TROOPS RUSHED TO JAFFA TO HALT NEW OUTBREAKS

JERUSALEM, August 5. (JTA) -- More British troops were rushed to Jaffa today as tension gripped the Arab city following renewed outbreaks that occurred there when the Government denied rumors that Jewish immigration had been stopped.

Soldiers beat off Arab attempts to invade the neighboring Jewish city of Tel Aviv. Shots were fired and two bombs were thrown from the Manshiyeh quarter of the Arab city, where on April 19 the Arab disorders broke out which have since claimed close to 250 lives and millions in property damage.

A strong attack on Ekron was repelled by soldiers who reinforced the Jewish colony's special guards.

Meanwhile, High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope struck back at the Supreme Court with an ordinance declaring collective fines imposed on various communities in connection with the disorders should be deemed lawfully and validly levied. The court last week invalidated the fines, ordering their remission to nineteen Arab towns and villages.

Arab municipal employees today informed the High Commissioner by wire that they supported fully the Arab demands and the memorandum by Arab Government officials demanding stoppage of Jewish immigration as the only solution of the present situation.

An Arab policeman was killed and another wounded during the night at Kakun, near Tulkarem, their assailants escaping. Soldiers killed an Arab bandit and wounded another in a clash near Ramallah.

CONFERENCE OF ARAB LEADERS WITH EMIR ABDULLAH FRUITLESS

JERUSALEM, Aug. 5. (JTA) -- An Arab delegation of seventy headed by the Grand Mufti returned today from Amman after fruitless consultation with Emir Abdullah, Arab ruler of Transjordan, who has been attempting to mediate between the Government and the Arabs to end current disorders and the general strike.

It was understood no decision was taken on halting the sixteen-week-old strike because of dissension among the Arab leaders. The moderates urged cessation, but the extremely Nationalistic Istaqlalists insisted on continuation of the strike, arguing that it would force the Government to grant Arab demands for suspension of Jewish immigration, prohibition of land sales to Jews and a national government.

UNOFFICIAL ARAB DELEGATION ENDS ENGLISH TOUR

LONDON, August 5. (JTA) -- The unofficial Arab delegation left for Palestine today after having spent several weeks in England in an effort to create a favorable public and official attitude toward the Arab cause in the Holy Land.

The Evening Standard reports the Government will not grant suspension of immigration as a concession to Arabs since it does not wish to engage in bargaining while the general strike is still in progress.

A decision either to continue or suspend immigration will be taken in London, the paper states.

Government circles are reported as voicing the belief that the Arab revolt, in progress since April 19, will not last more than a few weeks.

SPANISH REBELS EXACT \$60,000 FROM MOROCCAN JEWS

TANGIER, Morocco, August 5. (JTA) -- It was learned here today that Spanish rebels have exacted the sum of \$60,000 from the Jewish Community of Tetuan, coastal city of 30,000 population.

The wealthiest Jews of the city were forced to pawn their property to meet the demands of the rebels.

DANZIG COURT APPROVES ANTI-JEWISH BOYCOTT POSTERS

DANZIG, August 5. (JTA) -- The anti-Jewish boycott today had the official sanction of Danzig's Supreme Court as result of a decision which ruled that boycott posters displayed in Government buildings need not be removed since they are in accordance with Nazi principles.

The ruling was issued when Jews complained that display of the posters constituted violation of the Free City's constitution. A similar complaint had been lodged with the League of Nations.

POLAND'S EMIGRATION QUOTA TO U.S. UNFILLED

WARSAW, August 5. (JTA) -- Strict interpretation by the American Consulate of the "public burden" provision of United States immigration regulations has kept the quota from Poland unfilled, it was revealed here today.

The disclosure was made at a plenary session of the executive of the Jewish Emigrant Aid Society, when an official announced that American visas were not being fully utilized because of the consulate's rigid application of the regulation.

NEW RIFT LOOMS IN PALESTINE LABOR RANKS

PRAHA, August 5. (JTA) -- An old breach in the ranks of the Palestine labor movement along religious lines, thought healed last year by the World Zionist Congress, gave signs today of reopening at the international convention of the Agudath Israel, world orthodox Jewish organization.

Informing the delegates of a decision by the Poel Mizrachi, orthodox labor Zionist group, to denounce the peace agreement reached between the orthodox and majority forces in the Palestine Labor Federation, Isaac Breuer, president of the Poel Aguda, labor unit of the Agudath Israel, told the convention that the Poel Mizrachi had proposed an alliance with the Poel Aguda.

The purpose of the proposed alliance, he said, was to break the majority power in the Palestine Labor Federation. The two orthodox labor groups would unite on a fifty-fifty principle, the Agudath Israel and the rabbinate being left to decide on all religious questions affecting labor.

By the peace agreement, reached last year at Lucerne, the Histadruth (Palestine Labor Federation) undertook to observe kosher regulations and the Sabbath on Jewish national property.

GESTAPO TAKES CONTROL OF DANZIG POLITICAL POLICE

FREE CITY OF DANZIG (JTA) -- The German Gestapo (secret State police) has taken over control of the political police here. Herr von Gruetzner, one of the assistants of Heinrich Himmler, Gestapo chief, has been named head of the Free City political police.

Despite Nazi domination over Danzig's political affairs, a memorandum protesting recent decrees of Dr. Arthur Karl Greiser, head of the Nazi-controlled Senate, aimed at suppressing opposition groups, was presented to Sean Lester, League of Nations High Commissioner for the Free City. The memorandum was signed by opposition parties.

Fearing arrest and persecution by the Gestapo, a number of members of groups opposed to the Nazis have fled to nearby Gdynia, which is on Polish soil.

RELIEF GROUPS TO FEED 25,000 JEWISH CHILDREN IN POLAND

WARSAW (JTA) -- At least 25,000 Jewish school-children here will have to be fed by relief organizations during the coming winter months, it was established at a conference called by the Toz, Association for the Preservation of Health among Jews.

The conference expressed the hope that Jewish relief organizations in the United States and England will take into consideration the plight of the children of needy Jewish families in Poland and assign the funds to feed them in the school kitchens.

It is estimated that at least 325,000 zlotys will be required for this winter. Half of this sum will be covered by the local funds, while the other half, it is hoped, will come from Jewish relief organizations abroad.

150 GERMAN JEWISH FAMILIES TO BE SETTLED IN SOUTH AMERICA

BERLIN (JTA) -- Further plans for the settlement of German Jewish families in the Argentine by the Jewish Colonization Association has been made public here.

According to these plans, 150 Jewish families will be taken out of Germany during the year and settled in ICA colonies in the Argentine. The selection of the families will be made by a representative of the ICA. Each of these families will have to consist of at least three men and one woman fit for agricultural work.

The procedure of transferring the families from Germany to the Argentine will be along the following lines:-

1. One member of each family will have to undergo a month's special agricultural training in Neuendorf.
2. After completing the four weeks' training course, each member will be sent to the Argentine for a full year's training, partly in agricultural schools and partly in the old Jewish ICA colonies there. As soon as this member of the family has adjusted himself to the conditions in the Argentine, the other members of the family will within the year be brought over to the Argentine and settled in the ICA colonies there.

In addition to settling German Jews in the Argentine, the ICA has decided to settle a number of German Jews in Brazil, 190 kilometres from Rio de Janeiro. Of the land acquired by the ICA there, a territory of 20 hectares will be leased to each family arriving from Germany for intensive agricultural work along the lines of mixed farming.

It is expected that the settlers will become the owners of the land within a period of twenty years.
