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WARSAW JEWISH HOSPITAL WAS FIRST NAZI TARGET, PILSUDSKI'S WIDOW REVEALS- "NO ERROR"

LONDON, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- Marshal Josef Pilsudski's widow, one of the Polish refugees here, declared today that the first building hit in the Nazi aerial bombardment of Warsaw was a Jewish hospital. "The bombers flew low," she said, "and it could not have been an 'error.'"

In an interview with the Evening Standard, Mme. Pilsudski accused Chancellor Hitler of hypocrisy in having ordered military honors paid at her late husband's tomb in Krakow.

Women Kin of Polish Jews Held by Nazis Demonstrate in Berlin

NEW YORK, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- Polish Jewish women have demonstrated several times in Berlin synagogues in the past week, demanding that something be done about male relatives in the Sachsenhausen concentration camp, the Associated Press reported today. German rabbis were placed in an embarrassing position since intervention in behalf of the Polish Jews might be construed as an attempt to give aid to the enemy, the dispatch said.

Contrary to time-honored practice, synagogue services must now close by 7 p.m., for all Jews must be off the streets by 8. The Jewish theater has been closed and the Kulturbund has ceased to operate. In Berlin, only one moving picture theater for Jews remains open -- from 3 to 7 p.m., the A.P. said.

Reports from various parts of Germany received by the Berlin Jewish Community indicate that Jews have been ordered to surrender bed linen, underwear and clothes for use by the army, the A.P. declared. Jewish community officials were hard at work to supply complete data by Friday on every Jew's personal financial status and other personal details required by the German authorities, the dispatch said.

4,892 "ILLEGALS" ENTERED PALESTINE IN 2 MONTHS, COMMONS TOLD; NONE TURNED BACK

LONDON, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- A total of 4,892 illegal immigrants entered Palestine between August 1 and Sept. 30, the House of Commons was informed today by Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald. None was turned back to sea, Mr. MacDonald declared.

The Colonial Secretary announced also a general improvement in the Palestine situation since the outbreak of war. He said: "There has been an improvement in the security situation in Palestine although instances of lawless activity by Arab terrorists still occur from time to time. Generally both Arab and Jewish sections of the community have

ranged themselves behind this country in the present emergency and have shown every desire to cooperate with us in the successful prosecution of the war."

The Jewish Agency for Palestine announced today that the first citrus shipment of the season was en route from the Holy Land to England. The announcement said that necessary measures had been taken to ensure the wartime supply of citrus.

LORD WINTERTON TO CONFER WITH JEWISH LEADERS HERE ON REFUGEE PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- Lord Winterton of Britain, chairman of the Intergovernmental Refugee Committee, will meet leaders of Jewish and Christian organizations in New York interested in refugees when he comes to the United States to attend the White House conference on refugees, it was disclosed today. He will remain for a few days at the Long Island estate of Myron C. Taylor, American vice-chairman of the Intergovernmental Committee.

Sir Herbert Emerson, director of the committee, will come directly to New York and will probably be the guest of Robert Pell, State Department technical advisor on refugee problems. Paul van Zeeland, president of the Coordinating Foundation, will also come to Washington.

As a preliminary to the conference of officers of the Intergovernmental Committee, which will be held on Oct. 16 and 17, the President's Advisory Committee on Political Refugees will meet in New York in the middle of next week.

HIAS Gets Word From Berlin, Prague Emigration Still Possible

NEW YORK, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- Reporting the receipt of cables indicating that emigration from German-dominated territories was still possible, the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society announced today that it was reorganizing its machinery on a wartime basis similar to that during the last war to render aid to Jewish emigrants and refugees.

Plans for registration of refugees in countries adjacent to Poland to bring them into contact with relatives in the United States and South America and to expedite departure from neutral ports of those holding visas for overseas countries are being worked out by HIAS affiliates in Rumania, Latvia, Lithuania, Belgium and the Netherlands.

Cables were received stressing the necessity of immediate action to facilitate emigration. The Hilfsverein der Juden in Deutschland cabled from Berlin: "Continuance of emigration possible and urgency requested. There are many immigrants with valid immigration visas. Passage on neutral lines obtainable against free foreign currency." The Jewish Kulturgemeinde in Prague cabled: "Continuance of emigration activities unhindered. Creation of further emigration possibilities urgent and indispensable. Spare no effort to help us."

Abraham Herman, president of HIAS, said that contact with the Berlin and Prague organizations, previously maintained through the HIAS-ICA Emigration Association in Paris, will now be carried on directly from New York. He added that it was likely that through this contact it would become possible to ascertain the whereabouts of relatives in the occupied provinces of Poland and prepare the way for their possible emigration.

The HIAS-ICA cabled that despite difficulties created by the outbreak of hostilities it was maintaining contact with emigrant headquarters and its offices in neutral and friendly countries. Dr. James Bernstein, European commissioner of HIAS and co-director of the HIAS-ICA, visited London on Oct. 2 and conferred with British Jewish leaders regarding problems of emigrant aid during the emergency.

Gestapo Permits Children to Leave, Amsterdam Hears

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- Despite the war the Gestapo (German secret police) is willing to permit emigration of German Jewish children to England if the British Government allows it, it was learned here today. This attitude was conveyed to two representatives of the Children's Refugee Committee of Amsterdam who interviewed Gestapo officials in Berlin.

MEMBERS OF RADIO BODY MUST BAN COUGHLIN UNDER CODE RULING; HALF OF PRIEST'S CHAIN HIT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- Radio stations holding membership in the National Association of Broadcasters must refuse to renew their contracts with "radio priest" Charles E. Coughlin, a spokesman for the association told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today, following action of the group's code compliance committee in barring from the air individuals buying radio time for controversial broadcasts.

Most of the contracts expire in the middle or the end of this month, so Coughlin will still have his usual chain of stations for several weeks and during that time, Washington circles predicted, he will launch a virulent attack upon the N.A.B.

Action of the N.A.B. will cut Coughlin's outlets by about one half, including the largest stations now carrying his broadcasts, the spokesman estimated.

Also hit by the N.A.B. action will be Judge Rutherford, who has attacked the Catholic Church and the Rev. Walton Cole of Toledo, O., Unitarian minister who has often answered Coughlin's attacks upon the Jews, the Administration and those favoring repeal of the arms embargo.

The committee took direct notice of the use of the radio to promote intolerance. It said: "Radio, which reaches men of all creeds and races simultaneously, may not be used to convey attacks upon another's race or religion. Rather it should be the purpose of the religious broadcast to promote the spiritual harmony and understanding of mankind and to administer broadly to the varied religious needs of the community."

The N.A.B. spokesman said the committee was moved to take action by the possibility that a group with unlimited funds could dominate the air by purchasing all available time on a great many stations. He estimated that Coughlin now has 50 or 60 stations under contract, although the N.A.B. has never been able to secure from Coughlin an accurate list of stations over which his voice is heard.

The committee's action was in accordance with the code of conduct adopted last July at a convention of the association, to which all major radio chains belong. In its interpretation of that part of the code affecting Coughlin, the committee said:

"Under no circumstances will compensation be accepted by the station or network for time consumed by the spokesman of a controversial public issue unless the spokesman appears on a public forum type of broadcast regularly presented, in conformity with the code, as a series of fair-sided discussions of public issues and when control of the fairness of the program rests wholly with the broadcasting station or network."

BAN ON ENLISTMENT OF ALIENS WITHDRAWN BY BRITAIN

NEW YORK, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- The British Government has withdrawn its ban on the enlistment of foreigners in the British forces by issuing an Order in Council under the Emergency Powers Act of 1939, permitting the nationals of neutrals or Allied states to join the forces or obtain commissions, according to reports from London today.

It was emphasized, however, that the British defense departments had no intention at the moment of commissioning or enlisting aliens on a large scale.

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Use of Refugees as Farmers Offered

LONDON, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- The services of some 1,000 Jewish refugees trained in agricultural pursuits were offered to the Government today by the agricultural committee of the Council for German Jewry in connection with the Government's demand for increased food supply.

ZIONIST LEADER SENDS CONDOLENCES ON MUNDELEIN'S DEATH

NEW YORK, Oct. 4. (JTA) -- Dr. Solomon Goldman, president of the Zionist Organization of America, today telegraphed the following message of condolence on Cardinal Mundelein's death to the Catholic diocese in Chicago: "The Zionist Organization of America shares with all Americans in their sorrow over the passing of one of the world's foremost religious leaders and distinguished statesmen, His Eminence, George Cardinal Mundelein, whose career beginning in poverty and ending in universal esteem sheds luster on his great Church and our glorious democracy. He was a great spiritual father in whom the humble underprivileged and persecuted could find encouragement, comfort and protection. The Zionist Organization particularly offers its heartfelt condolence to the Catholic Church and the Catholic Community of Chicago."

Biddle expressed conviction that among the forms of relief which American organizations would have to send to the occupied territories would be mechanized medical units. Such units, with sanitary equipment, must be sent as quickly as possible to save the lives of many, he said.

The Ambassador also promised to take immediate steps to establish the fate of Israel Giterman, Polish representative of the Joint Distribution Committee; Mendel Mozes, chief of the Warsaw bureau of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, and others.

The Polish information reaching Paris regarding the fate of the Jews in Warsaw said that the majority of the estimated Jewish population of 350,000 were unable to evacuate because trains were not running and other means of transportation were virtually paralyzed by Army confiscation of all vehicles.

Now, under the Nazi regime, the Jews are reported to be undergoing renewed terrorism as the Nazis try to play the Poles against the Jews through radio and other propaganda outlets, using the arguments that the Germans will "polonize" Poland and see to it that "the Jews no longer exploit the Polish people."

Reporting in a radio broadcast on the large number of Jewish suicides in Warsaw, Nazi announcers said that "in this way the Jewish problem in Poland is beginning to be solved automatically."

The information reaching Polish circles here emphasizes that Nazi anti-Jewish propaganda has not affected the Polish population and that many Poles are helping Jews in Warsaw to hide from Nazi arrest. It is added, however, that something must be done to bring immediate relief since in no occupied city do the Jews suffer as greatly as in Warsaw.
