled the raiders, killing one Arab and wounding three.

During the night troops and police beat off a band of Arabs who attacked the Jewish settlement of Ataroth and killed one of its defenders, Chaim Golovitzky, 40, in the first volley. The battle lasted two and a half hours. Golovitzky was the forty-first Jew to die in the Arab disorders.

Arabs twice attacked Rishon-le-Zion, one of the oldest Jewish colonies in Palestine and famous for its wines, but were repelled by Jewish special policemen and British troops who were rushed to the scene in lorries.

Meanwhile, soldiers and police pressed a search for arms, ammunition, bombs, dynamite and wire-cutting tools in many Arab villages throughout the country. In ten villages in the vicinity of Jerusalem the search was productive.

All Arab cars passing through Tel Aviv were stopped by police and searched.

A Mills bomb was thrown over a wall into the yard of District Commissioner James Campbell in Jerusalem, exploding but failing to do any damage.

Telephone wires linking Kalkillia and Ras-el-Ein were out. Snipers fired on military patrols near Ramleh. An Arab patient in a hospital was killed by a stray bullet during a burst of shooting.

A bomb exploded in the customs house at Acre, smashing windows. Communist literature was found at the scene of the explosion.

Low-flying military airplanes early today scattered Arabic leaflets over the strife-torn Holy Land appealing to the Arab populace, in the name of common sense, to halt the general strike and terrorism.

The leaflets promise that if the strike is dropped and peace is restored, a Royal Commission will immediately come to investigate Palestine problems.

"This opportunity must not be lost," the leaflets conclude, "therefore cease striking and stop the terror."

Two Jewish policemen were honored today by Inspector Roy G. Spicer for arresting the murderer of Eliezer Bichutzki, slain in the April 19 attack on Jews in Jaffa, and for having prevented the bombing of the Jaffa police station. A Jewish corporal and a sergeant were also honored for valor in connection with the disorders.

Addressing a tea party given him by the Haifa Municipal Council, High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope said he was determined to take military and other measures until security of person and property had been fully restored.

The official Gazette disclosed today that 137 more Arab villages and 14 Jewish suburbs of Jerusalem are scheduled for collective punishment in connection with the disorders.

Fires that broke out in the Manshieh quarter of Tel Aviv and in a storeroom of the Government school at Beersheba were extinguished by the police before they did much damage.

ARAB ASKS JEW FOR DRINK, GIVES THANKS WITH BULLETS

JERUSALEM, June 25. (JTA) -- A hail of bullets was the thanks a Jewish orange planter received today when he complied with an apparently friendly Arab's request for a drink of water.

On receiving the drink, the Arab whipped out a revolver and fired four shots almost point-blank at the Jew, Y. Reinhard. Reinhard saved his life by falling to the ground, the bullets striking nearby trees. The Arab fled but was later arrested and will be tried under the new emergency regulations under which he faces death or life imprisonment.

CUZISTS CONTINUE ATTACKS ON JEWS, DEFY PARLEY BAN

BUCHAREST, June 25. (JTA) -- One Jew was gravely wounded and many beaten today in unchecked disorders as 5,000 uniformed Cuzists (Rumanian Nazis) converged on Bucharest for a convention Sunday.

While the Cuzists filtered into the city in groups after marching to the outskirts of the capital from the provinces, the city police were ordered to stand ready to cope with serious disorders expected over the weekend.

The Cuzists announced their determination to hold their convention despite a ban issued today on assemblages until July 12.

Jews were forced to use taxicabs to go to work to avoid being attacked in the streets. Disorders against democratic and liberal groups continued.

Cuzists set fire this morning to a labor club, where liberal leaders had met to consider the situation. They besieged another club last night, keeping laborites prisoners within until troops arrived this morning and forced them to leave.

The Rumanian Federation of Labor issued a statement accusing the Government of inactivity and warning that unless the authorities halt the wave of terror, the federation will be compelled to take action itself.

Abraham Rosenblatt, 18, was stabbed by Cuzists at Radauti. He is not expected to live.

The organ of the National Peasants' Party, which is headed by former Premier Maniu, charged today that the Government was deliberately lax in dealing with the disorders.

Hopes that King Carol would influence the Government to take action disappeared today when he left for a hunting trip.

Jews and non-Jewish merchants in Kishinev appealed to the army to take over control of the city. They accused the local police of failing to act to prevent Cuzist attacks.

Alexander Vaida-Voevod, anti-Semitic leader, warned his followers in an address to a meeting in Transylvania not to use terrorism against Jews as long as Rumania was not prepared to deport them from the country. He called for a march on Bucharest of 5,000,000 peasants to force the Government to deport 1,000,000 "undesirable Jews" by legal methods.

Filderman Lays Blame for Disorders on Lax Regime

BUCHAREST, June 25. (JTA) -- Dr. William Filderman, president of the Union of Rumanian Jews, charged today that the Rumanian Government was encouraging anti-Jewish actions by tolerating violation of law.

Declaring that the Government alone had the power to halt the present wave of anti-Semitism, he said, "The fact of the matter is the laws of Rumania are being violated on all sides, but the Government tolerates the violations."

Pointing out that the law forbids the wearing of political uniforms, he declared that nevertheless Cuzists walk the streets in uniform and maintain so-called "blue houses" in the center of the city. He added that Nazi swastikas are flown from numerous buildings the country over.

"The press is under censorship to prevent incitement of one section of the population against another," he continued, "but the anti-Jewish press is permitted to publish pogrom propaganda. Acts of lawlessness such as destruction of newspapers are perpetrated openly, the authorities tolerating them."

"Under such circumstances no one but the Government is to blame for the growing anti-Jewish disorders and for the consequences to which they may lead if Government laxity continues."

The entire democratic press denounced Tuesday's attack on Dr. Filderman at the Supreme Court Building as "a desecration of the emblem of justice."

POLICE ROUND UP ENDEKS WHO RAIDED POLISH TOWN

WARSAW, June 25. (JTA) -- Steel-helmeted police, aided by airplanes, yesterday arrested nineteen persons and wounded two resisting arrest in searching the woods near Myszenice, West Galicia, for anti-Semites who Tuesday night raided the town and carried on depredations against Jews.

While police continued to round up the band of 150, mainly Krakow students, the district governor and police authorities arrived in the town to investigate the excesses.

Krakow police were believed to have arrested Adam Doboszynski, wealthy landowner and president of the Krakow District anti-Semitic National Democratic Party, who was described in an official statement confirming the excesses as the person who organized and led the raid.

VERDICT IN PRZYTYK POGROM TRIAL EXPECTED TODAY

RADOM, Poland, June 25. (JTA) -- The three-week trial of 43 Poles and 14 Jews on charges arising from the disorders in Przytyk on March 9 in which three persons were killed and scores injured concluded yesterday with statements by defendants. A verdict will be rendered Friday.

Sholem Lesko, charged with the murder of M. Wiesniak, a Christian, declared to the court:

"I swear by the holiest I am innocent. I shot into the air to frighten off attackers. I did not shoot Wiesniak. My only crime is illegal possession of firearms."

Other defendants also affirmed their innocence. Several Jewish veterans of battles against Russia protested the treatment they were receiving from the anti-Semitic Nationalists in the country they fought to save.

The Nationalist attorney, Niebudek, winding up the case for the Christian defendants, demanded that the court endorse the anti-Jewish boycott which "already has been legalized in Premier Skladkowski's program."

HIAS OFFICIALS IN PARIS FOR PARLEY ON EMIGRATION

PARIS, June 25. (JTA) -- Three officials of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society of America arrived here today to attend an international emigration conference convoked for June 29 by HICEM, international emigration aid organization. They are Abraham Hermann, president, Samuel Telsey, vice-president, and Isaac Asofsky, general manager.

The conference, which will consider ways and means of helping Jewish migrants to find settlement possibilities in countries where they may be assured of peace and security, will be attended by HICEM committees from all over the world. The conference will also consider plans to coordinate activities of the organization.

The American delegates to the parley will participate in the international conference of social welfare workers opening July 8 in London.

POLIAKOFF TAKES LEGAL ACTION AGAINST OLD TAGEBLATT STAFF

PARIS, June 25. (JTA) -- Vladimir Poliakoff, publisher of the Paris or Tagblatt, German emigre paper formerly under the editorship of Georg Bernhard, announced today he had instituted action for theft and defamation of character against his former employes, who recently resigned charging he had sold out to the Nazis.

He said he had invoked a court of honor to hear the moral aspects of the case and had asked the Foreign Press Association and the Publishers' Syndicate to investigate the situation.

Denying that he had sold out to agents of the Nazi Government, Poliakoff accused his former employes of trying to rob him of his paper under the guise of a political attack. The staff is now issuing another emigre paper, the Pariser Tageszeitung.

M. Lowinsohn, who succeeded Dr. Bernhard as editor of the Tagblatt, announced that he could identify persons who assaulted him two weeks ago while leaving the paper's plant and that he had started an action against them.

"SOCIALIZED DEMOCRACY" URGED BY RABBIS AT CAPE MAY

CAPE MAY, N.J., June 25. (JTA) -- The Central Conference of American Rabbis today denounced Fascism and Communism as incompatible with the democratic philosophy of Judaism and reaffirmed its support of a "thoroughly socialized democracy."

In another resolution, the delegates to the convention of Reform rabbis petitioned the Government of the United States "to grant to Jewish religious conscientious objectors to war the same exemption from military service as has long been granted to members of the Society of Friends and similar religious organizations."

The petition was based on "the conviction that conscientious objection to military service is in accordance with the highest interpretation of Judaism."

Reaffirming the stand adopted at the 1934 convention, the rabbis accepted the report of the Social Justice Committee as follows:

"In the judgment of the members of the conference there is only one way in which the American people can escape the dictatorship and tyranny of Communism on one hand and the dictatorship and tyranny of Fascism on the other hand. That is by establishing a thoroughly socialized democracy.

"This change can be achieved without force, violence and bloodshed, but through the orderly methods of democratic procedure. We solemnly commend to the American people a social philosophy derived from the expanding democratic ideal that must henceforth be sovereign in our social life."

Education for marriage and preparation for family life are to be placed upon a scientific basis with the adoption of a recommendation creating a committee on marriage, family and home. The body is to be authorized to organize a program of education and service to aid the conference members in their efforts to safeguard marriage and the family.

Endorsement of Senator La Follette's resolution for investigating violations of civil liberties was made in a recommendation asking members to forward evidence of violations of liberties to the Senate investigating committee.

The conference voted to establish constructive children's clubs and classes to help eliminate crime by eliminating child delinquency.

The committee on international peace is to undertake a more intensive peace program with a \$500 allotment -- five times the previous grant. The conference advocated extension of neutrality legislation and steps to take profit out of war. It denounced the present armaments appropriations of this and other countries as unnecessary and evil.
