BILL TO CURB RIOTS ANNOUNCED BY KING EDWARD IN THRONE SPEECH

LONDON, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- King Edward VIII, in his speech from the throne opening the new session of Parliament today, announced the Cabinet will present a bill "to deal more effectively with persons and organizations who provoke or cause disturbances of public peace." He said the measure would not interfere with "legitimate freedom of speech or assembly."

"My Ministers have come to the conclusion," he declared, "that the existing law requires amendment in order to deal more effectively with persons and organizations who provoke or cause disturbances of the public peace. A bill for strengthening the law without interfering with legitimate freedom of speech or assembly will be submitted to you."

King Edward expressed deep regrets at the recent Palestine disorders and welcomed the "recent improvement in the situation."

Referring to the scheduled departure Thursday of the Royal Commission to investigate the underlying causes of the disorders, the monarch said:

"I sincerely trust that their examination of the very difficult problems which will come before them will lead to a just and permanent settlement."

Following King Edward's address Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin voiced the belief in the House of Commons that the public order bill would "go very far" toward discouraging disturbances arising from Jew-baiting in London's East End.

Mr. Baldwin spoke in reply to the opposition's address to King Edward's speech by Clement R. Attlee, Laborite whip, in which Mr. Attlee demanded the Government deal with disturbances caused by various uniformed groups.

Mr. Attlee charged the peace had been deliberately broken "by one ambitious person." Obviously referring to Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of the British Blackshirts, he expressed the hope that steps would be taken to deal with the "arch disturber" and not merely with his "gulls and hirelings."

DISORDERS FLARE IN PALESTINE; ARAB YOUTHS TO ACT IN LAND SALES

JERUSALEM, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- Arab disorders were resumed in several parts of Palestine today after a lapse following termination three weeks ago of the six-month Arab general strike against Jewish immigration and the Government.

Jewish lorries found the road blockaded near Anebtta, scene of a number of heavy engagements between British troops and Arab rebels. Roads between Mishmar Haemek and Jenin were also blockaded. As the trucks approached the barriers they were fired on by snipers hidden in the surrounding hills. No casualties were reported.

A woman was injured by a bomb explosion in an Arab house in Jaffa. Police discovered a revolver and a large store of ammunition. The landlord was arrested.

Young Arab Nationalists were reported preparing to form picket lines in an effort to prevent transfers of land sold by Arab landowners to Jews. Sale of land to Jews was one of the factors in the recent Arab general strike, leaders of which demanded a Government ban on it together with stoppage of Jewish immigration.

Representatives of Arab youth organizations, at a joint meeting with Arab notables, are reported to have reproached the elders for having sold land to the Jews. The elders are said to have replied that the crisis compelled them to sell.

1 KILLED, 20 WOUNDED IN RUMANIAN CLASH

BUCHAREST, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- One person was killed and twenty others injured in a clash yesterday between members of the anti-Semitic National Christian Party and adherents of the democratic National Peasants Party in the town of Vaslui.

General Gabriel Negrei, a member of the Peasants Party, was arrested and charged with firing the fatal shot. Gen. Negrei, who has been an ardent supporter of the democratic cause since his retirement from the army, said he fired in self defense when attacked.

Following the clash, anti-Semites demonstrated in Jassy, slightly injuring several Jews.

14 POLISH RIOTERS JAILED AFTER ANTI-SEMITIC OUTBREAK

WARSAW, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- Police brought 14 anti-Semitic rioters in chains to a Lomza jail today following an anti-Jewish outbreak in the township of Zombrow during which the local police were overpowered and many Jews injured.

One Jewish shop was completely destroyed by the rioters during the disturbances and a number of homes badly damaged. Police reinforcements from Lomza finally restored order.

Members of the outlawed National Radical Party staged anti-Jewish attacks in the township of Suchota, in East Galicia, newspapers reported today.

POLISH RABBIS SEEK POSTPONEMENT OF SHECHITA LAW

WARSAW, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- A conference of rabbis has decided to send a delegation to General Rydz-Smigly, virtual dictator of Poland, seeking postponement of the law restricting kosher slaughtering, which is scheduled to go into effect throughout the country on Jan. 1, 1937.

PROPERTY TRANSFERS BETWEEN REICH JEWS, "ARYANS" ABROAD RISE

BERLIN, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- Chancellor Hitler's Voelkischer Beobachter, chief Nazi Party organ, reported yesterday that the transfer of Jewish property to "Aryans" was increasing.

Jewish aliens especially are disposing of property in the Reich by exchanging it for property owned abroad by Germans, the paper said, and this system of exchange has become most popular for property situated in Polish Silesia.

Germans living in Polish Silesia are exchanging property with Polish Jews residing in Germany, the Beobachter declared.

DR. H. H. BOAS NAMED HEAD OF AMSTERDAM APPEALS COURT

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- Dr. H. H. Boas, for twenty years judge of the District Court, has been appointed Chief Justice of the Amsterdam Court of Appeals by Queen Wilhelmina.

250,000 BERLIN RESIDENTS OF JEWISH ORIGIN

BERLIN, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- City statistics issued today revealed there are still 250,000 persons of Jewish origin resident in Berlin, the Havas News Agency reported.

It was also announced that there are 90,000 practicing Jews and 40,000 listed as non-practicing.

COUGHLIN TO CHAMPION "MINORITY JEWS," HE TELLS PRESS

NEW YORK, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- Denying he had ever assailed Jews, as reported in recent newspaper headlines, Father Coughlin told newspaper reporters in an interview yesterday that his National Union for Social Justice will some day "protect the minority Jews."

Admitting, however, that he had been correctly quoted as "challenging" Jews to abandon the "eye for an eye" philosophy, he added:

"Someday the Jews will be glad to have me here to protect them from the Hitler philosophy in Washington today. When they need help they will find the National Union for Social Justice ready to protect the minority Jews."

Father Coughlin displayed a telegram from Bishop Gallagher of Detroit denying he had said, as reported yesterday, that after the election no priests in his diocese would be permitted to engage in politics.

TO PROTEST NAZI HINTS AT BRITISH RESPONSIBILITY FOR REICH'S PLIGHT

LONDON, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- Sir Eric Phipps, British Ambassador to Germany, has been instructed to tell Reich foreign officials that Britain "cannot accept" implications its policy was responsible for hardships endured by the German people, informed sources here said today, according to the Havas News Agency.

The implications were contained in recent speeches by Gen. Hermann Wilhelm Goering, Reich Economics Chief, and Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels.

Sir Eric went to the Wilhelmstrasse today, reportedly to make friendly representations to foreign officials concerning the speeches.

DANZIG SENATE PROMISES TO PUNISH ASSAILANTS OF POLES

FREE CITY OF DANZIG, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- All steps will be taken to punish Nazis who assault Polish citizens here, a member of the Free City Senate tonight promised Casimir Papee, Polish High Commissioner to Danzig, the Havas News Agency reported.

The pledge followed a demand by Papee for investigation of an alleged attack on several Polish nations by uniformed Nazis last Friday.

Danziger Volksstimme, Socialist organ, was suspended for six months tonight by the Government and its director, Anton Foolken arrested. The printing presses and all apparatus was seized.

ROYAL COMMISSION TO STAY AT KING DAVID HOTEL

LONDON, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- The Royal Commission, which is scheduled to leave Thursday to investigate underlying causes of the Palestine disorders, will make its headquarters at the King David Hotel in Jerusalem, it was learned today. The first meeting of the commission will be public, with following sessions private. High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, and Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, are expected to be among the first witnesses heard.

BAN ON PALESTINE TOURIST VISAS LIFTED

LONDON, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- The Colonial Office announced today rescinding of the ban on tourists to Palestine, in effect since early in October as a precautionary measure resulting from the unsettled condition of the Holy Land.

LATEST LONDON BULLETINBaldwin Urges Action to Preserve Tolerance

LONDON, Nov. 3. (JTA) -- Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, urging the House of Commons to help shape the public order bill referred to in King Edward's speech this morning opening the new session of Parliament, made a strong plea today for action to preserve tolerance.

"All British citizens," he declared, "without distinction are entitled to carry on lawful occupations without fear of violence and intimidation. Respecting law and order themselves, they are entitled to the protection that accompanies law and order. We will not tolerate for a moment intimidation of any parties in this country." The declaration was greeted with cheers.
