REICH TEXTBOOK TELLS TEACHERS HOW TO TEACH JEWISH QUESTION

BERLIN, Jan 15. (JTA)--A textbook for teachers on how to teach the Jewish question in German schools has been published here, it was learned today. The author is Ernest Dobers, a professor at the Teachers' College.

In a preface, Prof. Dobers points out that it is inadvisable to treat the Jewish question apart from other subjects, but shows how by skilful handling it can be introduced into virtually any lesson.

Prof. Dobers recommends free use of both the Volkischer Beobachter, chief Nazi organ, and the Stuermer, anti-Semitic pornographic weekly published by Julius Streicher, Germany's high priest of anti-Semitism. He regretfully admits, however, that it is unwise to put the Streicher publication in the hands of children under fourteen.

The book quotes liberally from Nazi newspaper stories and editorials on the Jews.

A somewhat similar book has been published by Dietrich Klagges, premier of Brunswick province. Concerned with the teaching of history, the book contains anti-Semitic maxims as an outline for courses in that subject.

FRANKFURTER MAY BE PERMITTED TO SPEND TERM IN SANATORIUM

GENEVA, Jan. 15. (JTA)--The authorities are likely to decide that David Frankfurter, convicted of murdering Wilhelm Gustloff, Nazi leader, may spend his 18-year term in a sanatorium rather than in prison, it was reported here tonight. The 27-year-old former medical student is suffering from tuberculosis of the bone.

POLISH SOCIALIST STUDENTS JOIN JEWS IN "STAND-UP" STRIKE

WARSAW, Jan. 15. (JTA)--Polish Socialist students joined Jewish classmates today in their "stand-up" strike at Warsaw University against assignment of the Jewish students to "ghetto" benches in classrooms.

Rather than occupy the benches, which had been plastered with yellow handbills by anti-Semitic Nationalists, the Jewish students yesterday elected to stand during lectures.

The "stand-up" strike spread from Warsaw University to other schools in Poland where efforts are being made to enforce segregation of Jewish students.

Disorders arising from the segregation efforts resulted in injuries yesterday to a Jewish student in the Warsaw University medical school.

Two students were sentenced to eight months imprisonment each for participating in disorders, but execution of the sentences was postponed for five years.

Shops Wrecked, Jews Flee Polish Town

WARSAW, Jan. 15. (JTA)--Anti-Semitic gangs today raided the township of Piekuti, in the Nowominsk region, wrecked every Jewish shop, smashed windows of Jewish homes and forced the town's entire Jewish population to flee. None of the gangsters, who came from neighboring villages, was arrested.

SIR ROBERT WALEY COHEN SAILS JAN. 20 FOR WEEK'S VISIT HERE

LONDON, Jan. 15. (JTA)--Sir Robert Waley Cohen, prominent British Jewish leader, announced today he is sailing Jan. 20 on the Aquitania for a week's stay in the United States.

The purpose of the visit was explained as "to renew acquaintance with American friends and discuss certain Jewish problems of mutual interest."

During his stay, Sir Robert is scheduled to address the fourth annual assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds in Philadelphia.

Sir Robert is chairman of the Economic Board for Palestine and the Palestine Corporation. He is managing director of the Shell Transport and Trading Co.

CONCERN OVER POLISH JEWRY'S SITUATION VOICED IN LONDON

LONDON, Jan. 15. (JTA)--The Joint Foreign Committee at a meeting today expressed grave concern at reports coming from "most authoritative sources" regarding the progressing economic depression of Polish Jewry.

The committee disclosed it is considering the situation with organizations here and abroad from the ameliorative viewpoint.

Considerable anxiety has been aroused, it was stated, by the renewed agitation in the Polish Parliament for Jewish mass emigration and particularly over the statement by Boguslaw Miodzinski, vice-president of the Sejm, that Poland has room for only 50,000 Jews.

BOARD OF DEPUTIES AIRS ITALIAN ATTITUDE ON JEWS

LONDON, Jan. 15. (JTA)--The Board of Deputies of British Jews at a meeting today declared that the flogging of two Tripoli Jewish merchants coupled with anti-Jewish articles in the Italian press has given rise to apprehension that Italy is departing from its tradition of tolerant treatment of Jews and is beginning to emulate the Nazis.

The board voiced the hope that the difficulty in Tripoli, arising from refusal to obey a Sabbath opening ordinance, and the exacerbation of feeling resulting therefrom, would shortly disappear.

FRANCE TO OUTLINE POLICY ON ENTRY OF JEWS TO COLONIES

LONDON, Jan. 15. (JTA)--The French Government will shortly issue an important statement of policy regarding admission of Jews to French colonies, it was reported here tonight.

RABBI HERZOG GETS NOMINATION PAPERS AT JERUSALEM CEREMONY

JERUSALEM, Jan. 15. (JTA)--Dr. Isaac Herzog, who arrived from Ireland yesterday to assume the post of Chief Rabbi of the Ashkenazic Jewish Community, received his nomination papers at an impressive ceremony here today.

Among those making formal addresses of welcome were M. M. Ussishkin, world president of the Jewish National Fund; Moshe Shertok, head of the political department of the Jewish Agency for Palestine; Rabbi Meier Berlin, of the Mizrachi Organization, and Isaac Ben Zvi, of the Jewish National Council.

Dr. Herzog, formerly Chief Rabbi of the Irish Free State, succeeds the late Abraham I. HaCohen Kook in the post.

J.N.F. PETES AMERICAN JEWISH LABOR DELEGATION

JERUSALEM, Jan. 15. (JTA)--A dologation of American Jewish labor leaders was warmly greeted today at a reception by the Jewish National Fund. Speakers included M. M. Ussishkin, world president of the Fund; Isadore Naglor and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Schlossberg, for the delogation.

JEWISH DEPUTIES BACK SO. AFRICAN ENTRY QUOTA BILL

CAPE TOWN, Union of So. Africa, Jan. 15. (JTA)--Jewish deputies of the South African Parliament announced today they will vote for the Government's bill establishing immigration quotas for all except British-born persons.

BRAZIL BARS 16 REICH REFUGEES ON TOURIST VISAS

SAO PAULO, Brazil. JAN. 15. (JTA)--Sixteen Jewish refugees from Germany who arrived here on tourist visas were today refused admittance into the country. Seven others were arrested in Sao Paulo on information furnished the authorities by reputed Nazi groups, but were later released.

The sixteen refugees arrived on the Campana. Jewish groups here, intervening in behalf of the Jewish exiles, expressed hope that their status would be legalized and said that Government circles were favorable.

Brazil Ponders Ban on Nazis

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 15. (JTA)--Chancellor Hitler's reported meeting with Hans Henning, Brazil's Nazi leader, brought a demand from the Chamber of Deputies last night for a Government decision as to whether foreign political groups should be permitted if they operate under orders issued in their native countries, the Havas News Agency reported.

The Government was asked first to ascertain whether Henning acutally had conferred with the Fuehrer. With this in mind, the Government was asked whether Nazism was to be recognized in Brazil.

BOMBINGS, EXCESSES SPREAD TERROR IN BUCOVINA

BUCHAREST, Jan. 15. (JTA)--Anti-Jewish excesses in the Bucovina district accompanied by bombings, spread terror today among the Jewish population and resulted in several injuries.

Several Jewish houses were bombed by Nationalists in Albori near Sucava, causing considerable property damage, but no injuries were reported. Jewish houses in Straca and Brodina, near Radauti, were demolished and their inhabitants beaten.

Members of Prof. Alexander Cuza's anti-Semitic party in the village of Stratauti gave local Jews an ultimatum to leave the district within five days or be killed.

BUDAPEST COMMUNITY ADOPTS \$1,120,000 BUDGET

BUDAPEST, Jan. 15. (JTA)--The annual conference of the Budapest Jewish community adopted today a 4,300,000-pengo (about \$1,120,000) budget for 1937 after its president had declared that despite difficult conditions, the community intended to expand its work.

Samuel Sorn, president, said there was no reason to fear that the Hungarian Jews were in danger of the persecutions facing Jews in other Central European countries. The expansion program, he said, would include erection of new hospital buildings and a new synagogue, and intensification of religious education.

He protested against Zionist propaganda in Hungary "because it is liable to provoke separatist aspirations".

IMPROVEMENT OF REFORM SERVICES URGED AT SYNAGOGUE CONVENTION

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 15. (JTA)--More than five hundred lay and religious leaders from various parts of the country, meeting here at the opening session of the 35th council of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, heard speakers at a worship discussion this afternoon agree that drastic steps must be taken to improve the services of the Reform synagogue.

Albert F. Mocklenburger, of Chicago, presiding at the session, said that "our rabbis have become preachers rather than teachers." Dr. Louis Witt, Dayton, emphasized the importance of prayer. He stressed the threefold objective of translating prayer into symbol and ceremonial, putting more worship into the home and creating a literature of prayer for private and daily use.

Dr. Jacob Singer, Chicago, speaking on "The Music of Our Worship," said that "we must recondition our people to an understanding and love for their own music." Oscar Steiner, Cleveland, said that the synagogue service must offer greater eye and ear appeal. Rabbi Irving Reichert, San Francisco, declaring that "most of the preaching being done in America today is appallingly mediocre," asked that preachers be freed from many extraneous and energy consuming tasks.

The convention, which will comprise five days of discussion meetings, round tables, business meetings and social events, was opened this morning by Jacob W. Mack, chairman of the union's executive board, who welcomed the delegates and delivered the opening message.

The council is meeting at the Hotel Roosevelt jointly with the twelfth biennial assembly of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods and the seventh biennial convention of the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods. All participated in this afternoon's session. Sabbath services were scheduled at Sinai Synagogue this evening, with Rabbi Edgar F. Magnin, Los Angeles, preaching.

Samuel B. Finkel, president of the Brotherhoods, in a message to the convention said that "Reformed Judaism must become a vital part of the lives of its adherents." He advocated a mood of critical self-analysis and scored attempts to make the Jewish religion conform to the supposed needs of the Jew in the modern world.

Criticizing attempts to bring religion to the level of the masses instead of bringing the masses to the level of religion, he said:

"There may be new models of automobiles, but there cannot be new models of religion. We do not want any Father Coughlins in our rabbinate. If there is to be any fist-shaking, let it be in the cause of religion."

CANCER RESEARCH PRESSED AT HEBREW UNIVERSITY

JERUSALEM, (JTA)--Tumors are being produced in animals and human tissues kept alive permanently outside the body as medical minds of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus probe the elusive problem of cancer.

With an anonymous contribution made in 1935, the university has established departments of Radiology and of Experimental Pathology, with modern apparatus, now housed in the Nathan Straus Health Center. They will be moved to the Hadassah-Rothschild-University Medical Centre as soon as it is completed.

Using a special X-ray apparatus which permits rays of varying wavelengths to be produced in exceptionally powerful doses, research scientists produce tumors in animals. The Radiology Department, paradoxically enough, is also experimenting to find the possibilities of curing tumors with rays.

While the Radiology Department treats animals with cancer-producing substances, the Experimental Pathology Department studies the intricate processes of cell division.

Its experiments are based on a new method known as "tissue culture", whereby cells and tissues from human beings and animals are kept alive permanently outside the body. Colonies of normal and malignant cells growing independently are subjected to detailed analysis.
