PALESTINE EXHAUSTED FROM THREE MONTHS OF ARAB DISORDERS

JERUSALEM, July 19. (JTA) -- A military train was derailed today by Arabs and a Jewish bus narrowly escaped damage when a bomb hurled into it failed to explode as Arab disorders against the Government and the Jews entered their fourteenth week.

The country appeared exhausted from three months of disturbances that have taken the lives of 47 Jews and resulted in injuries to 200 more. While 15,000 British troops -- the greatest garrison since the World War -- was attempting to restore order with the aid of constables and special police, the population struggled to maintain its spirit. Return to normalcy appeared nowhere in sight.

Passengers in a bus from the Montefiore settlement reached Jerusalem safely after a bomb thrown into it failed to explode. Passengers said they saw an Arab fleeing from the scene of the bomb throwing.

An official communique said a military train was derailed and fired on by Arabs near Kakun. Soldiers replied to the gunfire. The evening train was the target of Arab snipers near Deir el Sheikh. A patrol beat off the attackers.

A large bomb was discovered buried in the sand near the Anglo-Palestine Bank and the police post at Tel Aviv. It was connected to a long electric wire, which was disconnected in time to prevent what might have been a great disaster.

The owner of property in Gaza where 49 bombs were discovered was arrested. Bombs exploded at Gaza, Beersheba and Tel Aviv, causing no damage. Gunpowder was discovered in a shop in Gaza. A number of arrests were made.

Four Arabs were arrested at Petach Tikvah with 760 rounds of ammunition in their possession.

Police and troops drove off a band of Arabs who launched a determined attack on the Jewish settlement of Ein Harod. Yesterday, attacks on the Ramat Kovesha and Kiryat Anavim settlements were repulsed. A Jewish watchman, Abraham Goretzky, was slightly wounded defending Kalmania from an assault.

Two Jews were reported arrested in the Neve Shanaan quarter of Jerusalem for possessing revolvers, ammunition and a bomb.

A band of armed Arabs plundered a Jewish shop in Jerusalem and attempted unsuccessfully to burn it down.

A water-pipe was dynamited today 27 kilometers from Jerusalem.

Three special policemen were disarmed by unidentified persons near Nablus.

47th Jew Killed

Arabs attacked a bus near Hedera on Friday, killing Anshel Kimchi, 22, the forty-seventh Jewish victim of the disorders that started on April 19.

Police discovered a cache of forty-nine bombs in a straw heap at Gaza. Bombs exploded in Gaza, Beer Sheba, Khanyunis and on the outskirts of Tel Aviv and Acre.

Police patrols were attacked on the Hebron road, at Yagur and Haifa. They replied with machine guns. No casualties were reported. Gangs attacked a military camp at Nablus and a police post near Khan Lubban.

Several Arabs were arrested for possession of arms and ammunition. Others were seized for intimidating Arab crowds at Haifa.

About ten acres of three-year-old trees were uprooted by Arab marauders at Gan Naphthali.

A convoy was fired on near Anabta. A mill at Mudjeida was burnt to the ground after it had been bombed.

BOARD OF DEPUTIES ASKS BRITAIN NOT TO HALT IMMIGRATION

LONDON, July 19. (JTA) -- A resolution calling on Great Britain not to yield to Arab demands for suspension of Jewish immigration into Palestine will be presented by the Board of Deputies of British Jews to Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin and William Ormsby-Gore, Colonial Secretary, it was announced today.

The unanimously-adopted resolution said suspension of immigration could only be interpreted as a surrender to violence.

It expressed confidence that the Royal Commission, which will leave shortly to investigate the Palestine disorders, will not question the fundamental terms of the League of Nations mandate and that a solution to the present difficulties can be found within the framework of

the mandate to assure Arabs their legitimate interests, at the same time to accelerate the development of the country and facilitate steady immigration of Jews to the limit of Palestine absorptive capacity.

ACTIONS COMMITTEE TO MEET JULY 25

WARSAW, July 19. (JTA) -- The Palestine Office here disclosed today that the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization will meet to consider current disorders in Palestine on July 25 either at Zurich, Switzerland, or Praha, Czechoslovakia.

LEAGUE TOLD DANZIG DECREES MENACE JEWS' RIGHTS

GENEVA, July 19. (JTA) -- The League of Nations was asked today to safeguard the rights of Jews under the Danzig constitution in a telegram to the president of the League Council and to Capt. Anthony Eden, rapporteur on Danzig, from the Committee of Jewish delegations, bearing the signature of its president, Dr. Stephen S. Wise of New York.

The communication held that changes in the Free City constitution constitute a menace to civil and religious equality guaranteed by the constitution and by the League.

The message was sent after Dr. Arthur Karl Greiser, president of the Free City's Nazi-controlled Senate, had issued a series of decrees virtually setting aside the constitution, crushing opposition groups and prohibiting kosher slaughtering of animals.

The decrees permit dissolution of any organization whose members, with the knowledge of its executive board, spreads news "endangering the state interest." Three-month protective custody is permitted for anybody considered endangering public peace.

The measures were said in many quarters to foreshadow erection of a dictatorship on the Nazi model and eventual annexation of the Free City by Germany. The decrees were understood to have been authorized by Reichsfuehrer Hitler.

REICH JEWISH PAPERS BARRED FROM REPORTING ON JEWS IN OLYMPICS

BERLIN, July 19. (JTA) -- Jewish newspapers were prohibited today from reporting anything about the activities of Jews on Olympic teams or to comment on participation of Jews in next month's games.

One of the purposes of this measure was believed to be to prevent Jewish papers in the Reich from mentioning that Greta Bergmann, a champion high-jumper and one of the two "non-Aryan" members of the German Olympic team, has been eliminated from competition.

Jewish pensions in Berlin announced that they will be open to accommodate foreign guests. However, since they cannot fly the swastika under regulations restricting display of the national flag to "Aryans," only Jewish guests are expected to patronize these boarding-houses.

PHOENIX COMPANY IN GERMANY DISCHARGES JEWS

BERLIN, July 19. (JTA) -- It was disclosed today that all Jewish employees and agents in Germany of the Austrian Phoenix Insurance Co, which was reorganized recently following revelations of financial difficulties, have been dismissed. This action was taken although most of the policy holders are Jews.

REICH JEWISH COLONY TRANSFERRED TO SOUTH AMERICA

BERLIN, July 19. (JTA) -- The Jewish agricultural colony at Gross-Gaglow, which had been closed by the authorities, will be transferred to a South American country, it was learned today. A settlement has already been founded there, constituting the first all-German-Jewish independent settlement in the country.

SOCIAL WORK PARLEY HEARS NAZISM BRANDED "FUNDAMENTALLY IMMORAL"

LONDON, July 19. (JTA) -- Delegates to the International Social Workers Conference yesterday heard Nazism condemned as "fundamentally immoral" in an address by Dr. J. J. Mallon, warden of Toynbee Hall.

Speaking at a meeting arranged by the British Psychiatric Institute, Dr. Mallon described Nazism as a "diabolical philosophy which sacrifices the individual upon the altar of the State and introduces cruelty into the benevolent principles animating social workers of the rest of the world."

GUSTLOFF SLAYER TO BE TRIED IN OCTOBER

BASLE, Switzerland, July 19. (JTA) -- David Frankfurter, Yugoslavian Jewish medical student who slew Wilhelm Gustloff, Swiss Nazi leader, last February, will be tried before the October term of the Grison Cantonal Court in Chur on a charge of premeditated murder, it was announced today.

FRENCH JEWS ELECT DELEGATES TO WORLD CONGRESS

PARIS, July 19. (JTA) -- A conference of Franco-Jewish organizations today elected delegates to the forthcoming World Jewish Congress in Geneva and adopted resolutions condemning anti-Jewish actions in Poland, Germany and Palestine.

The conference said pogroms were occurring in Poland "with the Government's consent." On Palestine, the delegates protested current Arab disorders against Jews.

M. Seligman, an attorney, declared that Nazi propaganda was causing a wave of anti-Semitism in Alsace. Seventy delegates attended the conference. Marc Jarblum presided.

CONGRESS ON ANTI-SEMITISM TO BE HELD SEPT 19

PARIS, July 19. (JTA) -- The second International Congress for Combating Anti-Semitism will be held here Sept. 19, it was announced today. Delegates from twelve countries, including England, France and Spain, are expected to attend.

SIROVICH SEES CUBAN PRESIDENT ON SETTLING GERMAN REFUGEES

HAVANA, July 19. (JTA) -- The Cuban Government had under consideration today a plan broached by Congressman William Sirovich of New York for settling from 100,000 to 200,000 German Jews in an industrial colony in Cuba.

After an interview with President Miguel Gomez, Mr. Sirovich represented him as "greatly interested" and ready to consider a definite plan if proposed by a group of internationally prominent persons. Mr. Sirovich said President Roosevelt as well as industrialists and other congressmen favored such a plan.

Mr. Sirovich's next step was to fly to Los Angeles where he said he would confer with Louis B. Mayer regarding formation of an international committee to present the plan formally in the form of a brief in September.

He said refugees could help solve Cuba's unemployment problem by creating new industries and markets and assisting in building the nation's merchant marine. He added:

"The Jewish settlers would apply brain and brawn in opening world markets for new Cuban industrial products. The project would not clash with either the Palestine project or the Soviet's Biro-Bidjan project as some Jews do not desire to migrate to the Holy Land with the present Arabian trouble, and others do not desire to live under a communistic State.

"I told President Gomez that Cuba as a daughter of Spain may now open her gates to religious and racial tolerance to the same people Spain expelled more than four centuries ago."

CZECH SWIMMING UNION ASKED TO RESCIND BAN ON JEWISH CLUBS

PRAHA, July 19. (JTA) -- The Prager Mittag yesterday urged the Czechoslovak Swimming Union to rescind its recent action in fining and disqualifying three Jewish sports clubs for refusing to participate in the Olympic Games at Berlin.

In an editorial on the issue, which has provoked a storm of discussion in sports and political circles, the paper declares:

"Let us hope that this shame will be avoided at the eleventh hour. The Swimming Union should realize that a Jew wishing to go to Berlin to prove that he does not practice ritual murder, which at the present time is being discussed in German universities, may go; but a Jew thinking he has no business to visit a city ornamented with Stuermer boxes should not be compelled to go on pain of a fine."

The clubs punished by the swimming union are the Hagibor in Praha and the Bar Kochba in Bratislava and Brunn.
