PARLIAMENTARIANS SEE POLISH PREMIER ON COURT'S SLUR ON JEWS

WARSAW, June 11. (JTA) -- The three Jewish deputies and two senators called on Premier Felicjan Skladkowski today to discuss the Warsaw District Court's indictment of the entire Jewish population of Poland in passing death sentence on a Jew for the murder of a Polish soldier.

A joint conference of the Jewish Deputies' Club, political and economic organizations was convoked at the same time to consider action on the court's unprecedented accusation.

Argentine Jewish Writers Back Protest

BUENOS AIRES, June 11. (JTA) -- The Union of Jewish Writers, at a conference today, expressed solidarity with the published protest of the Union of Jewish Journalists in Poland against the Warsaw District Court's blaming of the Jewish people and press for the killing of a Polish soldier by a Jew.

Publication of the protest in Polish Jewish papers caused their confiscation on Wednesday. The court had indicted the Jewish press and people of Poland in sentencing the slayer, Judah Leib Chatzkelewicz, to death.

JEWISH BUTCHER FREED, SON HELD IN SLAYING OF POLISH POLICEMAN

BRZESCO, Poland, June 11. (JTA) -- Police today withdrew the murder charge against Isaac Szczerbowski, the Jewish butcher whose dispute with a Polish policeman, ending in the latter's death, touched off the May 13 anti-Jewish riots here.

The butcher's son, Wolf, who was arrested with his father, was formally charged with murder. His trial will start Tuesday.

LONDON PARLEY URGES POLAND TO RESTORE JEWISH RIGHTS

LONDON, June 11. (JTA) -- A resolution expressing "horror at the persecution of the Jews in Poland" and calling on the Polish Government to "restore full rights without discrimination" to the Jews was adopted last night at a mass meeting of the Federation of Polish Relief Organizations.

Messages from political and religious leaders to the conference were read. Daniel Frankel, Member of Parliament, said in an address he was convinced that Nazi Germany was influencing Poland in its anti-Jewish policy.

Dr. Moses Gaster, who presided, expressed the hope the meeting would be the beginning of agitation from town to town and country to country in behalf of the Polish Jews.

Messages were received from David Lloyd George, British wartime Prime Minister; the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of Durham and Liverpool, Clement Attlee, Laborite leader; Viscount Cecil, George Lansbury, Herbert Morrison, Capt. Victor Cazalot and Sir Archibald Sinclair.

Mr. Lloyd George's message said:

"The Polish Republic owes its existence to the victory of the Allied and Associated Powers in the World War. Having sustained the terrible conflict to establish international rights and justice, the Poles were anxious for the creation of new states not to give birth to new racial and religious oppressions.

"Their statesmen insisted on inserting in the peace treaties clauses protecting the rights of minorities. It cannot, therefore, be a matter of indifference to us if the Jewish minority of that country suffers degradation of status through the failure of the Government to fulfill its treaty obligations.

"I share with the vast majority of my countrymen the hope that the Polish authorities will not delay in restoring to its Jewish citizens full protection and the equal rights guaranteed by the peace treaties."

U.S., League Asked to Intercede for Polish Jews

NEW YORK, June 11. (JTA) -- A program of immediate action on behalf of the persecuted Jews of Poland was adopted by 2,462 representatives of Jewish organizations at a conference last night at the Hotel Astor, called by the American Jewish Congress.

The delegates, representing 835 societies, lodges and congregations in New York City and vicinity, planned the following steps:

1. An appeal to "civilized opinion everywhere responsible for the re-establishment of Polish independence" to unite in protesting to the Polish government against its "role of oppressor" and its breach of treaties guaranteeing minority rights.
2. A plea to the United States Government, as one of the chief sponsors of Polish independence, and in view of its "good neighbor" policy, to inform the Polish government of its condemnation of the anti-Jewish campaign. A further request that the American ambassador to Poland make a survey of violations of treaty guarantees of minority rights.
3. Election of a national delegation of 200 to prepare and present to the United States Government a memorandum on Polish oppression of the Jews.
4. A call to the World Jewish Congress to petition the League of Nations, as guarantor of Polish minority rights, to act at once for the protection of the Jews.

The conference elected 75 members of the national delegation and issued a call for similar meetings throughout the country to acquaint the American public with the Jewish plight in Poland and to elect members of the delegation, which will meet in the near future in Washington.

The program was adopted in a resolution which gave a detailed history of recent persecutions in Poland and of the attempt to reduce Jews there to the status of "third class citizens," to deprive them of livelihood, and to drive them out of the country.

The assemblage received pledges of support from eminent non-Jews, including 13 United States Senators, 26 Representatives and two State Governors. Dr. Stephen S. Wise read a protest addressed to the Polish Government, signed by 86 Christian educators, religious leaders and laymen.

Two non-Jews, Francis Biddle, former chairman of the National Labor Relations Board, and Dr. Harry F. Ward, of the Union Theological Seminary, were among the speakers, and both declared the cause of Poland's Jews to be the cause of human freedom, of democracy and of civilization.

MANY JEWS NEED "WATCHFUL CONTROL," ITALIAN PAPER SAYS

ROME, June 11. (JTA) -- "The problem exists and cannot be considered solved," Popolo d'Italia said tonight of Italy's Jewish question, according to the Havas News Agency.

protested their patriotism, declared that there nevertheless was a mass of Jews who merited "watchful control."

"Beside the Israelites who in this case publicly declared themselves anti-Zionists and devout Italians, there exists, in fact," the newspaper noted, "an important mass of Jews who do not declare themselves and do not go out of the closed field of their race and their particular mentality, more or less artful from the point of view of adaptation to different situations, and in who consequently deserve watchful control."

EXPANSION DRIVE VOTED BY "FLOATING CONVENTION" OF MARITIME LEAGUE

JERUSALEM, June 11. (JTA) -- The "floating convention" of the Jewish Maritime League closed yesterday with the adoption of resolutions for expansion of the organization while the Mt. Zion cruised home to Palestine through the Mediterranean.

It was decided to increase propaganda for Jewish seafaring activities, seek an added 20,000 members during the year and charter a special Jewish ship to visit Jewish centers the world over to spread the Jewish maritime idea.

Messages of encouragement in the political fight for the Jewish homeland were radioed from the ship to Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization; David Ben-Gurion, member of its executive, and Moshe Shertok, head of its political department.

Hundreds of delegates and guests on board for the league's first conference discussed problems of Jewish shipping. The convention-ship cruised the Mediterranean, touching at Cyprus and Syrian ports. Dr. M. Soloveitchik presided over the conference.

2 KILLED IN ARAB RAID ON DRUZE TOWN

JERUSALEM, June 11. (JTA) -- In a revenge raid for the killing of an Arab recently, an Arab band today invaded the Druze village of Shafram, near Nazareth, and killed two villagers after setting fire to several houses.

Police raids in Jaffa uncovered large quantities of arms and ammunition. Several Arabs were arrested.

HOUSE PASSES DIES IMMIGRATION BILL

WASHINGTON, June 11. (JTA) -- The House, by a viva voce vote, yesterday passed and sent to the Senate the Dies bill for deportation of criminal aliens and protection of aliens from expulsion in "hardship cases."

Fascists and Nazis was defeated after John J. O'Connor (Dom., N.Y.) had declared the proposal represented suppression of free speech. An amendment by Howard W. Smith (Dom., Va.) to strike out the section protection hardship cases was also rejected.

Asking that Congress "extend the hand of mercy to 8,000 aliens who have committed no crime," Samuel Dickstein (Dom., N.Y.) asked for passage of the bill, which, he said, would result in deportation of 23,000 criminal aliens but protect 8,000 heads of families who were guiltless.

Martin Dies (Dom., Texas) announced that the bill had the support of the American Federation of Labor and the Committee for Industrial Organization.

Several representatives joined in attacking present immigration laws. Thomas F. Ford (Dom., Calif.) said the existing laws were "barbaric, cruel and a monstrosity." Everett M. Dirksen (Rep., Illinois) said it was not the fault of aliens if they were not naturalized, that sometimes it was the fault of the American system. "We should take them by the hand," he said.

William I. Sirovich (Dom., N.Y.) declared the bill humanized the present law. At the same time he assailed the Nazis for their attack on Cardinal Mundelein and asserted that "all Nazi theories of race, politics, history and religion are either outright falsifications of fact and truth or pure plagiarism." He charged that "foreigners and aliens of Germany are tyrannizing and enslaving the German people."

POLISH JEWS' FEDERATION CONVENTION OPENS HERE

NEW YORK, June 11. (JTA) -- The first session of the 29th annual convention of the Federation of Polish Jews in America, opening Saturday night at the Hotel Astor, was scheduled to be turned into a protest meeting against the persecution of Jews in Poland.

More than 1,000 delegates and guests from all parts of the United States and Canada were to hear speakers including Samuel Untermyer, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, Charles Edward Russell, author, and Benjamin Winter, president of the federation. Messages of solidarity were to be exchanged with simultaneous meetings of Polish Jews in Montreal and Toronto, Canada, in Mexico City, in four South American cities, and elsewhere throughout the world.

TACTICS OF GERMAN OPPOSITION DESCRIBED IN BOOK

NEW YORK, June 11. (JTA) -- The "subtle tactics" of the opposition in Nazi Germany are described in "Hitler's Drive to the East" by F. Elwyn Jones, an English commentator, published here by E.P. Dutton and Co.

The object of the book, says Harry Hansen in a review in the New York World-Telegram, is to stir the English people to a collective effort with the democratic nations and the League of Nations. Mr. Jones calls for "a democratic front."

SHOLEM ASCH SAILS FOR EUROPE AFTER TOUR FOR J.D.C.

NEW YORK, June 11. (JTA) -- Sholem Asch, the author, sails for Europe on the Conte di Savoia tomorrow after an eight-week speaking tour in the United States and Canada in behalf of the Joint Distribution Committee. Speakers at a reception tendered to him by the committee's Landmannschaft and Fraternal Division last night included Joseph C. Hyman, executive director of the J.D.C.; George Backer, chairman of the New York campaign; B.C. Vladdock, Jonah J. Goldstein and Jacob Fishman and S. Dingol.

ZIONISTS REPLY TO ARABS ON STATION WNYC

NEW YORK, June 11. (JTA) -- A reply to the anti-Zionist addresses of speakers at an Arab dinner here last Saturday which were broadcast over the municipally-owned Station WNYC was broadcast over the same station tonight by Zionist speakers. They included Dr. Stophon S. Wise, Louis Lipsky and Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver.

POLISH JEWESS IS AUTHOR OF CHINA'S BEST SELLER

PARIS (JTA) -- Author of China's best-selling novel of the year is a Chinese lady named Ho-Ro-So, who was born Rosenthal, a Polish Jewess, it has been revealed here by a returned globe-trotting Yiddish poet who made the novelist's acquaintance in Peking.

The poet is Mcloch Ravitsch, of Warsaw. He relates that when he arrived in Peking, he was astounded to be greeted by Madame Ho-Ro-So in Polish.

The novelist, author of the Chinese best-seller, "Love and Duty," explained to the poet that she had studied in Paris twenty years ago and there married a Chinaman named Ho, who today is a well-known railroad engineer in his native land.

Madame Ho-Ro-So, which is Rosenthal Chinese, has written other popular novels in Chinese. Her latest has sold well over 500,000 copies in the Chinese edition and has also done surpassingly well in the English and French translations.
