RUMANIA TO BAN NAZI MEDDLING IN INTERNAL AFFAIRS

BUCHAREST, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- Premier Georg Tatarescu announced in Parliament today, following a conference with King Carol, that Rumania will no longer tolerate foreign Nazi and Fascist interference in her internal affairs.

The announcement was directed at diplomats from Germany, Italy, Japan, Portugal and the Spanish Rebel government for their participation in a funeral procession on Feb. 11 in Bucharest for two membors of the anti-Semitic Iron Guard killed while serving in the Spanish Rebel army.

Their participation, it was asserted, was considered a breach of diplomatic etiquette serving to encourage stronger activities on the part of the Iron Guard.

Political circles predicted that the Gorman and Italian ministers, and possibly the Portuguese as well, may all be recalled shortly from Bucharost, according to the Havas News Agency.

Promior Tataroscu, in his announcement to Parliament, said an inquiry had been opened into the act of the diplomats and declared that the coromony was contrary to all international and diplomatic usage, since the funeral was transformed, in effect, into a political domonstration.

Reports abroad that the Premier had handed in his resignation following a dispute over internal policy within the Government were formally and officially denied, according to Havas.

PLAN MEASURES TO ENFORCE JOBS SHAKE-OUT OF JEWS IN RUMANIA

BUCHAREST, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- Stringent Government measures will be taken against banks and large enterprises failing to comply with a

Ministry of Labor request that they reshuffle their personnel so as to have 60 per cent of the employes "of Rumanian ethnic origin," it was learned today. In its application, the request means elimination of Jewish employes and replacement by non-Jews.

The measures will make it impossible for such enterprises to discount their bills at the National Bank of Rumania, ban export and import permits and increase income taxes.

According to information obtained by a special Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent; these measures will be applied not only to non-Jewish enterprises, but to Jewish concerns as well.

JEWISH LAWYERS EJECTED FROM BUCHAREST COURT; PICKETS BAR ENTRY

BUCHAREST, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- Jewish lawyers were assaulted today in the Law Court Building, ejected and warned by anti-Semites never again to set foot in the court. Pickets were stationed by anti-Semitic layyers in front of the building to prevent Jews from entering.

WILNO UNIVERSITY INTRODUCES "GHETTO" RESTRICTIONS

WILNO, Foland, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- Surrendering to Endek demands, Wilno University authorities today quietly introduced virtual "ghetto" regulations for Jewish students. Under orders, professors began indivaidually to assign special places in classrooms to Jewish students. Jewish medical students are being permitted use of laboratories only on special days.

No official announcement of the new regulations had been made, presumably to avoid the charge that a student "ghetto" was being introduced. Refusal to occupy seats individually assigned them would mean a year's suspension for the Jewish students if not permanent expulsion.

A "ghetto" for Jewish cab drivers was demanded in a resolution adopted at a meeting of Polish cab men. The Mayor of Wilno will be asked to assign special stations to the Jewish cabbles and to force them to wear yellow license tags.

An ordinance was enacted forbidding treatment of non-Jewish patients at Jewish hospitals but permitting non-Jewish hospitals to treat Jewish patients. Simultaneously three Jewish staff physicians were dismissed by the St. Jacobs Hospital.

Jewish Deputies Urged to Quit Sejm

LWOW, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- Withdrawal of Jewish deputies from Farliament in protest against the treatment of Jews in Poland was demanded today by speakers at the fourteenth conference of the East Galician Zionist Federation. JERUSALEM, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- A quantity of bombs, arms and ammunition were discovered today by police searching the premises of an Arab political committee.

Assistance to the police in stamping out mounting terrorism in Northern Palestine was offered by an Arab delegation which called on District Commissioner Edward Keith-Roach in Haifa,

DR. KAHN OUTLINES J.D.C. AIMS FOR POLISH-JEWISH AID

PARTS, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- In an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today, Dr. Bernhard Kahn, European director of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, outlined the broad principles along which the relief organization will continue and expand its efforts on behalf of Polish Jewry.

Returned from a survey of the situation in Poland, during which he conferred with local Jewish leaders and organizations, he declared:

"The Joint Distribution Committee and all of American Jewry are deeply distressed over the plight of the Polish Jews, as I convinced myself during my recent American visit.

"The Joint for more than twenty years has been working closely with Jewish organizations in Poland. Different from other organizations, whose cooperation the Joint will welcome, the Joint is faced with the task, as a result of its work hitherto, to continue and to maintain all that it created, supported and developed in Poland with the sacrificial assistance of the Polish Jews themselves. Also, to considerably expand the scope of work of all existing organizations doing social, cultural and economic work, such as youth education productivization of the younger generation, protection of health, credit relief in every form and all constructive relief activities.

"The Joint cannot overlook new organizations conducting such activities, which it built through protracted labor and which won great importance in the life of Polish Jews.

"In addition, the Joint makes it its aim to seek ways and means, together with all existing economic organizations and interested Jewish personalities, for finding new economic existences, though in moderate proportion, for those Jewish masses who have lost their economic positions, and also to strengthen the weakened existences.

"Without going into details, I can only say that in addition to existing activities, which will be expanded, a large part of the Joint's funds will be devoted to such economic strengthening of the Jewish masses.

"In carrying out this task, we shall seek the cooperation of Jewish social and economic forces, which we found during our previous work, for example, the 130,000 members of the Free Loan Kassas, also the forces represented in TCZ (Jewish health society) and others grouped around our work,

"We hope to find in these economic activities, also, practical workers as well as interested circles through whom and with whom we can work. Provious conversations in Poland have strongthened this hope; similarly, forthcoming numerous conversations with Jewish personalities and organizations will undoubtedly produce the same results."

NEW JEWISH LEGION URGED FOR DEFENCE AGAINST RIOTS

LONDON, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- A new Jewish Legion for defence against Palestine rioting was urged last night by speakers at a dinner marking the twentieth anniversary of the establishment of the international Jewish battalion which aided Great Britain in the wartime campaign in the Holy Land.

A warning that a Jewish national home without adequate defence was merely a "national death trap" was given by Colonel J.H. Patterson, who commanded the wartime Jewish Legion. Leopold S. Amery, former Colonial Secretary, asserted that the Jewish national home in Palestine could not be regarded as a home unless those living there played a part in its defence.

Another Jewish Legion, with the British troops and Jewish police, could have suppressed the recent disorders in a month, doclared Col. Josiah Wedgwood, Laborito Member of Parliament. He added that order could have been restored if it had been willed.

Vladimir Jabotinsky, president of the New Zionist Organization, offered a round-table conference to iron out internal differences among Zionist groups.

BIRO-BIDJAN LEADERS REPORTED SEIZED AS ANTI-SOVIET PLOTTERS

LONDON, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- The Daily Telegraph reported today from Moscow that many Jewish Communist Party chiefs in the Jewish autonomous region of Biro-Bidjan have been arrested on charges of anti-Soviet activities.

Those arrested were said to include Michael Katell, president of the region's executive; Prof. Joseph Liberberg, former president, removed as a Trotskyist and counter-revolutionary, and M. Hubermann.

They were charged with fomenting Jewish nationalism and sabotaging Jewish immigration from European countries into Biro-Bidjan, the report said.

PROBE ASKED IN NATIONAL GUARD AD FOR GERMAN RECRUITS

NEW YORK, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- The Jewish War Veterans of the United States today asked Governor Lehman and Captain Joseph D. Curran, in charge of Battery D, 244th Artillery of the New York National Guard, for an investigation into an advertisement published in a local Nazi paper asking for German recruits.

The ad appeared in the Deutscher Weckruf and Beobachter, organ of the Amerika-Deutschen Volksbund and the Deutschen Konsum Verband. It asked for "young German men" who are citizens or have first papers to join the artillery battery.

Captain Curran said the publication of the ad in the Nazi paper was a mistake, but disclaimed knowledge of the paper's affiliations.

REMIER BLUM STRESSES INTEREST IN JEVISH HOMELAND

PARIS, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- Premier Leon Blum, receiving a delegation of American Jewish labor leaders en route home from Palestine, emphasized today his deep interest in Jewish aims in the Holy Land.

Colonial Minister Marius Moutet also received the delegation. Discussing France's offer of colonies for Jewish settlement, he said the matter was being studied and expressed the hope that substantial results would be realized.

The French ORT held a reception for the group. The delegation was given a reception last night by the French Socialist Party.

NATIONS URGED TO RATIFY CONVENTION ON REFUGEES

PARIS, Feb. 16. (JTA) -- All countries were urged today to ratify the inter-governmental convention fixing the legal status of refugees from Germany in a resolution adopted at a conference on refugees. The convention was drawn up under League of Nations auspices.

Among those attending the conference were Sir Neill Malcolm, League High Commissioner for Refugees, and representatives of Jewish organizations, including the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and the HIAS-ICA Emigration Association.
