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#### REFUGEES OF ARAB DISORDERS STAGE "HUNGER MARCH" IN TEL AVIV

TEL AVIV, August 6. (JTA) -- Jewish women and children refugees from the Arab disorders today staged a "hunger march" through the streets of Tel Aviv to the Government offices, where they presented the District Commissioner with a formal demand for food.

From the Government building, the procession went on to the offices of the Jewish Community where the marchers received assurances that the question of relief was being taken up with High Commissioner Sir Arthur Wauchope and would be swiftly settled. The community, in protest against the alleged failure of the Government to provide adequate relief for the refugees, had earlier withdrawn its assistance. A previous demonstration was dispersed by police.

At the height of the disorders, approximately 6,000 refugees were quartered in this city and fed largely by the municipal government. Many have since returned to their former homes.

Shooting was reported during the night at the Kadoorie Agricultural School on Mt. Tabor, at Afuleh, Tel Yosef and Mizpa.

#### HOPE FOR PEACE WITH ARABS VOICED BY AGUDATH ISRAEL WORLD PARLEY

PRAHA, Czechoslovakia, August 6. (JTA) -- The international conference of the Agudath Israel, world orthodox Jewish organization, today adopted a resolution expressing indignation at the Arab excesses in Palestine, the hope that peaceful cooperation with the Arabs is possible and satisfaction with Great Britain's determination to uphold the Balfour Declaration.

Another resolution declares the World Jewish Congress, which opens in Geneva Saturday night, has no right to represent the Jewish people, but is necessary to centralize Jewish social institutions.

The executive was empowered to convoke an Agudist congress in Jerusalem next Spring, with an unnamed European city as an alternative if that site is impossible.

President Eduard Benes of Czechoslovakia invited Jacob Rosenheim, president of the Agudath Israel, for an audience Friday, replying to the message of greeting extended by the convention at its opening session.

#### 5 RADICAL DELEGATES DEMAND ADMISSION TO GENEVA CONGRESS

GENEVA, August 6. (JTA) -- Five radical delegates arrived here today from the United States and immediately presented demands to the executive of the World Jewish Congress that they be seated at the opening session Saturday.

The executive appointed a special session to negotiate with the delegates, who claim they were elected by Jewish organizations in America with a membership of 500,000. A decision will be announced tomorrow.

The delegates are William Weiner, chairman of the International Workers' Order; Dr. Charles Kuntz, chairman of ICOR; Rabbi Greenfield of Brooklyn; H. Upatschinsky of the Fur Workers' Joint Board, and R. Saltzman, of the Jewish section of the I.W.O.

#### POLISH ORGAN WANTS JEWISH EMIGRATION AINED AT GENEVA

WARSAW, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Polish Political Information, semi-official organ of the Foreign Office, expressed the hope that the World Jewish Congress in Geneva would discuss emigration of Polish Jews to new territories overseas, the Polish Telegraphic Agency reported today.

Pointing out that Poland has the largest Jewish population next to the United States -- nearly 3,500,000 souls -- the periodical says Poland is naturally interested in emigration because she is overpopulated and suffers from faulty handicraft and trade structure.

Forty per cent of the Jews in Poland live on trade and as middlemen, the article says, adding that a large percentage are professionals and many have no definite occupation.

The depression hit the Jews first of all because they are a social strata lacking a healthy economic basis, the periodical continues. It quotes Jewish economists as stating that 1,000,000 Jews in Poland have no sound economic basis.

Poland, having no capital, can solve the overpopulation problem only by means of emigration, declares the periodical, and quotes Jewish writers as saying that the solution of the Jewish problem requires an annual emigration of 100,000 Jews -- as asserted in a press interview by Isaac Gruenbaum, member of the executive of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

Since Palestine emigration possibilities are held limited, Polish Political Information expresses the view that Jewish emigration should seek new territories overseas and holds this should be discussed at Geneva. Countries interested in the solution of the Jewish problem, possessing large territories and great international influence, could easily contribute a practical solution and open new territories to Jewish emigration, the article concludes.

#### GENEVA CONGRESS OPENING TO BE BROADCAST SATURDAY

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The opening of the World Jewish Congress in Geneva Saturday will be heard in the United States at 4 p.m. over the WEA network of the National Broadcasting Co. It will be part of a world-wide broadcast. Dr. Stephen S. Wise will deliver the opening address.

#### ITALIAN JEWISH LEADER SAILS TO FORM COMMUNITIES IN ETHIOPIA

ROME, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Advocate Carlo Alberto Viterbo, member of the Federation of Jewish Communities, left today for Ethiopia to create the first Jewish communal organizations in Addis Ababa and Dire Dawa.

He will also contact the Falashas, the race of Ethiopian Jews.

The Colonial Ministry has approved the federation's plans to organize Jewish communities and investigate Jewish religious conditions in Italy's newly-acquired colonial empire.

#### HIGH COURT UPHOLDS JAIL TERMS FOR ENDEKS WHO BEAT AGED JEWS

WARSAW, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The Court of Appeals today upheld the Bialystok court in sentencing several members of the anti-Semitic Nationalist Youth Union to one to two years' imprisonment for beating up a Jewish cattle dealer, Feiweł Malach, 69 years old.

#### ROGET'S THESAURUS TO DROP USE OF "JEW" AS SYNONYM FOR "LENDER"

CHICAGO, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- A one-man crusade against Roget's Thesaurus' use of "Jew" as a synonym for "lender" and "parsimony" was crowned with victory today when the publisher and the editor agreed to delete the offending definition from the next printing.

Harold J. Reiter, who had launched the drive with a broadcast letter of protest, had today letters from G.P. Putnam's Sons of New York and G. O. Sylvester Mawson of Wellesley, Mass., agreeing that his objection was well-taken.

Mr. Reiter, a Chicago sales executive, had sought aid from B'nai B'rith's Anti-Defamation League in his campaign. He received the support of a congressman, a university professor and others. Through his father, a delegate, he was prepared to take the matter to the World Jewish Congress in Geneva.

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"RIGHT" OF JEWS TO RESETTLE PALESTINE STRESSED BY ROOSEVELT

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in a letter to the United Palestine Appeal, has supported the "right" of the Jewish people to resettle Palestine. Governor Herbert H. Lehman also reaffirmed his sympathy with "the economic and spiritual development of Palestine."

The letters made public today were written in connection with the forthcoming publication of the "United Palestine Appeal Yearbook for 1936."

President Roosevelt's letter follows:

"We need from time to time to renew our faith in those eternal verities which are and which must forever remain the bases of human betterment. First among these is the common aspiration of mankind to seek communion with the Great Ruler of Human Destiny and next is the love of the homeland, which is a natural aspiration of our devotion to family life.

"The interest which I have had and have frequently manifested in the rebuilding of the ancient Jewish homeland is, I am persuaded, an interest which is shared by all who recognize that every people has the inalienable right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. It is a source of renewed hope and courage, that by international accord and by the moral support of the peoples of the world, men and women of Jewish faith have a right to resettle the land where their faith was born and from which much of our modern civilization has emanated."

Governor Lehman wrote:

"I have long been in thorough sympathy with the economic and spiritual development of Palestine. It is of greatest significance today because it promises to uphold and fortify civilization in its faith in the ancient ideals of justice, tolerance and charity at a time when the rest of the world is morally and spiritually depressed."

POLISH DIPLOMAT HAILS RUMANIAN ANTI-SEMITIC PAPER

BUCHAREST (JTA) -- Diplomatic circles have expressed surprise at a letter of congratulation sent to Porunca Vremii, a violently anti-Semitic daily, by M.M. Arciszewsky, Polish Minister to Rumania.

After receiving the paper's first anniversary issue, devoted mainly to inflammatory articles against the Jews, the minister wrote expressing admiration for "the splendid special number" and its "rich documentary and informative material."

#### PALESTINE'S INDUSTRIAL FUTURE HELD MENACED BY DISORDERS

JERUSALEM (JTA) -- A warning that current Arab disorders have hit industrial production so that "unless we mobilize all our strength, the whole industrial life of the country will be in great danger," has been sounded here by the Palestine Industrial Union.

The chairman of its Jerusalem branch said at a press conference that "the position of Palestine industry is very bad." He added that before the disturbances industry had slightly improved from the affects of the panic accompanying the outbreak of the Italo-Ethiopian war.

As a result of the disorders, he said, there was a sharp decline in production in every industry, except foodstuffs and paper. A number of factories closed down. Others have large stocks of which they cannot dispose, he said.

Many manufacturers were forced to dismiss employes and to appeal to banks for credit, he continued. Despite financial assistance, manufacturers cannot overcome the crisis and, if the present disturbances continue, many more factories will close down, he declared.

The situation would not be so desperate if a large number of articles manufactured here were not competing with important goods, the chairman said. About 80 per cent of all imported goods, which amounted to about \$4,250,000 last year, could have been produced in Palestine, he declared.

#### "ARYAN" WOMEN AIDES BARRED TO REICH "GHETTO" RESTAURANTS

BERLIN (JTA) -- Jewish restaurant owners are prohibited from employing German women under 45 years of age under an extension of the Nuremberg race and citizenship laws newly issued by the chief of German police. The original decrees forbid employment of "Aryan" women domestics under 45 in Jewish households.

The new order was issued in connection with permission given to Jews to open "ghetto restaurants" as an exception to the general prohibition on opening of new restaurants before April 1, 1938. Jews receive licenses on condition that they post signs limiting admittance to Jews. The licenses will hereafter state that employment of German women is forbidden.
