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DISORDERS CLAIM 43RD JEWISH VICTIM; JAILED ARAB LEADERS STRIKE

JERUSALEM, July 1. (JTA) -- Arab leaders launched a foodless, sleepless strike at a Government concentration camp at Sarafend today while disorders continuing in their eleventh week claimed their forty-third Jewish victim.

The ten-week-old general strike gave signs of ending when Jaffa Arab merchants appealed to Jews to return, promising to rent them houses, flats and shops and guard them against attacks.

Prominent Arab merchants approached Jewish firms in Tel Aviv for loans, credit and mortgages on buildings and groves.

Arab chiefs imprisoned at Sarafend refused proffered food and mattresses reportedly on the ground that a number of them had been transferred to another concentration camp.

Itzhak Glaeser, a native Palestinian, died at a Jewish settlement at Hedera of wounds suffered in defending the colony against an Arab attack. More than 140 Arabs, Christians and Jews have been killed since April 15.

Attacks on Government forces, raids on Jewish settlements, sabotage, bombing and guerilla warfare continued throughout the country.

Police reinforced by troops beat off an attack on the Jewish Kadoorie School at Mount Tabor which had started at 2 o'clock this morning with the firing of a volley of bullets into the building.

Several Arabs were wounded by machine-gun fire when a large band attacked a military patrol near Ummelfahm. Arabs also suffered several casualties in two attacks on a railway patrol near Beisan.

Shots were fired near the Safed police station, police and troops replying. A police patrol was fired on by snipers at Rachel's tomb near Ramat Rachel. Shooting was reported at Kyriat Anavim.

Arabs cut railway telephone lines near Yabne. A fire that broke out in a store in Jerusalem's commercial center caused considerable damage. Trees were burned down at a Jewish cemetery in Hebron.

Eight Arabs were arrested in Haifa for throwing a bomb at a police station. Police searching their homes discovered a bomb. Collective fines were imposed on the Arab villages of Cininim and Ras-el-Nakura. Two Arabs confessed shooting a Jewish watchman at the Boureika colony, producing the gun used in the attack.

An Arab was sentenced to four years' imprisonment for setting fire to crops near the American Jewish colony of Raanana.

ARABIC BROADCASTS FROM ITALY DEFAME BRITISH TROOPS. COMMONS TOLD

LONDON, July 1. (JTA) -- The radio station at Bari, Italy, is broadcasting to Palestine Arabic reports defaming British troops and calculated to incite the Arabs, Alfred Short, Laborite, charged in the House of Commons today.

Colonial Secretary William Ormsty-Gore replied to the charge that there were no recent reports of defamatory broadcasts. He promised to inquire of the Palestine Government which is keeping a transcript of all such broadcasts.

SIR ISAAC ISAACS HONORED IN LONDON

LONDON, July 1. (JTA) -- Sir Isaac Isaacs, former governor-general of Australia, was honored last night at a dinner tendered by the Jewish organization, the Maccabaeans. Sir Herbert Samuel presided.

Sir Herbert characterized Sir Isaac's career as "the best reply to what is going on in other countries" in reference to Jews.

Numerous Government officials were present. The speakers included Marquis Huntingdon, Undersecretary for the Dominions; Lord Wright, Master of the Rolls; Marquis Reading, and Sir Michael Myers, Chief Justice of New Zealand.

2 ANTI-JEWISH DEMONSTRATORS KILLED IN ALGERIA

ALGER, July 1. (JTA) -- Two anti-Jewish demonstrators were killed by police at Cran today, climaxing twenty-four hours of tensity following the lynching by an Arab mob of a Jew suspected of having slain an Arab.

Demonstrations spread to Constantine where police were forced to take severe measures to prevent an attack on Jewish quarters of the city. Fifteen demonstrators were reported wounded in the resulting clash.

ENDEK WHO LED MYSLENICE RAID SEIZED BY POLICE

WARSAW, July 1. (JTA) -- Adam Doboszynski, Cracow Endek chief and leader of last week's raid on Myslenice, was shot in the hand and arrested by police near the Czechoslovakian border, the Polish Telegraphic Agency reported today.

Police who had been seeking him for three days caught Doboszynski in the woods in Makow county and shot him when he resisted arrest. He was transferred to Cracow and placed at the disposal of the prosecuting attorney.

LIBERTY LEAGUE CHALLENGES FARLEY ON FIAS CHARGES

NEW YORK, July 1. (JTA) -- The American Liberty League today challenged James A. Farley, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, to produce concrete evidence in support of his statement to the Democratic convention at Philadelphia that the league financed "undercover agency that has disgraced American politics with their appeals to race prejudice, religious intolerance..."

In a statement issued following a meeting of its executive committee yesterday, the league characterized the statement as "a false accusation" and said "such false and defamatory language rose beyond the limit of self-respect and cannot remain unnoticed."

PROSECUTOR, JEWS, POLES APPEAL RADOM SENTENCES

RADOM, Poland, July 1. (JTA) -- The public prosecutor as well as Jewish and Christian lawyers filed appeals today from the decision of the District Court which last Friday sentenced eleven Jews and thirty-nine Poles to prison terms on charges arising from disorders in Frzytyk last March 9. Two Jews and four Poles were acquitted.

PART-JEWS TO BE TAKEN INTO REICH ARMY

BERLIN, July 1. (JTA) -- Reiteration of an earlier decree excluding Jews from military service is contained in a new law issued today by the Ministries of War and Interior and signed by Reichsfuehrer Hitler. Part-Jews will be permitted to serve in the army but will not be permitted to become officers.

The decree adds that "military service by Jews in wartime is reserved for special regulation."

HICEM CONFERENCE ASKS INVESTIGATION OF EMIGRATION POSSIBILITIES

PARIS, July 1. (JTA) -- A resolution recommending continued investigation to discover new immigration possibilities for Jews was adopted today at the closing session of a conference under the auspices of the HICEM, comprising the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society of New York and the Jewish Colonization Association.

The conference warned against irresponsible initiative in seeking settlement possibilities for Jews. The emigration experts decided in another resolution to afford special protection to Jewish women refugees.

In the closing address of the meeting, Samuel Telsey of New York, vice-president of the HIAS, praised the HICEM for its service in the past ten years. He paid tribute to France for aiding refugees.

PRO-JEWISH PAPERS SOLD IN BUCHAREST FIRST TIME IN FORTNIGHT

BUCHAREST, July 1. (JTA) -- Pro-Jewish newspapers were sold openly today for the first time in two weeks. Although Bucharest was quiet after a fortnight of terrorism, Jews did not venture into the streets.

The Government censor warned editors of the anti-Semitic Universul and the Democratic Dimineata that the authorities would no longer tolerate that "mudslinging" campaign that has been in progress between them.

It was the feud between the two papers and incitement against the Jews by Universul that led to anti-Jewish disorders.

GERMAN JEWISH PHYSICIANS FIND PLACE IN LIFE OF SOVIET

MOSCOW (JTA) -- Refugee German Jewish physicians are being absorbed into the life of Soviet Russia in increasing numbers and are gaining the respect of the authorities and the people.

The work of a group of doctors brought here recently by the Agro-Joint, a Jewish organization, and employed by the Narcomzdrav -- Commissariat of Health -- has prompted local Soviet authorities to pay tribute to their efficiency and service.

The Agro-Joint reports receiving many letters of appreciation from the medical departments of various towns and regions. There is a general demand for more refugee physicians.

Official letters say they not only make excellent specialists, but take an active part in the social labors of collective settlements and rapidly learn Russian to qualify them for better positions.

The peasants in districts where the refugees practice frequently attempt to show their gratitude for being cured of ailments by presenting the refugee doctors with gifts, addresses and, in some cases, a month's free keep in rest homes.

One collective settlement gave a doctor free use of the collective's treasured automobile to "do away with the disadvantage of village as compared with town" in making his rounds.

The salary of a refugee physician ranges from 500 to 800 rubles a month with house and garden free. Women's salaries vary between 125 and 300 rubles monthly.

A conference between German-Jewish doctors and Health Commissariat officials will be held shortly to bring about a closer relationship between them. The conference will be held at Simferapol, capital of the Crimean Republic.
