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NAZI CONGRESS USHERS IN NEW ANTI-JEWISH PROPAGANDA DRIVE

BERLIN, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- With the eighth annual Nazi Party Congress at Nuremberg supplying the impetus, the long-expected anti-Jewish propaganda drive gathered momentum throughout the Reich today.

Echoing the keynote sounded by Chancellor Adolf Hitler's opening speech, Der Stuermer, rabid anti-Semitic weekly published by Germany's No. 1 Jew-baiter, Julius Streicher, placarded this city as well as Nuremberg and other large population centers with posters accusing the Jews of responsibility for the events in Spain and reviving the long-discredited libel about the so-called "Protocols of the Elders of Zion."

A special issue of the Stuermer, reprinting the "Protocols" allegations that Jews planned to rule the world, was distributed by tens of thousands in Nuremberg today. Distribution was concentrated at a special exhibition designed to show the close affiliations between the Communists and Jews. The exhibit is called "Bolshevism with the Jewish Mask Off."

In a proclamation at today's session of the Congress, Chancellor Hitler reviewed Nazi achievements and boasted they had been accomplished "without a single Jew in the administrative system of the German nation."

Accusing Jews of conducting a "shameless propaganda" against Germany, the Chancellor charged them with maintaining international Jewish revolutionary headquarters at Moscow.

"We've revealed this shameful Jewish system of world hatred," he declared. "We studied its devilish methods. We warned against the results."

Referring to the Olympics, he said that Jewish correspondents would no longer be able to misrepresent the truth of Germany, because "millions have now seen it."

3 BRITISH CONSTABLES SLAIN IN NEW ARAB OUTBREAKS

JERUSALEM, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Three British constables and an Arab detective were slain today in fresh outbreaks of anti-Government and anti-Jewish violence marking the Arab general strike against Jewish immigration.

The constables were killed in a clash with an Arab band near Rosh Pina. The detective was killed by unidentified persons as he walked in Jerusalem's old city.

Ten Arab casualties were reported in a sharp engagement with troops and a squadron of planes near Nahariya. The planes joined the action when an Arab band attacked a police convoy. Two Palestine constables were wounded by Arab bullets and a third when the car in which they were riding overturned.

Troops demolished a house at Anabta, near which a section of the road had been mined by Arabs.

Arab marauders during the night uprooted 3,000 orange trees at Majdal.

Secrecy Veils Wauchope Parley With Arab Leaders

An atmosphere of secrecy shrouded an all-morning conference between High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope and two Arab leaders, former Jerusalem mayor Ragheb bey Nashashibi, and Auni bey Abdul Hadi, leader of the extremist Istiqlalist party who was recently released from the Government concentration camp at Sarafend.

The conference followed shortly after an interview between the High Commissioner and the Grand Mufti, Haj Amin el Hussein, in which the latter is reported to have been told that new elections were necessary for the Moslem Supreme Council, highest Arab religious body of which the Grand Mufti is president. Informed circles interpreted this as a warning to the Grand Mufti to discontinue his activities on the Arab Supreme Committee which is directing the sanguinary 21-week-old general strike.

To prevent a leakage, Sir Arthur barred an Arab interpreter at the all-morning conference with the two Arab leaders, using instead an English official from the Transjordan.

Meanwhile, a meeting of the Arab Supreme Committee to discuss the latest developments in the turbulent Palestine situation adjourned until the conclusion of Sir Arthur's conversations with Nashashibi and Abdul Hadi.

A stir was created in Jerusalem by charges that Arabs had made certain changes in the neighborhood of the Wailing Wall despite the decisions of Wailing Wall Commission, adopted following the 1929 anti-Jewish riots.

JEWISH AGENCY PREPARING NEW LABOR ENTRY SCHEDULE

JERUSALEM, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- It was learned today that the Jewish Agency for Palestine is preparing to file with the Government its semi-annual application for a labor immigration schedule covering the six-month period from October, 1936, to April, 1937.

MARTIAL LAW NOT YET DECIDED ON, COLONIAL OFFICE ORGAN SAYS

LONDON, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Martial law for Palestine has not yet been decided upon, Great Britain and the East, semi-official organ of the Colonial Office, will say in an editorial tomorrow:

The periodical draws an analogy between the Palestine situation and that which prevailed in the post-War Irish difficulties, declaring that martial law may be applied, as it was then, only in certain districts.

In such an event the civil administration of Palestine will not be entirely superseded, the magazine states.

It was disclosed that the following order-of-the-day has been issued by the commanding officer at the Aldershot barracks to troops departing for Palestine Saturday:

"Wishing you the best of luck during what I hope and believe will only be a short visit to Palestine."

3 ZIONISTS TO HEAD REICH CULTURAL LEAGUE

BERLIN, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- The official German news agency announced today that the authorities had endorsed a new executive to direct the activities of the Jewish Cultural League.

According to the agency, the executive will consist of Kurt Singer, Dr. Denno Cohen, Dr. Max Wiener, and Dr. Werner Levie. The three last-named are Zionists.

The announcement, since it does not mention the name of Dr. Georg Kareski who is nominal head of the League, seems to foreshadow his elimination. Dr. Kareski is leader of the State Zionist Party.

An article in Das Schwarze Korps, organ of Hitler's elite guards, biggerly attacks the Jewish Culture League and assails firms advertising in its theatrical publication.

SAYS "LOVE OF REICH, NOT HATRED OF JEWS" SPURRED ANTI-JEWISH LAWS

BERLIN, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Love of the German nation, not rancor against Jews, inspired passage of anti-Jewish legislation, it was declared today by Hans Frank, Reich minister without portfolio.

Replying to a question put to him by a visiting delegation of British lawyers, Herr Frank said:

"We issued our anti-Semitic laws not because we hated the Jews, but because we love the German nation."

SHOFAR TO BE HEARD FOR LAST TIME IN MANY GERMAN TOWNS

BERLIN, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- In hundreds of small German towns, the Shofar, or ram's horn, whose blasts have signalized the advent of the Jewish Holy Days for thousands of years, will be heard for the last time next week.

Accounts have reached the Central Jewish Organization here that many Jews all through the country are planning to leave homes where they have resided for generations.

In Altberun, upper Silesia, an exodus of 300 Jews who had remained, hopeful to the end, was reported. The Jewish community of Spriegau, also in Upper Silesia, was forced to sell its synagogue because after eighty years of uninterrupted services, insufficient Jews were left to compose a "minyah." The Holy Scrolls were given to a neighboring Jewish community.

ENDEK YOUTHS KILL AGED JEW IN POLISH TOWN

WARSAW, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- One Jew was dead this morning and several wounded as a result of rioting instigated by 100 young Endeks, anti-Semitic National Democrats, in Tykosin, a town near Bialystok.

Descending on Jewish shops and stalls, where they organized a picket-line, the Endeks fell upon the proprietors and Jewish passersby. Zelig Glitzman, 70, sexton of the local synagogue, died from the shock of injuries received.

A number of Endeks were arrested by municipal authorities. A delegation from the Jewish community immediately departed for Bialystok where they appealed for defense against future outbreaks.

REICH ZIONISTS PERMITTED TO STAGE DRIVE AGAINST PALESTINE ENTRY BAN

BERLIN, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Officials today granted the German Zionist Federation and the State Zionist Party permission to carry on a fortnight's campaign against possible suspension by Great Britain of Jewish immigration into Palestine.

MOBILIZATION OF BRITISH FORCES JUSTIFIED, N. Y. TIMES SAYS

NEW YORK, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- In an editorial entitled "Arab Terrorism Answered," the New York Times yesterday justified the mobilization of British troops for Palestine and impending declaration there of martial law.

"It is to be hoped," says the editorial, "that the military power of new regime will be exercised with wisdom and restraint, and have the desired effect of quelling the disorders."

"For peace and cooperation between Jew and Arab in the common task of rebuilding Palestine depend chiefly on Britain's showing unmistakably its determination to maintain its obligations under the Balfour Declaration."

Reviewing the five months of disorders in the Holy Land, the Times declares:

"If conciliation short of surrender on the vital issue of immigration would have ended the present conflict in Palestine, peace would have been achieved under the liberal and just administration of the present High Commissioner."

In discussing appointment of a Royal Commission of inquiry by the British Government, the Times points out that although Jews declared they would cooperate with that body, Arabs "insisted that not until the doors had been closed against Jewish immigrants would they discontinue their strike and agitation."

LONDON TIMES LAUDS DECISION TO SEND REINFORCEMENTS

LONDON, Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Voicing approval of the Government's decision to send more troops to Palestine, an editorial in the Times today points out that restoration of order is only a preliminary to enable the Royal Commission to start its investigation.

Police measures, the Times declares, will not solve the Arab problem and suspension of immigration would only result in further complications.

Stating the Government is equally responsible for the present situation in the Holy Land, the editorial urges the Royal Commission to investigate current administration methods, and expresses the hope that it will find remedial measures which may be studied by the Government in a constructive and impartial spirit.

LONDON CALLS ON AMERICAN LEGION TO FIGHT RACIAL ANTAGONISM

WICHITA, Kan., Sept. 9. (JTA) -- Making his first public reference to racial agitation in the current political campaign, Governor Alfred M. Landon yesterday urged members of the American Legion to combat any attempts to "stir up racial antagonism."

In his Labor Day address before the State convention of the American Legion, the Republican presidential candidate pleaded for racial tolerance and called upon legionnaires to fight for preservation of American freedom, with special stress on freedom of expression.

"It ought not to be necessary," said the Governor, "to stress tolerance in America. We have a great tradition of tolerance growing out of the fundamentals of our past. Our forebears came of different stocks, different religions. Men of every nation, every clime, united in building this country.

"Protestants, Catholics, Jews worked here side by side, good neighbors, good citizens. No other nation has such a background.

"But of late there has been disquieting evidence of attempts to stir up racial antagonisms. This is due in part, I suppose, to the influence of the persecuting spirit that has broken out in certain regions in Europe. In part, I suspect, it is due to what we call 'pure orneriness', of which we all have a share.

"This fomenting of racial feeling is not serious as yet. It would be tragic if it should become serious."
