JEW KILLED, 6 WOUNDED IN ATTACKS ON MAY DAY PARADES IN POLAND

WARSAW, May 2. (JTA) -- A five-year-old Jewish boy was killed, five Jews seriously wounded and many others slightly injured when the firing of a revolver into a May Day procession in the center of the Jewish quarter threw the crowd into panic.

(The Havas News Agency said the assailants hurled a bomb and fired several revolver shots into the crowd.)

Terror-stricken men and women, seeking to escape from the crowd, trampled on one another, adding to the confusion and the number of casualties.

The dead boy was Abraham Schenken, son of a street trader. The seriously injured are: Feiga Niuman, 50-year-old Jewish woman; Lasar Nissenbaum, 17-year-old tailor; Hirsch Drumlewicz, 43-year-old shoemaker; Abraham Englisher, 59-year-old trader, and Gershon Perlmutter, eight-year-old son of a tailor.

Demonstrations in the capital included seven parades with a total of nearly 100,000 marchers. Four Jewish Socialist groups marched in the Jewish quarters, Havas said.

Jews Fight Attackers in Lwow

LWOW, May 2. (JTA) -- Nationalist students attacked Jewish participants in a common May Day parade of Jews and non-Jews, severely wounding Abraham Blaustein. The Jews fought back against the attackers.

Day Is Quiet in Palestine

JERUSALEM, May 2. (JTA) -- May Day passed quietly in a Holy Land tense with Arab-Jewish antagonism. No disturbances attributable to the international labor holiday were reported.

However, an Arab policeman named Charida Buayon was shot dead in the market place of the Arab city of Tulkarem. It was understood he had been carrying on some secret investigation. The murderer escaped.

A strong detachment of British police searched an Arab village on Mount Carmel, near Haifa, and discovered a large quantity of rifles, bombs and ammunition.

Hitler Sees Jews as "Soviet Leadership"

BERLIN, May 2. (JTA) -- Chancellor Hitler, in the course of a speech at the Lustgarten here on the occasion of the Nazis' May Day, attacked Soviet Russia and declared that "the chosen people (the Jews) form the whole of the Soviet leadership to the exclusion of all real Russian proletarians."

MANDATES COMMISSION TO MEET AT END OF JULY ON PALESTINE OUTBREAK

GENEVA, May 2. (JTA) -- A British note proposing that the extraordinary session of the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations to consider the Palestine outbreak be postponed until the end of July was published today. It was understood the session would be deferred as asked.

Receipt of the note was confirmed by the president of the League Council after conference with the members of the commission and the League rapporteur on mandates, who is the representative from Rumania. The document follows:

"The British Government has been informed by the President of the Royal Commission that the report of the Commission will be completed by the middle of May, when it will be presented to the British Government. It is therefore clear that the British Government will not be able to present its observations or submit its report to the Mandates Commission by the 31st of May (the original date set for the extraordinary session).

"The British Government therefore proposes that the extraordinary session be postponed until later. The Government is unable to state the exact date when the Royal Commission report and the British Government's observations could be submitted to the Mandates Commission. It believes, however, these documents will be ready for submission if the meeting of the extraordinary session be fixed for the end of July.

"Freedom of conscience and the profession and practice of religion are, subject to public order and morality, guaranteed to every citizen

"The State guarantees not to endow any religion and shall not impose any disabilities or make any discrimination on the ground of religious profession, belief or status.

"Legislation providing State aid for schools shall not discriminate between schools under the management of different religious denominations, nor be such as to affect prejudicially the right of any child to attend a school receiving public money without attending religious instruction at that school.

"Every religious denomination shall have the right to manage its own affairs; own, acquire and administer property, movable and immovable and maintain institutions for religious or charitable purposes.

"The property of any religious denomination or any educational institution shall not be diverted save for necessary works of public utility and on payment of compensation."

TWO BIG JEWISH FIRMS "ARYANIZED" BY NAZIS

BERLIN, May 2. (JTA) Two of Germany's biggest and best known Jewish concerns have been taken over by "Aryan" interests, according to an announcement yesterday.

The "Aryanized" firms, joining the long list of enterprises from which Jews have been forced out, are M. Kempinsky and Co., famous Berlin cafe operators, and Loeser and Wolff of Elbing, cigar factory and tobacco shop owners.

DR. FINK, EDUCATOR, DEAD IN GERMANY

BERLIN, May 2. (JTA) -- Dr. Elias Fink, well-known Jewish educator, died yesterday at the age of 77. For more than forty years he was connected with the Samson Raphael Hirsch School, orthodox religious institution in Frankfurt-am-Main.

LATVIAN MINISTER PROMISES SUPPORT FOR ZIONIST AIMS

RIGA, May 2. (JTA) -- Foreign Minister Munthers, a member of the League of Nations Council, today received Leib Jaffe, of Jerusalem, Director of the Palestine Foundation Fund. Mr. Munthers showed interest in Palestine upbuilding work and promised his Government's support of Zionist aims.

REFUGEE'S PSYCHIATRIC DISCOVERY HAILED AT VIENNA PARLEY

VIENNA, May 2. (JTA) -- A conference of leading Austrian nerve specialists opened here yesterday to discuss what is being hailed as an "epoch making discovery" in the treatment of dementia praecox by Dr. Manfred Sakel, German-Jewish refugee who is now conducting a clinic in America. The treatment, details of which were made public by Dr. Sakel prior to his departure several months ago, employs "insulin shock" as its principal feature.

Prof. Potzl, prominent nerve specialist, told the conference that despite the attacks against Dr. Sakel's method by many Vienna psychiatrists, he has handled 700 cases, of which 70 per cent were successful.

WOMEN'S COUNCIL SETS UP HEBREW U. PEACE SCHOLARSHIPS

NEW YORK, May 2. (JTA) -- A research fellowship and a scholarship in peace to be set up at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem were announced today by the National Council of Jewish Women.

The fellowship, financed by Arthur Brin of Minneapolis, will be known as "The Fanny Brin Research Fellowship in the Department of International Relations." The scholarship is the gift of Mrs. Ben Hirschland of Oklahoma City.

Trustees of the two funds will be Dr. Judah L. Magnes, president of the university; Dr. Hugo Bergmann, rector, and Dr. Norman Bentwich, Professor of International Relations.

UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA NOT SENDING DELEGATE TO GOETTINGEN

PHILADELPHIA, May 2. (JTA) -- The University of Pennsylvania will not send a delegate to the Goettingen University bicentenary celebration in Germany, according to an announcement by President Thomas S. Cates. Previously, Dr. Gates said, Dr. Daniel L. Shumway, Professor of German and a graduate of Goettingen, who had been planning to visit Germany, was asked to act as delegate, but Dr. Shumway changed his plans and will not visit Europe.

LAGUARDIA GETS AMERICAN HEBREW MEDAL FOR AIDING CHRISTIAN-JEWISH AMITY

NEW YORK, May 2. (JTA) -- Mayer LaGuardia was awarded the American Hebrew medal for his activities during 1936 toward promotion of better understanding between Christian and Jew at a banquet tonight in the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria. Henry Morgenthau, who presided, headed a distinguished list of speakers.

NEW YORK, May 2. (JTA) -- An increase in naturalizations among Jews in 1936 as compared with previous years was reported to the board of directors of HIAS by Isaac L. Asofsky, general manager. The HIAS Naturalization Aid Bureau helped 6,989 persons to draw up citizenship applications and 3,441 applicants to verify their records of arrival in the United States from the HIAS files.

The report shows that 9,024 Jewish immigrants and 6,175 non-immigrants were admitted to this country last year. The Washington representative of HIAS appeared before the Board of Review of the Labor Department in behalf of 316 immigrants temporarily excluded from the country. The society also drew up affidavits for 10,671 persons with relatives abroad, and 178,476 persons received information on immigration questions.

HIAS, which maintains a Missing Persons Bureau, was called upon to help re-establish contact between separated members of families in 11,563 cases. The Food and Shelter Department furnished 266,953 meals and 27,380 lodgings to immigrants, transients, homeless and unemployed, the report shows.

WORKERS' ALLIANCE MARKS 25th ANNIVERSARY

NEW YORK, May 2. (JTA) -- The twenty-fifth anniversary of the Jewish National Workers Alliance was marked with a mass meeting and concert at the Hippodrome last night. Among those on the program were Mrs. Goldie Myerson, David Pinski, Chaim Greenberg and Louis Segal, who presided.

PREMIER BLUM'S COUSIN WINS PARLIAMENT SEAT AGAINST FASCIST

SETE, France, May 2. (JTA) -- Jules Moch, Socialist Cabinet Secretary and cousin of Premier Leon Blum, was elected to the Chamber of Deputies today in the final ballot of the Sete by-election, the Havas News Agency reported.

He gained 8,554 votes compared with 2,312 for his only opponent Henri Vuillemin, candidate of the Fascist-inclined French People's Party of Jacques Doriot.

Endeks Arrested for May Day Attacks

WARSAW, May 2. (JTA) -- A number of Nationalist students were arrested here today as the result of disturbances which occurred yesterday during a Jewish Socialist May Day parade, the Havas News Agency reported.

Authorities feared that even more violent disorders would occur tomorrow, when Poland celebrates its national festival, and that they would be markedly anti-Semitic. Tracts have been distributed throughout the capital by an illegal Rightist group, calling on Nationalist youths to stage demonstrations.
