AGENCY SEEKS TO AID STRANDED PALESTINE-BOUND REFUGEES; ITALIAN JEWS FREED

JERUSALEM, June 20. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency asked the Palestine Government in a memorandum today to provide transportation for 16 Palestine-bound Jewish refugees aboard the Italian steamship Rodi, which was captured by a British warship and taken to Malta.

Many Jewish refugees with Palestine certificates who had been in Italy fled to Greece, whence they have been trying to reach Palestine by train. The Agency is attempting to obtain for them the necessary transit visas through Turkey and Syria.

Several Italian Jews, including four Hebrew University professors, were released by the authorities after having been under detention since Italy's entrance into the war.

The position of American Jews in Palestine in the light of the war was discussed last night at a meeting in Tel Aviv attended by the heads of 175 American Jewish families. A committee was appointed to take up with the American Consul questions of evacuation of Americans inside or outside Palestine. Consular forms indicating their desires were filled out by participants in the meeting.

Aid by U.S. Jews Seen Needed if War Is Long

NEW YORK, June 20. (JTA) -- Mrs. Rose Jacobs, American member of the Jewish Agency's Jerusalem Executive, who returned from Palestine last week, said in an interview today that although Palestine had made all preparations for the war, a long conflict might raise the necessity of American Jewish aid.

"The fate of Palestine is inseparable from the future of the entire Mediterranean area," Mrs. Jacobs said. "The Yishub is prepared and is doing its best to take care of our needs. It may be able to pull through by itself. But if the war lasts long and supply lines are seriously restricted the day may come when American Jews will have to send help, as they did in the last war."

The Executive member declared "the Arabs are behaving, for the most part, peacefully now, but there was a demonstration in Jaffa when some Arabs paraded through the street shouting 'Heil Hitler! Heil Duce!' There were rumors of similar demonstrations in Nablus and elsewhere. The next day the Government issued a stern

warning against 'spreading false rumors,' threatening severe penalties. It wasn't clear who was responsible for the demonstration or how much arab sentiment it represented. There were rumors, too, that the Mufti had returned to Palestine. I have no idea whether there was any basis for these reports.

"One thing is certain--the Jews are 100 per cent loyal to the Allies. The loyalty is much stronger than the Allies themselves seem to realize. No matter what happens they can depend on the support of the Yishub."

POSITION OF JEWS IN LITHUANIA SEEN IMPROVED UNDER NEW REGIME

WILNO, Lithuania, June 20. (JTA) -- The Jewish position in Lithuania has undergone a radical change for the better, Jewish community leaders indicated today in an interview with the J.T.A. They pointed out that the new regime, which was set up following Soviet occupation, is a guarantee that full social and national equality will be enforced.

The first changes in officialdom, the leaders said, indicate that the new regime is determined to pursue a non-discriminatory policy.

Jewish institutions are continuing to function normally. The position of refugees in Wilno has been particularly improved, the system of repressions instituted by the former regime having been discontinued.

Officials of the Joint Distribution Committee here announced that they were continuing relief operations for refugees as well as for needy sections of the local population although facing financial difficulties.

U.S. URGED TO USE MERCHANT MARINE TO EVACUATE REFUGEES IN FRANCE

LONDON, June 20. (JTA) -- A plea to America to use its mercantile marine to evacuate German refugees still in France was voiced today at the annual session of the Council of the League of Nations Union.

The appeal was made by Margery Corbett-Ashby, who was among the signers of an appeal on behalf of refugees issued on May 51 by the Archbishop of York, and was coupled with a warning that unless swift action was taken within the next five or six days the fate "of these unhappy refugees" would be sealed. Jews, she said, would be deported to Poland and political refugees would face the firing squad.

Resolutions taking "strong exception" to the British Government's enactment of the Palestine land sale curbs without previous reference to the League Council and urging modifications of refugee restrictions here, which had been scheduled on the agenda, were withdrawm in order not to detract from the Union's support of the Government. President Gilbert Murray, however, referred to the Union's previous resolution on Palestine, declaring that both questions would be considered by the Union's executive body.

Smolar, Bernstein Reach Lisbon

LISBON, June 20. (JTA) -- Boris Smolar, chief European correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, and Dr. James Bernstein, European director of the HIAS-ICA Emigration Association, arrived here today from Bordeaux. Dr. Bernstein will study the possibilities of transferring HIAS-ICA operations to Lisbon.

Grynszpan Feared Fallen Into Nazis' Hands

WASHINGTON, June 20. (JTA) -- No word has come from Paris of the fate of young Herschel Grynszpan, whose assassination of a German Embassy official in Paris in 1938 precipitated organized pogroms in Germany, Government officials said today.

The officials believed it certain that the Polish Jewish youth, who had been held in a Paris cell awaiting trial, has fallen into German hands. They expressed doubt that he would survive.

(A London dispatch quoted a French radio report that Grynszpan had been seized by the Nazis in Paris and would be "tried" by them.)

BRITAIN WIDENS CURBS ON ALIENS; 50 DOCTORS DISMISSED

LONDON, June 20. (JTA) -- Home Secretary Sir John Anderson revealed in the House of Commons today that he has authorized chief constables to arrest and intern any Category C aliens whose reliability is doubted. He admitted that Category C aliens were interned without any reason being given when the action was represented as a matter of military necessity.

Fifty refugee doctors who, with the agreement of the British Medical Association, had been permitted to undergo training in order to qualify for licenses to practice here, have been dismissed from their posts, it was learned today.

A.F.L. ASKS REPUBLICANS TO FAVOR ACTION AGAINST SUBVERSIVE GROUPS

PHILADELPHIA, June 20. (JTA) -- The Republican National Committee's Resolutions Committee was urged today by the American Federation of Labor, represented by President Milliam Green and Secretary George Meany, to include in its platform planks calling for prosecution of organizations seeking violent overthrow of the Government, deportation of aliens advocating such overthrow and continuation of the nation's restricted immigration policy.

TEL AVIV, June 20. (JTA) -- Zalman David Levontin, a pioneer Zionist, died here yesterday at the age of 84. In 1901 Levontin was invited by Dr. Theodor Herzl, father of political Zionism, to organize the Jewish Colonial Trust, Zionist financial institution.

ANTI-ALIEN LAWS HELD 'CAPITULATION TO TOTALITARIANISM'

CHARLEVOIX, Mich., June 20. (JTA) -- The 51st annual conference of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, approving the report of its Social Justice Commission, today warned that current anti-alien legislation was "in effect a capitulation to totaltarianism."

The report, submitted for the commission by Chairman Edward L. Israel, Baltimore, said that anti-alien measures were "unjust to the overwhelming majority of loyal aliens as well as destructive of the fundamental texture of true democracy."

"We hereby record our faith in the loyalty of those who have come to this country either recently or in the past," the report declared. "We urge them to become full-fledged citizens of this land and urge that in the commendable effort to protect democratic institutions there be no legislation passed which will imperil the liberties of aliens as a group."

The report also approved the American Civil Liberties Union action for peace between the C.I.O. and A.F. of L., the findings of the Inter-Faith Conference on Unemployment in Washington on June 6, asked abolition of the poll tax in southern states, Government aid for the sharecroppers and retention of the fundamental principles of the National Labor Relations Act.

"There will never be enduring justice and sound civilization until men recognize and respect that dignity of the individual which is inherent in our Jewish spiritual concept of God's fatherhood and man's brotherhood; whatever specific applications we may make in the realm of social and economic life flow from this concept," the report added.

At a session tonight on "The Spirit and Character of the American Jewish Community," Rabbi B. Benedict Glazer, New York, said: "The full force of Hitler's savage onslaughts on the Jew is not completely dissipated in Europe. The poison of his international propaganda machine has seeped into many areas of the depression-prepared soil of the United States."

He pointed to what he called over-concentration of the American Jewish community on self defense and said: "It is questionable whether activities in the field of Christian-Jewish relations have influenced a major segment of the population, particularly the masses of victims of unemployment and depression and susceptible to the anti-Jewish blandishments of a demagogue."

Rabbi Glazer predicted that ultimately many external differences among the three major Jewish religious groups in the United States would disappear.

Speakers at a symposium this afternoon on "Problems of the Rabbinate" stressed that the war had greatly affected their functions. B. Feibelman, New Orleans, said that "civilization itself may not survive the war." Abraham Shusterman, Tulsa, declared: "No problem confronting the rabbi can compare with that of good and evil to which a war-torn world has given new significance."

Solomon N. Bazell, Louisville, declared that "freedom and democracy are sacred terms in these times" and called for a code of Reform Jewish conduct and practice. Other speakers included David H. Wice, Omaha, and Samuel Wolk, Wilkes Barre.
