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PALESTINE POLICE SET FOR RIOTS, FEARED AS REPORT CLIMAX

JERUSALEM, June 29, (JTA) -- Police were ordered today to stand by to avert possible disorders as the date of publication of the Royal Commission's report on Palestine approached.

British embassies in Egypt, Iraq and Saudi Arabia have already received copies of the report, it was learned, accompanied by detailed maps explaining the recommendations.

The Palestine Government has received a secret letter from the Colonial Office in London, it was reported, containing outlines of the policy laid down in the commission's findings and measures for maintaining order after the report is published.

Rumors that a campaign of terrorism in the Holy Land would follow publication of the report were climaxed today by receipt of letters from an Arab "Black-Hand" organization threatening the lives of Government officials if the plan to partition Palestine is accepted.

The letters were received by the Southern District Commissioner, the Police Inspector for the Southern District, and also by Emir Abdullah ibn Hussein, Arab ruler of Transjordan, whose name has been mentioned as possible king of an Arab state if Palestine is divided.

The letter to the Emir warned him not to accept the partition of Palestine if proposed.

The "Black-Hand" organization was believed to be a new one. Another "Black-Hand" organization was suppressed when police raided a meeting of its leaders in Haifa last Sunday.

Meanwhile, Fawzi Bey el Kaukaji, Syrian terrorist leader who was termed "Public Enemy No. 1" during the Palestine disturbances of

1936 because of his activities in the Holy Land, was reported by Arab newspapers to have been released from a Syrian prison under a French Government amnesty.

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Date of Report's Issuance Not Yet Decided

LONDON, June 29. (JTA) -- The British Government has made no decision regarding the exact date of issuance of the Royal Commission report on Palestine, it was learned today, but everything is in readiness for publication within the next few days.

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Report Wauchope Will Be Replaced Termed "Pure Speculation"

LONDON, June 29. (JTA) -- The Colonial Office today described as "pure speculation" a report published abroad that the British Government had decided to replace Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope as Palestine High Commissioner with Sir John Anderson, former Governor of Bengal.

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Sir John Anderson an "Iron Man"

NEW YORK, June 29. (JTA) -- Palestine High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope will be replaced by Sir John Anderson, a reputed "iron man," because of the increasing prospects for a murder campaign in Palestine, the New York Times reported today from Jerusalem.

Sir Arthur, whose five-year term has another four years to run, will receive a peerage and be appointed Governor of New South Wales, the Times correspondent said he had learned on reliable authority, while Sir John, former Governor of Bengal, will be sent to Jerusalem.

General Wauchope has been criticized by Jews and moderate Arabs for his vacillating policy, the Times said, and although a soldier his policy has been one of pacifism.

Sir John succeeded in ending the reign of terrorism and murder against Britons in Bengal. He escaped death several times when attacked by native terrorists.

AGENCY'S MEMORANDUM ON DISORDERS TO BE PUBLISHED JULY 1

LONDON, June 29. (JTA) -- It was announced here today that the memorandum submitted to the League of Nations by the Jewish Agency for Palestine, relating to the Palestine Arab disorders of 1936, will be published July 1.

The memorandum is accompanied by a letter addressed to Palestine High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope in which it is charged that at the time of writing, May 4 last, security of life and property continued to be "signally lacking, to the grave concern of the Jewish population and all peaceful inhabitants."

The letter, signed by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Agency, states that measures to enforce security were characterized by "considerable delay."

It also charges that foreign governments having no locus standi under the Mandate were allowed to interfere in the affairs of Palestine with the result that "forces hostile to the Mandate have been fortified in the hopes of eventually forcing the British Government, through violence, to abandon the policy of a Jewish national home."

The Weizmann letter outlines a number of demands described as of urgent importance. Among the demands listed are compensation for loss of life, personal injury and damage to property; Government support for supernumerary police made necessary by the disorders; facilities for the new Tel Aviv port, created as result of the disturbances closing Jaffa port to Jewish merchants; raising the proportion of Jewish railway personnel; rectifying the municipal boundary between Jaffa and Tel Aviv.

The letter concludes with a protest against recent labor immigration schedules declaring:

"The Jewish Agency considers it vital to the interests of the Jewish people and lasting peace in Palestine that the Jewish national home be enabled within the shortest time to develop, through immigration, settlement to such an extent as to render futile any attempt, through violence, to arrest its growth."

The memorandum gives the Jewish population at the end of 1936 as 404,000, an increase of 27,000 during the year. Jewish immigrants during 1936 totalled 29,727, it is stated.

GOETTINGEN DELEGATES WARNED OF JEWISH DICTATORSHIP IN DEMOCRACIES

GOETTINGEN, Germany, June 29. (JTA) -- Foreign delegates attending Goettingen University's bicentenary celebration yesterday heard Education Minister Bernhard Rust warn democratic nations that "they will come under the dictatorship of the Jewish race of world wanderers who know no fatherland."

The Minister's speech was the second principal address of the ceremonies, attended by representatives of only a handful of American colleges and boycotted by British institutions of higher learning. Swastika flags dominated the campus.

Earlier, Dr. Hans Heyse, known for his neo-pagan and anti-Christian sentiments, was chosen as orator on "The Character of the Scientific Academies in Europe" as spokesman for the faculty.

Dr. Rust, in his address, said:

"Those nations that prize personal liberty as their most valuable possession must today recognize that the end of it must be and always will be the most agonizing form of dictatorship, a dictatorship of the masses. In the end it means the destruction of national states.

"These nations will pay for this liberty with their own existence. They will come under the dictatorship of the Jewish race of world wanderers who know no fatherland."

POLISH TEACHERS, AIR ENGINEERS TAKE ANTI-JEWISH DECISIONS

WARSAW, June 29. (JTA) -- Anti-Semitic decisions were taken today by two Polish organizations with large membership at conferences here and in Poznan.

A meeting of Polish aircraft engineers decided to introduce the "Aryan paragraph" barring Jews as members, despite strong opposition of a number of Polish air force officers.

In Poznan, a conference of the Christian National Union of Teachers adopted a resolution supporting institution of "ghetto" schools. The resolution advocates complete segregation of Jewish school children and teachers.

More than twenty Jewish traders were beaten and windows of Jewish houses smashed in disorders which broke out during marketing today in the towns of Gildo and Plawno in the Radomsk district.

J.D.C. 1936 REPORT SHOWS JEWS' FLIGHT IN EUROPE INTENSIFIED

NEW YORK, June 29. (JTA) -- Intensification of Jewish suffering and hardship throughout a great part of Central and Eastern Europe is described in the report for 1936 of the Joint Distribution Committee, made public today.

The J.D.C. spent \$562,885 for aid to Jews in Germany in 1936, the report said, and together with its affiliated American Joint Reconstruction Foundation granted \$1,622,250 in new appropriations and revolving credits for Jews in Central Europe. The Jewish population of Germany decreased to 380,000.

The J.D.C. also announced that Alexander Kahn, one of its vice-presidents and chairman of its committee on Poland, is sailing on the Normandie Wednesday to survey the committee's work in Europe. Joseph C. Hyman, executive director, will sail on the Aquitania tomorrow for a short stay in Europe, it was also announced.

vehement protest against threatened partition of Palestine, the fortieth annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America ended tonight with a mass meeting at Carnegie Hall where Mayor LaGuardia and United States Senator Wagner were scheduled speakers.

The convention had already backed its stand against partition by pledging to raise a \$40,000 special fund to be used by Dr. Stephen S. Wise at his discretion "for the highest Zionist purposes." One use for the money, Dr. Wise indicated, will be to establish a Washington Bureau of the Z.O.A. The convention had previously appealed to the United States Government to intervene in the Palestine situation.

An unexpected appeal for this sum, to be raised as a "fortieth anniversary fund" was made by Dr. Wise in his address of acceptance after he had been re-elected president of the ZOA by acclamation last night. Pledges totalling over \$10,000 were made from the floor.

Dr. Wise sprang another surprise today when he declared his intention of leaving in two weeks for the World Zionist Congress in Zurich with several American Zionist leaders, stopping off in London on the way to consult with Dr. Chaim Weizmann and other world Zionist chiefs. Previously Dr. Wise had indicated that he intended to remain here until the time for the Congress, despite a cabled invitation from Dr. Weizmann and David Ben Gurion to come immediately after the convention.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, of Cleveland, in an address before the convention assailed Great Britain for an "incredible record of failure" culminating in the partition proposal, which he called "a desperate effort to solve a problem created by Britain's 'own blundering.'"

Dr. Silver announced he would sail Wednesday on the Normandie and would visit Palestine, remaining abroad for the Congress, to which he was elected a delegate.

Other ZOA delegates elected to the Congress included Judge Julian W. Mack, Louis Lipsky, Morris Rothenberg, and Ab Goldberg, of New York; Professor Gustavo Klausner, St. Louis; Rabbi Solomon Goldman and Max Shulman, Chicago; Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner, Cleveland; and Rabbi Edward L. Israel, Baltimore.

Mr. Rothenberg, chairman of the ZOA administrative committee was re-elected, like Dr. Wise, by acclamation. The number of vice-presidents was reduced from eight to six, and the following were elected: Judge William M. Lewis, Dr. Silver, Elihu D. Stone, Nathan Straus, Dr. Isaac Goldstein and Joseph Kraemer. The vice-presidents, it was decided will not be members of the executive committee. Morris Weinberg of Brooklyn and Harry P. Fiorst of Mt. Vernon were elected co-treasurers.
