TRUJILLO INVITES 1,000 YOUNG EXILES TO SETTLE IN SOSUA; PROJECT REQUIRES \$250,000

NEW YORK, June 18. (JTA) -- President James N. Rosenberg of the Dominican Republic Settlement Association today announced plans for settlement of 1,000 refugee children and youths from England and France, under a new offer by Generalissimo Rafael L. Trujillo, besides 200 refugees previously scheduled for colonization in San Domingo.

Equipment and one-year maintenance for the 1,200 will cost \$250,000, in addition to transportation expenses, Rosenberg said. Details of transportation have not been worked out yet, but Rosenberg expressed the hope that free transportation would be provided by Britain or Canada or aboard a Red Cross ship.

General Trujillo's offer was contained in the following cable: "I have recommended to the Dominican Government the adoption of a plan whose final details will immediately combine with the proposition of offering asylum in this Republic to a number of children and young men coming from England and France who will settle in the settlement at Scsua as an extension of the covenant celebrated between the Dominican Government and the Association for the establishment of colonists in the Dominican Republic."

Rosenberg's cable of reply follows: "Your noble action in extending settlement project for the unfortunate children and young people is magnificent. Shall try raise necessary monies. Meantime, in uame of those children, wherever and whoever they are and whatever their religion or nationality, profound thanks."

The 1,000 refugees will include 500 children and 500 youths between the ages of 16 and 20. "Our ability to expand the number whom we will aid will be controlled entirely by the money we can get," Rosenberg said. He added that he had the cooperation and promises of assistance in arranging transportation from George L. Warren, executive secretary of the President's Advisory Committee on Political Refugees; Stephen V.C. Morris, secretary of the Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees; Sir Herbert Emerson, director of the Committee, and Robert T. Pell of the State Department.

70 Orphans Housed in Manchester

MANCHESTER, June 18. (JTA) -- Seventy German Jewish orphans who escaped from Amsterdam and arrived in England May 20 will be established tomorrow in two hostels here, it was announced today by the German Jewish Aid Committee, which is sponsoring their resettlement. The children are from two to 16 years old.

'Wildest Confusion' in Bordeaux

WASHINGTON, June 18. (JTA) -- Bordeaux's refugee situation is one of "wildest confusion," Red Cross representative John Maloney cabled Washington headquarters today. He said:

"Bordeaux and region face almost insoluble problem with refugees continuously incoming despite attempts military authorities stem inflow. City already overcrowded with 150,000 homeless refugees faces possibility influx will reach 500,000. Re-evacuation hampered lack trucks and rail equipment. French also refugeeing from departments along Italian border and Riviera. Bordeaux railroad stations duplicate Paris scenes four weeks ago. Families sleeping parks and fields with mothers and young babies greatest sufferers. Ten infants born on Bordeaux bound refugee trains."

FLEET STILL PROTECTS PALESTINE, ARMY CHIEF STATES IN BROADCAST

JERUSALM, June 18. (JTA) -- Britain has fought and won "many splendid wars" singlehanded, it was declared today by the commander-in-chief of the British armed forces in Palestine in a statement of encouragement broadcast to the country.

"The courage of British men and women is still strong and steadfast," he said, "and Britain still possesses a tremendous weapon--seapower, which is still a shield for Palestine."

Labor Party Backs Allies

TEL AVIV, June 18. (JTA) -- Wholehearted support of the Allies was voiced today in a resolution adopted by a conference of the Palestine Jewish Labor Party.

The resolution extended special encouragement to the British Labor Party for assuming responsibilities in defense of the Empire and hailed the French workers and fighters.

In other resolutions the conference called upon American Jews to exert the utmost efforts to secure Jewish rights at the ultimate peace conference and appealing to the British Government to mobilize tens of thousands of Jewish youths, "who are ready to fight the external and internal enemies of Palestine."

Day of Prayer Set; Zionist Parley Put Off

LONDON, June 18. (JTA) -- Chief Rabbi Joseph H. Hertz today set next Sunday as a day of prayers of intercession "for a speedy triumph of the forces of freedom."

The British Zionist Federation decided to postpone its annual convention, scheduled to open June 25, because of the international situation.

ZIONIST LEADERS HERE FROWN ON JABOTINSKY ARMY PLAN

WASHINGTON, June 18. (JTA) -- Leaders of the Zionist Organization of America, conferring with British Ambassador Lord Lothian, yesterday disassociated themselves from the plan of Vladimir Jabotinsky, president of the New Zionist Organization, to create a Jewish army as part of the Allied forces.

Conferring with Lord Lothian were Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Dr. Solomon Goldman, Louis Lipsky and Eliezer Kaplan, treasurer, of the Jewish Agency for Palestine. After the interview, the Emergency Committee on Zionist Affairs issued the following statement on the delegation's behalf:

"Immediately after the declaration of war by Great Britain, Dr. Chaim Weizmann pledged support of the Jewish Agency for Palestine to the cause of the Allies. Following that declaration, 136,000 Jews of Palestine registered for war service. As recently as May 10, 1940, the Jewish Agency reiterated its readiness to mobilize four divisions for the defense of Palestine, in the cause of the Allies.

"The Zionist organizations of America have given their unqualified support to those proposals. It is understood, of course, that such support could be conditioned by the laws of the United States.

"It is unnecessary for us to state that American Zionist organizations are not associated with Mr. V. Jabotinsky's activities in any way."

Rabbi Isadore Breslau, of the American Zionist Bureau, added that American neutrality laws forbade enlistment of recruits for foreign armies in this country, and that American Jews would fight only when called upon to do so by their own country.

BALANCED U.S. DEFENSE PROGRAM BACKED AS RABBINICAL PARLEY OPENS

CHARLEVOIX, Mich., June 18. (JTA) -- Approval of the Liberal rabbinate for a "cooly conceived and balanced" national defense policy was expressed tonight by Rabbi Emil W. Leipziger, of New Orleans, delivering the presidential message to 200 rabbis attending the opening session of the 51st annual meeting of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, described as the world's largest rabbinical body.

C.C.A.R. members "contemplate with satisfaction and approval the expressed purpose of the President of the United States to prevent America from being drawn into the maelstrom of war," Rabbi Leipziger said in his message as prepared for delivery in advance.

He pointed out that the Jew was "caught within a vicious circle of his own driving ideals," having peace as his mission yet realizing that "if America does not add its might to the forces which democracies have engaged, freedom and justice may vanish from the earth--ideals as sacred as that of peace shall be flouted."

"Shall we eschew peace and fight for freedom or shall we let despotism triumph as the price of peace?" Rabbi Leipziger asked. "Was ever a people beset by a more grueling inner conflict?" His answer, in essence, was that the United States should stay out of war but strengthen its defenses.

In his address, Rabbi Leipziger also:

- (1) Recommended that the conference express appreciation to the various parties involved for the "inspiring" agreement regarding refugee settlement in the Dominican Republic;
- (2) Urged the conference to call on Jewish institutions of learning to create graduate schools and research departments in order to make room for rabbis and scholars from East European centers of learning;

- (5) Expressed concern over criticism in the liberal Christian press of President Roosevelt's appointment of Myron C. Taylor as personal representative to the Vatican;
- (4) Warned against the New York State law releasing children from school during the day to attend religious schools as giving impetus to the demand for a change in the status of religious education.

URUGUAY WIDENS ROUND-UP OF NAZIS; FOREIGN-RUN GROUPS BANNED

MONTEVIDEO, June 18. (JTA) -- Widespread raids on Nazis were under way today following the arrest of 12 leaders of an alleged Nazi plot to overthrow the Uruguayan Government.

Meanwhile, the Senate enacted a measure banning all organizations controlled from abroad. The measure, designed chiefly against Nazi and Fascist groups, had been previously passed by the Chamber of Deputies.

In addition to the Nazis arrested, 40 German engineers and technicians employed by the German-controlled Rio Negro Hydroelectric plant at Rincon del Bonete were brought here for questioning. All belong to the local Nazi organization.

JEW NAMED TO NEW LITHUANIAN CABINET

KAUNAS, June 18. (JTA) -- Dr. L. Kogan, famous Jewish lung specialist and expert on social medicine, has been appointed Minister of Health in the new cabinet of Justas Poleckis, formed following the Soviet occupation of Lithuania.

PRAGUE PRIEST SENTENCED FOR AIDING JEWS

ZURICH, June 9. (JTA--Airmail). -- The Prague newspaper Der Neue Tag reports that a 66-year-old Prague priest, Dr. Ferdinand Hrouds, has been sentenced to 15 months' imprisonment for "misuse of his office" by pre-dating records of Jewish conversions.

The newspaper states that Father Hrouda baptized 454 Jews after annexation of the Sudetenland by Germany in order to help them escape penalties of the anti-Jewish laws or to obtain immigration permits for South American countries.

Father Hrouda was charged with having inserted in the certificates of baptism not the actual date it had taken place but, in at least three cases, a date a few days after the date of birth of the convert. In his defense Father Hrouda is reported to have explained that he had been moved by Christian sympathy to aid the Jews.
