EQUALITY FOR ALL EMIGRANTS URGED BY WORLD LABOR BODY

GENEVA, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- The principle of equality for all emigrants was embodied in two resolutions adopted by the migration committee of the International Labor Office at its closing session today. The resolutions were offered by delegates representing Poland and Japan.

The I.L.O. was asked by the committee to initiate a study of all problems connected with the various migration proposals presented by delegates to the conference. It was also recommended that the director of the I.L.O. be empowered to prepare a memorandum covering all points.

An international commission of experts to study emigration needs and possibilities to relieve European countries of surplus population was proposed last night by Titus Komarnicki, of Poland. The project was strongly criticized by delegates.

The committee adopted a proposal by M. Le Coq of Belgium that the I.L.O. obtain data on emigration by correspondence with experts.

It was noted that Poland did not directly refer to Jewish emigration, although one of the major questions scheduled for discussion was believed to be Poland's demand, voiced at the last League of Nations session, for aid in expatriating 80,000 Jews annually.

It is believed now in informed circles that strenuous objections to the project by Jewish organizations, on the grounds that singling out Jews for expatriation was contrary to the principle of equality professed by the Polish Government, caused Poland to revise her plans.

EVACUATION OF BRITISH TROOPS IN PALESTINE TO CONTINUE

LONDON, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- British military reinforcements will continue to be evacuated from Palestine, where they had been sent to quell Arab disorders, it was revealed in the House of Commons today.

Replying to a query by William Gallacher, Communist, War Minister Sir Alfred Duff-Cooper stated an order has been issued for the withdrawal of the Fifth Division. He declared further withdrawals depend on the situation in the Holy Land. Evacuation of the British forces started Nov. 7 when a contingent of 2,900 reservists left Haifa on the liner Laurentic.

Laughter greeted a query by Col. Josiah Wedgwood, pro-Zionist Laborite, on whether Palestine is being governed by the Arab Supreme Committee, the rulers of neighboring Moslem countries, High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope or Lieut. Gen. J.G. Dill. The question drew no reply.

WAUCHOPE CONTINUES TESTIMONY; OPEN SESSION SET FOR TODAY

JERUSALEM, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope continued his testimony before this morning's session of the British Royal Commission which is investigating six months of Arab disorders. Sir Arthur was the sole witness heard by the six commissioners yesterday when the investigation officially opened with a secret session.

An open meeting of the commission will be held tomorrow, with Eric Mills, Immigration Director, and Col. George W. Heron, of the Advisory Council, the chief witnesses.

MOSLEY MEETING BANNED BY BRITISH CITY

LONDON, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- The Bedford Borough Council banned today a meeting of the British Union of Fascists scheduled for next Friday at the Town Hall. Sir Oswald Mosley, Blackshirt leader, was to have been the principal speaker.

The House of Commons last night passed ~~of~~ second reading a public order bill prohibiting semi-military organizations such as Sir Oswald's.

WICKHAM STEED ASSAILS BRITONS WHO EXTOL NAZISM

LONDON, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- Scathing denunciation of dictatorship, which "regards freedom lightly if not as evil in itself," was voiced last night by Wickham Steed, former editor of The Times, delivering the third annual Lucien Wolf Memorial Lecture.

He caustically criticized British liberals and newspaper proprietors who visit Germany to harken to its leaders and return to extol Nazism, "forgetting the crimes for which these leaders are responsible."

Characterizing dictators as "refugees from reality" seeking to escape from critical thought through uniformity and "shirtiness," Mr. Steed assailed Nazi exponents for putting folk thought before individual thought.

They hold out "the behavior of a flock of sheep or a herd of swine as an ideal towards which mankind should strive," he asserted, "provided always that there be acting sheep-dogs under an all-powerful shepherd or schweinhund (swine-dog) under a supreme swinesherd to make the flock or herd likeminded."

14 WHO TRIED "MARCH TO PALESTINE," TO STAND TRIAL

WARSAW, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- The authorities today released William Ryppel, a Warsaw Zionist attorney who organized yesterday's abortive "March to Palestine," and thirteen of his followers. They will be tried soon on charges of forming an illicit organization, illegally wearing uniforms and resisting the police.

The march, in which 150 Jewish youths of 1,000 enrolled originally participated, ended a few hours after it started when a police detachment dispersed it 25 miles out of Warsaw. Fourteen of the marchers suffered injuries when the police charged them with batons upon their refusal to obey repeated orders to turn back to Warsaw. The youths had no passports to Palestine.

GUSTLOFF CASE SEEN AS SPRINGBOARD FOR NEW NAZI REPRESSIONS

BERLIN, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- Jewish leaders expressed fears today that the Government would enact new anti-Jewish measures immediately after next month's trial of David Frankfurter, Jewish medical student, for the assassination of Wilhelm Gustloff, Nazi leader in Switzerland.

Violent anti-Semitic utterances voiced at a conference of Nazi officials and district leaders, and a vigorous anti-Jewish campaign being waged by the official Nazi press under reported orders of the Propaganda Ministry were cited in support of the belief.

Intervention of the League to Combat Anti-Semitism in behalf of Frankfurter was deplored by some Jewish leaders on the ground that the resentment over it in the Reich might lead to its use as justification for new anti-Jewish restrictions.

The new measures, it was reported, would not be restricted to propaganda activities, but might embrace new discriminations demanded by Julius Streicher, Germany's arch anti-Semite, and other Nazi Party extremists.

Nazi leaders, meeting in the third day of a seven-day conference to plan a program for the coming few months, heard Dr. Otto Dietrich, the Nazi Party's Reich Press Chief, describe the changes in the German press since Jews were ousted from it.

Propaganda Minister Goebbels's paper, Der Angriff, continuing anti-Jewish agitation in connection with the Frankfurter case, charged that "Moscow and world Jewry are making intensive preparations for the defense of Frankfurter."

The paper asserted that Dr. Felix Loria, attorney of Bruenn, Czechoslovakia, had received 5,000 Swiss francs from the Soviet legation in Praha for the Jewish medical student's defense and that Jewish industrialists and representatives of the League to Combat Anti-Semitism had conferred in Bruenn on appointment of an executive body to conduct an offensive against Germany in connection with the case.

NAZI AGENT, HURT IN RUMANIAN RIOT, HAILED AS HERO IN BERLIN

BERLIN, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- A hero's welcome was given at the Berlin railway station today to Heinrich Zersaff, a Nazi student stabbed in a brawl in Czernowitz, Rumania, while cooperating with the anti-Semitic Iron Guard there as a Nazi agent.

Prince Schaumburg Lippe headed a Propaganda Ministry delegation of welcome. Speeches described Zersaff's assailants as "Jewish Bolshevik elements" and the student was called a "victim of the fight for Nazi principles."

RABBI ZAHARI OF YEMEN, DIES AT 55

JERUSALEM, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- Rabbi Shalom Ben-Zion Zahari, one of the most prominent rabbis of Yemen, southern Arabia, and head of the Jewish Community of Radahe, died today. He was 55 years old.

INDIAN MOSLEMS ASK BOYCOTT OF CORONATION FETE IN PROTEST ON PALESTINE

DELHI, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- India's Moslem millions were called upon tonight to boycott the colorful Durbar ceremonies to be held at Delhi next year following King Edward VIII's coronation in London, the Havas News Agency reported.

The resolution was adopted by the Moslem "Congress of Palestine" here as a protest against Britain's policy in the Holy Land. The delegates expressed intense hostility toward any immigration of Jews into Palestine.

JEWISH BANKER COMMITS SUICIDE IN REICH JAIL; HELD AS TAX DODGER

HAMBURG (JTA) -- Max Nathan, a well-known Hamburg Jewish banker, committed suicide in a jail here, where he had been held on tax charges, the German press reports.

Nathan was arrested in the Hamburg railway station when he returned from Marienbad.

According to the press, police who searched Nathan's home discovered a treasure-chest concealed in the garden containing gold, jewelry and currency to the value of 250,000 marks.

Following Nathan's suicide, his son was arrested charged with aiding his father to conceal assets, as well as with high treason.

Existing laws in Germany do not restrict the amount of gold and jewelry any individual is allowed to possess.

MME. HARAND, CHAMPION OF JEWISH RIGHTS, ARRIVES FOR U.S. TOUR

NEW YORK, Nov. 17. (JTA) -- Mme. Irene Harand, editor of the Vienna newspaper, Gerechtigkeits, arrived here today on the Queen Mary for a visit in the United States of about five weeks to seek support for her world movement against race hatred.

She said that while the Austrian Jews were not quite contented, their situation was not as bad as has been pictured.

FIGURES CITE ARAB BENEFITS OF JEWISH INFLUX TO PALESTINE

NEW YORK, Nov. 16. (JTA) -- A statistical analysis designed to show Arab benefits from Jewish immigration to Palestine has been issued by the United Palestine Appeal in connection with the hearings of the Royal Commission inquiring into recent disorders in the Holy Land.

Figures are presented to show that health conditions have improved, the Arab population has increased 462,000 in 14 years, indebtedness of Arab agricultural cultivators dropped 60 per cent in six years and Arabs have received employment in expanding industries, notably citrus raising.
