ENTRY BAN NOT BASIS OF PEACE TALKS, WEIZMANN ASSURED

LONDON, Sept. 5, (JFA) -- Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Falestine, today received written assurances from Colonial Secretary William Ormsby-Core that suspension of immigration into the Holy Land has not been made the basis of negotiations looking toward peace.

In a letter to Dr. Weizmann, made public at today's session of the Agency's administrative committee meeting, Mr. Ormsby-Gore declared the Felestine Government was not negotiating with Nuri Fasha as-Said, Iraq Foreign Minister and peace mediator, along the lines of immigration stoppage.

Reading of the letter considerably eased the tension among Zionist and non-Zionist leaders attending the two-day conference here. Reports have been current for many days that immigration would be suspended temporarily in order to stop the Arab disorders and permit the Royal Commission to proceed with its inquiry.

In his letter to Dr. Weizmann, Mr. Ormsby-Gore denied that the Iraqi Foreign Minister had been authorized to assure Arab leaders on the measures that would be taken after cessation of the disturbances.

He said no promises had been made by High Commissioner Sir Arthur Wauchope or the British Government to Nuri Pasha as-Said with reference to suspension of immigration.

The Colonial Secretary also said there was no foundation to the report in the Falestine Post on Tuesday which listed alleged terms on which the Arab Supreme Committee would abandon the general strike against Jewish immigration.

It was indicated in well informed circles today that the Iraq Foreign Minister's mediation efforts may be abandoned.

Following is the full text of Mr. Ormsby-Gore's letter:

"I have to acknowledge receipt of your letter of September 1 enclosing a report from the Palestine Post as to certain terms alleged to have been accepted by the Palestine Arab Higher Committee as the basis for terminating the strike and terrorist campaign,

"No such terms have been agreed to either by the High Commissioner or by His Majesty's Government. Moreover, there's no foundation for the suggestion referred to in a letter addressed on August 31 by the Jewish Agency for Falestine to the High Commissioner that the High Commissioner had authorized Nuri Fasha to give assurance regarding certain measures, including suspension of immigration, to be taken after cessation of disturbances. Not only has Nuri Fasha not been suthorized to give any such assurances but Sir Arthur-Manchore states he has not asked for such authority and to the best of the High Commissions' is belief, Nuri Fasha made clear to the Arab leaders that he was not in a position to give any such assurances.

"No promises have been made to Nuri Fasha by the High Commissioner or by His Majesty's Government as regards either suspension of im-, migration or his position as mediator in the affairs of Falestine,"

3 SOLDIERS, 16 ARABS KILLED IN BATTLE; BRITISH PLANE CRASHES

JERUSALEM, Sept. 3, (JTA) -A spectacular battle between Arab rebels and British troops reinforced by a squadron of planes resulted today in the death of three soldiers and sixteen Arabs as sanguinary disorders neared the end of their twentieth week in the Holy Land.

The battle started when a band of fifty Arabs fired on a military patrol near Bala. Finding itself surrounded and in a desperate situation, the patrol signalled for reinforcements.

Troops which rushed to the patrol's aid found the road blocked.

Meanwhile, a squadron of planes sped to the scene, located the band, swooped and raked it with machine gun fire, killing 16 Arabs and wounding four others.

One of the planes, riddled by rebel fire, crashed and burst into flames. Lieutenant Hunter and his gunner were killed in the crash.

A corporal of the Lincolnshire regiment was killed and two officers and one private were wounded in the battle.

Troops later demolished six houses in Bala from which the Arab rebels had opened fire,

A bomb was hurled into a military camp at Safed without doing any damage. Arabs set fire to a Jewish house in Foriah, near Kinereth on the shore of the Sea of Galilee.

A Jewish-owned tannery in Givat Shaul, Jerusalem suburb, was razed to the ground early this morning by fire which sterted when an incendiary bomb was thrown into the factory by Arabs,

Rebels stoned a Jewish-owned bus passing Ramleh and wounded Moshe Boyarsky. He was taken to the Hadassah Hospital in Tel Aviv.

Buses passing Yagur near Haifa ran an Arab gauntlet of bullets and rocks in an attempt to prevent travel to and from Haifa.

MARTIAL LAW LOOMS FOR PALESTINE AS BRITAIN PREPARES REINFORCEMENTS

LONDON, Sept. 3, (JTA) -- Martial law loomed for the Holy Land today as the Fritish War Office concelled military maneuvers at Sussex in or-der to be in a position to rush more troops into the strife-torn area at short notice.

It was learned that the decision to send additional reinforcements into Palestine to quell the 20-week-old disorders was the direct result of yesterday's discussion of the Palestine situation by the British Cabinet.

Well-informed circles believe that martial law is now inevitable,

The Evening Standard reported this afternoon that Sir John Simon, Home Secretary, and William Ormsby-Gore, Colonial Secretary, were in conference at Downing St. over new dispatches that had been received from High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope.

David Ben-Gurion, chairman of the Falestine executive of the Jewish Agency for Falestine, was received by the Colonial Secretary prior to leaving for Falestine,

IRAQ PREMIER EXPECTED TO TAKE UP PEACE EFFORTS IF AIDE FAILS

5000 FOREIGN NAZIS, MANY FROM U.S. AT REICH PARLEY

ERIANGEN, Germany, SEPT. 5; (JTA) -- The Havas News Agency reports five thousand foreign Mazis, many of them American citizens, today attended the official opening of a convention on the propagation of Nazism abroad -- the "Nazi International" -- preliminary to the big Nuremberg Nazi party congress next weeks Ernest Wilhelm Bohle, British-born president of the movement, in his opening address paid tribute to the memory of Wilhelm Gustloff, Nazi leader in Switzerland who was assassinated by a Yugoslav Jewish student, and of the Germans who have been killed in the Spanish civil war.

"During the past year Germans in foreign countries have continued with all means at their disposal to defend Germanism and national socialist ideas," he said. "Wilhelm Gustloff and the Germans assassinated in Spain are our martyrs."

He announced that a street in this Franconian city would be named in honor of the Swiss Nazi leader and asked that the entire gathering stand in silent tribute to the "Germans in foreign countries who were victims of assassins."

In an address of welcome to the delegates last night, Bohle said the goal of their organization was to imbue each German living in a foreign country so thoroughly with the Nazi doctrine that he could never forget his Germanism.

"The chiefs of this organization," he said, "are the political soldiers of the Fuehrer."

Special trains will carry the delegates, who have come here from doz_- ens of bountries, to the Nuremberg congress.

"PUBLIC ORDER" HIS ATM, RUMANIAN JUSTICE CHIEF DECLARES

BUCHAREST, Sept. 3, (JFA) -- Mircea Djuvara, new Minister of Justice, today told principal officials of his department that his chief concern was "maintenance of public order."

At a special departmental conference, M. Djuvara said he will see that "legality is strictly preserved and that justice is a powerful dam breaking all waves of passion."

GERMAN FILM WITHDRAWN FROM CANADA THEATRES WHEN JEWS PROTEST

TORONTO, Sept. 3, (JTA) -- The German film, "The Dancing Dubhess", has been withdrawn from Canadian motion-picture theatres as a result of protests from the anti-Nazi boycott committee of the Canadian Jewish Congress, it was announced today by Jack Mandell, secretary.

The film was scheduled to play at a chain of theatres here following approval by the government censor board and a showing in Winnipeg. Representations were made to Feerless Films Ltd., its distributor, which thereupon ordered it withdrawn.

U.S. CHRISTIAN LEADERS ASK BRITAIN TO UPHOLD TERMS OF MANDATE

NEW YORK, Sept. 3, (JTA) -- The American Christian Conference on Palestine in a ceble to the British Cabinet yesterday urged the Government to maintain "firm adherence to the terms of the mandate over Palestine,"

The cable was signed by George Gordon Battle, chairman of the organization, A.F. of L. Fresidont William Green, James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Gerwany, Dr. John Haynes Holmes of the New York Community Church, Fresident Frederick B. Robinson of City College of New York, Reverend Ivan Lee Holt, president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America and Carroll Hayes, president of the New York Catholia Cibb.

"The Jewish people have laid the foundations of the national home," says the statement, "using peaceful means and with extraordinary zeal and energy. They have created possibilities for larger numbers to come and what they have wrought has been of inestimable benefit to all elements in ralestine. To persecuted Jews throughout the world Felestine has become the sole refuge."

The petition sent to Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin warns the British government that "any lessening of the terms of the mandate must lead to the lessening of British presting in America."

"It would cause the loss of good-will," it declares, "among Jews and Christians. It would tend to confirm the feeling prevailing among many persons that contain sections of the British government are deliberately and unreasonably opposed to Jewish rights and interests and would encourage other elements in this country already unfriendly to Great Britain.

"It is our duty to warn the kindred British people not to be misled by provocative forces who counsel yielding of moral values to force and whose own ends are, in the opinion of Christian America, not above suspicion.

"We rely upon the conscience of Great Britain to remain loyal to her sacred trust. Christian honor demands that the pledges of the nations be kept."

The American people has endorsed the Balfour Declaration, the statement continues, expressed through every Fresident since the World War and in resolutions passed by both houses of Congress.

"The opportunity offered to the Jewish people," the cable maintains, "to establish their national home in Felestine has been accepted by enlightened public opinion in America as not only just and moral but as irrevocably guaranteed by international law."

GRAZIANI TO AID JEWISH RELIGION IN ETHIOPIA

ADDIS ABABA, Sept. 3, (JTA) -- General Graziani today promised Italian support for organization of Jewish religious communities in Ethiopia. The general gave assurances to this effect in a long audience granted to Carlo Viterbo, representative of the Union of Italian Communities.

LATE LONDON BULLETIN

PREPARED TO NEGOTIATE WITH ARABS, WEIZMANN TELLS PARLEY

LONDON, Sept. 3, (JTA) -- Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jawish Agency for Palestine, today declared he was always ready to discuss the question of Arab-Jewish relations with the authorized representatives of the Palestine Arabs.

Addressing the final session of the Agency's administrative committee conference here, he disclosed that he had informed Colonial Secretary William Ormsby-Gore of his readiness to go to Palestine at any time for a joint discussion with Arab leaders and the Government.

The statement was made during a discussion on the implications of proposals by foreign Arab representatives for cessation of the Arab general strike.

Dry Weizmann voiced regret at the Falestine Government's failure to take energetic action when the disorders broke out on April 19, He paid tribute to the restraint and discipline of the Falestine Jews.

. The two-day conference of the committee concluded with adoption of resolutions, including one on the question of Arab-Jewish relations and another on the Agency's budget.
